NEW DISTRICTS TO BE FORMED BY NAT'L GOVT.

ENTIRE NATION WILL BE DIVIDED INTO NEW DIVISIONS

TOKYO, May 1—It is understood that the Home Minister is whereby Japan will be divided into considering carrying out a plan seven or eight economic administrative blocs to intensify economic control.

Presently there have been complaints that the prefectural government's economic control is too small a scale; also, entirely non-cognizant with each district's economic conditions.

It was said that the new administrative blocs would not replace the prefectural administration but instead collaborate with it.

SHANGHAI RIOT TRIAL BEFORE NAGASAKI BAR

HAYASHI MAY GET STIFF SENTENCE ON CONVICTION

NAGASAKI, May 1—The public trial of Yukichi Hayashi, 72, former chairman of Japanese Rate-payers Association and central figure in the track shooting at Shanghai on January 23rd, started at the Nagasaki District Court at 10:10 A. M. yesterday with Prosecutor Makoto Moriyama demanding a two-year jail term.

It was recalled that Hayashi shot W. J. Keswick, Chairman of the Shanghai Municipal Council governing body in the Shanghai International Settlement, Issaku Okamoto, Japanese member of the Municipal Council, and Kazuo Ikeda, assistant secretary of the Shanghai Municipal Council, as the culmination of a bitter debate over the proposed enforcement of a 40 percent increase in municipal rates to meet the deficit in the council's budget.

The incident occurred at an extraordinary meeting of rate-payers held at the Shanghai racecourse.

MAY 1 NAMED CHILD HEALTH DAY BY PRES.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the Congress by joint resolution of May 18, 1928 (45 Stat. 617), has authorized and requested the President of the United States to issue annually a proclamation setting apart May 1 as Child Health Day:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, in recognition of the vital importance of the health and strength of the children of the Nation, do hereby designate the first day of May of this year as Child Health Day.

And I call upon the people of each community of the United States on that day to review the extent to which they are providing for children nutritious food, healthful recreation, effective health supervision, and adequate medical care, and to plan how much protection can be extended to all our children.

I also call upon children to take full advantage of their opportunity to grow in health and strength and to share in protecting the health of other boys and girls.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this 7th day of April in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred

CITY FEUD TO END THROUGH NEGOTIATIONS

YOKOHAMA - TOKYO SPLIT OVER WITH GOVT. MEDIATES

TOKYO, May 1—Yokohama ended its half-year campaign opposing the opening of Tokyo port, as the government agreed to take over part of its foreign bonds, which has been the source of the municipality's financial difficulties.

The federation opposing the opening of Tokyo port had been organized in Yokohama six months ago because it was claimed that the opening of the Tokyo port would spell the doom of the port city's business.

The recent realization of the importance of Tokyo port, however, has caused the abandonment of the opposition. An agreement was reached after a series of conferences between Mayor Kiyoshi Nakarai of Yokohama, President Chuichi Ariyoshi of the Yokohama Chamber of Commerce, Finance Minister Isao Kawada and Communications Minister Shozo Murata.

Importance of Nazi Move is Minimized

NEW YORK, April 30 — Nazi circles in Moscow minimized reports of the German troop movements in Finland which appeared in the Communist party organ, Pravda, Associated Press dispatch from Moscow reported.

It was said that the troops probably arrived in Finland under Finnish-German agreement permitting the transfer of Nazi troops to Norway through Finland.

Observers, however, attached significant fact that this is the first time that Moscow press mentioned such Nazi troop movements.

OLD ZINC MINE WILL BEGIN TO OPERATE AGAIN

ABANDONED MINE FOUND TO CONTAIN RICH ZINC ORE

FUKUOKA, April 30—The reopening of the zinc mine in Atsushima Island, which is said to contain a large amount of ore with zinc content of forty to sixty percent, was announced by the Japan Zinc Corporation.

The mine was worked on during the first World War by the Germans on large scale and ore from the island was exported to Germany, but due to economic depression following the end of the war, the mine was abandoned till a recent survey disclosed that rich zinc ore still remained.

With a capital of five million yen, the Japan Zinc Corporation will begin mining immediately as well as installing facilities designed to increase production.

The case was presented to the court by County Attorney Martin Pence and presided by Judge A. M. Cristy of Honolulu. Harry Irwin represented the defendant.

PIER 15 FEUD REMAINS IN A TIGHT DEADLOCK AS HAWAII LEGISLATURE ENDS SESSION

Bad Last-Minute Jam In House Costs The County of Hawaii Over Half Million In Appropriations

HONOLULU, May 1 (Special To The Hawaii Mainichi)—After one of the most hectic sessions in the history of Hawaiian legislature, the territorial legislature officially adjourned at 5:30 A. M. this morning, the House ending its session sine die at that time. The Senate, on the other hand, had finished its program by 3:25 A. M. and adjourned sine die at that time this morning, after waiting upon the House from about 1 A. M. this morning endeavoring to close both chambers of the territory's lawmaking body simultaneously if possible.

SENATE WAITS FOR HOUSE

Immediately after midnight, last night, it was found that the House was hopelessly deadlocked on the Pier 15 measure, the 15-15 tie still holding firm, with those opposed to the so-called Dillingham interests bringing every pressure possible upon members of the Big Island to swing over in order to save some half a million dollars in appropriations to the County of Hawaii. Neither side indicated its desire to yield on the pier measure and as a result, a little over two hours after the Senate had adjourned, Speaker Arthur A. Akina rapped his gavel bringing the House of Representatives to a close at 5:30 A. M. this morning.

APPROPRIATIONS LOST

The Pier 15 deadlock cost the County of Hawaii some \$500,000 or more in appropriations, it was learned from a rough check, the main items being \$65,000 out of the gas tax set-up; \$75,000 from personal property and \$325,000 in federal match money. In the deadlock was involved some \$110,000 reduction in the personal property levy, bringing the total in excess of half a million dollars difference to the County of Hawaii.

It was also learned that the Classification Bill, Senator V. A. Carvalho's S.B.-317, as applying to Hawaii was defeated in conference, as well as the "war bill" sponsored by the administration. The controversial Wage-Hour legislation also failed enactment.

HULL IS NON-COMMITTAL ON JAPANESE PEACE PLANS-U.S. TO STAND ON PAST POLICIES

U. S. SECRETARY OF STATE REFUSES TO MAKE ANY COMMENT ON PROPOSED VISIT OF YOSUKE MATSUOKA

WASHINGTON, April 30—Secretary of State Cordell Hull indicated at the press conference that the United States government has not been officially advised of any Japanese "peace plan" along the lines published in the Japan Times and Advertiser and declined to comment beyond that, inferring that the United States stands firm on the past principles of the policy.

Asked to comment upon the Japan Times' proposals, Hull said that he has not yet given them more than an appreciable (partial) examination but advised the newsmen that they might find that the experts' opinions are much more useful. Hull added that all he needs to say under the circumstances was that in any event the principles underlying all basic relationships between the nations have been thoroughly kept alive by the United States government; noted principles were once practices by all nations as well.

Hull refused to comment to the press on Japan press reports urging Matsuoka to visit the United States but merely referred to the remarks made yesterday. Likewise, he declined to say anything regarding the reports of the United States Marines' evacuation from North China shortly.

BRITAIN PLANS USING SHIPS TIED UP IN SOUTH AMERICA

WASHINGTON, April 30— Britain is about to reach agreement with twenty-one American republics regarding the use of 160 foreign vessels now tied up in the western hemisphere ports, it was reliably learned.

It was further understood that Britain agreed to recognize American nation's right to seize foreign vessels immobilized by war and use them "to promote peace and security in the western hemisphere." However, on the other hand twenty-one American republics promised to sell or charter to Britain any surplus ships as a result of seizure.

Meanwhile, informed sources revealed that Lord Halifax, ambassador to Washington, last night held a lengthy conference with Sumner Welles, Under-Secretary of State and also Chairman of the Inter-American financial economic advisory committee, for the purpose of discussing the question of foreign vessels in the western hemisphere.

EDITORIAL

"CHINA AS A DEMOCRACY"

"Washington, as we understand it, regards China as second only in importance to Great Britain among the nations we must help to defend democracy against Hitler. We hear more and more to the effect that you have to strain your eyes pretty squintily to tell the Chinese dragon from the democratic donkey, or jackass.

"Just how much of a democracy is China;

"Well, we never heard of any election being held where by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek became head of the present Chinese Government that is fighting Japan. As we recollect, Chiang was an old lieutenant of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, then was active in China's Kuomintang (Nationalist) party, and somehow came out on top after sundry squabbles among politicians of that and other Chinese parties.

"None of these parties was or is a political party in the sense that our Republican and Democratic parties are. They are cliques, lodges, or more or less secret societies, as we see them—faintly comparable to our big city machines, but not to our national political organizations.

"This is because the Chinese are what they have been for centuries—100 per cent individualists. In so far as democracy is based on individualism, the Chinese are individualists, plus.

"They consider that they owe allegiance, not to their country, province, city or farm district, but solely to their own families. The 'good earth' they consider theirs to exploit, denude and drain, without obligation to conserve for the public welfare or posterity. Hence China's huge areas long since stripped of trees; and hence its tremendous erosion districts, many of its appalling floods, and much of the poverty of its 450,000,000 people.

"If the Chinese are democrats, then so were the financial and industrial pirates who took everything that wasn't nailed down in the United States after the Civil War. We finally had to put assorted social-control brakes on those gentry, or they would have wound up by owning us all.

"Too, the Chinese practice ancestor worship, one of the

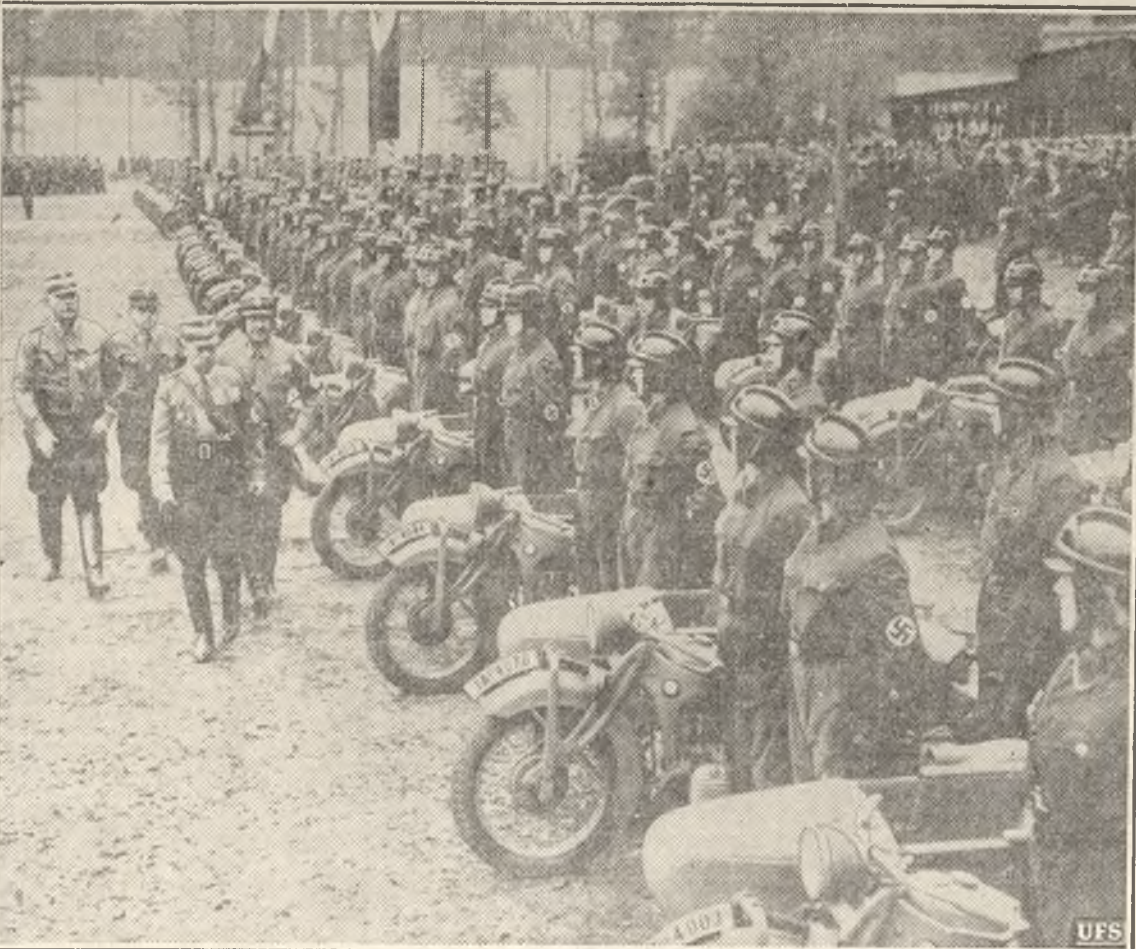

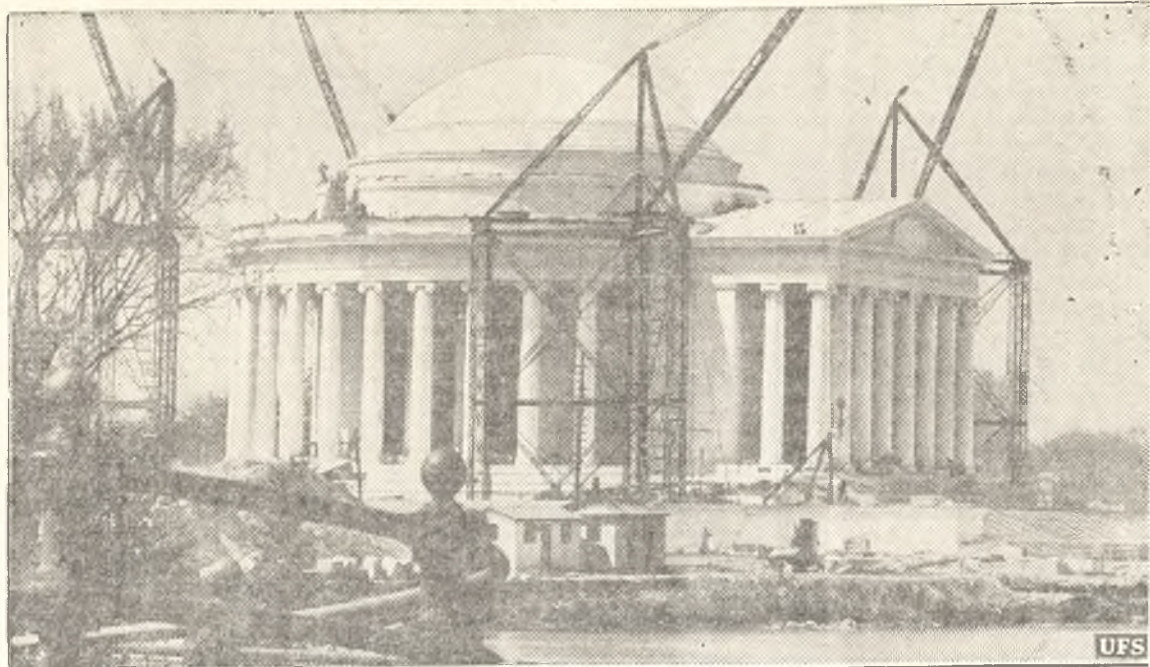

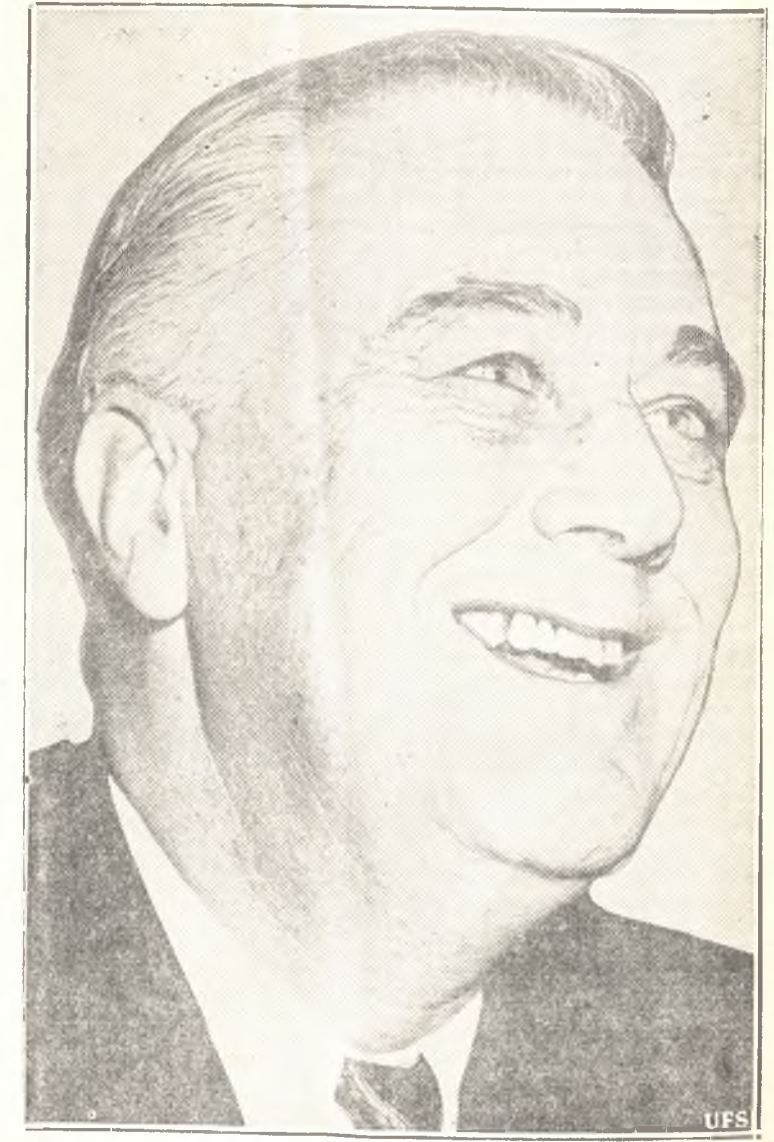

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII NEWS

Milk production has been maintained remarkably well by the feeding of strip-cane roughage to dairy cows, reports L. A. Henke, animal husbandman with the University of Hawaii agricultural experiment station.

"Our results to date indicate that our cattle consume only half as much of the strip cane as they do of the green Napier grass, but milk production has not declined," Mr. Henke says.

If continued experiments demonstrate that strip cane is a satisfactory substitute for Napier grass or other roughage now being fed to livestock, the operations of many dairies will be modified inasmuch as considerable man power is necessary in the growing and harvesting of green feed required each day, the experiment station researcher points out.

"Because of the lack of rain during the past winter with resulting lower yields of grasses used as soiling crops, several dairies around Honolulu are now using strip cane to supplement their supplies of roughages for their dairy cows," Mr. Henke says. "In no case, however, are these dairies relying solely on strip cane, but are alternating the feeding of cane and green forage."

In the trial experiment at the University, the cows are definitely limited to strip cane for a period of time after which they are again fed Napier grass.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations to fill the positions listed below. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than the closing date given in each case.

Senior Architect, \$4,600 a year; Architect, \$3,800 a year; Associate Architect, \$3,200 a year; Assistant Architect, \$2,600 a year; Junior Architect, \$2,000 a year; Optional branches: Design, Specifications, Estimating. The duties of the positions are based upon these divisions of work. To qualify as junior architect, applicants must have completed a 4-year architectural course in either architecture or architectural engineering. For other positions, completion of a 4-year college course in architecture or engineering as well as appropriate professional architectural experience in the optional subject is required. 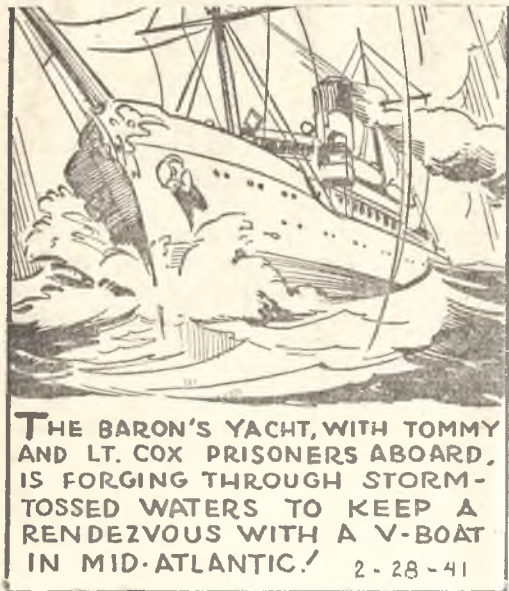

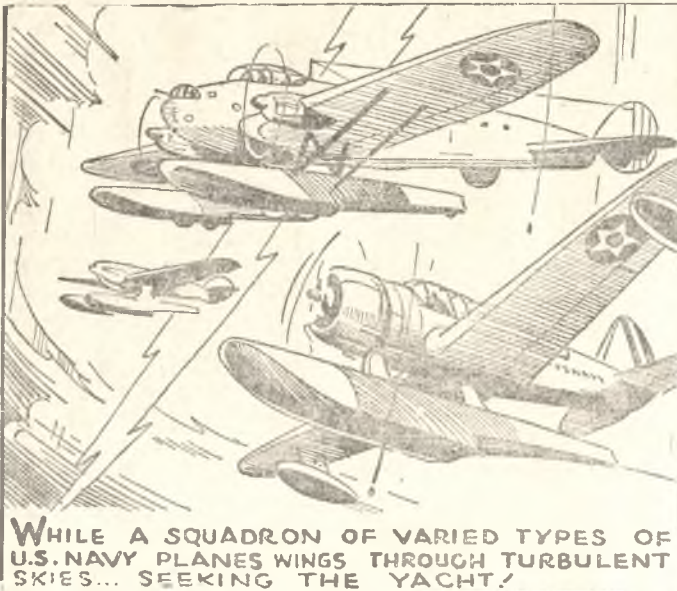

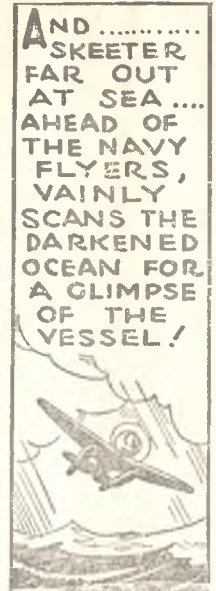

most poisonous and paralyzing vices anybody can indulge in. Super-devotion to the dead worthy and the back number necessarily prevents progress.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen in 1911 began his efforts to blast his people out of these ancient ways, and Mme. Chiang Kai-shek is carrying on those efforts. But they have still a long, long, way to go, as experienced by the fact that this nation of 450,000,000 wasn't able to rise up and slap back to its island home almost overnight the Japanese nation of 70,000,000.

"The Chinese, since 1911, have been 'governed,' meaning exploited and ground underfoot, by a multitude of war lords, meaning gangsters.

"When the Japanese took over Manchoukuo against the protests of our then Secretary of State (now of War) Henry L. Stimson, they restored some law and order there. In the next couple of years, between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 Chinese moved into Manchoukuo from 'democratic' North China, so as to be able to farm in peace while paying tribute only to the Japanese in the form of taxes.

"All in all, China does not look every democratic to us.

"It may be, though, that the Chiang Kai-sheks, the British and ourselves can eventually needle the Chinese people into organizing a united and heavily armed nation, kicking the Japanese out of China, and building a strong, semi-democratic military power on that foundation.

"If that comes to pass, what will be its net effect on the Western world; As we see it, the net effect will be a much more perilous Yellow Peri than the Japanese ever were.

"A strong, united, heavily armed continental power of 450,000,000 people is necessarily four or five times as dangerous to its enemies or its potential enemies as an island power of 70,000,000, no matter how strong, heavily armed and united that island power may be. And what guaranty have we that the Chinese, if they ever do organize, will be content to have licked Japan and won't ream of going other places with their shiny new military machine;

"This war at least promises to be interesting, both during and after."
