Legislative Proceedings.

FOURTY-FIFTH DAY, JUNE 28, 1870. The Assembly met at 11 A. M., the President in the chair. After prayer by Mr. Phillips, the minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Mr. Kalamazov moved that the rules be suspended, in order that he might introduce a Bill in regard to the sale of land. The Bill was read, after being re-constructed by the Member, and passed to second reading under the rules.

Mr. Kalamazov offered a Resolution that the Assembly be adjourned at 10 A. M. on the 29th inst. The motion was carried.

On motion of Mr. Lyons, the rules were suspended, when he read a Report on the veto question. The Report was ordered printed, with a Bill on the subject.

Order of the Day.—First in order was the Appropriation Bill, upon which the House went into Committee. Mr. Boyd in the Chair.

Salary of Attorney-General, \$10,000. Passed. Salary of Clerk of the Court, \$2,500. Passed. Incidental and traveling expenses, \$1,000. Passed. Salary of Marshal of the Kingdom, \$6,000. Passed.

Salary of Sheriff of Hawaii, \$4,000. Passed. Salary of Sheriff of Maui, \$4,000. Passed. Salary of Sheriff of Oahu, \$4,000. Passed.

Appropriation of criminals, \$5,000. Passed. Salary of Oahu and Deputy Constables, \$20,000. His Ex. Mr. Phillips moved to amend by inserting \$20,000. He said that as a pretty general movement had been made throughout the Islands for a change in the administration of the police department, some notice should be taken of it. He was hardly prepared to recommend the great increase of expenditure which would result from paying all the police wages, but the present system had been established, as well as the proposed, at any rate, he would make the motion, to open the subject.

Considerable discussion arose upon the question, but finally, motion was made by Mr. Hitchcock that the Committee recommend taking the Report of the Committee on the subject, which would dispose of the matter for this session, and be of equal value, the time had not yet come for a change in the system.

Mr. Lyons moved to amend the present method of administering the police department. The principle of having people—constables—living around, among the people, making their living out of the fines and costs of criminals, was a very bad one, and should be changed as soon as possible. He did not see why the present was not as good a time as any to make change, or, however, on account of the great cost, he was in some doubt on the subject.

Mr. Rice favored a change, and mentioned several cases of the evil workings of the present system,—actual crime arising on the part of the country policemen.

Mr. Phillips moved that further consideration of the Report be postponed, and that the Attorney-General report to the House the exact sum necessary to carry on the department.

This motion was carried. Police of Maui, \$7,000. Consideration suspended, and, on motion, further consideration of all items regarding the police was suspended till the Attorney-General reports.

Police of Oahu and Deputy Constables, \$20,000. Consideration suspended until the session of the Assembly upon the Bill introduced by H. W. C. Lunallo, on the salary of the President of the Board of Education.

Salary of Clerk of Board of Education, \$5,000. Consideration suspended for the same reason. Pending the discussion of this item, the Committee received permission to sit again on Friday. Report approved.

His Ex. Mr. Phillips, moved that several Bills relating to his Department be made the special order for to-morrow, as he would leave town shortly. The motion was carried, and the House adjourned.

FOURTY-SIXTH DAY, JUNE 28, 1870. The Assembly met at 10 A. M., the President in the Chair. After prayer by the Chaplain, the minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Report of Commissioner.—The Special Committee to whom was referred the petition from Hamakua, regarding the Police, reported consideration, and recommended further examination of the matter by the House.

Resolution.—H. H. W. C. Lunallo, offered a Resolution that one of the Nobles of this Assembly be excused from further attendance at the meetings of the House, on account of sickness, and that a sum of money be appropriated for his use. Ruled out of order.

On motion, the rules were suspended, and Mr. Filipo introduced a Bill to amend Section 528 of the Civil Code, which was read first time, and passed to second reading under the rules.

Order of the Day.—First in order was the Bill to provide for the assessment of a part of the expense of building roads upon the estates benefited thereby, on its third reading. The Bill was read and passed, the ayes and nays being called on a motion to indefinitely postpone, which was lost by a vote of 11 to 24.

A Bill to provide for an appropriation for Customs-House Guards, was read third time, and passed. The Chair then read the ruling on the question as to whether the Bill introduced by Mr. Thompson to repeal Section 1420 of the Civil Code was in order. The ruling was as follows:—The Member for Honolulu (Mr. Thompson), requests leave to read for the first time, a Bill, of which he has given previous notice, to repeal Section 1420 of the Civil Code.

By the action of the House, the repeal of Section 1420 of the Civil Code, together with certain adjoining Sections, has been indefinitely postponed. Rule 40, of the Standing Rules and Orders of the House, reads as follows:—

"When a question is indefinitely postponed, the same shall not be acted upon again during the session."

"Therefore, the introduction of the Bill of the Member from Honolulu, repealing Section 1420 of the Civil Code, is ruled out of order."

A suspension of rules will be necessary in order that the Bill may be entertained.

Mr. Thompson appealed to the House from the ruling of the Chair. He objected that this was not the same Bill that had been before the Assembly; that it was an entirely different matter, and, as he had ruled, had been indefinitely postponed. This was a new Bill, and should be considered before rejection.

Mr. Lyons moved to amend the ruling of the Chair on this question. The object of the ruling was that we may avoid doing our work over again; if it were not so, all of our work might have to be repeated and gone over, to an indefinite extent. had been thoroughly and carefully discussed, the law had been habitually postponed. Our rules were very definite on this point, when a question was indefinitely postponed, any further discussion was impossible during the session, and it was the intention of this House, when they voted the other day, to put aside the question for this session. If any member wished to have a matter gone over again, he could have a re-consideration, which was the right and proper course. Had not this matter been decided before the House? Had not the Assembly just said this matter entirely? The Member for Honolulu had made this point, that this was a different matter and a new question entirely, because it proposed to repeal only a single Section in place of those which it was proposed to repeal the other day. The House should not stultify themselves by going back to their own rules. In the Bill that had been before the House, the real purpose was to repeal Section 1420 of the Civil Code. Did any one doubt it? This very thing had been said by the Member for Honolulu, in the form of a question, when he debated the Bill.

His Ex. Mr. Harris, sustained the ruling of the Chair. He related an instance of ruling on the part of the Speaker of the English House of Commons, which resembled this. When there was one who had the politeness to get up and say that there had been a Bill before the House to repeal Section 1420 of the Civil Code? He spoke at some length, taking substantially the same ground as Mr. Smith.

Mr. Kalamazov was opposed to the ruling; he said he would vote against it, and called upon all brother members to do the same. The ruling of the Chair would shut out all chance for improvement and repeal, not only in this law, but in all similar cases. If we sustain this ruling, we could not even consider the Bill of the Member for Kauai.

The ruling of the Chair was sustained, the ayes and nays being, ayes, 17; nays, 16; absent, 1; doubtful, and therefore no vote, 1.

Next in order was a Bill to re-codify the Civil Code, which was read a second time. A motion was made by His Ex. Mr. Phillips, that the Bill be indefinitely postponed, as before the next session there would be a good deal of amendment required, which would be prepared and brought into the next Legislature; besides, there were nearly a thousand amendments of the old law yet on hand.

The motion was carried. Next in order was a Bill to enlarge the Jurisdiction of the Police Courts, which was read a second time, and ordered to engrossment.

A Bill to secure to workmen their wages, in case of bankruptcy, was read a third time. The nature of the Bill was to secure from the funds of the bankrupt estate, first, what was owed to workmen, as high as \$50, above which they should be paid pro rata.

A motion was made by Mr. Lyons to order to engrossment. A counter-motion was made by Mr. Bishop to indefinitely postpone. He regarded the Bill as an incumbrance upon our present bankruptcy laws; its tenor was to secure to clerks and others of that nature, the first place in the settlement of such estates, at the expense of others, all should be treated alike.

His Ex. Mr. Phillips, supported the motion of Mr. Lyons. The Bill was a good one, and he hoped the House would pass it.

The motion to order to engrossment was carried. A Bill to amend the laws in regard to gaming was then read, and ordered to engrossment.

A Bill limiting the time within which actions may be brought for the recovery of land, was read a second time. The time, as contemplated by the Bill, was to be not more than twenty years. Pending discussion, the House adjourned.

FOURTY-FIFTH DAY, JUNE 28, 1870. Assembly met at 10 A. M., the President in the Chair. After prayer by the Chaplain, the minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Report of Commissioner.—Committee on Judiciary reported consideration of a Bill to regulate criminal procedure, and recommended its passage with a few amendments which they reported.

On motion the rules were suspended and the Bill read last time by its title only, and on further motion, was made the special order for Monday next. The committee whose duty it is to examine all petitions containing miscellaneous subjects, reported consideration of a petition from Maui, on potatoes, and a petition from Honolulu, on salaries of His Majesty and the Ministers, recommending tabling the same. Report approved.

Order of the Day.—A Bill to limit the time in which actions may be commenced to recover Real Estate, on its 2nd reading, came first on the orders, as unfinished business. Motion to order to engrossment was carried.

Consideration of the Appropriation Bill was then taken up in place of the special order, of several Bills concerning the Attorney-General's Department. House went into Committee. Mr. Bishop in the Chair.

His Ex. Mr. Phillips stated that he was prepared to report on the question of appropriations for the Police. The matter had been very carefully considered in the office of the Marshal and the Governors of the various Islands. The items were even greater than he had thought—and for the two coming years would be as follows:

Police of Oahu \$50,750  
" Maui 17,640  
" Maui 16,500  
" Kauai 6,612  
Incidentals 1,000  
Total 103,588

Items were then read from the appropriation Bill as follows:—Police of Oahu and Deputy Constables \$20,000  
" Maui 7,700  
" Kauai 9,800

The items were then read from the report of His Ex. the Attorney General, on the Police. If a paid service were inaugurated, there would be Constables in each District, paid a monthly salary of \$12, which would make up the sum to the large amount stated in the general report.

Motion was made by Mr. Hitchcock that the item for Police on Oahu \$50,000 pass as in the Bill. Considerable discussion ensued on this motion, the feeling being very strong in the side
