THE JUDGE'S CHARGE IN GUILTEAU'S TRIAL

The Judge, in conclusion, said: "And now, gentlemen, to sum up all I have said to you, if you find from the whole evidence that at the time of the commission of the homicide the prisoner was laboring under such defect in his reason that he was incapable of understanding what he was doing or seeing that it was the wrong thing to do—as, for example, if he were under an insane delusion the Almighty had commanded him to act—then he was not in a responsible condition of mind, but was an object of compassion and should be acquitted. If, on the other hand, you find he was under no insane delusion, but had possession of his faculties and had power to know his act was wrong, and if, of his own free will, he deliberately conceived the idea and executed the homicide, then, whether his motives were personal vindictiveness, political animosity, a desire to avenge supposed political wrongs, or morbid desire for notoriety, or if you are unable to discover any motive at all the act was simply murder, and it is your duty to find a verdict of guilty as indicated, or (after a suggestion from Scoville to that effect), if you find the prisoner is not guilty by reason of insanity, it is your duty to say so. You will retire to your room and consider your verdict."
