GOVERNMENT LANDS.

It is satisfactory to have a government amenable to reason and desirous of serving the public good. Absence of these features in the old administration was one of its objectionable characteristics, and its indifference to the public murmurings and requests was one of the causes of its downfall. Directly in the line of the public good and a sound policy is an announcement from the Minister of Interior in to-day's paper, relative to Government lands. Applicants to lease or purchase are informed that "lands belonging to the Government, suitable for settlement under the Homestead Act, will be utilized for that purpose as soon as the necessary preliminaries can be arranged." This is acceptable news to many people who have long waited for an opportunity to secure a little land on which to settle in the country.

A FABLE.

There is an old Japanese fable to the effect that there were two frogs living in different places—one in Kioto and one in Ozaka. One lived in a spring and one in a lotus pond. In the course of time they both took a notion to travel. And it is not very strange that they started to travel directly toward each other. At length they met at the summit of the high land between the two cities. Falling into conversation, they soon found out that they were out on the same errand, viz: to see the world. Describing their own countries, they were surprised at the apparent resemblance. Seeing that they were then on the highest land near them, they put their fore feet together, so as to enable them to stand firmly on their hind feet. In this position their eyes were, of course, turned backward. Thus each one saw his own home, while thinking that he was looking out upon the world at large. Laboring under this delusion they agreed that the two places were exactly alike. Reasoning from these two cases they decided that all the places of the world were alike. So they returned to their own homes each satisfied that he had practically seen the world.

DEATH OF GENERAL COMLY.

By the courtesy of Hon. Geo. W. Merrill, we are informed that General Comly, formerly U. S. Minister Resident at Honolulu died recently at Toledo, Ohio, of lung and heart disease, after a prolonged illness.

BUTTON AND A WAG.

Well Mr. Wag, said Button, I hardly know, but I can say this much, that some of the insignificant dukes who heretofore wore a modest expression, now spit between their teeth, chew tobacco and talk out of the corner of their mouths.

THE COURT-MARTIAL.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Allow me to say, with reference to the published statement of the sentence imposed on me by the Court-martial, that Lieutenant-Colonel Ashford had no right, himself, to review the proceedings in my case. As I intend to appeal, the published sentence cannot, properly, take effect until after the said appeal is decided.

ARRIVAL OF THE MARIPOSA.

The S. S. Mariposa arrived from San Francisco this morning after a pleasant run of six days, 12 hours and 10 minutes. She arrived off port at 3:30 o'clock, and at 5:45 made her berth. She brought a fair list of merchandise and several passengers for this port. Nothing unusual occurred during the passage. The steamer received about 300 tons of coal to-day. At 4 o'clock this afternoon she made tracks for Australia, taking a few passengers from this port, and 34 cabin and 40 steerage in transit from San Francisco.

CONFLICTING REPLIES.

To illustrate the inconsistency of verbal reports, the following is published: When the steamer W. G. Hall was about to depart this morning, a reporter asked Mr. Chas. Clark where the King was going to. To Kau until December, replied Mr. Clark. Where's the King going to, Mr. Ena? asked the scribe of that gentleman. To Maalaea, replied Mr. Ena. Where's the King going to, Capt. Bates? said the reporter to the master of the steamer. To Lahaina, answered the Captain. The reporter by this time was pretty well disgusted, and would not have known who to believe if Mr. Webster of the I. I. S. N. Co. had not come to the rescue.

WITHOUT A PILOT.

The ex-boatman of the Kaimiloa, lately promoted to the command of a vegetable cart, left his craft without moorings yesterday and she got in motion. No one being on board to take the helm, she luffed at the corner of King and Bethel streets and, striking a rock, capsized. Before the master arrived, however, she was righted, with the propeller slightly damaged, but no other harm done, except to the cargo, the odor of which reminded the by-standers of the navy. "Didn't you never have a runaway yourself?" was the "captain's" reply to the gibes of those who were in charge when he arrived.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

While a salute was being fired at the shore battery this morning, in honor of the departure of the King by the steamer W. G. Hall, a terrible accident occurred. After the discharge of the third gun, another was heard to follow instantly; then came a long pause, and a few minutes later tidings of the accident were received. From what can be learned from the excited witnesses, it seems that while a native was charging one of the guns, the charge exploded. The native who held the ramrod was frightfully mangled. Both his arms were blown off at the elbow. One of his eyes was torn from its socket, and his face was lacerated. Another native who was close by also received injuries, but not so severe as the other man. Both men were conveyed to the Queen's Hospital, where they now are. The one who received the greatest injury is in a precarious state.

THE KING ON A VISIT.

The King departed for Lahaina by the steamer W. G. Hall this morning. The steamer was crowded with passengers who were covered with flowers. When His Majesty arrived the people on the wharf

made way for him. He walked leisurely to the gang plank, shaking hands with native friends, who reverently kissed his hand. The King was accompanied to the vessel by His Ex. Godfrey Brown, Governor Iauka, Major Rosa, Major Hayley, Major Parker, Mr. Ena and Capt. Chas. Clark. As the Hall glided away from her berth, the U. S. S. Adams hoisted the Hawaiian flag on her main mast, and manned her yards. A salute was fired from the shore battery.

HONOLULU RIFLES.

JUDGMENT OF THE COURT-MARTIAL.

Battalion Orders 12, dated August 3d, were posted up in the Armory of the Honolulu Rifles last evening. The orders conveyed the decisions arrived at in the several cases before the court-martial, for "neglect of duty and disobedience of orders." Following are the orders: Quartermaster Sergeant W. A. S. Beals of Co. A is found guilty and sentenced to be reduced to the ranks.

Corporal Coghlan of Co. A is found guilty, reduced to the ranks and reprimanded.

Private Geo. W. Miles of Co. A is found guilty and dishonorably discharged from the battalion.

Private Alex. Flohr of Co. B is found not guilty of the main charge, but guilty of one out of four specifications, and is ordered to receive a reprimand.

Ordnance Sergeant Frank Godfrey is found guilty and dishonorably discharged from the battalion.

Promotions are promulgated as follows: Sergeant Geo. C. Stratemeyer of Co. A to be Battalion Ordnance Sergeant, vice F. Godfrey; Sergeant E. W. Wood of Co. A to be company Quartermaster Sergeant, vice Beals; Corporal T. B. Murray of Co. A to be Sergeant to fill vacancy.

The court-martial is declared to be dissolved. All drills are discontinued till Sept. 13, except recruit drills, of which there will be two instead of one weekly—on Monday night without arms and on Friday with arms. Signed V. V. Ashford, Lieutenant Col. commanding, Geo. McLeod, Capt. Adjutant.

WARD MEETINGS.

Three Ward meetings were held last evening. Below is the gist of each meeting:

FIFTH WARD. The meeting of this Ward was held at the Lyceum. The attendance was large and enthusiastic.

The committee on permanent organization submitted a draft of Constitution which was adopted, as follows:

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. The name of this Club shall be "The Young Men's Fifth Ward Reform Club."

Art. II. Section 1.—The object of the formation of this Club is declared to be political organization by and for all residents of Hawaiian, American or European birth or descent, for the purpose of establishing and maintaining honest constitutional government in the interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this city and Kingdom, and to assist in the selection of honest and representative men for elective offices, under the Constitution proclaimed July 7, 1887, and in support of the political party who organized and carried into effect the said constitutional reform.

Sec. 2. It is expressly declared, as a fundamental principle of this Club, that no class or creed shall be acknowledged, recognized or permitted in the organization, but all action shall be based on the principles of honest, representative, constitutional government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

Sec. 3. The doctrine of majority rule is expressly adopted and confirmed, and all members of the Club shall be pledged to abide by and support the rules, resolutions and nominees, first, of their own Club; secondly, of the General or Central Committee, directorate, or convention of all the clubs duly and regularly assembled under this or their Constitution or Constitutions.

Sec. 4. Everyone eligible as a voter of the Fifth Ward who, having passed the Committee on Permanent Organization, and shall have signed the Constitution of the Club, shall thereby become a member thereof.

Art. III. The officers of this club shall be a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the club.

Art. IV. Section 1. The committee shall consist of, first, the Executive Committee elected by the club which shall be known as the Committee of Thirteen, and they shall deal with all questions not especially delegated to other committees.

Sec. 2. The Committee of Permanent Organization shall consist of five members appointed by the chairman. They shall have charge of all matters pertaining to permanent organization, reporting to the club from time to time. It is hereby declared to be the intention and desire of this club that similar clubs may be organized in each ward of this city on principles based upon concurrence in the New Constitution; the whole to unite in forming a Central Executive Committee, to direct the appointment of delegates from the several clubs so formed, to meet in convention at such time and place as may be by

them decided upon to select candidates for the coming elections for Representatives and Nobles.

Art. V. The order of business shall be:

- 1. Roll Call of Officers and Committees.
2. Reading Minutes of preceding meeting.
3. Report of Committee of permanent organization.
4. Report of Committee and resolution attached.
5. Election if any.
6. Deferred business.
7. New business.

Art. VI. We the undersigned voters in the 5th Ward declare our adherence to the principles above laid down and hereby become members of the 5th Ward Young Men's Reform Club, under the same.

A recess of five minutes was then taken to afford an opportunity to enroll, which was done, 124 coming forward and attaching their signs manual to the document.

Dr. Tucker was then elected delegate to the Central Committee.

Mr. C. J. McCarthy was unanimously elected Sergeant-at-arms of the Club. The President suggested the necessity of the chairman of the precinct committees taking immediate steps to get their committees into working order. After the passing of two or three minor resolutions, the Club adjourned.

SIXTH WARD. The Sixth Ward met at the Rifles armory, last evening, for the purpose of completely organizing the Reform Club of that ward.

When the meeting was called to order by the Chairman, the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The report of the committee on the Club Constitution was read and accepted. The Constitution is similar to that of Fifth Ward. The officers who were elected at the first meeting were accepted, to act under the Club Constitution. Jas. Torbert resigned from the Executive Committee and was succeeded by Mr. H. Lose. Mr. J. B. Atherton was unanimously elected delegate to the Central Executive Board. Ten minutes were allowed by the Chair to permit the members to sign the Club Constitution. The Constitution is being translated into the Portuguese language, so that the Portuguese members of that ward can sign next Saturday night.

### "MALTA OF THE PACIFIC."

New York, July 25.—The *Herald* in a long editorial styles the Hawaiian Islands "The Malta of the Pacific" and says: While it is not the wish of the Government to interfere with the autonomy of these islands, it would be greatly detrimental to our interests to allow any of the great Powers of Europe to acquire dominating influence there. We did not wage the Mexican war to get possession of California, or to purchase Alaska, or to build the Union Pacific Road to be brought to a sudden halt by the loss of our rights in the islands. The trade of the Pacific Ocean belongs to us by geographical proximity. The Hawaiian Islands being, as Webster declared, ten times nearer to the United States than to the Powers of Europe, we cannot allow any nation on the face of the earth to rob us of it. This is the universal American sentiment, and the sooner England sees it the better. The rights of Americans are paramount, and the Government must see to it that they are maintained. The *Herald* advocates a cable from San Francisco to Honolulu, and says thereby our commercial transactions can be maintained and increased. It says the value of such means of instantaneous communication it is impossible to overestimate. This magnificent enterprise would offer a financial opportunity to a private company, and if at first it should need the assistance of the Government, it would doubtless be given generously. We understand that there is already a project of this kind on foot. It should be examined, whittled into practical shape and pushed.

### FACTS VS. THEORIES.

One of the best instances of the value of facts over theories is afforded by Professor W. T. Harris, in a recent article in the "Forum." He attacks the land theory of Henry George by a presentation of figures. "George claims that by nationalizing the land and putting on it a Government tax equal to the rent, all expenses of the Government would be paid, a vast surplus left for public improvements, charitable institutions, libraries, art galleries, amusements and means of mental and physical betterment of all kinds. Also, that poverty will be banished, by preventing speculation in land values and monopoly of the soil. Professor Harris gives data which show that the value of land owned by individuals or companies in the United States excluding buildings and other improvements in accordance with George's scheme, is about ten billion dollars, hence the annual rental at an estimate of 4 per cent of its market value, which for the naked land is fair, would be about four hundred millions a year. This is a little more than \$6.66 a year for each man, woman and child in the country, or a little more than 2 cents for each working day. The average income of our people, including every individual, is about 40 cents a day at a low estimate. These are the figures upon which Mr. George must depend for his promised results. Instead of having a surplus after paying the expenses of Government, he would have a deficit of \$400,000,000 for the present taxation of the country—national, State and local—foots up, according to some accounts, about eight hundred million dollars. It remains for Mr. George to show how this item of 2 cents a day is going to make or mar the fortunes of the people of the United States, whether paid to landlords, retained in their own pockets as individual land-owners, or given to Government for revenue purposes.

### A MEAN ADVANTAGE.

"Now gentlemen," said the boisterous man in the smoking car, "this thing of eating thirty birds in thirty days is easy enough to do unless you are betting you can do it. The idea of having it to do makes it repulsive. Now, for instance, I'll bet \$5 that there is not a man in this car that can take thirty drinks in thirty days." "I will take the bet," said a tall rawboned party across the aisle. "All right sir. Where did you say you were from?" "I am from the great Commonwealth of Kentucky, sir." "Good! put up your money." "Here is the chink. Now, what drink do you name?" "Water," said the boisterous passenger, as he put up a V. "Water! Water!" screamed the gentleman from the dark and bloody ground. "The money is yours, stranger. Do you s'pose I would drown myself for \$5!"—[Nashville American.
