A STRANGE COMMUNITY. A Kansas Town Completely Isolated from the Outside World.

There are really no stores, but there are three large buildings used a storehouse, where the different products are nicely kept. In one of these were stored vegetables, corn and other things.

ENGLISH RAILWAYS. Efficiency and Ugliness of their Running Equipments.

The first impression which an American who is experienced in railroad traveling in his own country derives from the exterior aspect of an English train is unfavorable.

There is no doubt of it. They are narrower and they are shorter; and to the American eye they look even shorter than they really are, because they have no projecting platform at the ends, no overhanging roof or hood, but are buckled close up to each other, and their contact controlled by small metal buffers, the springs of which allow a play of from eighteen inches to two and a half feet between car and car.

The regular meeting of the Eclipse rowing club will be held to-night. This club turns out at day-break to practice.

The Yosemite skating rink expects to present a champion roller skater to public view after the arrival of the Mariposa.

The James I. Dowsett became stranded at low tide on the reef at Lanai while stopping at that place to receive bullocks.

During the meeting of the Kapiolani Boat Club last Thursday evening, the members decided to withdraw from the association.

Eight different rowing crews were making time over the bell and spar buoy courses within a few minutes of each other at 5:30 o'clock last evening.

The boat clubs that still belong to the Rowing Association are the King's, composed of natives, the Honolulu, whites; the Iolani, natives; and the Knickerbockers, Portuguese.

Yesterday a horse and buggy was standing on Fort street above Hotel, with the horse facing the sidewalk, a passing hack struck the hind wheel of the buggy almost upsetting vehicle.

At eleven o'clock to-morrow morning there will be services held, with preaching by the Rev. E. C. Oggel, at the Bethel Union Church. The subject will be "Dead." All are cordially invited.

Mr. Thos. Willets, formerly manager of the Pawa Dairy, leaves the Islands on board the W. H. Diamond which is announced to sail to-day. He intends to take charge of a cattle ranch in Texas.

Evidently the Kapiolani boys intend business. They have repaired their garboard streak, which was split last Thursday evening, and have had a new one put in its place. The boat was in the water again last night.

The Honolulu Club, at a late meeting, passed a resolution instructing their delegates to the Rowing Association, to move for the rescinding of the motion that made a "Senior" such a pliable and transferable personage.

The M. B. C. base ball club will have a practice game at Makiki to-day. It was expected that they would play a match game with the Unknowns, but that club is to be played against the Honolulu Juniors at the same place, this afternoon.

The circus will give two performances to-day. Matinee at two o'clock and in the evening at eight. Although no steep-chase will be given at the matinee, there will be one in the evening that is expected to be very exciting. Popular prices.

Several young men amused themselves yesterday forenoon by tying a large sized centipede to a string and placing it in the middle of Hotel street, opposite the Y. M. C. A. building to see how close wagon wheels could get without passing over the insect.

The billiard rooms of Charlie McCarthy's were crowded last night with interested spectators, who were watching a table game known as "Devil's Pool." It is an English game and is on the same principal as the American Pin Pool.

Thursday afternoon as Bob Levy was driving down Fort street near Hotel his horse became balky. In backing the animal to try to go in another direction the wagon almost went through Goo Kim's "drapery shop," as somebody called the place.

The Rowing Association held a special meeting last evening at His Majesty's boathouse. Collector of Customs Iaukea, Vice Chamberlain Purvis, and three delegates from the Honolulu Club were the only representatives of the boating interests present. They passed certain racing rules which the boating clubs may or may not be satisfied with.

Between eight and nine o'clock last evening a bright light was observed on top of the mountain lying between the valleys of Manoa and Palolo. No one was hurt. The driver when questioned as to the cause replied: "Me no sabbe, me think the horse no good."

At the meeting of the trustees of the Honolulu Library Association held last Thursday evening, the Entertainment Committee gave a verbal report. The substance of the report is as follows: The committee had three meetings, and, after thorough investigation and advice from experienced persons, are forced to the conclusion that it would be impracticable to have an "Author's Carnival" as proposed. They have learned that in the large cities where such carnivals are held—the returns do not amount to one-third of the outlay, and in these cases the participants furnished their own costumes which were necessarily rich and costly. Here the committee would be expected to furnish the dresses. Another point made, and an important one too, was that the carnival would require the services of so many ladies that in a small place like Honolulu the participants would outnumber the audience. The committee is in hopes of completing arrangements for an entertainment by next February or as early as practicable. The members of the committee are Mr. M. M. Scott, chairman; Mrs. E. McGrew, Mr. J. B. Castle, Mrs. E. P. Adams and Mr. J. F. Brown. The rest of the business transacted consisted in auditing bills, etc.

The King street bridge is in an exceedingly bad condition. The bridge was once, during the long past, acadimized, but that has worn away in places causing ruts and holes that make driving across it risky. When a series of accidents occur, as axels or wheels breaking, or the springs giving way, frightening horses etc., then probably the bridge will be repaired so as to render it fit for use.

Night before last, between half past eight and nine o'clock, while Mr. Bolster was sitting on the veranah at his residence on Merchant street. The family were inside the house. Mr. Bolster went to the end of the veranda to look out on the street, and while turning around, he saw a native standing in the hallway between the sitting room and bed room. He immediately took hold of him by the shoulders, but his shirt gave away and the native at once made his escape through the back yard and over the fence. The house was lit up at the time. The gates were all shut and bolted. It is supposed the native must have been on the premises some time, and seeing some folks leaving the house, thought nobody was in and at once tried to jump. He was seen by the neighbors entering over the fence on Richard street and had no hat or boots on. Mr. Bolster can recognise him if he sees him again. The police immediately arrested a native answering the description, but he was not the same party.

WOMAN AND HOME.

A DOCTOR ADVANCES SOME NEW IDEAS ABOUT DRESS.

A Cheerful Visitor—A Word to Mothers—The Hair and Teeth—"Crow's Feet"—An Offended Poetess—Receipts for the Cook.

In a recent article published in the New Orleans Medical and Surgical Journal, Dr. Th. mas Herbert points out what he believes to be a serious popular fallacy concerning summer wearing apparel. "We have been taught," he says, "that white bodies reflect heat and dark ones absorb it. We see for our eyes that snow melts much faster under dark cloth than it did under a white fabric. The inference was that we should wear white cloth in summer, because it absorbs heat and reflects more, and dark cloth in winter for the opposite reason. This is an error which has grown into a pernicious habit. The temperature of the body, as taken by the thermometer, is about 98.6 degrees. This would make the blood temperature 100 degrees, probably more. Now, the general blood temperature is much on a par with the outside atmospheric temperature during the greater portion of the summer, with a tendency to be higher, even in the recess of the body, and this tendency is much increased by exercise. In the summer, however, the thermometer may register 100 degrees to 110 degrees, and at the hottest period of the day may give 100 or 105 degrees in the shade. Then the outside heat may be greater than that of the human body in response. But at other periods of the day the temperature is notably less, while our own heat tends to remain permanently at the same degree. In short, during the greater portion of the day, even in the hottest summer, the body temperature in some of our organs is at least as above the surrounding temperature. These remarks do not apply to the great proportion who labor in the shade. Exercise may bring the blood to fever heat.

Leaving aside any consideration of our exterior apparel, we will say that most of us during this exercise wear white stuff next to the skin. Yet such garments will reflect heat from our bodies more when the temperature outside is greater than it is inside of them, and to our bodies more when the excess of temperature is in the blood. In the vast majority of cases therefore, we put on such garments preferably in summer when they generally serve as retainers of heat. In winter clothing we make another error in wearing fabrics which do not absorb moisture readily and tend to keep a stratum of air saturated with it over the skin, thus preventing evaporation, and consequently retarding the heat, which retains moisture retains heat, and what retains heat is so far, doubly injurious. This is just the way white clothes operate.

There are men who can not be made to wear, in the heat of the sun, anything lighter in weight or color than a dark-lined flannel shirt. Negroes, black as Erebus, split wool standing naked beneath the copper sky. They do not complain. In winter, nature wears a mantle of sparkling white. White retains heat. Who ever saw a black polar bear? But the human creature has on a garment that is dark colored, and absorbs heat. The atmosphere around him, which may be below zero, will reach the heat from his blood and organs which may be above 100 degrees in temperature. His vital furnace is set a-roaring to supply the loss. Exhaustion of life occurs, and he is chilled to the core. The law of equilibrium, by the same law of equilibrium, the overtaxed organs make a tremendous effort to remedy this trouble by reaction.

A Cheerful Visitor. (Detroit Free Press.)

There was no time for hesitation; the anxious chef threw the trimmings of the potatoes served at the royal table into a frying-pan with a large lump of butter, tossed the mishmash pieces until of a golden color, the missing to the eye, and further adorned by a dash of finely chopped parsley. The prince found the potatoes so good that he inquired the name of the dish. "No one knows what answer he received, as, being very deaf he repeated: "Ah, fried potatoes a la messire; I find them excellent and hope they will often be served." The king and princess laughed so hearty that the boys rolled down their cheeks, but the deed had been done and potato trimmings cooked in a frying-pan had received their baptism.

To Exterminate Ants. (Chicago Herald.)

Ants can easily be exterminated by putting about two ounces of lard oil in a small tin can without a top and burying the can about half-way in the earth near the ant nest. Leave it until the next day and, if any ants are seen outside of the can, pour a little oil into it, stir it with a stick, and then let it stand a little longer, when the last ant within traveling distance will be drowned in the oil.
