Pledged to neither Sect nor Party, But established for the benefit of all.

MONDAY, MARCH 16, 1891.

A few nights ago the incandescent lights of Honolulu went out for one night and part of another. Severe comments upon the Ministry were made by several citizens, who are patrons of the incandescent system. Such comments have since proved to have been unnecessary. Constant progress has been made by the Minister of the Interior in putting the electric light system of Honolulu into efficient working order.

The improvements made in the arc-light system, up to the present time, point to what will almost certainly be accomplished when the overhauling, now going on in the incandescent branch of the service, is completed.

While no appropriation was made for the incandescent system, established by the Ministry of the Reform party, upon the order of one man, yet the present Government will likely be able to carry out such unauthorized contracts. This will be done in much the same way as when the efficiency of the arc-light system was increased from twenty-seven street lights to ninety!

This much has already been accomplished by correcting the incompetence of the Reform administration, as represented in this department by the Minister of Interior and Superintendent of Public Works of that period.

If the present investigation of the incandescent system turns out results of as severe botch-work as did the arc-light system, the Government will be able to keep both systems running at full power, provided the average supply of water is furnished by the natural rainfall of the upper Nuuanu Valley.

THE DIMOND'S QUICK TRIP.

The Charleston has a dangerous rival for the pennant in Hawaiian transit in the barkentine W. H. Dimond, Captain W. H. Drew, which has just arrived after a run of eleven days from Honolulu, or only forty-eight hours longer than the Charleston took to come back. True the Charleston made the run out in six days and four hours, but that was a very exceptional event. The Dimond spoke the cruiser twice on the trip, on the second and fifth day out from Honolulu, the Charleston being astern in the latter case. Captain Drew says he would have beaten the cruiser but for baffling winds. The round trip of the W. H. Dimond to the Islands was made in twenty-three days, the fastest sailing time on record.—Alta.

MARE ISLAND MATTERS.

The cruiser Charleston while at Mare Island will undergo extensive alterations and repairs. The circles and other gear for the eight-inch guns have to be got ready, and as the davits from which the waist boats are hung have been found weak, they also will be replaced. The boiler-makers will also have a job, as the recent run to Honolulu destroyed several of the boiler tubes, and they will have to be replaced. It will probably take about three weeks to get the vessel ready for sea again. Two boat races between crews from the United States steamers San Francisco and Alert are to take place tomorrow. There will be a race in gigs and another in dingies. About \$2000 will change hands on the results.—Alta.

THE CHARLESTON.

The Charleston will leave at 7 a. m. today for Mare Island to remain two months. Admiral Brown told an Alta reporter yesterday that the Navy Department was delighted with the ship's fast run to Honolulu, which was made without forced draft in a single instance. The Admiral laughed at the reports about the Queen's ill health and predicts a peaceful era on the Islands, disturbed only by the ambition of baffled office-holders and office-seekers.—Alta.

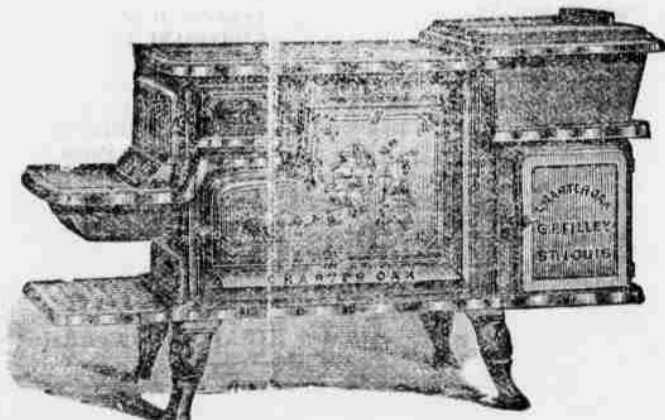

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

AMERICA.

ATTACK ON NAVY EXPENDITURE.

Ex-Senator Ingalls has contributed an article to the New York Truth, fiercely denouncing expenditures on the Navy as money squandered. He says: "Our only enemy is England, and she is under bond to keep the peace. No other nation is so vulnerable, and none so detested. She has incurred the resentment of the human race by centuries of injustice."

"England kicked us when we were helpless and feeble. She sacked and burned our defenseless capital. She kicked Ireland, she kicked Egypt, she kicked the Hindus, Zulus, Boers and Chinese, but she is not in the habit of kicking her equals. In our civil war she did all she could, short of open hostility, to destroy our Union, and then apologized and paid damages. Lately we had another contention about seal poaching and the Behring Sea."

"A casus belli could easily have been found if wanted, and we were assured that danger was imminent. Immense appropriations were promptly voted for fortifications and a navy, and then when the national hair was standing on end England suddenly came into our Supreme Court as a suitor and submitted the whole controversy to that great tribunal. It was reassuring, but it was laughable nevertheless."

EUROPE.

THE FRENCH INCIDENT.

London, March 5.—There is a semi-official authority for the statement that Lord Salisbury proposes to expel Boulanger from British territory. The Government is deeply irritated by Boulanger's conduct in connection with the visit of the Empress Frederick to Paris, as he is believed to have inspired the assaults in the Boulevard press upon the Empress, and to have planned an even greater insult than was actually directed to her.

The Paris correspondent of the Times declares that part of the irritation caused by the visit of the Empress Frederick to France was due to the Cologne Gazette's expression, "Lubenhafte Beldingungen," being translated into French as "injuris des polissons." The translation, "indignity by scamps," was much too strong for the meaning of the words.

Berlin, March 5.—It was remarked at the Court concert yesterday that the Emperor was markedly cordial to Mme. Herbet, wife of the French Ambassador. The general anger over the recent outbreak of French Chauvinism is subsiding.

German officers have entered all trains at the Alsace-Lorraine frontier and turned back a large number of passengers whose passports did not conform to the new rules. The Berlin newspaper heartily approve the loyalty expressed in the address of the Alsace-Lorraine Parliament yesterday to the Emperor, as the first expression of such a nature since the Franco-Prussian war. Hope is expressed that the Emperor will accede to the Parliament's appeal for the repeal or mitigation of the stringent passport regulations.

It has transpired that Helena Markovic and Helena Kucanovic, who attempted to kill King Milan 1882, have been strangled to death in prison. Milan has requested M. Garacianovic to institute an inquiry into the killing.

PROTECTION URGED IN FRANCE.

M. Melme, in the Chamber of Deputies March 5, presented the report of the Tariff Committee. The report affirms the necessity of protecting the agricultural industries and manufactures of France, and argues that such action will benefit the consumers as well as the producers. An increase in the tariff, says the report, would augment the public revenue and develop home trade. It instances the results brought about by protection in the United States.

The National Liberals of Geestemunde have decided to run Bismarck for the Reichstag.

The Spanish Cortes opened March 2. The Queen Regent, in her speech, announced that commercial treaties with foreign nations are not to be renewed and that it has been found necessary to establish customs relations in several new cases with foreign States.

ANOTHER MONTE CARLO TRAGEDY.

Monte Carlo has again been started by a sudden death. This time is an English physician, Dr. Seegart, who had been winning enormous sums at the gaming tables. The unfortunate physician fell dead as he was seated in front of a croupier at one of the gaming tables. Apoplexy is announced as being the cause of Dr. Seegart's death.

THE AUSTRIAN ELECTIONS.

A manifesto has been issued by the Old Czechs upon the recent elections. They declare that since the result of the elections show the desire of the people to adopt a policy different from that followed by the men who have grown gray in the service of the nation, the leaders of the old Czech party will retire from public life.

SALE OF A FAMOUS STALLION.

The United States War Department has purchased in England the Hackney stallion, the Star of Nepal, which ran second at the Islington Horse Show. The price was \$2000. The Italian and United States Governments are to compete for the prize for running breeders in horses, and are paying large prices for good selections.

SEIZURE OF A BANKER.

Robert Lindsay Antrobus, second son of Sir Edmund Antrobus and

junior partner in the well-known banking house of Coutts & Co., was found dead in bed March 6 with a pistol by his side. It is believed to be a case of suicide, although the cause is unknown.

MISCELLANEOUS.

AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION.

The Australian Federation Council opened a three weeks' session at Sydney March 2.

The Council discussed the tariff question on the 6th. Munro advocated uniform duties between the federated colonies, but he added that the interests of the Victoria protectionist colony must be guarded. The conference would fail to do its duty if it allowed important manufactures which had been created in the colony of Victoria to be ruthlessly dealt with.

Mellwraith said that if the resolutions in regard to the tariff were passed a federal government could readily be formed, even though all the colonies did not join the federation. The resolutions implied free trade within the federation and protection against the world. Absolute free trade was impossible, owing to the necessity of raising revenue.

Deaken of Victoria said that the work of forming a common tariff was a question involving millions of pounds invested in industries built up by protection, and the guarantee must be obtained. Federation would preserve those interests. The constitution should require that existing tariff laws should only be reduced a certain percentage in a certain number of years.

A CHILEAN INCIDENT.

A New York Post Buenos Ayres special says: The insurgents are entrenched strongly near Iquique. A British West Indian steamship, supposed to be carrying insurgents, when called on by a Chilean warship near Coronel, hoisted the British flag and stopped. The vessel was then boarded and searched. A quantity of powder and dynamite was found, which the Chileans were about to seize, when they were warned by the Captain, who said the articles should not be taken without a fight. He was let alone, and the steamship was allowed to continue on her way.

Pati has accepted the proposal for twenty performances at Rio Janeiro for £30,000.

Near Cleveland, Tenn., the work of a prehistoric race has been discovered in the shape of a wall, now under ground. It is five feet high and one hundred yards long. Some of the stones bear inscriptions in hieroglyphic characters. The wall evidently antedates the mound-builders.

Chicago, March 5.—The report of the World's Fair Committee on Ceremonies is completed. It provides for a gigantic military display and a parade under the direction of the Major-General of the army on Tuesday, October 11, 1893; regular dedicatory exercises on Wednesday, and grand ball on Thursday, and the whole to conclude with a general civic-military display on Saturday.

There is great excitement in Chattanooga County, Kansas, over the rapid spread of small-pox among farmers, and so intense is the scare in some towns that the authorities have prohibited either entrance or egress except by railroad. The number of deaths is said to be alarming.

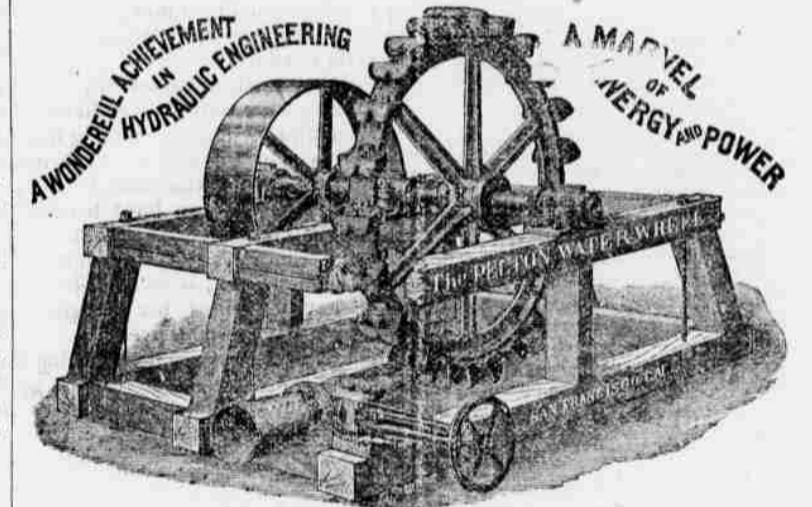
