Mr. George Smith writes to the London Daily Telegraph: "The collection brought home by the expedition confided to my charge includes over 400 separate inscriptions, besides various objects of art, domestic utensils, implements, &c. The inscriptions throw new light on the history, politics, astronomy, mythology, geography, and language of ancient Assyria; but it would be tedious to your readers to indicate on them a critical and minute examination of all these texts. I will, therefore, select a few as characteristic specimens of the collection, and I shall commence with a text that has attracted most attention—namely, which belongs to the Deluge series. When last year I published a translation of the text in question, I was obliged to note with regret that in the first column of the inscription there were about fifteen lines entirely lost. The lacuna occurred at a point of high interest to students and the world in general—for the Divine Instructor of Sisi was about to give orders for the embarkation in the ark. It is needless, therefore, to say with what satisfaction I lighted upon the welcome tablet which fills up this very important gap. The fragment I found during the Daily Telegraph expedition belongs to the first column of the Deluge series of inscriptions. It continues the speech of the God Hea, the commencement of which is on the portion of tablet already in the Museum. On the fragment of the old collection, Hea tells Sisi to warn the world, because of the wickedness of the people; on the Daily Telegraph portion Hea continues by predicting the flood, and then commands Sisi as follows: "On the coming of the flood which I shall send, thou shalt enter into the ship, and the door of the ship shall be shut behind thee. The ark shall be of it thy corn, thy furniture and goods, thy gold and silver, thy male slaves, and thy female slaves, the sons of the army, the beasts of the field, the animals of the field, all that thou hastest thou shalt do. They shall go in before thee, and they shall guard the door of the ship. Sisi attended and opened his mouth, and spake, and said to the God Hea, his Lord." Five lines of this speech of Sisi follow this. They are too mutilated for exact translations; and in the answer, Sisi refers to the difficulties in the way of the work. I need not dwell upon the interest of placing this account side by side with that contained in the book of Genesis.

The Photograph Album. There is a sort of delicious joy in looking over a family album, especially if it is a very old album with a grained back, which occasionally and unexpectedly drops through your fingers, leaving a couple of cousins or an aunt and three aunts in the other, and the balance of the family under the chair. The first picture is of an old gentleman with an expression of wary caution in his face, as if he was engaged in dodging a wild bull, and was somewhat doubtful of the result. Opposite him is the grandmother, a patient looking lady in a black dress, with a book in one hand and a pair of spectacles in the other. There is a noble well meaning expression in her face. On the next leaf is a middle aged man looking as if he had been suddenly shot through the roof of a starch factory, and had landed in a strange country. Opposite is the picture of his wife, who, having heard a rumor of the catastrophe, has made up her mind to be prepared for the worst. Then follow the children—little girls looking so prim as to make you squint, and little boys with their noses and ears in their noses, and with an expression on their face of unearthly solemnity. Then follow uncles, taken in their overalls, with a spreading inclination in their clothes, hair and face, as if they were bound to get their money's worth; and aunts with warts on their noses, and varnish in their hair, and preposterous lace collars about their necks. Then there is the bashful young man peering opposite to an aggressive young lady, whom heaven and some married woman have designed for each other. There are also the pictures of Cousin Aleck and his young wife, who stopped here when on their tour, and no young man looks at him without remarking on and registering a terrible vow never to get married. Besides these is a picture of the man who died in a strange country, the only one of which time his wife died, and he moved to live with his children, and is now worth some fifty thousand dollars. He has been photographed in his hat, which is one size too large for him, and which gives him the appearance of having murdered his aunt and concealed the body. Then there are two or three fine looking corsairs of no particular identity, and several broken spirited women with babies in their arms—directly or indirectly related to the owners of the album; and the exhibition closes.—Danby News.

A NEW MOVEMENT IN CHINA.—The Chinese are preaching their system and setting up benevolent institutions! The following strikingly shows how strong must have been the impressions on the mind of the mind of the preaching of the gospel and the working of Christian institutions, when the Chinese leaders resort to the course thus indicated: "The Rev. J. Chambers, of the London Missionary Society, writes from Canton: 'The influential part of the community seem to have changed their tactics entirely for the present. Instead of direct or violent opposition they resort to works of benevolence and public preaching of their favorite doctrines, in imitation of us. They are establishing hospitals and schools and providing help in the city and in the country. There is now a benevolent institution in the western suburbs of Canton, for which tens of thousands of dollars are subscribed by the officials and gentry. Medicines are dispensed and prescriptions written gratis, widows and orphans and aged poor are helped, coffins are provided for those who die in poverty, and free schools established or are to be established by this institution throughout the city and suburbs. But a most remarkable fact is the public preaching—a new thing in China, at least in modern times, and evidently in imitation of Protestant missionaries. Not long ago there was an examination of candidates for the office of preacher, held by a committee of the gentry, at which some two hundred preached trial sermons, in a hall open to the public, each being allowed half an hour, and called to halt when the time was up by the ringing of a bell. Somewhere about sixty of these are said to have been selected, to be paid each thirteen dollars a month, for preaching in different parts in the town and country. This movement is, on the whole, very encouraging in regard to mission work. It shows that a deep impression has been produced by Christian preaching.'—N. Y. Independent.
