"Free to be strong or feeble, free to be false or true,  
To withhold you from evil-doing, or what I shall ban, to do;  
Free to be crooked and craved, or fearless, and frank, and brave,  
To love as yourself your brother, or make him your bond and slave;  
To hallow the world with freedom, or fetter your fellow-men;  
But, as you shall do, at the Judgment Day My Justice will judge you then."

Then the sons of men multiplied gladly, and, proud of the boon of birth,  
They teemed over main and mountain to the uttermost bounds of earth;  
They built up cities and Empires, Commonwealth, Throne, and State,  
And some were pillared on force and fraud, and some upon fear and hate.  
For the strong cared but to enjoy their strength, the mighty to use their might,  
And the vanquished were lashed to the victor's car, wherever his sword could smite.

But out of the mist of the Northern Sea a blended race arose,  
Whose blood was warmed by the wind and the wave, and braced by the winter snows:

And the lowliest hearth hath sacred rights nor sceptre nor sword dare touch;

Let the hellhounds of War be all unleashed, and the battle-bolts be judge!"

Then the Land of the Northern mist waxed wroth, and said,  
"Now their hour has come,  
Too long to their deeds have mine ears been deaf, too long my voice been dumb,  
I will wrench the rod from their boorish grasp, their lash will I snatch and seize,  
Till low on their knees they grovel down, and for mercy clasp my knees.  
They have called on the sword, they shall bide by the sword, and mine will I never sheathe,  
Till to dwellers in darkness it bring the Light, and Freedom to all who breathe."

Then manly to tender kissed farewell, but never a tear was shed,  
And over the wave, and along with the wind, to the Southern zone they sped,  
The roughly-nurtured, the gently-bred, all bound on the self-same track,  
To storm the steeps and defiles of death, but never to turn them back;  
And their sons that on Austral or Western shores exult in their sires' renown,  
Shouted, "Barrel and blade, we'll come to you, and gallop the despots down."

Shame, shame on you, Gaul and Teuton! that, seeing this noble deed,  
You have hardened your hearts for envy, and been false to your vaunted Creed;  
Should juggle with truth, should welcome the lie, should garble and gird for spite,  
Pray Heaven to favor the tyrants' cause, pray Heaven to hinder the Light.  
Hark, hark to the greeting of free-born men from the Land of the Setting Sun,  
"God prosper you, dear old England! it is rightly and nobly done!"

XI.  
Wherever our sails have quivered, wherever our keels have plowed,  
We have carried the Flag of Freedom, unfurled it from mast and shroud.  
It hath weathered the storm of battle, it guardeth the paths of peace,  
And will watch over Right, both day and night, till the day and the night shall cease;  
And, while there's a chain to statter, and, while there's a wrong to right,  
Its watchword shall be God's gift to man, "Through Liberty, on to Light!"

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

For the peace of the Community we think that the men located at the Drill Shed camp should be permitted to remain there until they can find other quarters. Most of them are working and able to pay for their grub; it is only a question of lodging. The expense is very trifling indeed and the Board of Health's "finance committee" may see its way to save a few dollars from the amounts now used for cigars, liquor, hacks and guards. If the men are turned out they may try to find sleeping accommodations in our chicken houses, gardens or verandahs.

We clip from a leading American paper the following expression of opinion and the policy of expansion: "The expansion of the English-speaking race in America has often been distinctly immoral in method; it has often been rapacious, cruel, brutal; and for every offense against the laws of God it has paid, paying, and will pay the penalty. If the rights of the Indians have not been protected his wrongs have been punished. Nevertheless, the Indian was bound to give way to the superior race." Superior in what, pray? Is it in rapacity, cruelty and brutality?

In a certain grade of politics, not altogether estimable, it is considered fair play to disintegrate the power of opponents by misstatements. For some reason best known to the Star that interesting, but scarcely ever reliable, journal has endeavored to make trouble between the Consul of China and his Vice Consul. The felicitous imagination could scarcely be surpassed when the Star's statement of last evening and the facts are compared. As our morning contemporary, ever anxious, under its present management, to approach Truth even if not to clasp her, has contradicted the Star's version, THE INDEPENDENT contents itself by endorsing the Advertiser and, after investigation, of saying that Vice Consul Goo Kim Fui is too well known in the community to be reproached by even the mere suggestion of intriguing against his superior with whom he is on the best of terms. If a building is erected on a false foundation it falls. Verb: Sap: Suff.

It may appear surprising to the Advertiser man that a number of people should endeavor to organize a political club, and that T. B. Murray, who has been connected with the political affairs of the Islands during the last twenty-five years should take an active part in the interest of the club. Knowing, as we do, that the present Advertiser man owed his political prestige in the early '90s to "Tim" Murray, we can well understand his attempt of ridiculing his former political "boss." The political star of Mr. Murray may be waning in the far horizon, but the star of the Advertiser combination has set for good and at least for years to come. We thank the Advertiser for its kindness in outlining a "policy" for THE INDEPENDENT, but while feeling grateful for its good offers, we beg to state

that no mediation from any "party" of the enemies of the Hawaiians will be accepted or listened to. When the day comes the platform and policy of the Hawaiians will be known and not before.

Concerning the crime of 1893 against Hawaii, Senator Clark, of Wyoming, said: "We all know that revolutions, if successful, are just; they are legal; and the successful power has the right to do what it pleases. It is not often that I agree with the Senator from South Dakota on political questions, but there is no man in this Chamber, if you get him out in a corner of the cloak-room, who will not acknowledge that the revolution in Hawaii was made possible only by the arms of the United States of America! Now, can we not afford to be at least equitable and just and honest in this matter? We took those islands. They had to go somewhere. I do not regret that we took them. I am very glad of it, because I think that of all the domain over which the American flag flies to-day the Sandwich Islands are the fairest and give promise of the most in the future." The Senator was speaking in support of an appropriation, for Queen Liliuokalani's support. The ethics of the Senator we need not discuss.

It will be remembered that a mysterious meeting was held at the Y. M. C. A. a short while ago, at which parsons and invited "business" men were present. The object of the secret meeting was stated to be the moralizing of Honolulu and the doing away with the social evil, but not a whisper was heard as to the methods the moral men intended to the methods the moral men intended to adopt to purify the moral atmosphere of the town. This morning our principal dicky-bird dropped a letter on our window sill and we learned of an important meeting in the Attorney-General's office, at which propositions were made to "do wonders." As far as we can learn it has been agreed between the Government and the Y. M. C. A. people that men living on the immoral earnings of women shall be banished under a law which is still in existence, although virtually a "dead letter." No one will oppose such a step except the men to be banished, and, we presume, their lawyers. If the matter is to be carried out, no time should be lost, because in the moment the territorial bill takes effect our "banishing" law will be a thing of the past. It is understood that Messrs. Ballou and McClanahan are assisting the Government in prosecuting the men. While we all wish to make Honolulu a special moral town that our virtuous reformers not lose sight of the doings and temptations of our own boys and girls.

A Japanese, named Fujihara is in jail at Hilo on the charge of having shot and killed Sasuda. It is thought that the killing was the result of an illegitimate intimacy between the wife of Sasuda and the alleged murderer.

**A Sudden Death.**

The many friends of D. W. Roach were shocked to learn last night of the untimely death of D. W. Roach which occurred at his home on Adams Lane after a very brief illness. The deceased was one of the best known barbers in town. He had resided here about 15 years and carried on a flourishing business. He was a native of California and 36 years of age. A widow and two young children mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father. Roach's well known shop adjoining the Pantheon Saloon was burned during the recent official fires. The cause of death was pneumonia and the deceased was attended by Dr. Day and an autopsy held. Mr. Roach was a member of Mystic Lodge, Knights of Pythias under whose auspices the funeral will take place at 4 p. m. to-day.

**The Court of Claims.**

At yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet it was decided the Executive Council request the Council of State to appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the expenses of the court of claims, etc, according to the following items:

Finance Department—Pay of Commissioners of the court and incidentals, \$15,000.

Attorney General's Department—Pay of counsel for the Government, \$5,000.

These items are based on estimates for expenses for the forthcoming six months and are as follows:

Five Commissioners at \$10 per day each.

One clerk at \$150 per month.

Two stenographers at \$125 per month each.

Three interpreters at \$5 per day each.

One janitor and messenger at \$40 per month.

Counsel for government, \$500 retainer fee and \$7 for each case adjudicated on its merits.

Subsequently at the meeting of the Council of State the bill was referred to the Finance Committee of that body for investigation and consideration.

**Found Dead.**

A German of middle age who occupied a room at the lodging house on Fort street, known as the Villa, was found dead in his room this forenoon.

He had not been seen since last Friday, and the landlady thought he might have left for the country. The Japanese servant cleaning the room knocked at the door every day but received no response. Yesterday, the occupants of the adjoining rooms complained about a terrible stench, and finally the door was broken down and the decomposed body of the man was seen the floor.

A small five barreled revolver was found near to the body which was perfectly black. The police were summoned and Deputy Marshal Chillingworth on his arrival telephoned for Dr. Emerson, who could not attend until he had his luncheon, and impanelled a coroner's jury who viewed the body. The identity of the alleged suicide was not ascertained when the Deputy Marshal returned to his office.

### Russia Aggrieves Germany.

Berlin, March 15—An unpleasant  
impression has been created here by  
the speech of Chaplain Malcheff of
