Now there is a dispute bubbling up over the ownership of the Spaulding baseball trophy. If the clubs do not pull themselves together and play ball next season, the public will be ready to vote for depositing the cup in the museum.

Ka Leo laments that the natives on the other islands do not heed its howling. It makes the remark, "We have done our part, and can say no further." In other words it says the cause of restoration is dead, what it abused this paper for saying many weeks ago.

Wilder's Steamship Company is signaling the opening of its corporate new year by the initiation of several improvements. Among the principal is quicker time to be made between Honolulu and Hilo by the company's banner steamship Kinau. The company is introducing the apprentice system into its fleet, whereby bright young men will be enabled to learn practical navigation, as well as marine engineering, without having to leave their island homes in youth.

Labouchere believes that Japan has a right to pursue the advantages she has won in the struggle with China until she compels the enemy to sue for peace. He is doubtless correct in this view. There was a belief that some influential papers would be disciplined if they persisted in their outspoken criticism of the Emperor.

HUM ON QUEEN STREET.

National Iron Works Has a Busy Time.

Any person passing out Queen street to-day would hear the cheering hum of busy industry at the National Iron Works. The machinery of the establishment is now run by an electric motor. It is a well-equipped foundry and machine shop, having two cupolas, a brass furnace, turning and planing machinery, crane, etc. White & Ritman, two master mechanics, are the proprietors.

The works have just delivered a lot of work to the Oahu Railway & Land Company, and have more in hand from the same corporation. It is the iron and brass work for the new cars that company is building. A damaged aermotor is being repaired to the order of the Hawaiian Hardware Company. The firm has a considerable amount of work in hand for coffee planters. There are cleaners, hullers, etc., for both power and hand. Work of the kind described is particularly interesting, showing how one industry promotes and helps other industries.

Mr. Ritman was busy at the moulds this morning, having a variety of patterns in the sand. His last previous casting amounted to 3500 pounds. A machinist was working at a lathe, putting the finishing touches on parts of machinery. J. C. White, the senior partner, was in the shop but unfortunately only able to help with advice, as he is going lame with a sprained knee.

The reporter asked about the progress of a new motor machine, intended to revolutionize the operation of machinery, about which he had got an inkling on a previous visit to the same place several months ago. He was told that the idea was still being worked up by the inventor, and some of the work for him was in hand at present.

Prince Hohenzolne Not of the Submissive Kind.

That the advent of Prince Hohenzolne as Chancellor means an end, at any rate for the time being, of the submissive Chancellor regime, as it existed during Caprivi's tenure of office, is now a generally accepted fact. So says a Berlin correspondent, who thus proceeds: Every indication is that Hohenzolne is determined to have things his own way, and the Emperor, apparently, is inclined to give him a free hand. In fact, there is a strong reminder of Bismarckian times. Hohenzolne, and not the Emperor, is regarded as the man who will pull the strings in Germany's domestic and foreign policy. Newspapers of all shades of opinion do not tire of occupying themselves with everything connected with the new Chancellor, and every fact, even the most trifling, is read with avidity throughout Germany.

One article written by Professor Gelfcken and bearing upon the new Chancellor, has attracted a great deal of attention. He adduces evidence to show that Bismarck, and not Hohenzolne, was responsible for the venustious passport regulations in Alsace-Lorraine, and that it was due to the personal intervention of Hohenzolne that after the elections there in 1877, which were so unfavorable to the Government, the constitution was not suspended and the Reichland again governed from Berlin direct.

This testimony from Professor Gelfcken that Hohenzolne's record is not as black as it has been painted in some quarters, comes very opportunely, in view of the striking manner in which the Prince has been received on his return to Strasburg for a short stay in order to settle the affairs of his administration completely in order for his successor. Hohenzolne has been the recipient of many manifestations of regret at his leaving his post from various parts of the two provinces. The Prince tomorrow will be presented with a farewell address by the Strasburg University, and at the same time an honorary diploma will be conferred upon him. These ceremonies will be followed by a torchlight procession arranged by the inhabitants of Strasburg. The demonstrations of the people of Strasburg, and of Alsace-Lorraine in general, afford clear testimony of the esteem and respect in which Hohenzolne is held by the inhabitants of the two provinces he has governed and disprove the assertions that his rule has been unduly severe. Hohenzolne will not return to Berlin until Wednesday next and until then several weighty questions remain in abeyance.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

Movement to Revive the Organization in Honolulu.

A meeting of teachers was held at the Y. M. C. A. hall yesterday to discuss the organization of a Teachers' Association. President Hosmer of Oahu College presided, and there was a good attendance. J. Lyford was the secretary.

Remarks, all favorable to taking action, were made by Messrs. Dunas, Mackintosh, Richards and Lyons, also Miss Beckwith. The following committee was appointed to draft a scheme of organization and lines of work: Miss Beckwith of Punahou Preparatory School, Mr. Richards of Kamehameha, Miss Eastman of the Kindergarten, Dr. Lyons of Punahou, Rev. A. Mackintosh of the Royal, Miss Needham of the Fort Street, Mrs. Souza of the Portuguese, Mr. Walls and Rev. J. Okabe.

Although the former organization, which included teachers of the whole group, has been dormant for several years, there are local organizations on the other islands which maintain commendable activity.

THE SMUGGLED OPIUM.

Trial of the Accused Deferred—What the Police "Think."

Edwin Gilsey's case will not be called until some time next week. Gilsey is charged with the smuggling of ninety pounds (180 tins) of opium. He is still in jail and friends are working on the quiet to secure his release. The Customs officers are of the opinion that they have sufficient evidence to convict Gilsey, who they believe has been in the game for the past few months. Recently he purchased a "California" horse from Jim Carty, paying half the purchase price down. He was about town lately in a new rig and playing the high-toned sport.

In police circles it is believed Gilsey has a partner in the person of another colored man whose face is familiar on the city front. The police will keep their eyes "peeled" hereafter.

ATTITUDE OF ENGLAND.
Labouchere Offers Some Independent Advice to the Japanese.
The impression grows stronger in the European capitals, says a late London despatch, that there will be no interference of any sort by the powers in the war in the East at its present stage. This is due to no lack of desire on England's part, for she is becoming extremely anxious over the growing peril to her interests. The belief spreads that the overthrow of the present dynasty of China is inevitable. It makes little difference whether it is accomplished by the Japanese or by a revolution. If by the latter agency England will find means to secure the substitution of another native dynasty.
It is only a question of time when England will put her finger in the pie, or on pretext or another, in spite of her professions of neutrality. Her national characteristics are so constantly coming into evidence that Labouchere seems almost alone in the possession of these healthy sentiments. "The sole reason for asking the neutral powers to intervene is, I take it, that the Chinese do not want to admit that they have yielded to Japan. If the European powers did intervene, the wretched, cowardly swaggers would soon establish the legend that the monarchs of the West had been ordered by his celestial majesty to bring the Japanese to reason, and that the subject monarchs had obeyed the celestial behest. If the Japanese are as intelligent as they seem to be, they will push forward preparations for a march on Peking. When all is ready and the invading army is already on route, they will signify to the Chinese on what terms they can have peace. If the terms are not accepted the Japanese should march forward and dictate terms at Peking. No suggestions from neutrals should induce them to arrest military and naval operations."

All officials failing to obey these instructions are to be degraded and punished. Premier Baca is not favorable to the Central American Federation and his accession to power may result in Nicaragua's withdrawal from the compact."

JUDICIAL NOTES

Charlotte Adams' Will-Objection to S. Ehrlich's Discharge.

W. H. Cummings has brought action against J. K. and Niau Iauka, to have judgment in their favor for \$300 damages sustained. The Mar. Ct. endorses on the summons, a bond filed as required by Sec. 8, Chap. 95 of Laws of '93.

Annie Phelps sues for a writ of error against Jos. O. Carter, as proponent of the alleged will of Charlotte Adams, to have the judgment on verdict set aside. Plaintiff was one of the contestants of the will that was admitted to probate. C. W. Ashford is her attorney.

John H. Hackford, assignee in bankruptcy of S. Ehrlich, has filed objections to the discharge of the bankrupt.
