This Morning's Session—102 McBryde 2 1/2-10.

NARROW ESCAPE AT SEA

As the little schooner *Blanche* and *Ella*, Captain Nilson in command, was making her way to this port from Hanalei about 9 o'clock Saturday night, the lookout suddenly made out the dim outlines of a bark bound to sea bearing directly down upon them amidstships. It was very dark at the time and the unknown vessel was carrying no lights.

The schooner had her port and starboard lights burning brightly forward and also carried a white light in her rigging. The lookout sang out to Captain Nilson who was at the wheel as soon as she sighted the bark, doing so just in time for the captain to bring his vessel up in the wind.

The shouting of the lookout was evidently heard aboard the stranger for she put her helm hard to port and passed swiftly to the stern of the little schooner, grazing her stern rail and causing her to tremble from end to end.

After the bark had passed she started her lights forward and disappeared in the darkness without speaking the schooner or waiting to put about to see if the latter had received any damage. The name of the bark could not be ascertained on board the *Ella*.

Captain Nilson in partnership with Captain Dudoit recently purchased the *Blanche* and *Ella*. Captain Nilson formerly commanding the schooner *Ada* for Harry Evans with whom he was connected for over two years.

Football Matters.

NEW SET OF QUESTIONS

Propounded to R. P. Rithet Head of Welch & Co.

Attorneys for Plaintiffs Want to Know the Why and Wherefore in the Big \$100,000 Waialua Deal.

In re: the bill for specific performance in *J. A. McCandless vs. the Waialua Agricultural Co., Ltd.*, et al, 205 interrogatories to be propounded to R. P. Rithet, head of Welch & Co. of San Francisco, on behalf of the plaintiff have been filed in the Circuit Court by Kinney, Ballou and McClanahan. The questions that follow are simply a brief resume of what the typewritten sheets contain, it being impossible to print the substance of the whole:

When did you personally, or the corporation of Welch & Co. first have knowledge that said Welch & Co. was a stockholder and did this company become such through a transfer to it of shares in existence at the time or through a subscription made by it on the original subscription list of the Waialua Agricultural Co., Ltd. Does the corporate name of "Welch & Co. by J. B. Atherton" appear on the original list of the Waialua Co. as an original subscriber for 1000 shares of assessable stock of the corporation of the for value of \$100,000? Did J. B. Atherton have authority, on October 11, 1898, to subscribe for 1000 shares of assessable stock for Welch & Co.? State exact date and how such authority was given. State also if the authority possessed by Atherton on October 11, to subscribe for \$1,000 worth of stock was given to him by the Board of Directors of Welch & Co. Did you as president of Welch & Co. have valid authority to subscribe for such stock without the sanction of the Board of Directors? Had you, without such sanction, given such authority at or prior to said date? How and in what manner was such authority given?

Would the Corporation of Welch & Co. have consented to have been liable as a contributory to the amount of \$100,000 if on October 12, 1898, the Waialua Agricultural Co. had become or had been declared insolvent. Would you, under such circumstances, have advised the Board of Directors of the company that said company could not and ought not to be held a contributory for the said subscription? If, as you have heretofore testified, Atherton had no power, right, or authority from Welch & Co. to subscribe for \$100,000 worth of stock, state if such company have ratified such unauthorized subscription. If such subscription was made please state any fact or circumstance (if any such there were) which was or might have been the reason or inducement or the consideration which prompted Atherton to do this unauthorized act. Did you or Welch & Co. ever have any notice or knowledge imparted to you or it, at any time prior to date of receipt of a letter from Castle & Cooke dated October 1st, 1898, of the proposed formation of a sugar plantation at Waialua? As to the letter of October 13, referred to in your former deposition, was the information imparted by Atherton, Dillingham or Castle & Cooke? Do you wish to testify that letters which authorized the subscription for the corporation of Welch & Co. for \$100,000 worth of stock in the Waialua Agricultural Co. are lost when you say as you did in your former deposition that you have not them "at hand"? Do you or the corporation of Welch & Co. keep letter press or carbon copies of all business correspondence passing out of your office? If Welch & Co. had subscribed for \$100,000 worth of stock in a for-

SETTLEMENT IMPROVEMENTS

Incidents of the Board of Health's Trip to Molokai.

Kalaupapa Streets on Village Plan—Prizes Offered for Best Work in Tree Planting Mr. Smith Interested.

The regular semi-annual trip of the Board of Health to the Molokai settlement was made last Saturday. There were on board the W. G. Hall, besides 81 deck passengers, 37 cabin passengers. President Cooper, of the Board, is to be greatly complimented on the accommodation afforded the visitors.

In the morning a tour was made of the village at Kalaupapa. The meathouse was first visited, where the rations are given out. Each member of the settlement receives a pound a day of either meat or fish as he chooses. The method of giving out rations has been found on the whole to be superior to that of allowing so much each week in money for food, or to any other method yet tried. The cattle are killed twice a week. The cemetery was next in line, and from there the party proceeded to the Bishop Home for Girls, in care of sisters of the Order of St. Francis.

One of the most important improvements that has been made of late is the laying of an 8-inch pipe to a spring up in the hills which it is expected will furnish plenty of water for irrigating as well as other purposes.

Bro. Dutton who is in charge of the Boys' Home, celebrated on Saturday, the 13th anniversary of his stay there. A very good band has been formed among the boys which gave several selections for the visitors. Prof. Berger's object in making the trip was to take several of the old instruments of the Hawaiian band for these boys.

SUIT ON OLAAS LANDS

E. A. Horan vs. Sanford B. Dole, J. A. King and J. F. Brown is the title of an agreed case submitted to the Supreme Court for adjudication.

Horan is with others a lessee of Crown Lands in Olaa, Hawaii. Some time ago he received a Patent to the land which was originally held under lease by A. G. Curtis who sold to plaintiff.

When the new land at Olaa was recently opened, Horan made application for an additional 150 acres he having first written to President Dole regarding his intention to apply and receiving a favorable answer.

Horan made his application in due form and was refused the land. The plaintiff claims that under the law and the facts he is entitled as of right to purchase, at the appraised value the lots selected by him. He asks that the defendants be ordered to issue to him a patent conveying the same to him on receipt of the appraised value of said lands.

The defendants deny this right and assert that the plaintiff lost the right or privilege of purchasing additional land when he accepted a patent for the land held under his Crown Land Lease.

Victorious Again.

Co. F won the return shoot against the police in the match at the military range Saturday afternoon, the score being 416 to 361 with ten men. Following is the score in detail:

The schooner *Luka* which arrived in port this morning has aboard a load of fertilizer for Hamakua plantation from Allen & Robinson. The *Luka* leaked and the fertilizer got wet, so she came back.

MORE THAN MILLION A MONTH

Exports for July in Sugar Amount to \$1,236,808.

Other Exports; Bananas, Honey, Coffee, Rice and Empty Beer Kegs—Biggest Sugar Cargo.

For the month ending today the value of the domestic produce shipped out of the port of Honolulu amounts to \$1,267,215.

Out of this amount \$1,236,808 represent the value of the 250,000 and odd bags of sugar that have been taken out of this port by 12 vessels during the month of July.

The largest cargo of sugar was taken by the American ship *Iroquois* which carried 55,584 bags when she sailed out of this harbor a few days ago.

The next largest was taken by the bark *R. P. Rithet*, amounting to 32,723 bags.

The barks *Diamond Head*, *Alden Besse* and *Albert* took away 25,499 bags, 20,924 bags and 20,025 bags respectively.

During the last four weeks nearly 7000 bunches of bananas have been shipped to the coast; over a hundred thousand packages of merchandise have gone out of the city; nearly 300 cases of Honey have been exported; 127 bags of coffee and about 2000 bags of rice are also included in the output and last but not least to be mentioned are a little over 1200 empty beer kegs and wine casks.

A hundred and twenty tons of old iron was exported as ballast on the City of Columbia, but it came back with the steamer when she returned from Nihaun (en route to China) recently.

MONTHLY STOCK REPORT.

The monthly report of transactions which have taken place on the Honolulu Stock Exchange during July appear on the stock list today. From the figures there given it is a patent fact that the reducing of the par value of the more popular stocks has made buying and selling more general in those stocks. As compared with former reports this will be seen readily. This month 1237 shares of Ewa have changed hands the highest price paid being \$30 1/2 and the lowest \$27 1/2; in Honokaa there have been transactions to the number of 1305 shares the highest price paid being \$26 1/2 and the lowest \$26. The greatest fluctuations during the month have been in Kihai assessable of which 2930 shares were sold at from \$11 1/2 to \$6 1/2. In McBryde assessable there were more transactions than in any other stock and the price has varied but little 7731 shares sold at from \$3 to \$2 1/2. Olaa assessable shares aggregate 4082 sold at from \$14 to \$1 1/2 per share. There has been considerable buying of Hawaiian Government and O. R. & L. Co.'s bonds \$17,000 of 5's at from 103 to 104 and \$2000 of 5's at 101 with \$7000 O. R. & L. Co.'s securities at from 106 to 107 1/2 are noted.

"The Hawaiian Star, the Independent, the P. C. Advertiser and EVENING BULLETIN newspapers of Honolulu, offer prizes, of Fifty Dollars, Forty Dollars, Thirty Dollars, Twenty Dollars and Ten Dollars respectively, to be paid to such persons residing at Kalaupapa and Kalawao, Molokai, who shall show the best results in tree planting at said Kalaupapa or Kalawao between August 1st, 1899, and October 1st, 1900.

No person to be entitled to more than one prize. Trees planted prior to August 1st, 1899, not to be included.

A Committee of three persons to be appointed by representatives of the above newspapers will award the prizes. In making the awards the Committee are not to be governed only by the number of trees planted; but all the circumstances are to be taken into consideration."

The committee appointed consists of W. O. Smith, C. B. Reynolds and Wm. Notley.

W. O. Smith has offered additional prizes of \$25, \$20, \$15, \$10 and \$5 for the best kept grounds in the Settlement by April 1, 1900, the prizes to be awarded by the same committee. It is expected that the offering of these prizes will accomplish a great deal toward the beautifying of the place.

If Mr. Ray reads the papers of Hawaii he finds that not a few citizens of the territory differ with some of his opinions on the government.

With empty bottles marking the pathway of visitors to Mokuaweweoe's activity, it's a question just how to take the stories told of the special scenic effects.

Notwithstanding the decisions of the Supreme Court, the Hawaiian Government can repeal the penal contract labor law if it wants to. Will it be done?

The thoughtless man among those to whom the Call representative has submitted questions on the future government of Hawaii will be the one who gives an answer favoring anything but a territory or state.

A local contemporary makes bold to say that Germany was, is, and continues to be right in the Samoan affair. This is indeed a remarkable statement, remarkable in that it is the first time such an assertion has been made—outside of Germany.

Whether it is better to spend public money sending men to Washington to lobby in Hawaii's cause, or to spend the money in securing legislative action at home that shall firmly establish Hawaii's integrity of purpose, that is the question.

Hilo wants Reed's Island as a public park. It is an excellent scheme and Hilo does well to begin agitating the question early. Judging from the speed with which Honolulu's Aala park is nearing completion, Hilo will secure its much needed public pleasure ground sometime, the later part of the next century.

The official organ is to be congratulated on its new flop. Having argued that the Newlands Resolution is unconstitutional as a whole, it now makes the claim that the resolution is a constitutional contract; having endorsed President Jordan's view of Aguinaldo, it now says the Filipino war will not be abandoned. Mr. Hatch was always credited with having considerable influence.

A solution of the problem of where the Supreme Court got its authority for nullifying the Constitution of the United States may be found in Article 91 of the Constitution of the Republic of Hawaii, entitled, "Constitution Supreme Law"—"This Constitution when promulgated shall thereupon become the Supreme Law of the Republic, and the Constitution promulgated on the 7th day of July, 1887, and all other Constitutions at any time the Supreme Law in the Hawaiian Islands, and also all laws and parts of laws inconsistent herewith, are hereby expressly abrogated and are declared null and void." If our government can find in the constitutional provision, which gives the President with the approval of the Cabinet power to make rules and regulations for "administering oaths and holding elections," authority for changing the oath required of electors, that government finds it an easy matter to nullify any and all constitutions that every have been or ever may be the Supreme Law of the land.

McBryde, as best man. F. C. Schernstein of this city played a wedding march on the piano as the bridal party entered the parlor and took their places.

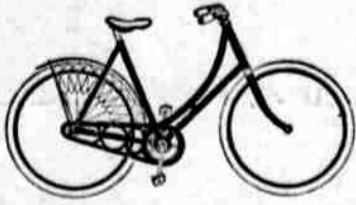

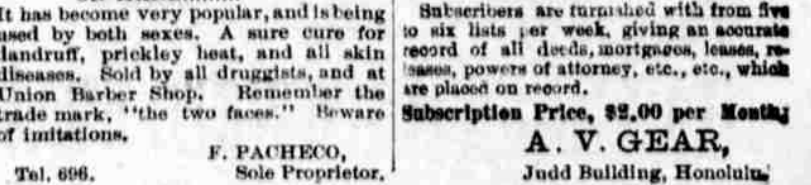

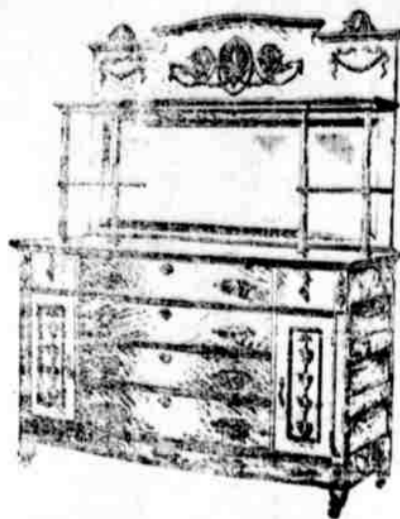

There must have been an optical delusion somewhere. The people of the place had bought some meat in the afternoon. This might have looked like a human head, but it was rather doubtful.

The Niihau. The Inter-Island Co's new steamer Niihau is in the hands of the carpenters at the old fish market wharf.

For the next month they will be busily engaged in making alterations in the deck works. The present house is to be extended 8 feet forward, an upper deck is to be constructed upon which 6 or 8 staterooms will be built. The upper deck will not be covered and will extend only as far forward as the house.

Numerous other alterations will be made and the Niihau will look very little like the original Hueneme that came from San Francisco, when the carpenters are through with her.
