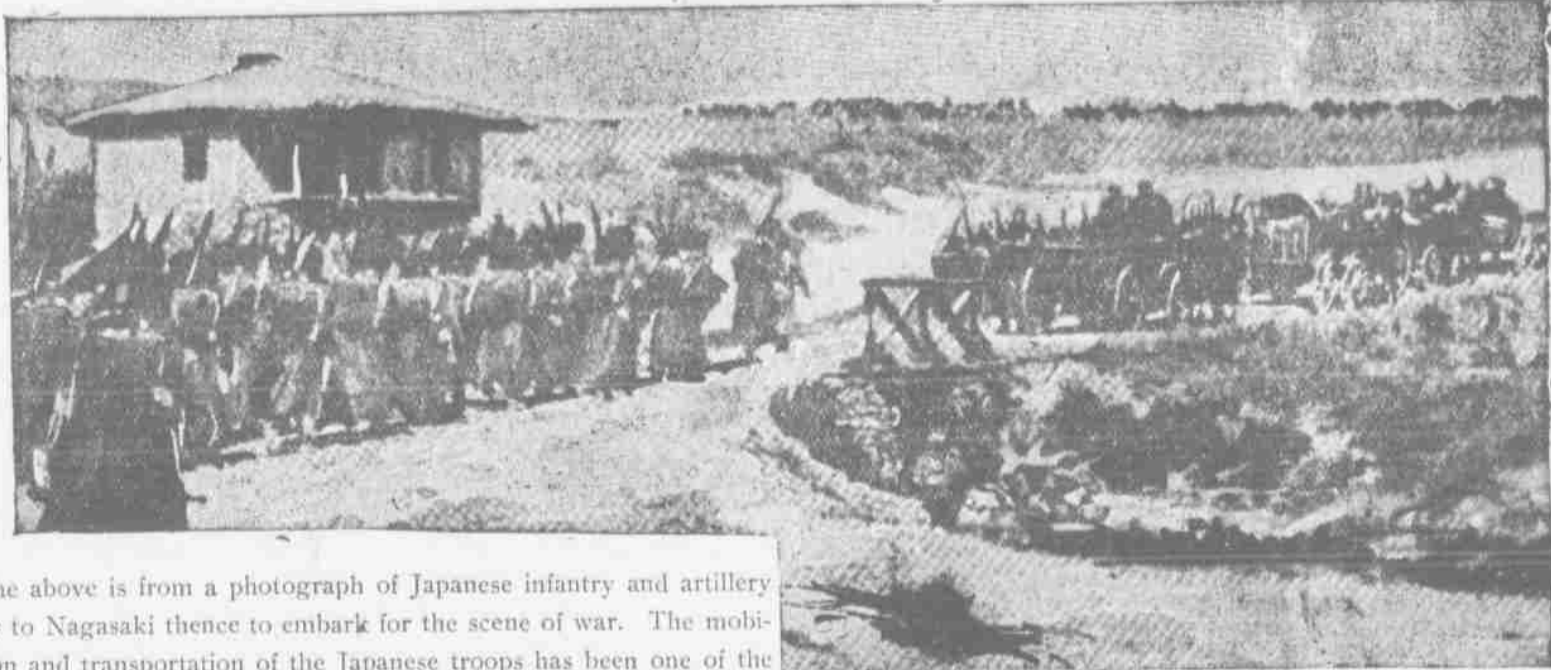

Mobilization Of Japanese Troops Honolulu Has

No Jury To Try E. M. Jones

The effort to get a jury in Honolulu for the Jones case ended this afternoon, when Judge Robinson discharged all the jurors and adjourned the case, holding that it was impossible to legally get a jury. The court decided that the open venires were illegal, that the court is restricted to the official jury list, which has been exhausted, and that therefore the only way to try Jones is to take his case to another circuit. A trial in the Fifth Circuit Court at Kauai is now probable.

Judge Robinson based his ruling on the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Osaki Mankichi case. When court met this afternoon a large crowd of new jurors had been summoned, but Judge Robinson of his own motion ruled that the summonses were illegal. The open venires were issued under the theory that the English common law prevailed in Hawaii, but in the Osaki Mankichi case the Supreme Court ruled that there could be no common law juries in Hawaii during the period covered by the facts of that case. Nothing has been done since to change the law in this respect, and Judge Robinson said that he was convinced that his ruling allowing open venires had been an error. To proceed with the trial under such circumstances would be only a waste of time, as a conviction would certainly be set aside on appeal. Deputy Attorney General Peters, on whose motion the open venires were issued, agreed with the court.

Judge Robinson was about to order that the case be transferred to another circuit, when A. G. M. Robertson asked that no further order be made until he had had time to confer with his colleague, J. J. Dunne. The court then discharged all the jurors, including the eleven who had been accepted, and the case is at an end as far as Honolulu is concerned.

The decision means that the courts are absolutely restricted to the 250 jurors whose names were placed on the jury list for the year by the jury commissioners. In the Jones case the entire 250 had been summoned and examined and citizens not on the list were being sent for.

ADMIRAL COOPER IN COMMAND

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21.—A new Chinese exclusion treaty is being prepared, to take the place of the one now in force.

BUFORD MARINES GIVEN EXERCISE

Four companies of marines from the transport Buford are passing the greater portion of today at Kapiolani Park and vicinity. The men marched from the vessel quite early this morning. They left the ship about 7 o'clock and assembled in marching order on Naval wharf No. 1. They then marched up Richards street to King then turned Waikiki into King and march on out to Kapiolani Park.

The companies were under command of the various commissioned officers. The men indulged in the usual drill and maneuvers. They took lunch and ate at the park. The purpose of taking the men out was to give them an opportunity of getting some exercise and drill after being so long on the vessel. They will return to the Buford about 4 o'clock this afternoon.

There are 600 marines altogether aboard the vessel. They came from Philadelphia and are going out to Manila for assignment about the Asiatic Station.

KENNAN COMING BACK.

George Kennan, who is en route to

the Orient as the representative at the seat of the war, of the outlook, is far from a well man. He left Washington in a wheeled chair, and while he has improved much since he started, he is far from well. While in Honolulu he, with his wife is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Lorrin A. Thurston. He promises however to come back this way, and will then stop over here and has promised Secretary Brown at least one lecture or address.

EXTRA SESSION NEXT MONTH

A call for an extra session of the legislature to begin early in next month, is expected to be issued almost at once by Governor Carter. The governor called the heads of departments to conference with him at eleven o'clock this morning and sent word to members of the legislature that he desired to see them. The members expected to be called in session and the subject is being generally discussed among them.

A meeting of all the members of the legislature who are on this island was called for by Governor Carter this morning, the members to meet with him at the Capitol building at two o'clock this afternoon. The meeting is believed to be a discussion with the lawmakers prior to the issuance of a call for an extra session, to begin next month. Such a session has about been decided on and it is said that the call may be issued this evening, or tomorrow, if the conference with legislators takes the expected lines.

"The proper remedy for the troubles of the government," said the governor this morning, "is not retrenchment in

EXTRA SESSION DISCUSSION

The exclusive announcement in The Star's first edition this afternoon that a call of an extra session of the legislature was almost certain and might be expected at once, caused much discussion about town. The impression had begun to gain ground that the administration was going to go it alone, unless the forthcoming Supreme Court decision on the appropriations made a session necessary.

Governor Carter has received much advice on the subject, most of which is understood to have been against a session. It is generally based on a lack of confidence in the legislature, however, and the Governor is disposed to put more faith in the chances of good work in the proposed session than most of those who advised with him.

One peculiar feature of the situation is said to be that the Governor and the Treasurer are agreed, in opposition to all the other heads of departments. All except Kepoikai are said to have advised against it, while for once the Governor and Treasurer agree.

The sentiment among members of the legislature appears to be strongly in favor of general co-operation to reorganize government affairs. A "business session" is the need of the hour, say legislators who have discussed the matter, and many will go into the session if it is called with pledges to hustle for quick work and a short session. If this policy is pursued it is believed that the financial atmosphere will rapidly clear.

"If the cutting down of specific salaries could be avoided," said Speaker Beckley, "I should be opposed to an extra session. But if the administration finds it necessary to cut down salaries which were specifically fixed by the legislature, I think an extra session is preferable. There would be a lot of bad feeling among those whose salaries were arbitrarily reduced."

STACKABLE IS REAPPOINTED

Associated Press Cable to the Star.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21.—President Roosevelt has nominated E. R. Stackable to succeed himself as Collector of Customs for the District of Hawaii.

Stackable is the first of the federal officials appointed on the organization of the Territory to be re-appointed. His present commission does not expire until June 14, the day on which the Territory was organized. Postmaster Oat's commission expires about the same date. All the other federal commissions are of a later date. Governor Dole's commission would have expired at the same time, but his resignation changed that. Of the other federal officials, Collector of Internal Revenue Chamberlain was appointed later, succeeding William Haywood; United States Marshal Hendry succeeded Daniel Ray; United States Attorney Breckons succeeded John C. Baird. The judges of the Territorial courts were appointed later.

E. R. Stackable has been in the public service for a great many years. For a long time he was at the head of the Postal Savings Bank of the Republic of Hawaii. On the resignation of Richard Ivers as Collector General of Customs of the Republic of Hawaii, Stackable was appointed, and when that office became functus officio by the organization of the Territory, he became Collector of Customs for the Collection District of Hawaii.

Congratulations upon his re-nomination by the President began to come in on Collector Stackable immediately upon the public announcement of his re-nomination through the Associated Press dispatches in The Star.

RUSSIA'S DIFFICULTIES.

Russia's position apart from the Japan war is by no means a happy one. She is beginning to reap the whirlwind which she has sown.

When the telegrams came announcing that the Finns and the Jews were volunteering for the war, The Star pointed out that it was more than unlikely, that it was impossible.

Thus we find that at Warsaw and throughout Southern Russia there is a strong feeling of unrest, and revolutionary leaflets and pamphlets are being more boldly distributed.

In Finland itself matters are ripe for revolution, and the Russian authorities know it, for they are massing troops in the province "on account of labor troubles."

In spite of what is said by the Russian authorities about the enthusiasm of the people for the war, writers on the spot fail to find it. In the commercial circles there is a distinct objection to the war which has already driven many firms into bankruptcy.

A Russian revolutionary committee has issued a proclamation against the war, which is being distributed from one end of the empire to the other. This proclamation condemns the policy which has brought Russia into conflict with Japan.

The conduct of the negotiations with Japan, and the breaking out of the war have very clearly emphasized their condition to educated Russians. They see at the moment of a national crisis how impotent they are to have any influence over their national affairs.

All these things must be considered when trying to forecast the future of the war. Russia has no free hand to hurl all her land forces at Japan. She is honeycombed with disaffection, and has to keep a large force even within her borders.

The picture in Japan is a very different one. There you have an absolutely united people, full of patriotism and thoroughly devoted to their government and their country.

RETRENCHMENT.

During this week some settlement of the retrenchment question may be reached. The outline is now completed, but there will have to be a meeting of the heads of departments with the Governor to bring the whole into harmony.

There are some people who cannot see the necessity for retrenchment. This is especially true of the people in the outer districts. They have not felt the pinch of the empty treasury as yet.

It must be plain that no Territory can go on in the way we have been doing without coming to grief. We are unlike countries whose borrowing capacity is unlimited. Our borrowing capacity is limited by the Organic Act.

When we regard our expenditures, there can be no doubt that they are on an extravagant scale. We have been feeding a champagne appetite upon a beer income.

The German forces in South Africa have been forced to retire. In warfare of this kind the advanced nations are always giving their troops too much to do.

Progress Of The War

LONDON, March 6.—The London Daily Mail's Chetoo correspondent describes a visit he made to Chinampo. He says the country thence to Ping Yang is impassable, owing to the thaw.

"I am informed," adds the correspondent, "that there will be no advance until 100,000 men have been concentrated at Ping Yang. It is thawing inland, and the waterways have greatly helped the transportation arrangements.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 6.—Advices from Vladivostok says that the 2500 Japanese troops who landed at Plaksin (on the east coast of Northern Corea) are advancing toward Musan (218 miles from Gensan) with the intention of ultimately reaching Hunchun.

Cossack scouts report that the Japanese column from Ulaksin bay, on arriving in the snow-blockaded defile of the mountains separating Korea from Manchuria, was forced to halt, owing to avalanches and other obstacles.

TOKIO, March 6.—The Russians are briskly fortifying Antung which it is believed, they will make a base for resistance. Scouts near Anju are being withdrawn toward Kasan.

FORMAL OPENING OF THE AQUARIUM WHERE THE WONDERFUL COLORING AND FANTASTIC SHAPES OF FISHES CAN BE SEEN.

The new aquarium at Waikiki near Sans Souci, was formally opened Saturday afternoon. The aquarium owes itself to the offer of Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Cooke to build the building if James B. Castle would donate the land and the Rapid Transit and Land Company would equip and maintain it.

One of the conditions upon which Mr. and Mrs. Cooke agreed to build the aquarium was that it should be open one day in the week free to all. What day that will be has not been decided on, but it has been suggested that it be Saturday, so that the school children will have the opportunity of the leisure day of their week to visit it.

The opening of the aquarium to the public on Saturday was under the auspices of the Rapid Transit Company. At 2:30 o'clock a large party of invited guests left the power house on special cars and were taken at once to the aquarium. Here the party spent some time in looking at the building and the 265 individual fish representing sixty varieties which are now in the aquarium.

After an opportunity had been given for all to go through the aquaria, President L. T. Peck of the Rapid Transit Company called all to the central building and introduced Lorrin A. Thurston who gave an account of the inception and cost of the institution and expressed the hope that on the expiration of the lease of the land together with that of the four adjoining lots, they would be conveyed to the Kapiolani Park Association so that the park would be given a sea and beach frontage.

Mr. Peck introduced Judge Dole who made a very pleasing address concerning the occasion which had gathered them together. The aquarium is entered through a Japanese torii over which is a hideous sign announcing that it is the aquarium.

LAHAINA, March 18.—Dr. Myata, who was formerly connected with the medical department of the Japanese army, is about to return to his native land, to resume his duties with the medical staff.

JURY TROUBLES ON MAUI.

WAILUKU, March 19.—In the case of Territory of Hawaii vs. John Keawe, charged with manslaughter in the first degree, the second panel of jurors has already been exhausted. Jurors have again been sent for from all parts of the islands, some even from Molokai, and the case will not be resumed until Wednesday morning, when it is expected that the Molokai citizens will be on hand. In the meantime the term of court will proceed with civil suits.
