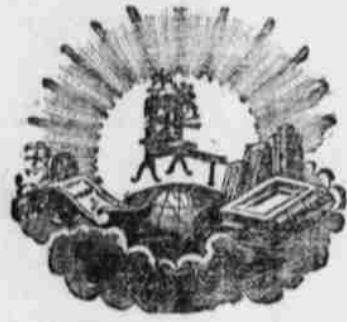

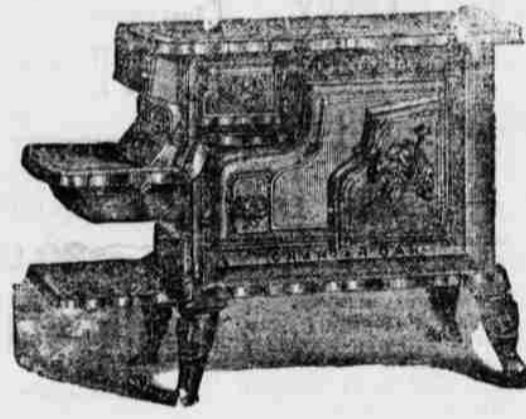

A MERRY CHRISTMAS TO ALL.

To-morrow, Christmas Day, is the day agreed upon by the major part of Christendom for the annual commemoration of the Saviour's birth. The biblical record of the event, which occurred close upon nineteen hundred years ago, states that a host of angels appeared on the occasion with songs of praise and joy, proclaiming "peace on earth and good-will towards men." And to-morrow, at this distant period, in many lands and from ten thousand pulpits, the same sentiments will be proclaimed. In our "Island Home," Christmas comes to us with surroundings vastly different from those familiar to many of us in our youthful days. Then while the snow chilled without, the blazing fire produced cheerfulness within. Here the warm atmosphere and the luxuriant verdure present a striking contrast. But the heart-feelings are the same, and all hail Christmas as a season of peace and good-will. We salute our patrons and everybody, and sincerely wish them all a merry, merry Christmas!

Late Foreign News.

UNITED STATES.
New York, Dec. 16.—A Washington special to the "Herald" says: There is every indication that the Territories of Dakota, Washington, Montana, and possibly Utah, will be admitted into Statehood. While Utah has adopted a new Constitution, which prohibits the perpetuity of polygamy within the Territory, Congress will make provision that in the event of the Territory's admission into the Union as a State that that clause of the Constitution cannot be disturbed without the consent of Congress. It matter not, however, if they are admitted at this session, they will not be granted the right of national franchise until 1892.

A committee of citizens from Utah, headed by Delegate Cain, today, waited on Speaker Carlisle and Senator Ingalls and presented to them copies of the State Constitution adopted at the last Utah Convention.

Washington Dec. 16.—Senator Hoar of Massachusetts yesterday introduced a bill to facilitate and to open an overland commercial route between the United States, Asiatic Russia and Japan. The bill directs a survey to be made of a route for the construction of a railway by the most feasible route from the northern boundary of the United States through British Columbia and Alaska to a desirable harbor on the southern coast of the Alaskan peninsula or on Behring Sea. The survey is intended to begin at or near Spokane Falls, on the eastern side of the Rocky Mountains, deflecting westwardly for the branch line of Stika, the main line to be continued north and west to a desirable harbor on the Alaskan peninsula. One hundred thousand dollars is appropriated for the survey.

Washington, Dec. 16.—James A. McKenney of Kentucky will probably be the next Minister to Mexico.

Mr. J. C. Merrill, a well known and prominent merchant of San Francisco, has been committed to jail for contempt of court.

CANADA.
Halifax, Dec. 16.—The St. John "Globe" open advocacy of immediate annexation of Canada to the United States as the simplest and best way to settle all difficulties between Great Britain and the United States has produced a great sensation in political circles in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The "Globe" is owned and edited by John Ellis, Member of the Canadian Parliament for St. John city, and for many years its representative in the New Brunswick Legislature.

The "Recorder," organ of the Nova Scotia Government says: If Sir John Macdonald should become an annexationist to-morrow, the Tories would go wild with delight.

The "Mail" conservative says: Nothing but the talk of red-handed rebellion and the streaked and spotted flag of the neighboring nation is inciting such fools as he may be able to influence to joining a treasonable conspiracy.

James Gordon Bennett, has been sued for libel on two charges, one for \$500,000, and one for \$250,000. Witsville, December 14th.—Claus Spreckels has accepted the site offered by the people of Pajaro valley for a beet sugar evaporator, and was in town to-day signing contracts with farmers for the raising of beets. He agrees to pay a minimum price of \$4 per ton. Work will soon begin on the evaporator building, which, with the machinery, is to cost \$400,000. The architect is now in town.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—Sergeant Buell, the Signal Service Chief of this station, has been summarily removed to Galveston, Tex., by General Greely of the Arctic fame, now at the head of the Weather Department at Washington. The reason given for the transfer is "unsatisfactory services," but the real truth is believed to be that the Sergeant has, on numerous occasions, given out correct predictions here when the Washington end of the machine had blundered. The removal is made after two men, Lieutenants Woodruff and Ellis, had been sent here within sixty days of each other to make investigations, and had both reported the condition of affairs to be excellent and the service of the best possible nature.

EUROPEAN.
St. Petersburg, Dec. 13th.—The "Norse Vremis" publishes in its Paris correspondence a letter from General Boulanger to M. Sasin, member of the chamber of deputies, declining the latter's offer to surrender his seat in General Boulanger's favor. The General writes that he considers it his patriotic duty to adhere to his military position in view of the fact that he expects war, and says that France has greater need of generals than of deputies.

Paris, Dec. 10th.—A dastardly attempt was made this afternoon upon the life of M. Jules Ferry while walking in the lobby of the Chamber of Deputies. In an instant the wildest excitement prevailed.

A man named Aubertin appeared in the lobby of the Chamber of Deputies and asked to see both M. Ferry and M. Goblet. The latter did not respond to Aubertin's request for an interview, but M. Ferry did, and on his appearance Aubertin drew his revolver and fired three times at him.

One of the balls struck Ferry in the chest. This wound, however, was not serious, as M. Ferry was able to proceed to a hospital supported by friends.

CONDITION OF THE CROWN PRINCE.
Berlin, Dec. 16.—According to latest information from San Remo, Sir Morell Mackenzie was agreeably surprised in finding Crown Prince of Germany better than he had reason to expect. There is no difficulty in breathing, and although there is an inflammatory appearance of the larynx it seems to imply the non-existence of a cancer after all. The right vocal chord, moreover, is now said not to be affected. The doctors attending the Crown Prince seem no longer to believe that the malady is malignant. The case is characterized as the most extraordinary ever seen of its kind.

I have received a telegram from a trustworthy source in San Remo, according to which the general appearance of the Crown Prince's larynx is better than at the beginning of November, though a new growth has formed in the upper part of the larynx about the size of a split pea. Its appearance, however, is not malignant. The former growth has diminished in size. As it is considered probable that Sir Morell Mackenzie will leave San Remo to-morrow evening, it is perfectly clear that the pessimist opinion originally spread throughout the Continent is not shared by the medical men in attendance on the Crown Prince.

CHRISTMAS TREE.

The scholars of the Central Union Sunday School had a most enjoyable time last night in the parlors of the church. The occasion was the presentation to each of the pupils of a Christmas gift. The presents were all displayed on a beautiful Christmas tree, which was erected in the center of the room, and brilliantly illuminated. Mr. C. M. Cobke caused unbounded merriment among the little ones while distributing the gifts. The parlors were densely packed with the children and friends of the school. After the distribution of presents, refreshments were served, which terminated a most delightful evening for young and old.

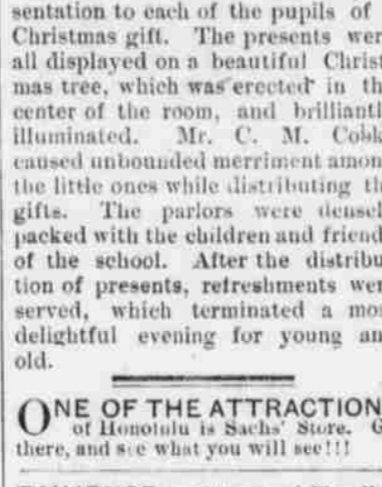

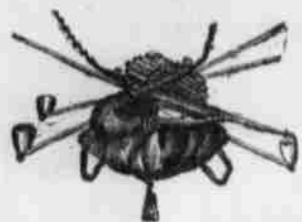
