**NEW WARSHIPS.**

Bids Are All Above Price Allowed by  
Congress.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Bids were  
to have been opened by the Navy De-  
partment today at noon for armored  
battleships, monitors and armored cru-  
isers now authorized by law, but none  
was received within the price fixed by  
Congress.

The Carnegie Steel Company and the  
Bethlehem Iron Company submitted  
statements that they were unable to  
furnish armor of the character required  
at the price fixed by Congress. Burnside  
brothers of San Francisco made a blank-  
et offer to furnish all the armor requir-  
ed for \$450 per ton, which, however, is  
above the limit fixed by Congress. This  
limit was \$400 for the seven ships au-  
thorized last year and \$300 for the ships  
authorized this year.

**GENERAL ASSEMBLY.**

MINNEAPOLIS, May 27.—The one-  
hundred and eleventh annual meeting  
of the General Assembly of the Presby-  
terian church ended today. It will meet  
next year in St. Louis.

**DEATH UNDER WHITE FLAG**

**TREACHERY ON THE ISLAND OF  
NEGROS.**

Filipinos Hoist Flag of Truce and  
Then Fire Upon a Peaceful Party  
That Trusted To It.

MANILA, May 28.—The cable ship  
Recorder, while picking up the cable  
between the islands of Negros and  
Cebu, went to the town Escalante, on  
the former island. She landed a party  
in a launch, consisting of the command-  
er, second officer and several of the  
crew, and also Captain George P. Tilley  
of the Signal Corps, who was on board  
the ship to observe the cable opera-  
tions. A flag of truce had been hoisted  
by the rebels, who waited until the  
party had landed and then treacherously  
poured a murderous volley upon them.  
Captain Tilley and one of the men at  
once threw themselves into the water.

The commander of the Recorder, run-  
ning a great risk, managed to reach the  
launch and put off from the bank to  
save it from capture by the rebels.  
Meanwhile a rain of bullets was falling  
all around the fugitives. The second  
mate was picked up by the launch just  
as he was sinking, but was alive. He  
said that the last he saw of Captain  
Tilley the latter was swimming feebly  
by his side.

The steamer was far out from shore,  
but those on board could see that the  
Malay seamen were caught by the re-  
bels, flogged and then cut to pieces. The  
ship returned to Bojo, stopped and  
within an hour troops were dispatched  
to the scene of the attack.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—General  
Greely today receive a cablegram from  
Major Thompson at Manila, reporting  
that a party landing for the repair of  
the cable at Escalante, island of Negros  
had been treacherously attacked by na-  
tives; that Captain George P. Tilley,  
Signal Corps, is missing, and that the  
worst is feared. Tilley's services in the  
Philippines have been marked by such  
ability, courage and zeal that his su-  
periors placed him in the foremost  
rank of subordinate officers. Tilley's  
operations referred to are not those of  
the Signal Corps, but of the Eastern  
Extension Cable Company, that has  
been permitted to repair and replace  
certain cables in the Visayan Islands.  
Tilley doubtless accompanied the ex-  
pedition as a representative of the  
United States, the supervision of all  
telegraph lines and cables being a part  
of his duties. No other casualties in  
the Signal Corps have been as yet re-  
ported in this expedition. Tilley was  
appointed from California.

HELENA, (Mont.), May 28.—Captain  
George P. Tilley, reported probably  
killed by Filipinos at Escalante, island  
of Negros, had been a resident of He-  
lena since 1884. He was an expert tele-  
grapher and electrician, and a man of  
finest character. He was born about  
thirty-eight years ago at Jamaica, L.  
I., where his father, a civil war veteran  
lived. Tilley enlisted early in the  
war with Spain as lieutenant of the  
Signal Corps, and was promoted soon  
after reaching the Philippines for con-  
spicuous able service. He had been fur-  
ther recommended for promotion to  
brevet major.

**CASTELAR DEAD.**

MADRID, May 28.—Senor Emilio  
Castelar, the distinguished Republi-  
can orator and statesman, died today, after  
illness lasting five years. He will be  
given a state funeral. He was born in  
Cadiz, September 8, 1832. His father was  
a Republican before him. Castelar be-  
came Professor of History and Philoso-  
phy at the University of Madrid in 1869.  
He has always been a Republican and  
twice had to leave Spain on account of  
his political opinions.

**THE SCINDIA.**

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29.—The  
United States collier Scindia went out  
of commission yesterday and will soon  
be converted into a floating coaling sta-  
tion. The Scindia and Ermas will be  
anchored in the neighborhood of Mis-  
sion rock and will supply warships with  
fuel until such time as Uncle Sam com-  
pletes his plan for the conversion of  
Mission rock into a coaling station.

**NEW GOLD DISCOVERY.**

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—Great  
excitement has been caused by the re-  
ported discovery of immense dry placer  
gold deposits in Lower California, 300  
miles south of Ensenada.

**CIVIL SERVICE.**

WASHINGTON, May 29.—President  
McKinley has issued the long pending  
amendment to the Civil Service rules.  
It releases from the operation of the  
Civil Service about 4000 officers.

Congressman Mondell has some good ideas with regard to the territory of Hawaii, which he expressed in his interview yesterday. He sees, and many Congressmen see, that a country which has managed its local affairs so well in the past, is quite able to manage its local affairs in the future. Congressman Mondell will be a help to us next January.

The "pork packing case" has become quite a "cause celebre" in our courts. It has once more to be tried. Altogether the case must have cost more than the original cause was worth, and it has been a source of worry and irritation to several in the legal profession. It is one of the oddities of law, that a case so apparently simple, has risen to so much prominence.

There will be joy at the Volcano house if the crater once more to roll its billows of fiery lava within the deserted pit of Halemaumau. There have been so many false alarms about the returning fires of Kilauea, that people have become very sceptical about reports. Still the present report is vouched for by the captain and officers of the W. G. Hall, and exaggerated stories are of no advantage to tourist travel. We may look for further news next Sunday with some confidence that our great natural wonder is going to give us a display to finish up the century with.

The death of Rosa Bonheur, which was announced in yesterday's paper, removes one of the most noted of female artists. Her pictures of animals are known in every country from countless copies. There has probably never been any one so skilled in painting horses as Rosa Bonheur. Her "Horse Fair," and the "Three Horses at a Trough" are world renowned, and will remain a monument to her genius as long as the canvas will hold together. None of the newer school have equalled the veteran artist in her particular field.

The British Government has again denied the application for pardon of Mrs. Maybrick, the murderess. The sympathizers of this woman forget the facts in the case, which proved that she maintained a lover, and produced a letter in which she spoke of the advantages which would come from her husband's death. What some people build on is the fact that Lord Chief Justice Russell believe her innocent, but then Russell was the leading counsel for the defence, and naturally he took that view. The views of a counsel for the defence are by no means evidence for innocence. However, Mrs. Maybrick's case has been gone over, and in prison she will remain.

Secretary Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, is starting a propaganda of education regarding the practicability of tea cultivation in the southern United States. In this little portion of the United States, he has a tea garden right to his hand. That tea will grow admirably upon our upper slopes is well known. Experiment has proved it over and over again, and men who understand tea culture have shown that it would be a profitable venture. But sugar and coffee have had too many attractions for the ordinary investor. However, with the Department of Agriculture interested in pushing tea culture, there will come a tea boom here. The United States imported 71,000,000 pounds of tea last year, at an expense of \$10,000,000. There is no reason why some of the \$10,000,000 should not stay within the borders instead of going abroad.

**NOTHING DECISIVE.**

The news from the Philippines is somewhat meager. With the advent of the rainy season military operations have come to a standstill, and the United States troops have been withdrawn from outlying positions. The result has been that the insurgent Filipinos have returned and, according to native accounts a reign of terror has resulted.

Of course a good deal of salt must be added to tales that come from native sources, but that such a condition of affairs should occur is by no means unlikely. The Spaniard somehow or other teaches cruelty, and those who have been under his baleful tutelage almost invariably practice it. The history of the Mexican war tells just such tales as are now being narrated of the Philippines.

The work of the Peace commissioners under Professor Schurman is tending to keep the war spirit alive among the Filipinos. It is very evident that the mass of the people are far too ignorant to appreciate anything which the educated man understands. The fact that Aguinaldo and his generals have not been taken and that the ground once occupied has been abandoned on

account of the rainy season, coupled with the efforts of the Peace commission to bring things to a pacific conclusion, is interpreted as weakness and cowardice to the Filipinos, and they readily believe it. It is quite possible that the Peace commission really prolongs the struggle, just as a peace-at-any-price party, has plunged many a European state into war.

When a war is on, it is an unwise thing to have civilians, with large diplomatic powers, at the front. For all ordinary matters in arranging for an armistice, the military chiefs are sufficient, when once the beaten foe has sued for peace, then the civilian can have his innings. But it is thoroughly misleading to a semi-civilized foe to be forever thrusting a chance of peace before him from a source of authority which he regards as emanating from a different point to that of the military, while he still thinks himself unbeaten by the latter.

**LIGHT NEEDED.**

A document with which all thinkers on the Islands should make themselves familiar, or which should be in such form that all should be able to make themselves familiar with it is the bill to provide a government for the territory of Hawaii. There is only a very limited number of copies here, but the Government might easily have a number printed for distribution. Here we are not so very far off from the time when the debate will come on, which will settle what our status shall be, and one may safely say that not a dozen people in the whole territory even know the form under which the bill will go in, its main provisions, nor the amendments which were made in it when it passed through committee.

It is true that Congress will do what it pleases with us, and that our destiny is no longer in our hands. But that does not mean that we are to sit with folded hands. We can not speak directly in Congress, but we have many good friends who can speak for us, and who will be only too happy to put forward ideas for us, if they are expressed in convincing terms.

But how are we as a community to make any expression of our desires, if we are in ignorance of what is proposed to be done. Here and there may be found a man who has some hazy notion taken from extracts that have appeared in the papers, but it is doubtful if even our Cabinet Ministers have read through and examined the document in its present amended form.

Things may be going along very comfortably, and our business prospects may be brilliant, but we have political duties, as well as the duty of accumulating wealth. Indeed it is the vigor with which the men of the United States attend to their political duties, that enables the nation to become the mighty and powerful nation it is.

It is manifestly the duty of our Cabinet to put this law within reach of all those who are interested in it, and that means within reach of the whole people. When all who care to take an interest in it, have had the opportunity to study it, ideas on the subject might be formed, which it would be advantageous to send forward to our friends in Congress, and thus we might influence our fate somewhat. It is very certain that unless we help ourselves we shall find nobody to help us. Our days for being molly-coddled are past. Instead of waiting like children for the inevitable, we should be informed before hand what that inevitable is. Decidedly the Cabinet should publish an issue in pamphlet form.

The project of Colonel Whyte to introduce a farming class will be watched with great interest by those who are anxious for the progress of the country. There is nothing visionary about the colonel's scheme. He has been over the ground himself, and has talked not only with projectors in Honolulu, but with the men who have had to deal practically with the land on Hawaii. There are no more practical men on the Islands than the Horners. J. M. Horner is a veteran agriculturalist and has made a success of earning a fortune from the soil any time these last fifty years. His experience is practical, he knows what the American farmer can do, and he knows what can be obtained from the Hawaiian soil. If he is a party to setting aside 1000 acres for settlement, any one can feel assured that he sees ultimate success for those who may elect to try their luck upon the land. But Mr. Horner does not believe in luck, he believes in solid hard work, which well applied, will bring success to any man.

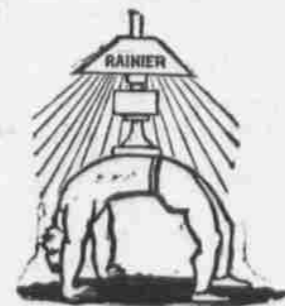

## NEEDS MORE VOLUNTEERS

### OTIS MUST HAVE MORE MEN TO CONTROL ISLANDS.

Diplomacy Has to Take a Back Seat—Administration Realizes the Wants of the Fighting Line.

NEW YORK, May 29.—The Washington correspondent of the Herald telegraphs: The question of calling for volunteers for continuing the war in the Philippines will probably come up again at tomorrow's session of the Cabinet. The situation in the islands, as described in recent dispatches, is such as to make it almost necessary to raise at least a part of the provisional army authorized by the last Congress, if the United States expects to secure complete control of the archipelago.

The Administration has been brought to realize that it is no longer war and diplomacy in dealing with the insurgents, but plain war. Diplomacy and the Peace Commission have been completely whipped and forced to surrender.

General Otis has not a sufficient number of men to accomplish this end. It is believed that he has so informed the War Department, but the officials will not admit it. They do admit, however, that the outlook for an early peace is very gloomy, and that more troops are badly needed in the Philippines.

Just how to meet this situation is the question which confronts them and requires prompt decision. Although General Otis states that he will continue an aggressive campaign during the rainy season, it is appreciated that he will be able to do little more than garrison some of the points which the forces under General MacArthur and Lawton have taken, and hold them until the rainy season is over. It is also plain that there will be more or less illness during this period of bad weather, and that when the campaign is resumed the force capable of active warfare will be materially reduced. It is expected that the President will discuss all phases of the situation with the Cabinet tomorrow and reach an early decision.

### STARVATION IN RUSSIA.

LONDON, May 27.—Particulars received regarding the famine in Russia confirm the previous growing accounts. The members of the Russian aristocracy seem to have at last awakened to a full sense of the gravity of the situation, and money is beginning to flow in on all sides for the relief of the starving millions. Unfortunately, charity is almost too late. The censor at first prevented the truth from being published by the Russian press. Now that the facts are allowed to appear, the famine specter is stalking through the land. Some authorities estimate that as many as thirty million peasants are starving. The Czar, Czarina, Russian Government and the Red Cross and other bodies have subscribed many millions of roubles, but \$2,250,000 is still required.

### NEALL FOUND GUILTY.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Captain J. M. Neall of the Fourth Cavalry has been found guilty of a number of the charges made against him, and the sentence of the court martial, which recently tried him at the Presidio, is that he be dismissed from the service. The judge advocate has approved it, and the case will go in a few days to the President.

General Shafter, who sent the findings of the court martial to Washington, made a strong plea for mercy for Captain Neall. It is hoped that the friends of Captain Neall may be able to induce the President to permit him to remain in the service and to accompany his troop, which leaves next week for Manila.

### THE SPRECKELS WIN.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—The case of John D. Spreckels & Brothers Company against R. A. Graham has been compromised. It is understood that Graham is compromising for practically the full amount asked by the Spreckels Brothers. It is understood that the pledged property will be sold, but that Graham will be given an option on it, and the whole matter will be amicably settled. The compromise, however, will cost Graham somewhere in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

### JEAN DE RESZKE.

LONDON, May 26.—Jean de Reszke, the famous tenor, has been decorated by Queen Victoria with the Royal Victorian Order of the Fourth Class.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—Charles M. Shortridge formerly proprietor of the San Jose Mercury and the San Francisco Call, has been granted for divorce by his wife on the ground of desertion.

### TUBERCULOSIS CONFERENCE.

BERLIN, May 27.—The lull in political excitement during the vacation of the Reichstag and Diet was relieved by the assembling of the Tuberculosis conference, which has attracted extraordinary attention. The event is compared with the Peace conference—as indicative of the progress of fellowship among nations.

### YALE'S NEW PRESIDENT.

NEW HAVEN, May 28.—Professor Arthur Twining Hadley has just been elected president of Yale university to succeed President Dwight.

## ANGLO-AMERICAN PLANS

MAY BE ADOPTED BY THE PEACE CONFERENCE.

The United States Commissioners Will Support Pauncote's Scheme For a Permanent Tribunal—Other Schemes.

LONDON, May 31.—The correspondent of the Standard at The Hague says: An important advance was made today in the direction of a scheme of arbitration combining the Russian, British and American proposals. The representatives of these nations arrived at an agreement which seems to find general acceptance. Sir Julian Pauncote conferred this afternoon (Tuesday) with Seth Low and Mr. Hollis, and both the British and American proposals were examined, with the result that the United States will support the Pauncote scheme for a permanent tribunal.

In all practical and essential features the Russian and American plans are identical, but the American delegates have gone further, covered the whole field of arbitration and drafted provisions for a rehearing in the event of a disagreement. Their proposals will be submitted to the drafting committee tomorrow.

The correspondent of the Daily News at The Hague says: The Americans will submit tomorrow a scheme of mediation distinct from their arbitration scheme. I understand it is entirely original and full of new and ingenious and practical ideas. The Americans refuse to consent to compulsion in any category of the proceedings. Disputes, therefore, can only be referred to the permanent tribunal by the desire of both litigant states. They also hold that to oblige independent states to enter into binding treaties with each other would revolutionize international law and the Monroe doctrine.

The Times correspondent at The Hague says: A proposal will be submitted at the meeting of the drafting committee of the arbitration committee today (Wednesday) under which a nation which sees danger of grave disagreement with another state may apply to some third state, not having an immediate interest in the case, to act on its behalf. The other party to the dispute will then have an opportunity of taking a similar course; and the mediating state will investigate with a view of finding a pacific solution.

If, despite this, war should still break out, the mediating states shall continue to represent the belligerents without affecting the rights and duties as neutrals, with a view to bringing about the speediest possible cessation of hostilities.

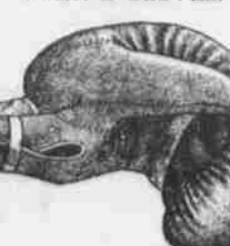
