ADVERTISING THE NATION.

The Paradise of the Pacific for June is issued, ready for the foreign mail by the Zealandia tomorrow. Its illustrations are of Queen Liliuokalani, Iolani Palace, native poi feast, and a map of the Hawaiian Islands. This map has been contributed by Mr. T. G. Thrum and contains a chronological table of Hawaiian kings, census of 1890, and table of area and elevation of the islands. The selections from Hawaiian lore are varied and of great interest. In the original matter there are many valuable memoranda of facts designed to be of benefit to Hawaii by circulation abroad. And "abroad" the Paradise goes almost as extensively as sunlight. The editor particularly boasts of having the Sultan of Morocco on the subscription list, and quotes a letter from that country from another intending subscriber; also a letter from the Hawaiian Consul at Dordrecht, Holland, asking for advertising rates, with a view to encouraging some of his commercial friends "to advertise for relations with Hawaiian houses." Messrs. Godfrey (editor) and Williams (publisher) are worthy of commendation for the manner in which they are fulfilling the object of the paper, viz., to make the islands known abroad as a place to be sought "for health, for pleasure, for profit."

ORDINATION SERVICE.

Messrs. A. W. Soares and R. K. Baptist were ordained to the gospel ministry, for work among the Portuguese, before a large congregation at Central Union Church Sunday evening. Rev. A. D. EXPECTATIONS V. DEEDS.

It was a hard day for the W. C. T. U. members in the grand stand were well pleased with the result. It was expected that a great game was expected. At least a good game was given. The matter was that of a perfect Hawaiian afternoon, a breeze from the mountains fanning the players and keeping the spectators comfortable.

The pitching of White Leona for the Honolulu took on novel wrinkles that were very baffling to the Kamehamehas. Only the fine fielding of the Kamehamehas, and but a few exceptions, prevented the Honolulu heavy hitters from scoring high. The exceptions, however, gave the Honolulu the two winning runs in the seventh inning.

First blood was won by the Honolulu in the second inning. White Lucas, Carter and Desha made base hits in succession when two were out. Lucas came home by Carter's, and Carter by Desha's, with the assistance of a wild throw by Lavelle. Kamehameha scored one by Davis in the third, who ran on a passed ball at third strike, was advanced two stages by Pabua's sacrifice and a wild pitch, and came home on a single by Mahuku. Wilkey added one the same inning to Honolulu's score, getting to second on a wild throw by Mahuku, and to third and home respectively on singles by Chan, Wilder and E. Wodehouse.

In the fourth three Kamehamehas—Kelinof, Meheula and Waimanukai—were struck out in succession. Waimanukai wrenched his leg at first base, on which he was safe, in the seventh. His place was taken by Bridges, a smart little stoney, who distinguished himself by an effective throw from third to first in the eighth, and whom W. Lucas tried hard but in vain to strike out in the ninth.

The Honolulu scored two more in the seventh, by Hay Wodehouse and G. Lucas. The former got base on an error by Mahuku, the latter second on a muff by Lavelle. Wodehouse got round on a passed ball and throw, and Lucas on a wild throw by Mahuku and a sacrifice hit by Chan, Wilder. For the Kamehamehas in next inning Pabua and Mahuku scored on base hits and a passed ball and two wild throws from Chan, Wilder. Nothing more being accomplished on either side, the score remained five to three and an inning to spare in favor of the Honolulu. This puts them two games ahead in the race for the championship cup.

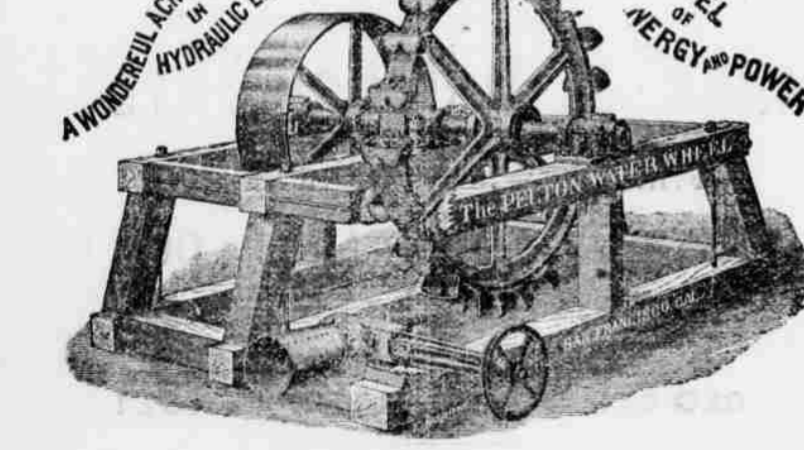
