A Daring Feat.

According to the *Cologne* (Ger-
many) *Gazette*, a young Norwegian
named Frederick Norman, is about
to undertake a feat of almost unex-
ampled daring. He proposes to
cross the Atlantic Ocean in a r^og
boat which he is having built for his
own use. It is twelve feet in length,
four feet wide, and two-and-a-half
feet in depth, and has a covering
before and behind. A so-called
floating anchor will, it is said, serve
to keep the bow of the boat in posi-
tion when the occupant of the carft
is asleep. He thinks the gulf stream
will not, of course, be able to cook
during the voyage. His victuals
will consist of biscuit, preserved
meat and vegetables, condensed
coffee and fifty gallons of water.
His early experience in his native
waters makes him entertain no fear
from any storms which he may en-
counter. He has some idea of tak-
ing a wager on the accomplishment
of his task within 100 days, but the
main object of his experiment is to
show what a hardy Norseman can
do in the way of enduring exposure
on the open sea.

THE DAY'S DOINGS.

MORNING.

The California Furniture Manufacturing Company.

A few days ago as our reporter wandered promiscuously about in search of news, he happened to go into the above premises, and being greatly interested in what he saw, he took notes and describes his visit in the following lines:

The establishment is situated on Queen street, in the next building to Messrs. W. G. Irwin & Co., and the first view does not strike the eye with that amount of gorgeousness of which a more thorough search gives the impression. It is unlike most things in this sublunary sphere—it improves on acquaintance. The more you see of it the better you like it.

On the ground floor there are three rooms. Taking the back one as the first one to be viewed, we find it full of material for stuffing mattresses, "pure and unadulterated" hair—Eureka vegetable hair, &c. This last is made from the California soap-root. The root is described as being something like a cocoanut, but growing underground. It is torn into fibres, which, to the uninitiated, bear such a close resemblance to animal hair, that it is impossible to decide, without comparison, which is which. The animal hair comes in twisted ropes, and is then untwisted by hand and put through the "picker." This machine is something like a grindstone bristling with sharp teeth and enclosed in a wooden cover to prevent the fragments of hair flying about in any but the required direction.

The next apartment is the workshop. Although the finer kinds of furniture are imported still the work done here is good and much of it will compare favorably with the imported article both in design and execution. Here are kept the best black Bessener steel springs for mattresses and no others are used in the shop. Old mattresses too can be renovated and made as springy as new—which is undoubtedly a boon to the thrifty housewife.

Leaving the workshop we enter the sales department, and gaze with curious eyes on the excellent and elegant display. A lot of new goods just opened and hardly arranged were the first things that attracted our attention, and we made instant resolves and calculations that when the new-paper business began to pay better than we would launch out into the purchase of gorgeous furniture similar to this. But on enquiring we found that the prices of most of these beautiful and useful articles would not drain our slender purse. Reasonable prices for everything, and a determination not to be undersold in quality or price by any house in the trade, is the motto of the firm, and it is truthfully carried out. Bedroom suites of black walnut with marble-topped bureaus, bevelled edge mirrors, Californian cedar suites sweetly redolent of the forest, knock-down wardrobes, office tables, chairs in all styles were rapidly glanced over. Amongst the most striking were, a bedroom suite in mahogany and ash, made in Grand Rapids, Michigan, with bevelled French mirror, marble-topped bureau and combination washstand;

a Mexican primavera suite; a magnificent suite in black walnut with French burl and carved ebony panels, Tennessee marble and bevelled French mirror an elegant spring-back and seat; arm-chair upholstered in raw and spun silk, just soft enough to make one wish to sit forever; a little table with Mexican onyx top; but why particularize? Go and see for yourselves. Before leaving the ground floor the aesthetic sunflower of the establishment struck up some good music on one of the finest toned pianos in the country. Neufeld of Berlin is the maker, and every piano player in Honolulu should go and hear the revelation of its rich full tones. Then going upstairs we entered the show room for drawing room furniture. Elegance and comfort hold their sway here—from the sofa to the Hoey pattern double bed-lounge, everything is produced so as to give the double pleasures of use and beauty. "Jewel" chariot chairs for babies, folding up combination springbeds, "Gardner" perforated chair-seats, Patent "Tucker" spring mattresses, "Domestic" woven wire mattresses, folding chairs, Kou furniture, bookshelves were viewed in such rapid succession as to leave us in a state of hopeless bewilderment as to which were the especial objects of our choice. Still, we do not despair of finding out yet. Mr. A. M. Bradley, the courteous and well-informed manager, then bade us farewell at the door, and we wended our way along the street only to fall into the clutches of Mr. E. P. Adams, the agent for the Company, who quickly renovated our overburdened mind with the practical inquiry of how much we had bought. We leave him to the mercies of our readers, who will not, we are sure, when they view his stock, come away without at least making a fair exchange of coin for his furniture.

The Amy Turner arrived in New York on the 26th of August, with a cargo of about 1,500 tons of sugar. The bark C. R. Bishop left New York for Bremen on the 18th of August, and will probably leave the latter place for Honolulu in October.

The Eureka took 3,225 packages of sugar and the Ella 2,778 packages of sugar, 112 barrels of molasses, and 1,044 packages of rice.

The bark W. H. Almy arrived yesterday after a short passage of 14 days. Amongst the rest of her cargo were 20 fine horses for Mr. John McKeague.

We are informed that Mr. Purvis received a packet of cinchona seeds, by the last mail, direct from Ceylon. The seeds were sent to Hamakua on Tuesday for planting there as an experiment. Since the medicinal properties of the cinchona were first made known to Europeans over a century ago, the demand for the bark has been so great as to cause serious fears of a cessation in the supply from its native place, the Andes of South America. The culture of the tree has been successfully tried in other places and it is to be hoped that the experiment will succeed here and Hawaii nei may add another article to her list of profitable exports.

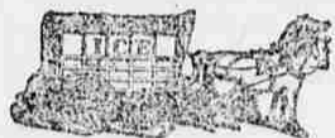

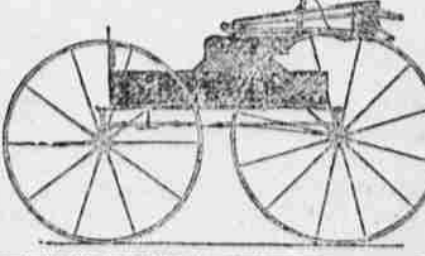

PARIS, July 29.—Another event that eclipses Egyptian affairs is the sleeping beauty in a hospital. Seventy-five days ago a pretty young woman, aged twenty five, was found at midnight by the police asleep on one of the seats of an external boulevard. She was conveyed to the station as drunk as drunk and incapable. On being searched a scapular was found around her neck and two religious medals. As she did not wake next morning, she was conveyed to the hospital, where she has still lain, in all the attitude of death, save that she respires rapidly. She has been fed on soup. Doctors from far and near came to peep at the phenomenon. It was discovered that she was two months *enceinte* when admitted, and a few days ago she was prematurely confined of a dead-born infant. But the pains of childbirth never roused her; she slept all the same. The famous Dr. Charcot, the highest authority of the day on nervous diseases, was called in. He recommended a cold douche. The first bath produced no effect; the second, however, did, and she promises in a little time to awaken up like Rip Van Winkle. Attracted by the accounts published, as strolling player called and recognized in the patient her daughter, disappeared since seven years. The patient appeared to know her mother, as she pressed her hand and cried, but never uttered an intelligible word. The prodigy, when a child, experienced the first attack of lethargy when the Prussians bombarded the capital. Among other distinguished foreigners who visited the sleeper was Mr. Barnum. That looks like business. With her and Jumbo, Barnum might be excused by his temperance friends for indulging in a straight drink.

A gun invented by a man in Riley, Miss., is, if it is what it is claimed to be, one of the most wonderful inventions of the age. It can be fired from ten to twenty thousand times a minute, can be elevated or depressed or turned to the right or left, inclined to cover the slope of a hill, contracted so as to bring the fire to bear upon one spot or expanded to cover a wide area, and all with the greatest ease and in the simplest manner, by merely turning a crank.

Senator Hill was buried at Atlanta Saturday afternoon, August 19th. There was an escort of the Atlanta Bar and Congressional Committee. There was a long line of carriages, and nearly 20,000 people were on the streets and in the procession.

A dispatch from Melbourne says: Bishop Goold of the Roman Catholic diocese here, was shot at and slightly wounded. His assailant, named O'Farrell, was arrested. He is the brother of the man who attempted to assassinate the Duke of Edinburgh at Sydney, March 18, 1868.

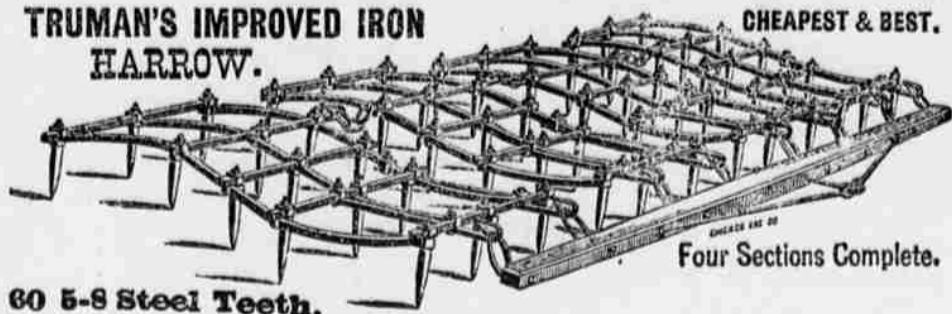
