Board of Health Notice.

The attention of Keepers of Lodging and Tenement Houses is called to the following law:

Sec. 1. Licenses to keep lodging or tenement houses in the District of Kona, Island of Oahu, may be issued by the Minister of the Interior, to any person applying for the same in writing, and producing a certificate from an Officer, or AGENT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH that the premises intended to be used under the license are in good sanitary condition.

Sec. 2. The sum of two dollars shall be paid to the Minister of the Interior for such license, which shall be for one year. Shall describe with sufficient accuracy the premises to be used thereunder, and shall be held subject to the following conditions which shall be set out in the license: That the licensee shall not keep a noisy or disorderly house; that no prostitutes shall be suffered to enter therein; that the premises will be kept in good sanitary condition, subject to the approval of the Board of Health and in accordance with all the terms of Chapter III. of the Laws of 1880, entitled "An Act to provide for the sanitary condition of Dwelling Houses" that any Officer of the Police or Board of Health, shall have free access to the same and that upon any breach of the conditions the license shall be revoked.

Sec. 3. Every person who shall keep a lodging or tenement house or shall admit lodgers to his or her dwelling within the said District without first securing from the Minister of the Interior, such a license, shall on conviction pay a fine not exceeding fifty dollars or be imprisoned at hard labor not exceeding thirty days or both.

Sec. 4. This Act shall take effect and become law from and after the date of its approval.

MONDAY, NOV. 3, 1890.

The Commissioners declined to send the lady bugs to Kona, on the report received of cottony blight there. Their reason was that some of the blight would have to be sent with them as food on the passage, which in case of the real pest not being present in the district would risk its introduction. The decision has proved to be a wise one, for, by last mail, it is learned that it is only the old blight, not the cottony one, that has appeared in Kona.

When the Labor Bill came up in the House this morning a question was raised as to the constitutionality of the Act. It was then asked, by one of the members, whether an opinion of the Supreme Court would be likely to aid or reach the case through an ex parte opinion as to the legality of deporting an expired-contract laborer? The questioner further stated that hitherto important ex parte decisions of the Supreme Court have been reversed by themselves, when all the facts became known. It was finally determined that instead of submitting the two bills before the House that the main points at issue should be laid before the Supreme Court for an opinion thereon.

The great importance and grave nature of the question of labor, now at issue, is attracting much public attention and it therefore behooves both Court and Legislature to calmly and justly consider the question from all sides before reaching conclusions, which may carry with them either great good or lasting evil for Hawaii.

ANSWER TO THE FRIEND.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The editor of the Friend has in his October issue, an editorial, where, in welcoming the newly arrived protestant Portuguese ministers, he brings several insulting charges against Catholics, which I cannot let pass unmentioned.

It reminds me of the kiss of Judas when the editor says that this work, (the perverting of Portuguese) "has not been undertaken with views hostile to the Roman Catholic Church."

Mr. Friend, in your protestant enlightenment you discover, I don't know how many "old superstitions" from which you certainly would like to emancipate Catholics. The principal one is nothing less than "crass idolatry" found not once exceptionally but so common in purely Catholic countries.

Is this the reason, why so many learned and prominent Protestants in England and in the United States (as you admit) adopt the Roman Catholic religion? Your enlightenments made a marvelous discovery. Why did you not substantiate your charges with some document having the authority of the Catholic church? Perhaps the newly arrived Portuguese Ministers, so well versed in Catholic matters, from their own past, could easily have furnished you some. Amongst the millions of Catholic books find only one which teaches idolatry, crass or not, and we plead guilty.

In connection with this comes the charge of "misguided devotion to Mary" by you styled Mariolatry. This very expression of yours, proves that notwithstanding your protestant enlightenment, you are in total darkness regarding this point. No Catholic not even the most ignorant one, makes a Deity of the Blessed Virgin. But we believe certainly that all generations of the children of the true church will call her blessed. Luc. I.

In regard to the future of the Roman Catholic church, out of which you would like "the Papacy to melt away" (how kind you are to this church, if you could only kiss her head off!) you need not trouble yourself. It needs no reform in its constitutions, which it received from Christ himself, and which enables it to reform all its members. May it please you or not, "the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

Now in freeing the Portuguese from "superstitions" which exist only in the prejudiced minds of certain protestants, and by preaching to them, in the name of the pure gospel to revolt against the lawful authority of their church you pretend to make them "better men, more enlightened." This is a new edition of the first tempter's bait, "you shall be like Gods, knowing good and evil." Do you expect it to improve by widening the discussions already existing in our small population, in regard to religion and nationality? What must every fair-minded person think of a religious denunciations which makes use of calumnies to fight against the Holy Catholic, Apostolic church, and her members? (We remember also the position taken by you to uphold one of your estimated brethren in vilifying the late Father Damien, and of which, a redress, to my knowledge, has not been seen yet.) As for us we find our consolation in the Holy Scriptures where we see the Son of God ill-treated by bigoted Jews, in a similar manner, and where he prophesies that in future his disciples shall be treated likewise. Notwithstanding you boast to know all about the "sweet and blessed love of the Lord Jesus," of which we Catholics "know so little." I think the above-mentioned charges prove very little love of Jesus or of your neighbor, but on the contrary prove an abundance of hatred, jealousy and envy against the Roman Catholic church and its members. And when our Saviour says that "by this all men shall know that you are my disciples if you have love one to another, as I have loved you," it appears you follow the inspiration of a different spirit, who says, by this all men shall know that you are my disciples, if you have hatred, jealousy, and envy against your neighbor, as I have against you.

THE NEW SAILORS' HOME.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—There has lately been a good deal of interest shown in different directions, and by different individuals in raising money for a much needed Sailors' Home in Honolulu. I have been asked about the amount already raised and still needed, and as to the relation of the Home to the churches. I am informed by one of the trustees that they have on hand and promised, about \$13,000. But for levelling the ground, which they already own, and for the building and other necessary expenses, it is desired to raise \$18,000. This is aside from the furnishing of the Home.

As to its relation to any religious denomination, it would without doubt "be worked on a secular basis." The object of those interested in building this house is to provide a comfortable and wholesome place where the sailors, coming to this port, may find a clean bed and good food for such time as they are on shore. It would doubtless contain a reading-room, and other means of entertainment. The management of the Home would naturally tend to good morals and decent behavior, but it would not be under the auspices of any religious body, or connected with any church.

The trustees, their terms expiring at different dates, are: S. M. Damon, B. F. Dillingham, W. W. Hall, A. S. Cleghorn, H. F. Glade, W. G. Irwin, C. R. Bishop, W. Babcock, J. T. Waterhouse, Jr., P. C. Jones, J. B. Atherton, A. Fuller, S. N. Castle, J. H. Paty, C. M. Cooke, J. R. Walker, S. B. Dole and F. A. Schaefer.

It is greatly to be desired that those who are able to give towards the building fund for this Home should contribute, so that the necessary amount may be raised and a Sailors' Home be built soon. It is four years since the old Home was condemned and pulled down, and since that time there has been no place in Honolulu specially devoted to sailors, and offering these generous and often imposed upon men, the comfort and entertainment of a well-appointed Sailors' Home.

THE WORLD OVER.

The French authorities are trying to suppress the gambling vice of the nation.

The Catholic Congress at Saragossa has passed resolutions in favor of founding Catholic workmen's associations.

Emigration has been somewhat epidemic in Iceland for the last two years. The island now contains only about 75,000.

Emigration from Ireland, though greatly diminished, still continues at the rate of more than seventy thousand persons a year.

The port of St. Nazaire, at the mouth of the Loire, will be open for imports and exports of sheep, oxen, and horses, subject to inspection.

A crown for the Negus of Abyssinia, now in course of construction at Milan, is of the purest gold, contains 130 stones, and weighs three pounds.

Emperor Wilhelm of Germany has just purchased a castle in Lorraine for \$125,000. He proposed to remain there a certain portion of each year.

There has been erected the first and only modern windmill in London. It is placed on the top of a warehouse and has a wheel thirty feet in diameter.

It is said that the City of London Contract Corporation has marketed \$80,000,000 of securities based on American properties during the past eighteen months.

A dispatch from the Congo State says that the authorities intend to issue a decree imposing new taxes, principally on merchandise, between Matadi and Stanley Pool.

The 41,000,000 gallons of spirit made in the United Kingdom in 1889 were mostly used in England, and nearly three-fourths of this vast quantity was drunk as a beverage.

The police force of India numbers 17,000 superior and subordinate officers and 126,000 constables, not reckoning the 17,880 police of Upper Burma and 600,000 village watchmen.

The Vienna Fremdenblatt doesn't like the McKinley bill, and "appeals to the countries or Europe to act in concert to prevent their becoming tributary to the New World."

The Board of Education of New York City has asked the city railroads to grant low fares to children. Two of the largest companies have expressed a willingness to make special rates.

M. de Lesseps has lately appeared in the light of an author, having published a little volume entitled "Origines du Canal de Suez." The book is having an enormous sale in France.

The Castle of Clergnon in the Ardennes, which Leopold I. of Belgium built at enormous cost, some fifty years ago, on a steep rock above the Lesse, is showing unmistakable signs of decay.

A scheme which has been drawn up for a ship canal from Birmingham to the Weaver Navigation at Winsford has been unanimously approved at a meeting of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce.

The Liverpool Mercury complains that the German commercial traveler is running John Bull a severe race everywhere, but particularly in Russia, where German machinery is supplanting the English.

From all sections of Texas come reports of increase of capital and arrival of well-to-do immigrants. The moneys invested for the school fund and the lands held by the State for the same are estimated at \$60,000,000.

The whole of the Princess Victoria of Prussia's trousseau is being made in Germany, excepting only four Oriental dresses, which the Empress Frederick ordered while in Athens, and these are being expressly manufactured at the Greek School for Art-weaving.

One night quite recently eighty birds were killed by striking the Bartholdi statue. Fifty of them were Maryland yellow-throats; among the other species represented were oven-birds, yellow-bellied flycatcher, Cape May warbler and Philadelphia vireo.

A new desecration of the landscape against which English people are protesting is the posting of advertisements upon the sails of fishing boats. One writes: "We have a great trouble with a large board advertisement of pills stuck up right in the middle of a beautiful bay."

The Bishop of Wakefield writes that the Church of England Funeral Reform Association has already done much to lessen the foolish extravagance of funerals, and the society will double the value of the work if it can induce the public to adopt a more sensible and rational method of burial.

The veteran Hannibal Hamlin, of Maine, now eighty-two years of age, Vice-President during Lincoln's first term of office, attended the Grand Army encampment at Boston and insisted on being allowed to march in the procession though his route was over four miles in length. With much difficulty he was persuaded to drive, although he persisted that a man who had never worn an overcoat and was never ill ought to know his own capabilities.

Prince Bismarck, says the "Journal of Education, has an adopted son now twenty years of age, and a Frenchman. One evening during the Franco-Prussian war, when the Chancellor entered his sleeping apartments, outside of Paris, he found a baby lay asleep on his pillow. The mother had left a note saying that her husband had been killed at Sedan, and despair and want had forced her to give up her child. Bismarck sent the child by special nurse to Berlin, and subsequently had him educated, and he is now a model young man and devotedly attached to his benefactor.
