CHINESE IMMIGRATION.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs has republished the "regulations for the admission of Chinese immigrant laborers into the Hawaiian Kingdom" which were passed, in Cabinet Council, on 13th July 1883.

This step has been taken in consequence of the arrival of more than 1,000 Chinese males, within a month, by the steamers of the Pacific Mail Company, the City of Rio de Janeiro and the City of Tokio. The British steamer Arabic and the P. M. S. S. Co.'s steamer City of Peking, besides a British tramp steamer, are all expected within the next few weeks, and each vessel will bring its quantum of "Chinese immigrant laborers."

It is a curious coincidence that two steamers, flying the American flag, should be allowed to land their "immigrant laborers" and that the nine months old regulations should be enforced only when the next steamer expected is a British steamer. Has the Minister of Foreign Affairs, from past experience, in the Madras for instance, had enough of British steamers? Or is it a recurrence of the old insinuations that no Britishers are wanted here? These "Chinese immigrant laborers" come from Hongkong, a British port. Some of them may be British subjects. How will the Minister of Foreign Affairs prevent them from landing without violating the Treaty Rights with Great Britain? The Treaty says that "the subjects of each of the two contracting parties respectively, shall have liberty freely and securely to come with their ships and cargoes,

to all places, ports and rivers in the territories of the other, where trade with other nations is permitted. They may remain and reside in any part of the said territories respectively, and hire and occupy houses, etc."

If the Foreign Office Regulations of 13th July, 1883, be rigidly enforced then it precludes the importation of Chinese by the proposed Spreckels line of steamers. If the Pacific Mail Company or any British steamers cannot land more than twenty-five "Chinese immigrant laborers from any one vessel," then how can permission be granted to Colonel Spreckels to land 600 "Chinese immigrant laborers" every three months, to the exclusion of the owners of vessels of other nationalities? Colonel Spreckels is not likely to run twenty-four steamers from Hongkong to Honolulu, every three months, in order to make up his complement of six hundred by carrying twenty-five men on each.

The Honolulu agents of the vessels that bring the "Chinese immigrant laborers" are not to be held responsible for the arrival of these vessels. The Minister of Foreign Affairs has sent his nine months old "Regulations," accompanied by a Protest, to the proper official quarters in Hongkong, but, up to the present time, no notice has been taken of them. Where is the Board of Immigration? Are its members again ignored by the Foreign Office? Have they no voice in immigration matters and have they no power to make "Regulation?"

We do not support the indiscriminate importation of Chinese, in fact we think there are enough, if not more than enough, of them in the Kingdom. But we do want to see fair play. If American steamers can land Chinese, then British steamers should be allowed the same privilege, and Foreign Office Regulations should not be immediately enforced on the arrival of a British steamer.

CIVIL COURT.

THURSDAY, March 27th, 1884.

Wilder & Co. v. six Hawaiians charged with deserting from contract service. The cases were settled out of Court, each man paying \$2 costs.

C. Brewer & Co. v. R. Gerke, assumpsit for balance due on a promissory note, \$95.40. Judgment was given for the plaintiff in the full amount claimed, with attorney's commission \$9.50 and costs \$3.10, total \$108.

Manuel Ries v. J. Wendel, action for trespass, damages laid at \$150. Continued to 3rd April.

Akuna v. Lokana et al, action for trespass, damages laid at \$200. Continued to 3rd April.

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

Prince Bismarck is preparing a draft of a proposed new Constitution for the Empire. It contains a "dictator" clause similar to that in the Prussian Constitution.

The proposed treaty between England and Abyssinia is one of the most important results of the Soudan rebellion. Whatever terms may be finally agreed upon with King John, the English are likely to secure a firm hold all along the west shore of the Red Sea.

Toronto, March 15.—Early this morning, while a freight train was backing on a siding near High Park, the scene of the terrible accident of the 2nd of January, another freight ran into it. The engineer and fireman of the latter train are probably fatally injured. The damage to rolling stock is estimated at \$25,000.

New York, March 17.—The Tribune says: The experiments now making at the Fort Hamilton war ship with the dynamite gun, show that it will accomplish all that its inventor claims for it. We are on the eve of a great change of methods of all kinds of warfare. The dynamite is placed in a hollow projection, which is thrown from a gun by compressed air. There is no explosion, the inventor says, until the projectile strikes the object at which it is aimed. The destruction is great enough to sink the heaviest iron clad.

Madrid, March 16.—General Velarde, a cavalry ensign, three sergeants, and two civilians, were arrested at General Velarde's house, Saturday. Several others have been

arrested at other places, including General Villacampa. The Government has for some time been aware that a conspiracy was being hatched for a military uprising similar to that of August last. Many more persons were arrested to-day, including Moran, secretary for Sorilla, a priest, fourteen sergeants and three army officers. The Government has forbidden the proposed Communistic banquet and public serenade in honor of Tortuondo, the well-known Democratic deputy.

London, March 15.—In Berlin to-day it was semi-officially announced that the principal powers of Europe had agreed to join in the confederation proposed jointly by Germany and France for the suppression of all anarchical forms of Socialism. The announcement was, however, coupled with the statement that the country most necessary to the success of the confederation, Switzerland, had finally and unreservedly refused to join. The Swiss Federal Council in its note of declination takes the position that the nature of the Government of Switzerland forbids and renders unnecessary the espionage and discrimination proposed, and states that so far as Swiss experience has shown, the so-called anarchists are a vulgar and unimportant lot of criminals, easily made amenable to the regular laws and not worth the special notice of the Government or a confederation of Governments. The attitude of Switzerland is a serious disappointment to Bismarck, and it is believed will eventually cause the abandonment of the proposed confederation, which would be impracticable so long as Switzerland offered a harbor to anarchists.

The official approximate returns of the gold yield in Victoria last year give 809,337 ounces, as against 864,486 in 1882.

The new foreign police officer made the first permanent impression of his activity, and obtained his first record, on Wednesday night. Information as to the nature of the offence can be obtained from Captain McKinnon at the Station House.

The method of burial of the dead from the Queen's Hospital is very primitive and should be improved upon. Several descriptions of the proceedings have been sent us, by eye-witnesses, and they will be published unless great alterations are effected.

The only Police Court business transacted yesterday was the entering of a nol pros in two cases, one in the matter of Kahoano, a vagrant, and the other in the remanded case of Hook Chong, charged with having opium in his possession.

A sale of damaged Chinese matting, ex Helena, will be held to-morrow, by Mr. E. P. Adams. There are sixteen different varieties of matting, some of which has scarcely suffered from the effects of the salt sea waves.

The M. M. B. C. had their first practise on Wednesday afternoon, when some of the members found themselves rather short winded. The Honolulu B. B. C. practised yesterday, the Oceanics take the field to-day and the H. B. B. C. to-morrow.

Consignees of goods by the Birmah are requested to call, at the office of G. W. Macfarlane & Co., to receive orders for their freight, as she has commenced discharging. The captain and officers are not responsible for debts contracted by the crew of the Birmah.

Messrs. G. W. Macfarlane & Co. have not been idle since taking possession of the hotel. They have been personally, and through Manager Fassett, endeavoring to ascertain how visitors and residents can be best provided for, and, in the course of a few weeks, they will probably have an entirely new system adopted.

Richard street sidewalk has been leased for grazing purposes. A portion of the grass was consumed, by stock, on Wednesday night. The same economical plan might have been adopted on King street, instead of utilizing the valuable labor of the prisoners to hew down the herbage. Think of the waste of good fodder!

At the circus, on Wednesday evening, there was a good attendance, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather. The Morosco brothers was as good as ever, in their various acts; Scott on the horizontal bar and Miss St. Claire on Danger were well received. Alejo Hudson, in his bareback riding act, surpassed his previous efforts. The next performance will be given this evening, when it is to be hoped the French Riding School will be seen no more.

The first band concert at the Hawaiian Hotel, under its new proprietorship, was given last evening out of compliment to the large number of visitors from the United States who are now staying there. The concert was well attended and the strangers were surprised at the degree of proficiency attained by Hawaiian musicians under their able bandmaster. The hotel concerts will

probably again become a regular and recognized recreation, and, when additional accommodation is provided for the visitors, they should be as popular as the Emma Square concerts.

It is probable that His Majesty will hold a private audience for the visitors who are now staying here from Boston, and who would thus have an opportunity to see the interior of the Palace and many of the relics of the old Royal families. Such an act of courtesy on the part of His Majesty to representative foreigners is always appreciated and meets with the general approval of the community.

Negotiations have been proceeding, for some weeks, between the Hawaiian Bell and Mutual Telephone Companies for a consolidation of interests, in fact the Directors of the two companies have agreed to a basis upon which the companies can consolidate, and a meeting of the stockholders of the Mutual will at once be called to present the matter for their consideration. It is advisable that every stockholder should be present at the meeting, and that there should be as few proxies as possible as a full and free expression of opinion on this important matter is desired from every member.

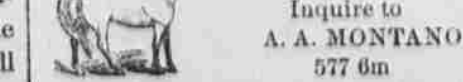

THE HOUSE OF ORLEANS.

BY GEORGE MAKEPEACE TOWLE.

By the death of the Count de Chambord, in the autumn, the elder branch of the French Bourbon line became extinct.

The next heir of the house of Bourbon is the Count of Paris, the head of the family of Orleans, and he, as a fact, has succeeded to the leadership of the new united French monarchists.

The Count of Paris is the lineal descendant and representative of Philip, Duke of Orleans, the second son of Louis XIII., and the younger brother of Louis XIV.

The regent's son, Louis, the third Duke of Orleans, was a man of far different mould. He seems to have avoided sedulously the example of his carousing father.

and enterprising warrior, who did good services in the Flemish wars, and aided in shedding some military luster on the throne of his cousin, Louis XV.

But the most notorious, if not the most illustrious, of the Orleans princes was the son and heir of this warrior duke. Louis Joseph of Orleans was that celebrated "Egalite" who played so dramatic and, in some respects, so little creditable a part in the era of the Revolution.

His son, Louis Philippe, became a wanderer on the face of the earth. He taught school in America, and was often at his wit's end to make both ends meet.

In his turn, Louis Philippe was driven from throne and scepter by the third revolution, in 1848; retired to elegant exile at Claremont, in England, and died there peacefully, in a green old age.

The present Count of Paris is the eldest grandson of King Louis Philippe. His father, the Duke of Orleans, who was Louis Philippe's heir, was accidentally killed in Paris, by being thrown from his carriage, in 1842.

The Count of Paris has always borne himself in a manner to win and retain the respect of the world. He has never countenanced any revolt against the Republic in behalf of his own claims.

By descent and marriage the Count is connected with most of the reigning families of Europe. He is a first cousin of the king of Belgium, and both first cousin and brother-in-law of King Alfonso of Spain.
