WEST MAUI NOTES.

A Severe Earthquake Shock—Visit of the Episcopal Bishop—Kauai Notes.

Rather a severe earthquake shock was felt at various points on the island at about 10:35 a. m. Friday, April 22d. In severe earthquakes the almost invariable succession of phenomena is first a trembling, then a severe shock, or a succession of shocks, and then again a trembling, gradually becoming insensible.

The phenomena connected with earthquakes as variously described by many different writers, such as appearances in the heavens, or changes in the atmosphere which to them seem to have some connection with the catastrophes they narrate, including irregularities in the seasons, sudden gusts of wind interrupted by sudden calms, violent rains at unusual seasons, a reddening of the sun's disc, and similar phenomena, were conspicuous by their absence in this case.

In this instance the true undulation of the solid crust of the earth or earth-wave, passed over an immense area and had a very great velocity, as it was felt almost instantaneously at Wahee, Hana, Ulupalakua and Lahaina, as well as at Wailuku, Kaunoi, Spreckelsville and elsewhere.

After rather an unusual and somewhat continued activity amongst Maui society people, a season of rest has come upon us. A few afternoon teas and one or two camping out parties are about all there is to chronicle.

Mrs. F. L. Stolz and party of friends have gone up Haleakala, to their snug little nest at Olinda, for an outing, with every prospect for a delightful and enjoyable time, as the weather is superb.

SUPREME COURT.

A Suit for \$1500 Damages Agat at the Port Surveyor.

In the Supreme Court to-day before Judge Bickerton and a mixed jury being heard the case of Chun Ming against C. L. Crabbe, Port Surveyor, a suit for \$1500 damages. Plaintiff alleges that Crabbe entered his private apartments unlawfully, while in search of opium. **PROGRAMME**

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12, 1892.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.  
 One of the striking and very attractive features of the dedication ceremonies and display next October will be the "Procession of Centuries," or parade of symbolical floats through the lagoons and water ways of the exposition grounds. These floats are to be gorgeous affairs. The contract for the construction of twenty-four of them has been let at an approximate cost of \$3800 each.

According to an English mining journal, contributions are generously being made for the "typical collection of British economic minerals," which will form part of the English exhibit, and be presented to an American museum after the Exposition closes.

The directors of the Texas World's Fair Association met to-day and accepted Galveston's offer to construct for Texas a \$100,000 building on the World's Fair ground at Chicago, provided the Texas exhibits are concentrated at Galveston before being shipped to the World's Fair. For this purpose Galveston has also raised an additional \$50,000, and the contract for the construction of both buildings was let to W. J. Hobson of Waco, who is now on his way to Chicago to inspect the plans and the site for the Texas building.

**SUGAR MATTERS.**  
 A beet sugar company with a capital of \$500,000 has been organized at Phoenix, Arizona.

Up to March 25th, 2500 acres had been planted in beets at Chino.

Rumors are in circulation at New York as to the possibility of organizing a big sugar refining company to compete with the sugar trust, which now practically controls the business of sugar refining in the United States. It is said that the backers of the movement are the wholesale grocers of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, St. Paul and other large cities, and that Erastus Wiman is ready to invest \$1,000,000 in the new company.

**THE SUGAR TRUST.**  
 It is interesting to note the change that a brief period has brought about in the relative position of the markets for raw and refined sugars. With the outlet for raw sugars in the control of a single buyer, the price has been forced down from 3 7-16 cents to 3 1/2 cents per pound, while the price of granulated has risen from 4 cents to 4 1/2 cents, less 2 per cent. There is a difference of opinion among trade authorities as to the cost of refining sugar; but 1/2 of a cent per pound margin over the price of centrifugal 96 test is generally conceded as covering the expense and yielding a reasonable profit to refiners. It is doubtful, indeed, if the cost is as much as that; but assuming this estimate to be approximately correct, it will be seen that already, under the beneficent workings of the newly entrenched "combine," the profits of sugar refining have been increased a little over 1/2 of a cent per pound. This is exactly the advantage conferred upon the Sugar Trust by the present tariff rate on refined sugars. The "laid down" cost in this country of German refined sugars is very close to the present market price of American granulated; but the latter is more desirable, and is usually valued by distributors at 1/4 of a cent above the price of the imported sugar. The Sugar Trust is, therefore, protected by the 1/2 cent tariff rate, by 1/4 of a cent preference price, and by as much in excess of this 3/4 of a cent per pound as its ability to "rig" the market against importers may secure to the monopoly.

There is no longer any possible excuse for the maintenance of a duty upon refined sugars. There is no productive industry to "protect" except that of a monopoly engaged in the nefarious business of fleecing American consumers under cover of the tariff. A prompt repeal of the duty on refined sugars would clip the wings of monopoly and give domestic consumers a chance to protect themselves against unreasonable exactions in the price of an article of necessity in every household.

From the most accurate data obtainable, says a New York journal, it is learned that since the first intimations were made that a bill looking to a repeal of the tariff on refined sugar would be taken before Congress the stock of the American Sugar Refining Company has experienced a shrinkage of nearly \$9,000,000.

Consular reports for the first quarter of 1892 show a decrease in trade compared with the same period in 1891. It is alleged that it is due to the reciprocity treaties with the United States, which are affecting the German sugar trade to the West Indies and South America.

From Berlin the decrease is 8,000,000 marks and from Hamburg, 5,000,000 marks in sugar exports alone. About 1,000,000 marks of the Berlin decrease is in the cheapest kind of fancy goods, which hitherto have been sent to the Southern States.
