## HILO HAPPENINGS.

Strange Doings Under the Opium License  
—Personal Notes—Local Gossip.

A splendid example of how the new opium law works was shown to the people of Hilo last week, when two officers entered the store of a Chinaman, and in the back room caught several Chinese with a complete opium outfit. The officers arrested the Chinese found in the room and conveyed them and the opium outfit to the Police Station, where a charge of smoking opium was lodged against them. They were accordingly taken before the Judge the next morning, who dismissed the case upon the evidence of the proprietor of the establishment, who produced a license to sell opium. Now this shows how cute the Chinese are in cheating the law as it now stands. Anyone can go into the room of one who holds a license and smoke to his or her heart's content; and, if they are arrested, the proprietor can always produce his license as a testimony, and swear the people found in his room are friends, and that the outfit is his own personal property, and that settles it.

Mr. M. G. Correa, who met with a painful accident several weeks ago by being thrown from off his horse, thereby breaking his leg above the ankle, has so far recovered that his friends expect to see him about soon.

Mr. D. H. Hitchcock, accompanied by his son Charles, left last week for Kohala to attend the Circuit Court being held there this week.

The wreck of the brig Selina, which was sold to Mr. James Cornell, is now no more, as she has been broken up into firewood.

Large volumes of smoke can be distinctly seen arising from out the crater on the summit of Mauna Loa.

The Japanese acrobats were received here with large audiences every evening that they performed, and, as the weather was fine, everything went off nicely. They go from here to Kohala this week.

Mr. Julian Monsarrat, of Kapapala Ranch, is in town, and is the guest of William Shipman while here.

The St. Mary's Band, composed of boys connected with the Brothers' school, gave a delightful moonlight concert here last Thursday evening, which was highly appreciated, as these young boys are remarkably fine players for the short time that they have been together.

With splendid weather, and everything serene, Hilo is contented.

## THE MASCOT.

### Hilo and its Prospects.

To the Editor of the Herald:

Few people, even, residing in Honolulu have a correct idea of the equable climate and beautiful surroundings of this little town situated, as it is, on the shore of Hilo Bay with Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea in the background giving it a remarkably romantic and picturesque appearance, especially at this time of the year, when the two mountain tops are covered with snow. Many other localities, not as conveniently situated but better known, are attracting the attention of visitors on account of their climatic advantages, while this little, modest and secluded village lives a dreamy and passive life. With all the natural advantages that nature could bestow, and with opportunities for development seldom equalled, this little village and its people seem to encourage that feeling of exclusive and independent quietude rather than stimulate or assist in increasing either its population or its resources. A great future is predicted for Hilo, as the people here are on the eve of great expectations from the proposed railroad which is to run from Hamakua into Hilo, and which will be injurious to Honolulu, as all the sugar and other products of these two districts, and in fact of the whole island, will undoubtedly be concentrated in Hilo, and from here exported by a line of steamers or vessels to California, and I hope it won't be long before they commence to build the railroad, as that will be the corner stone of the future Hilo.

2. CAKES: Fruit, pound, sponge, jelly and coconut, round and ornamented; the same in squares and pyramids, and fruit cake four tiers.
3. PASTRIES: Lady fingers, citron, currant, chocolate, wine drops and macarones; cream puffs, chocolate glaces, orange, vanilla, newitz, strawberry, and kisses with strawberry preserves.
4. JELLIES: Strawberry, port and claret, in moulds and squares.
5. BLANCMANGES: Almond and cream, in moulds and squares.
6. CONFECTIONERY: Home manufacture, French candies mixed, chocolate creams and ice cream chewing candies; crystallized fruits.
7. BEVERAGES: Soda water; lemonade, port and plain; coffee with cream.
8. HAM SANDWICHES.
9. BONBONS.
10. FRUITS: Oranges, nuts and raisins.
11. Flowers.

## Shipping Notes.

Steamer Kinau brought 11,000 bags sugar, 130 bags spuds, 70 bags corn, 254 hides, 98 sheep, 550 goatskins, and 100 packages sundries. She will sail at 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon on her usual route.

Steamer Likelike brought 7,847 bags sugar, 87 sheep, and 400 packages of sundries. She sails at 5 o'clock to-morrow afternoon for Kahului and way ports.

Steamer Mikahala brought 2,008 bags sugar, 90 bags rice, 3 horses, and 31 head of cattle.

Steamer Mokohii had 40 bags sugar and 50 sheep; Kilauea Hou, 4,000 bags sugar. Both sail at 5 this afternoon.

Steamer Surprise brought 4,057 bags sugar and 4 deck passengers. She will probably sail again to-morrow.

Although not posted, it is possible the steamers C. R. Bishop and James Makee may sail to-day on their respective routes.

Schooner Caterina returned from Hanalei without sugar on account of the wind being too high for loading.

Steamer John A. Cummins brought 1,000 bags sugar and 50 bags rice. She will not sail before to-morrow, having to take some sugar machinery to the Koolau side. Captain Neilson reports remarkably calm weather over there on last trip, the sea being as smooth as glass.

Steamer C. R. Bishop brought 1,737 bags sugar; Waialeale, 2,773 bags sugar, 32 bags rice and 30 bags paddy; James Makee, 2,700 bags sugar.

Russian man-of-war Vitiaz sailed on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock for Japan.

Schooners Kanikeaouli and Moiwahine are put down elsewhere to sail to-day, but only as a probability, not a certainty. Both look as pretty as yachts in their new coats of paint.

As sugar is arriving freely, it is likely the bark C. R. Bishop, barkentine Mary Winkelman, and tern W. S. Bowne will all be dispatched for the Coast this week.

On ye next Fryday nyte at ye Old Folkes' Concerte ye men and women shall be fuffered to fit together.

SUPREME COURT.

Before Judge Bickerton. H. Hackfeld & Co. vs. C. Kavanagh; J. E. Wiseman and Dr. G. Trousseau, garnishees. Following is the decision filed in the above suit: This is an action of assumpsit returnable at January term, 1887, on which there was a confession of judgment by defendant, filed January 8th, 1887.

It is claimed on behalf of Wiseman that he should be discharged as garnishee, for the reason that no legal service of process has been made on him, also that no true copy has been served.

The attaching creditor furnishes the names of the persons to be garnisheed, and the Sheriff proceeds to execute the writ without any unusual formality, but he must conform to the statute. (Waples on Attachment and Garnishment, p. 193).

After reciting the facts, evidence, pleas, and authorities, the decision concludes: Let a reference be had to a master to ascertain the amount of principal and interest due on the note, and the amount of dividends received by Paty, and on Willong's paying the balance due he will be entitled to the possession of the shares. BULL RUN'S PANIC.

HOW CHANDLER, WADE AND OTHERS HALTED THE STRAGGLERS.

Graphic Description of the Event as Related by One of the Eye Witnesses—A Lot of Frightened Human Cattle at Bay.

In his life of Ben Wade the Hon. A. G. Riddle, of Washington, modestly omits all mention of his own part in the battle of Bull Run, and the other evening I called upon him to obtain his recollections of it. "Do I remember it?" he exclaimed with a smile, "I should think I did, for a letter I wrote to my wife giving an account of my experience on that day got into the newspaper through the carelessness of a gentleman to whom it was given to read, and caused my defeat for congress at the next election. I was in congress at the time, and the reason I went to the battle was this: The Cleveland Grays, commanded by Gen. Alexander McDowell McCook, were at the front, and it was the finest company in the first regiment of the entire army. I had promised to go to the front and join them in their first battle, and in pursuance of this promise, two carriage loads of us, knowing that there was to be a fight on that memorable Sunday, left Washington about 3 o'clock in the morning to see it.

CONGRESSMEN AND CITIZENS. "There were Senators Chandler and Wade, Congressmen Blake, Morris and myself, all from Ohio: Mr. Brown, the sergeant at arms of the senate; Maj. Eaton, of Michigan, a friend of Mr. Chandler; and Tom Brown, of the treasury department, a friend of Mr. Wade. We got breakfast at Fairfax Court House, and reached the headquarters of the army at Centerville about daylight, provided with passes from Gen. Scott that would take us everywhere. At Centerville I found that the Grays were in the advance, on the skirmish line, and of course could not join them, as I had hoped and expected. However, we left our teams at a temporary hospital near Centerville, and went on, walking into the line of battle. After a while, when we supposed the battle was over, we went back to the hospital, where we had left the teams, thinking that the Union troops had been victorious, and there found several hundred soldier stragglers gathered around. There were a number of congressmen and citizens in the crowd, and among them Congressman Ely, of New York, who you remember was taken prisoner and sent to Richmond.

"Well, as I said, we supposed that the battle was over, and our troops successful, and were doing what we could to assist the wounded, when, to our great surprise, a splendid column of the famous Black Horse cavalry, of which you have heard so much, came charging down upon us. At first we supposed they were our troops, but soon saw they were rebels, and made a rush for a big, stout six-rail Virginia fence near by. A good many who had guns and revolvers whipped them out, and as the cavalry stopped and poured a volley into us we returned it with some vigor and effect, for as they rode off after that first volley we could see several riders horseless. In a minute the place was deserted by all except our party, and we then got into our carriages and started toward Washington.

"As we moved along the woods on each side of the road appeared to empty themselves of soldiers, who were all running as fast as they could, and pretty soon the road became blocked by teams, army wagons, riders horseless, wounded men, cannon and everything that had the power of motion, all pulling and heaving, and shouting and climbing over one another in the greatest excitement and confusion. Soldiers were throwing away their guns, their knapsacks and unloading themselves for flight. Army teamsters were cutting loose their horses from the wagons, artillerymen were doing the same, and you never saw and no one can imagine a wilder or more bewildering spectacle. Everybody seemed to have gone crazy.

LIEN FRIGHTENED CATTLE. In the crowd I saw E. B. Washburne, of Illinois, and Congressman Shanks of Indiana, with their hats off, trying to rally the men and persuade the soldiers to turn back and do their duty. But it had no effect whatever. The whole mass of men were like a lot of frightened cattle, and seemed to think of nothing but getting to some place of safety, and the whole crowd, which was growing larger and larger until it numbered several thousand, would have run as far as Washington had not Mr. Wade and Mr. Chandler, who were in their carriages ahead of us, got out and stopped them.

"When we were about a mile from Fairfax we saw Senator Henry Wilson driven by slaves in a light buggy, and called to him. He told us to hurry on, as the rebels were coming. Then we saw Mr. Wade and Mr. Chandler get out with their rifles. I asked them what they were going to do, and Mr. Wade replied that they were going to stop those — rascals! We lighted with them, and, taking guns, we had picked up on the roadside or revolvers that we had taken with us, the eight of us stretched across the road and forbade any man to pass. The flying men saw that we were in earnest, and Mr. Wade and Mr. Chandler used some strong language to bring them to their senses. Old Ben stood in the middle of the road with his hat on the back of his head and his rifle in his hand, and said he would shoot the first man who attempted to run any further. Mr. Chandler was very much excited. His face was pale and his eyes were bloodshot, and in his hand he had a big navy revolver, which he was brandishing in the air, while shouting to the panic-stricken soldiers that they were a lot of fools and cowards, and could not retreat any further unless they went over his dead body. The rest of us did what we could, and in a few moments we had the crowd at bay. The only man who passed us was a soldier bearing dispatches from Gen. McDowell to Gen. Scott at Washington, and we would not let him go until we found out what his errand was. Not a man got by our line, and many of the soldiers, becoming ashamed of their cowardice, joined us in trying to stop the panic. Order was somewhat restored, and the retreat was stopped when Col. Crane, of the Second New Jersey, who had been on duty at Fairfax Court House, came up with his regiment, and asked what the trouble was. Mr. Wade explained to him the situation, and he said he would relieve us. He soon brought order out of confusion, reformed the men, and then we went on our way toward Washington."—Herculey Crump in Pioneer Press.

CANINE DECORATION. On Tremont street, Boston, was noticed a novel arrangement in canine decoration the other day. Behind a tall man who seemed indifferent to his companions trotted two little pugs yoked together with a silver plated yoke. Large bows of yellow ribbon decorated the collar of each, and the pair was as ornate as possible. It was only when another dog made his appearance that the yoked pugs lost their dignified air.—Chicago Times.

THE DECAY OF TEETH.

What an Experienced Dentist Says—Use of an Improved Patent.

"It is a fact too well known to be emphasized," says Dr. Geo. B. Halman, one of the most experienced and skillful dentists of this city, "that the early decay of teeth is almost universal in this country. In the report of the Massachusetts state board of health for 1874, the statement is made that of 880 school children under 12 years of age in Woburn, Lexington and Bedford, in 1874, 680, or two-thirds of them, had decayed teeth. In 1874 out of 113 scholars in the Lawrence primary school, Woburn, thirteen only were fortunate in the possession of sound teeth, and cases are not rare where young persons at the age of 15 years are obliged to use false teeth.

"What is the cause of this decay? Much attention has been given to the solving of this difficult problem by members of the dental profession, and it is almost universally conceded that the general use of certain kinds of food is one cause, and perhaps the principal cause of decayed teeth. "Dr. Ephraim Cutter, now of New York, in the 'Transactions of the New Hampshire State Medical Society, 1876,' illustrates this view of the matter in this way: 'The Chemical News,' he says, 'ascribes the potato rot to a deficiency of lime and magnesia in the soil. Different observers give the percentage of magnesia in the ash of sound potatoes at from 5 to 10 per cent.; in the diseased potatoes only 3.94 per cent. Analysis shows over 5 per cent of lime in healthy potatoes, but in diseased potatoes only 1.77 per cent.'

"A similar statement was made some years ago by Professor Thorpe with regard to diseased and healthy orange trees. In former years there was a serious deficiency of lime and magnesia in the soil. Different observers give the percentage of magnesia in the ash of sound potatoes at from 5 to 10 per cent.; in the diseased potatoes only 3.94 per cent. Analysis shows over 5 per cent of lime in healthy potatoes, but in diseased potatoes only 1.77 per cent.

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The South in the Union Army. According to Felix A. Roever, a correspondent in The North American Review, the southern and border states furnished over 350,000 white volunteer soldiers for the Union army and nearly 100,000 colored troops for the same service.

Queer Thing a Woman Is. "Woman is a queer creature," said a shipping car conductor. "I have often noticed that our women passengers are the first to get up in the morning. If a train is due in Chicago at 8 o'clock in the morning they will get out of their berths at 6, and begin to get ready to get off the car at 7. I remember one old lady who came in with us one night last summer. She was up at 4 o'clock in the morning, or just daylight. At 5 o'clock she began gathering up her traps. The train was two hours late, and I told her we would not reach Chicago until 9:30 or 10. But that made no difference. Long before 11 o'clock she had her cloak, gloves, and black veil on, her shawl straps in her hand, and her valise all strapped and on the seat beside her. There she sat, bolt upright, turning neither to the right nor the left, asking no questions and saying nothing to anybody for nearly four mortal hours."—Chicago Herald.

A splendid example of how the new opium law works was shown to the people of Hilo last week, when two officers entered the store of a Chinaman, and in the back room caught several Chinese with a complete opium outfit. The officers arrested the Chinese found in the room and conveyed them and the opium outfit to the Police Station, where a charge of smoking opium was lodged against them. They were accordingly taken before the Judge the next morning, who dismissed the case upon the evidence of the proprietor of the establishment, who produced a license to sell opium. Now this shows how cute the Chinese are in cheating the law as it now stands. Anyone can go into the room of one who holds a license and smoke to his or her heart's content; and, if they are arrested, the proprietor can always produce his license as a testimony, and swear the people found in his room are friends, and that the outfit is his own personal property, and that settles it.

Mr. M. G. Correa, who met with a painful accident several weeks ago by being thrown from off his horse, thereby breaking his leg above the ankle, has so far recovered that his friends expect to see him about soon.

Mr. D. H. Hitchcock, accompanied by his son Charles, left last week for Kohala to attend the Circuit Court being held there this week.

The wreck of the brig Selina, which was sold to Mr. James Cornell, is now no more, as she has been broken up into firewood.

Large volumes of smoke can be distinctly seen arising from out the crater on the summit of Mauna Loa.

The Japanese acrobats were received here with large audiences every evening that they performed, and, as the weather was fine, everything went off nicely. They go from here to Kohala this week.

Mr. Julian Monsarrat, of Kapapala Ranch, is in town, and is the guest of William Shipman while here.

The St. Mary's Band, composed of boys connected with the Brothers' school, gave a delightful moonlight concert here last Thursday evening, which was highly appreciated, as these young boys are remarkably fine players for the short time that they have been together.

With splendid weather, and everything serene, Hilo is contented.

**THE MASCOT.****Hilo and its Prospects.****To the Editor of the Herald:**

Few people, even, residing in Honolulu have a correct idea of the equable climate and beautiful surroundings of this little town situated, as it is, on the shore of Hilo Bay with Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea in the background giving it a remarkably romantic and picturesque appearance, especially at this time of the year, when the two mountain tops are covered with snow. Many other localities, not as conveniently situated but better known, are attracting the attention of visitors on account of their climatic advantages, while this little, modest and secluded village lives a dreamy and passive life. With all the natural advantages that nature could bestow, and with opportunities for development seldom equalled, this little village and its people seem to encourage that feeling of exclusive and independent quietude rather than stimulate or assist in increasing either its population or its resources. A great future is predicted for Hilo, as the people here are on the eye of great expectations from the proposed railroad which is to run from Hamakua into Hilo, and which will be injurious to Honolulu, as all the sugar and other products of these two districts, and in fact of the whole island, will undoubtedly be concentrated in Hilo, and from here exported by a line of steamers or vessels to California, and I hope it won't be long before they commence to build the railroad, as that will be the corner stone of the future Hilo.

Steamer John A. Cummins brought 1,000 bags sugar and 50 bags rice. She will not sail before to-morrow, having to take some sugar machinery to the Koolau side. Captain Neilson reports remarkably calm weather over there on last trip, the sea being as smooth as glass.

Steamer C. R. Bishop brought 1,737 bags sugar; Waialeale, 2,773 bags sugar, 32 bags rice and 30 bags paddy; James Makee, 2,700 bags sugar.

Russian man-of-war Vitiaz sailed on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock for Japan.

Schooners Kanikeaouli and Moiwahine are put down elsewhere to sail to-day, but only as a probability, not a certainty. Both look as pretty as yachts in their new coats of paint.

As sugar is arriving freely, it is likely the bark C. R. Bishop, barkentine Mary Winkelman, and tern W. S. Bowne will all be dispatched for the Coast this week.

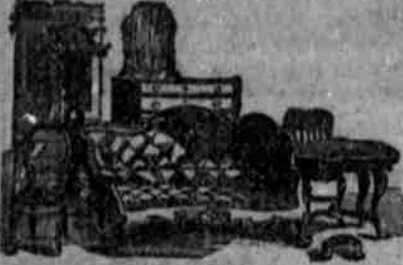

SUPREME COURT

AT CHAMBERS. Before Judge Bickerton. H. Hackfeld & Co. vs. C. Kavanagh; J. E. Wiseman and Dr. G. Trousseau, garnishees.

Following is the decision filed in the above suit: This is an action of assumpsit returnable at January term, 1887, on which there was a confession of judgment by defendant, filed January 8th, 1887.

It is claimed on behalf of Wiseman that he should be discharged as garnishee, for the reason that no legal service of process has been made on him, also that no true copy has been served. It is claimed on behalf of plaintiffs that service on Fisher, attorney or agent of Wiseman, was legal service on Wiseman.

The attaching creditor furnishes the names of the persons to be garnisheed, and the Sheriff proceeds to execute the writ without any unusual formality, but he must conform to the statute. (Waples on Attachment and Garnishment, p. 193).

The Legislature is judge of this; it having prescribed the kind of service, none other will avail. Peckham, Warren, 8 Peck, p. 164. After hearing argument, and viewing the authorities cited by counsel, together with others, I am of opinion that there was no legal service on Wiseman, and Wiseman is discharged as garnishee without further answer.

In Equity, before Chief Justice Judd. G. W. Willifong vs. John H. Paty and Samuel Farker. This is a bill in equity to recover certain shares of stock held by defendant as a pledge and for an account, etc. His Honor the Chief Justice filed his decision in the above suit Saturday.
