A number of Micronesian citizens who have been stranded in Hawaii as the result of the ~~Department's~~ suspension of a travel agreement between the Department of the Interior and the Air Force should be able to return to their homes soon, according to Sen. dki.

A Department of the Interior spokesman advised the Senator that the Military Airlift Command is expected to supply transportation to the stranded Micronesians within a few days.

The Military Airlift Command will be reimbursed for the cost of the transportation by the office of the High Commissioner of the Trust Territory, the Interior spokesman said.

The spokesman said flights were suspended after a woman who claimed to be a Marshallese queen showed up at Hickam Air Force Base with an entourage of 21 persons and demanded transportation home. Part of the group ~~was actually~~ were actually in the air and en route to Kwajalein before the Air Force learned the transportation was not authorized by the High Commissioner's office.

Flights will now be limited to those who are specifically authorized by the High Commissioner's office, including Trust Territory officials and employees, and Trust Territory students officially sponsored by the Trust Territory.

Description of Project:

Hapuna Beach State Park Development will involve the partial development of 46-acres of 250-acre State owned parcel of beach property on the northwest shore of the island of Hawaii. Improvements will include: extensive landscaping, an irrigation and domestic water system, restrooms and bathhouses, picnic and camping spaces. This project will help fulfill the deficiencies for shoreline recreation facilities identified in the Preliminary Outdoor Recreation Plan for Hawaii.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund provides funds to acquire Federal recreation lands and waters, and for matching grants to States and through States to local governments for outdoor recreation acquisition and/or development projects. Grant assistance is also provided to the States for the preparation and maintenance of the comprehensive statewide outdoor recreation plan. The fund is supported by revenues from the sale of the annual \$7 Golden Eagle Permit, other Federal outdoor recreation entrance and user fees, the sale of Federal surplus real property, and the Federal motorboat fuels tax.

Dear Senator Inouye:

In keeping with the growing importance of forestry activities in your State, the Department of Agriculture is changing the name of the research and cooperative forestry program in Hawaii to the "Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry." We consider this title distinctive and indicative of the wide variety of forestry research and cooperative programs conducted in Hawaii.

This proposed change of name was brought to my attention by Representatives Matsunaga and Mink. In July, Dr. Jemison, Deputy Chief for Research in the Forest Service, was in Hawaii reviewing the research program and organization. The proposal was discussed with Governor Burns, Mr. Richard A. Cooke of the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce, and a number of other people in Hawaii who have been interested in developing an Institute of Forestry for the Pacific Islands.

For your convenience, I am enclosing an advance news release. A copy of this news release is being made available also to the other Congressional delegates and to Governor Burns.

Hawaii Research Center Gets New Name

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service Research Center in the State of Hawaii has a new name to reflect its growing influence in forestry research in the Pacific Island area.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today the center in Honolulu has been designated the Institute of Pacific Island Forestry.

He noted that the Institute's location at the crossroads of the Pacific establishes it as an effective source of information about tropical and subtropical forestry for the Pacific Island area. For forestry specialists, he said, the Institute also serves as a link with forestry and forest research activities in the continental United States. The Institute will be affiliated with the Forest Service's Pacific Southwest Forest Experiment Station in Berkeley, California.

Secretary Freeman credited the interest Hawaiians have shown in development of forest resources for the impetus given to the Forest Service research program over the years.

The research center was established in Honolulu in 1957, at the suggestion of the State. In the same year, Robert E. Nelson, a research forester, was assigned to Honolulu.

Since then, research work has progressed rapidly under his direction. The unit now has nine scientists, including specialists in watershed, timber, and forest products research. It is developing information designed to determine how best to manage forest lands for timber, water, wildlife and outdoor recreation. It is also seeking ways to develop new industries

based on forest resources. In addition, the Forest Service is collaborating with the Hawaii Division of Forestry in an inventory of the State's timber resources.

Answers to such questions as the following are being sought in the research studies:

What is the best use of a particular area of forest land?

What type of vegetation is best for specific watersheds?

Can koa trees be regenerated to assure a continuing supply of this valuable wood?

What is the potential for utilization of available local timber species?

What exotic tree species, useful for timber, watershed protection,, wildlife, and recreation, are suited to Island environment?

What are the consequences--in terms of water yield, flooding or erosion--of conversion of forests to other uses?

Senator Daniel K. Inouye today announced the approval of two local development company loans by the Small Business Administration.

The SBA approved a \$90,000 loan to Kona Local Development Corporation, Kealahou-Kona, Hawaii, to assist the Jupiter Cleaners & Laundry, Ltd., who are engaged in dry cleaning and laundering. This loan will be used to construct a building and purchase machinery and equipment as well as provide employment for seven persons.

James E. Mitchell is president of Kona Local Development Corporation and the president of Jupiter Cleaners & Laundry, Ltd. is Arthur Schilling.

Two U. S. Public Health Service experts, a scientist and a veterinarian, have been sent to Hawaii to investigate reports of a rabies outbreak, according to Senator Daniel K. Inouye.

The two men are Dr. Robert E. Kissling, Deputy Chief, Biology Section, Laboratory Programs, National Communicable Disease Center, Atlanta, Georgia, and Mr. Robert Huffaker, Assistant Chief, Veterinary Public Health Section, Washington, D. C.

A spokesman told Senator Inouye that Public Health Service officials were intrigued by reports of rabid rats in Hawaii "because rats don't usually get infected except under laboratory conditions."

Senator Inouye said he is awaiting the findings of the Public Health Service team.

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors today concurred in a report recommending the improvement of three shallow draft harbors in Hawaii at an estimated cost of \$2,267,000, according to Senator Daniel K. Inouye.

The three state-operated harbors are Kikiaola, Kauai; Ala Wai, Oahu; and Maalaea, Maui. Construction costs estimates are: Kikiaola, \$463,000; Ala Wai, \$1,090,000; and Maalaea, \$714,000.

Local cash contributions would average 44.6 per cent of the total cost of the projects.

Senator Inouye said the favorable report on the three harbors will go to the Chief of Engineers for further evaluation.

RIVERS AND HARBORS BOARD
RECOMMENDS SHALLOW DRAFT HARBORS IN HAWAII

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors today concurred in the report which recommends the improvement of three shallow-draft harbors in Hawaii and returned the report for flood control on Bassett Creek, at Minneapolis, Minnesota, to the District Engineer at St. Paul for further study. Three State operated harbors on the Islands of Oahu, Maui, and Kauai would be improved at an estimated cost of \$2,267,000.

The favorable report on the harbors in Hawaii will go to the Chief of Engineers for further evaluation and for submission to the States and the other Federal agencies concerned. Thereafter, it will go to the Secretary of the Army, the Bureau of the Budget, and the Congress.

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors is an independent agency which was established to scrutinize the water resources development project proposals of the Corps of Engineers. The Chairman of the Board is Major General Robert G. MacDonnell, President of the Mississippi River Commission, Vicksburg, Mississippi. Other Board members are: Major General Frederick J. Clarke, Deputy Chief of Engineers, Washington, D. C.; Brigadier General William T. Bradley, Southwestern Division Engineer, Dallas, Texas; Brigadier General Francis P. Koisch, North Atlantic Division Engineer, New York, New York; Brigadier General Willard Roper, Ohio River Division Engineer, Cincinnati, Ohio; Brigadier General John A. B. Dillard, South Pacific Division Engineer, San Francisco, California; and the Board's Resident Member, Colonel Alvin D. Wilder, Washington, D. C.

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Improvement of Small-Craft Harbors in Hawaiian Islands: The Board

unanimously recommended the improvement of three existing State-operated light-draft harbors in the Hawaiian Islands as part of a system of small-boat harbors to accommodate the growing light-draft recreational fleet and to meet the boating needs for interisland cruising.

The three existing harbors which would be improved at an estimated cost of \$2,267,000 are: Kikiaola, Kauai; Ala Wai, Oahu; and Maalaea, Maui. The proposed work generally includes deepening and widening the approach channels and harbors, and the modification and extension of existing breakwaters. Non-Federal interests would be required to contribute towards the first cost of the works and provide public launching and docking facilities for transient small watercraft.

The Board noted that these three harbors in addition to those previously authorized together with the light-draft vessel harbors operated by the State and private interests will satisfy nine-tenths of the State's boat-space requirements for the year 1980 and about three-fourths of the need for the year 2020.

COASTS OF THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS,
HARBORS FOR LIGHT-DRAFT VESSELS

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors has considered the report of the District Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer District, Honolulu, Hawaii, and the Division Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer Division, Pacific Ocean, Honolulu, Hawaii, for improvement of Coasts of the Hawaiian Islands, light-draft vessel navigation facilities.

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors concurs in general in the views and recommendations of the reporting officers. The Board notes that the need for small-boat navigation improvements has been approached on a statewide basis with a view to developing an adequate harbor system for the major islands. The improvements recommended by the reporting officers, in addition to those harbor improvements previously authorized, together with State and private harbor facilities, will satisfy about 90 percent of the State's boat-space requirements for the year 1980, and 78 percent of the need for the year 2020. The Board notes further that improvements would be economically justified at Waimanalo and Punaluu (or Kahana Bay as an alternate site for Punaluu) on the island of Oahu; however, in view

of opposition by local residents the State has not offered to cooperate in these improvements at this time. It further notes that harbors for refuge only are not economically justified at the present time. The Board considers that the harbor improvements recommended by the reporting officers are economically justified and the requirements of local cooperation are appropriate.

Accordingly, the Board recommends improvement of harbors for light-draft vessels at Kikiaola, Kauai; Ala Wai, Oahu; and Maalaea, Maui; generally in accordance with the plans of the District Engineer and with such modifications thereof as in the discretion of the Chief of Engineers may be advisable, at a first cost estimated at \$2,267,000 for construction and \$13,700 annually for maintenance: Provided that prior to construction of each project local interests agree to:

a. Contribute in cash a part of the first cost of construction of the general navigation facilities to be paid in a lump sum prior to initiation of construction, subject to final adjustment after actual costs have been determined, as follows:

b. Provide without cost to the United States all lands, easements, and rights-of-way required for construction and subsequent maintenance of the projects and for aids to navigation upon the request of the Chief of Engineers, including suitable areas determined by the Chief of Engineers to be required in the general public interest for the initial and subsequent disposal of spoil, and also provide necessary retaining dikes, bulkheads, and embankments therefor or the costs of such retaining works;

c. Provide and maintain without cost to the United States necessary berthing or mooring facilities and attendant utilities, including a public landing with suitable supply facilities open to all on equal terms;

d. Maintain without cost to the United States adequate depths in Ala Wai Harbor entrance channel;

e. Provide and maintain without cost to the United States depths in the berthing and mooring areas, and in the local access channels, commensurate with the depths provided in the related project areas;

f. Provide and maintain without cost to the United States all appropriate onshore structures, access roads, parking areas, public rest rooms, and boat launching ramps as necessary to insure a complete and adequate project;

g. Accomplish without cost to the United States such utility, drainage, or other relocations or alterations as necessary for project purposes; and

h. Establish regulations prohibiting discharge of untreated sewage, garbage, and other pollutants in the waters of the harbors by users thereof, which regulations shall be in accordance with applicable laws or regulations of Federal, State, and local authorities responsible for pollution prevention and control.

Provided further that construction of any of the individual projects recommended for authorization may be undertaken independently of the others whenever the necessary funds therefor become available and when local interests have agreed to furnish the required local cooperation.

but that construction of any of the individual projects will not be construed as a commitment on the part of the Federal Government nor the responsible non-Federal interests for construction of the remaining projects .

The net first costs and annual maintenance costs to the United States , exclusive of aids to navigation and after payment by local interests of the amounts indicated above , are now estimated as follows:

The Board report is being processed to the Chief of Engineers , who in turn will transmit his proposed report , together with the reports of the Board and the reporting officers , to the Governor of the affected State and to interested Federal agencies for their views and comments . These comments will accompany the complete report to Congress with the recommendations of the Chief of Engineers .

After the report has been transmitted to Congress , further action toward construction of any project that may be recommended therein will depend upon authorization of the project by Congress and the subsequent appropriation of the necessary funds for the work proposed .

Preliminary reports from U. S. Public Health officials in Hawaii indicate that some of the reported rabies cases on Oahu are the result of a laboratory misdiagnosis, Senator Daniel K. Inouye said today.

Senator Inouye said he was advised by a Public Health Service official in Washington that all of the laboratory procedures required to produce a positive confirmation of rabies infection were not followed in some cases.

Of all the tissues examined by the Public Health Service team in Hawaii up to the end of the working day on Thursday, October 12th, none were confirmed as being positive for rabies, Senator Inouye said.

A very strong recommendation has been given to the laboratories in Hawaii that they follow through on all accepted procedures before they make their final diagnosis, Senator Inouye said.

"I do not claim that there are no rabies cases in Hawaii," Senator Inouye continued, "but it is becoming apparent that we had better take a second look at the evidence reported to date."

The Senator said he expects a full field report from the Public Health Service early next week.

This project as approved will cost a total of \$33,601 ; the Federal Government will provide \$ 32,491 of these funds. \$ 22,498 represents training allowances to be paid to trainees and \$ 11,103 represents total training costs. Training will be conducted at Kauluwela High School, Honolulu

The Manpower Development and Training Act became law on March 15, 1962. Identification of occupations where workers are in short supply and selection of persons qualified for training to fill these positions are the responsibility of the Department of Labor. Classroom training of persons for particular skills is the responsibility of the Department of HEW. After successful completion of the course, placement of trainees into jobs for which they are qualified is made through the Employment Service.

Special investigations have been conducted from time to time at the major ports, but not throughout the islands. The inspectors are consulting with local federal agencies, port authorities, pilots, and other marine interests.

The findings for the Hawaiian Islands will be included in a new edition of the publication United States Coast Pilot 7, together with similar information now being gathered in California, Oregon and Washington.

The Coast Pilots are a series of nautical books issued by the Coast and Geodetic Survey, an agency of the Environmental Science Services Administration in the U. S. Department of Commerce. They supply information important to navigators of U. S. coastal and intracoastal waters. Generally, the books furnish in narrative form information which can not be shown graphically on marine charts, such as navigation regulations, weather, ice, freshets, routes, and port facilities.

A new edition of each Coast Pilot is published at intervals of four to ten years. The new edition of United States Coast Pilot 7 is scheduled for issuance in September 1968. Cumulative supplements, containing changes reported

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after publication, are published early each year. The information they contain is considered vital for safe navigation and Coast Pilots are consulted regularly by skippers of naval and commercial craft and small boat operators.

The first Coast Pilot of Hawaii was published in 1912. Revised editions were printed in 1919, 1923, 1933 and 1950. In 1959, information for Hawaii was consolidated with navigation information for California, Oregon and Washington to make up United States Coast Pilot 7. The 1968 edition will be the third book published in the consolidated series.

No confirmed evidence of rabies has been found in animal tissue samples from Hawaii subjected to rapid diagnostic procedures at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Senator Daniel K. Inouye was advised today by Colonel Ralph Singer, Assistant Chief of Preventive Medicine.

All tests were negative, according to Colonel Singer. Animal inoculation procedures are being followed and if rabies is present the results will show within two weeks, Senator Inouye was advised.

A total of 30 days must elapse, however, before definite assurance can be given that rabies is not present, the Senator said.

This award is made under the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (Public Law 87-256), known as the Fulbright-Hays Act. The stated purpose of the Act is to enable the U.S. Government "to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries by means of educational and cultural exchange; to strengthen the ties which unite us with other nations...and thus to assist in the development of friendly, sympathetic, and peaceful relations between the United States and the other countries of the world."

Under the Act, direct grants are made annually to about 2,500 U.S. citizens to go abroad and about 6,000 foreign nationals to come here. A total of 106,000 - some 30,000 Americans and 76,000 foreign citizens representing 130 countries and territories - have received grants since the passage of the original Fulbright Act in 1946.

Grants are made for university lecturing, advanced research, graduate study, teaching in elementary and secondary schools, practical experience in technical and specialized fields, and consultation and observation. Final selection of grantees is made by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, whose 12 members are appointed by the President. In the process of screening, assigning, and supervising grantees, the Department of State is assisted by a number of public agencies and private, nonprofit organizations. Among these are the U.S. Office of Education, the Institute of International Education, and the Conference Board of Associated Research Councils.

Overseas the exchange program is administered in about 50 countries by binational commissions set up under executive agreements. Cultural Affairs Officers of the U.S. Information Agency assist the commissions. In some 80 other countries and territories Cultural Affairs Officers conduct the program on behalf of American embassies.

The State Department's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs administers the over-all program. Its diverse responsibilities include sending out scientists, writers, doctors, athletic coaches, and other American "specialists"; bringing foreign leaders to the United States; arranging overseas tours by performing artists, music and drama groups, and athletes; assisting American-sponsored schools abroad, and participating in UNESCO and other multilateral organizations.

Inouye will cosponsor a resolution which expresses the sense of the Senate that President Johnson consider a United States initiative which would seek to place the question of Vietnam before the United Nations Security Council.
