RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT

In Memory of the Late Judges Rosa and Hitchcock.

Passed at Circuit Court on Hawaii—Tributes from Bar and Bench—Judge Stanley Announces Change of Commission.

North Kohala, Oct. 13, 1898.—Judge Stanley arrived at Mahukona by the steamer Mauna Loa yesterday morning. After the opening of the Court yesterday morning, Judge Stanley announced that he had resigned his position as Judge of the First Circuit Court and that he had been appointed by the President as Judge of the 3rd and 4th Judicial Circuits. He presented his commission and it was read in Court.

The following is a synopsis of the proceedings held in the 3rd Circuit Court in re Resolutions relative to the death of late Hon. Antone Rosa and Hon. E. G. Hitchcock:

TRIBUTES TO THE MEMORIES OF THE LATE HON. ANTONE ROSA AND HON. E. H. HITCHCOCK.

On Thursday the 13th day of October, 1898, shortly after the Court was opened by the Deputy Sheriff, C. H. Pulaa, Judge Stanley presiding, the resolutions which are reproduced below relative to the deaths of the late Hon. Antone Rosa and Hon. E. G. Hitchcock were presented.

Those present were: E. P. Dole, Deputy Attorney General; H. L. Holstein, Chas. Creighton, A. N. Kepoikai, Geo. D. Gear, Harry P. Weber, Carl S. Smith, P. McMahon, stenographer; District Magistrate Atkins, Deputy Sheriff Paakiki, and J. A. Thompson, Deputy Clerk Judiciary Department, officiating as Clerk of the Third Circuit in place of Dan. Porter. Besides the above named gentlemen the court room was filled with persons, mostly Hawaiians, assembled to attend to business before the Court.

Mr. H. L. Holstein rose and read the following resolutions:

"Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst Antone Rosa, a member of the Hawaiian Bar and one who held the position of Circuit Judge of the Third Circuit;

"Resolved, That we the members of the said Bar hereby express our appreciation of the fact that, in his passing away, a great loss has befallen us, a loss of a tried and trusted official as well as a brilliant and valuable member of the Bar;

"Resolved, That we hereby express to the family of the deceased our sincere sympathy with them in their bereavement, and further

"Resolved, That the Court be requested to spread these resolutions upon its records.

Mr. Holstein continued and spoke feelingly in memory of the deceased in Hawaiian, as did also other members of the bar, viz.: Chas. Creighton, A. N. Kepoikai, E. P. Dole and Hon. Judge Stanley.

The Judge after his remarks gave directions to the Clerk to make the requisite entries of the proceedings in the record of the Court and to furnish a certified copy of the resolutions to the family of the deceased.

After Judge Stanley had finished his tribute to the memory of the late Judge Rosa and had ordered the resolutions spread upon the records of the Court, Mr. Chas. Creighton then presented and read to the Court the resolutions

produced below, after which he moved that the same be spread upon the records of the Court and a copy thereof be forwarded to the family of deceased:

"Whereas, It has pleased God to take from us the Honorable Edward Griffin Hitchcock, Circuit Judge of the Third and Fourth Circuits, be it

"Resolved, That the members of this Bar, in expressing our sense of the loss which the Court and community have suffered by the death of Judge Hitchcock, do hereby record our appreciation of the sterling integrity, marked ability and untiring industry which distinguished him in the performance of his duties;

"Resolved, That in the death of Judge Hitchcock the nation has lost a good citizen and upright Judge;

"Resolved, That we tender to the widow and family of the deceased our sincere sympathy with them in their affliction.

"Resolved, That these resolutions be entered upon the records of this Court.

[Signed by the same members of the Bar as the Rosa resolutions.]

Chas. Creighton continued and made some eulogistic remarks regarding the honored dead, followed in the same strain by E. P. Dole, A. N. Kepoikai, Carl S. Smith, H. L. Lincoln and Hon. Judge Stanley.

The Court ordered the resolutions to be entered upon the records and a certified copy of the resolutions furnished to the family of the deceased. After the above proceedings the Court went on with its regular business.

COMICAL GENIUS THIS ONE

Letter from Cavite of an Artillerist Who Made Friends Here.

He Comounds Fancy Bills of Fare and Indulges in Flights of Very Manly Philosophy.

Oscar V. Thompson, saddler, Light Battery G, 6th U. S. Artillery, Post San Felipe, Cavite, Philippine Islands, writes to a lady who was kind to him and his chums in Honolulu a letter quite out of the ordinary run of soldiers' letters that have been appearing in the local press. With the humor of a Mark Twain the writer combines the philosophy of a Socrates. His present copyist knows a lot of people who enjoyed entertaining Thompson and his intimate comrades in Honolulu. The following is part of his letter:

"Upon the 4th of August, 11:55 a. m., we left the good place called Honolulu. Nothing occurred upon the trip except the same old story, getting hungry and no place to sleep. On Sunday, August 21, we entered Manila bay, where ships of all nations were anchored. But the greatest sight was the Spanish fleet, nothing but masts and smokestacks being visible.

"Upon the 22nd we went ashore in Cavite, using an old Spanish fort as quarters. Two hundred Spanish prisoners were there. Native prisoners were there. Mosquitoes were there, also ants. Of all places that I ever have stayed in, that was the worst. The old prison in Havana, Cuba, was better. Anything that you lay down is immediately covered with little Philippine ants. And will they bite? At night—oh my!

"We have lots to eat here—salmon, tomatoes, canned corned beef, once and a while beans. But still I am happy in a way, for I am neither sick nor dying like many are—perhaps my time will come, but as yet I ain't dead. I am not in the doleful dumps, neither black nor blue.

"Our bill of fare yesterday was: Dinner—Soldiers. Supper—Ditto; also the cook has something fried. We had little pieces of horse meat, that tried to swim across the sloppy soup in our little tin pans. We have had tacks, and coffee so weak that they all get drowned.

"We had for supper September 8 old peas in which the bugs lost their lives long before they had time to escape from the boiler. And stale bread cut up in small slices of cholera morbus, etc.

"The officers' bill of fare, Sunday, September 4: Soups—risotache, moustache and quintessence of sourjice. Fish—dogfish, catfish and suckers. Boiled—cannasback, whaleback sauce; caissons, limbers and cannon sauce; knapsacks, canteen and mess plate sauce. Extras—stewed iceicles, snowballs and skates. Roast—Frankforts, soldiers, sailors and shells; Spain-Spaniards, blankets and cross guns. Vegetables—Dewey berries, washed deadbeats, pickled talk and annexation. Desert—Dewey pudding, Manila flavoring; cigarette pudding, rice paper flavors; Battery G's light artillery what is it sauce; hard tacks, soft tacks, rusty tacks and carpet tacks.

"Milk is twenty cents a bottle. Tin cans and buckets are not made. One must take the bottle. Eggs are fifty cents per dozen—shells, eggs and all thrown in. Potatoes, sweet or sour, five cents apiece. And the water here. Of course it is not lavender water or carbonated juice. It will, if given a half a chance, remove dirt, thirst and many other moral obligations. I know it because those who have tried it told me so. But the one great trouble with the water here is its life. Drink very much and it will walk off with you,

it is so full of life and smell. The smells are full of malaria, and the malaria full of microbes and other pestiferous animals. Every morning the microbes come around seeking whom they may devour, sometimes trying to work me for life insurance, and then again to sell me an encyclopedia to study them and a microscope to see them.

"Also every now and then another microbe with a patent washing machine comes around and tries to inoculate me; but he can't work me, for I have a washing machine right called the 'Seek Me No Further.' Of course it is hot here, so hot that all soft things melt. Thus so, you surely know, how my poor head is affected.

"I am glad, very glad, I enlisted, for this soldiering under difficulties and discouragements is just what I like. It brings out the true steel that one possesses. The greater the difficulty the more glory in surmounting it. Nothing is really troublesome or hard that we do willingly. Hardships are the only tests of manhood and self-reliance, and he who strives to pass around in the vain hope of accomplishing the ends of life without experiencing the jostle and clash of strife will do much at once by breathing out his life in idle wishes, and finally regret his useless intention and barren zeal and sink down to sin, vice and crime."

Mr. Thompson continues his homily at some length, ending with a reference to a comrade who had become discouraged and was "simply going." Then he resumes his satirical vein, thus:

"I want to tell you about the omnibuses, hacks, buggies, street cars and horses. Oh, they take the prize and everything else besides. The hacks are a thing by themselves, as well as the lean, little ponies that pull them. The street cars are more striking in appearance than strikingly handsome. It takes one man to drive and one man to work the whip, and if the wind blows very hard business is suspended."

Mr. Thompson concludes with personal information, showing that he is assisting the quartermaster, and having a deal of the purchasing to do in a position to go anywhere in and about Manila.

Friday, Oct. 7.—Left Kaawa at 8:30 a. m. and marched to Panaluu, where a halt was made for luncheon. Then the boys trudged on to Dr. Carter's place at Hauula where they remained for two days. The treatment received at the hands of Dr. and Mrs. Carter was very much appreciated by the boys.

THE BOND ABOUT \$20,000

Security Must Equal Claims for Releasing Libelled Steamer.

Supreme Court Opinions on S. S. City of Columbia and Another Case—Judge Perry Decides Against Kahului Railroad.

The Supreme Court by Justice Whiting, sitting with Chief Justice Judd and substitute Justice Neumann, has rendered a unanimous opinion on the appeals from Judge Perry's decrees in the libels against the steamer City of Columbia. It declares that the libellants are entitled to a stipulation for value which will be a substitute for the vessel, the amount to be not less than the amount of the claim or claims for which she is libelled, provided the vessel be libelled so much. The appeal suspends the decree and the vessel remains in the custody of the Circuit Court until the termination of the litigation, but the Circuit Judge in admiralty still retains jurisdiction to order an appraisal of the vessel if necessary, and to allow security to be substituted for the vessel, as by a bond or a stipulation for value with proper sureties. An order will issue to the Circuit Court accordingly: It is mentioned that counsel for Rose Berliner had stated in open court that he would accept a bond of \$2500, which for the purposes of her libel may be taken as the valuation of the vessel.

Kinney & Ballou for libellant Russell Colegrove; Geo. A. Davis for libellant Rose Berliner; F. M. Hatch and Mr. Cayless for the vessel and master.

According to this decision, counting the continued libel of Harvey Johnston, the amount of the bond to be prescribed cannot be less than \$19,500, with estimated costs probably added.

Judge Perry has decided in favor of the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company, in its ejectment suit against the Kahului Railroad Company. The Judge knows of no sufficient reason why the law of estoppel should be modified in any degree in favor of railway companies. He finds that the plea of estoppel has not been established by the defendant, on whom was the burden of proof. Hartwell for plaintiff; Kinney & Ballou for defendant.

Mary M. Seabury's final account, as executrix of the will of Joseph Seabury, shows receipts of \$595, out of which \$218.20 has been expended, leaving a balance of \$376.80.

Cattle Slaughtered Each Day.

It might be interesting to the people of Honolulu to know that the city requires that the lives of between 30 and 40 cattle be sacrificed each day to supply the tables of the various households.

MAUNA LOA BEATS KINAU

Three Steamers Bring the News from Lahaina.

Both Captains Had Orders Not to Race—Slow Time Made—Inter Island Boats Time Slow—Other Facts.

The steamer Mauna Loa beat the Kinau to Lahaina by fourteen minutes. This is the news brought by the Lehua, Kauai and Iwa this morning. All three of these steamers had communication with Lahaina.

Joe Puni, one of the charterers of the Iwa, and a passenger on her during the round trip, speaks as follows: "We were at Kaunakakai when the Mauna Loa and Kinau went by on the way to Lahaina. Both boats were going at a rapid rate, the Mauna Loa leading the Kinau about a mile and a quarter.

"The Kinau did not stop at Kaunakakai but followed right on, leaving her Kaunakakai passengers and mail in Lahaina to be sent across later."

Captain Bruhn of the Kauai tells the same story and adds that the Mauna Loa was six hours and twenty-five minutes getting to Lahaina. Calculating from the time she left the wharf here she must, according to that statement, have arrived in Lahaina at 5:10 p. m.

C. L. Wight of the Wilder S. S. Co. says he received word that the Mauna Loa had beaten the Kinau to Lahaina. The fact that the Kinau did not stop at Kaunakakai did not signify anything. Very often the Kinau, in case she had stowage passengers for Kaunakakai, took them to Lahaina for the Lehua to take across, this being done as an accommodation to the cabin passengers wishing to get to Lahaina as soon as possible.

Mr. Wight further stated that the Kinau had positive orders not to race: Captain Campbell of the Inter-Island Company, says the same thing in regard to the Mauna Loa.

Indeed, this seems to be proven by the fact that the time made to Lahaina, six hours and twenty-five minutes, was below the average of ordinary trips.

There is, however, no doubt that the Mauna Loa got in at Lahaina first and that she also made Maunaloa before the Kinau.

Final news as to whether or no the Mauna Loa and Kinau were really in a race will arrive here tonight on the former steamer. The consensus of opinion along the water front is that the captains got up their sporting blood outside and let out their steamers contrary to orders.

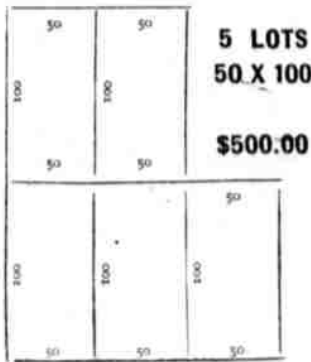

ITEMS FROM HARBOR FRONT

The new Inter-Island steamer may be expected tomorrow or next day.

The Kinaiu is due late tonight from Maui and Hawaii ports.

The barkentine Archer will sail for San Francisco some time this afternoon. She has only a small load of sugar.

The Lehua arrived from Molokai and Lanai shortly after midnight last night with only firewood as a cargo.

The Aloha will haul over to the Inter-Island wharf on Monday, there to take on her first installment of sugar. She will take in all, between 1200 and 1500 bags of sugar.

PASSENGERS ARRIVED. From Molokai, per stmr Lehua, Oct 15.—J F Brown, wife and two daughters, W D Braden and 10 on deck.

KANSAS NEW PLAGUE.

Clouds of Grasshoppers, Wasps and Hornets at Wichita.

Wichita, Kas., October 3.—Several hours before sunset there began to arrive here, flying low over the city, an army of countless millions of insects, comprising grasshoppers, wasps, bald, hornets, special varieties of butterflies and numerous wild bees. They are drifting slowly with a light breeze toward the southeast, the lowest flying wasps and hornets clustering in great numbers about the spires of the highest buildings. The air was thick with a smoky haze and the theory here is that the haze and accompanying insect visitation are due to the forest fires now raging in Colorado, the insects, it is supposed, being driven from their haunts in advance of the flames. The advance guard began to arrive yesterday, but owing to their comparatively small numbers no attention was paid to them until they were noticed in myriads late this afternoon.

EPISCOPAL COUNCIL.

Opened With Due Ceremonies in Washington, D. C.

Washington, October 5.—The triennial Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States opened with much ceremony in this city today. The Epiphany Church was the scene of the gathering, and in that structure assembled many distinguished Americans to take part in the deliberations of the church assembly.

Notable among the lay delegates were Chief Justice Fuller of the United States Supreme Court, who represents the lay delegation from Chicago; J. Pierpont Morgan, William Bayard Cutting, Francis Lynde Stetson and Captain A. T. Mahan, representing New York; George C. Thomas and James S. Biddle of Philadelphia. The clergy was represented by many prominent in the church work of the country, including Rev. Morgan Dix of New York.

Stars and Stripes at Quebec.

Quebec, October 5.—For the first time in the history of America, the Stars and Stripes, borne by a body of United States soldiers, have been unfurled on the citadel of Quebec. It was the occasion of the review of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston by the Governor-General of Canada. Following the Boston men were many veterans of the Civil War, several officers who participated in the late war with Spain and many descendants of the wars of the Revolution and the War of 1812, and these men received hearty cheers and a warm welcome of the British people in one of the strongholds of Queen Victoria's domain.

CONTRACT TO OUTSIDERS.

Difference of Two or Three Hundred Dollars Throws Out Local Firms.

The contract for water pipe and fittings has been awarded to the Mortin Pipe and Foundry Company of San Francisco. It is for 400 tons pipe, 17,000 lb. lead and 1000 lb. fittings. These were the bids received:

Mortin Pipe and Foundry Co., 6in.x8in. pipe @ \$29.30 per ton; special castings @ 2 3/4c. per lb.; lead @ 3 1/2c.

Wilson & Whitehouse, Honolulu, pipe, \$29.45 via San Francisco and \$27.98 via New York; castings, 4c.; lead, 4 1/2c.

Cotton, Neill & Co., Honolulu pipe, \$27.40; castings, 3c.; lead, 4 3/4c., via New York.

The local firm of Wilson & Whitehouse, shipping from San Francisco is only \$242.50 in excess of the San Francisco firm getting the contract, while it is \$345.50 lower, shipping from New York around Cape Horn.

The local firm of Cotton, Neill & Co., shipping from New York, is \$502.50 better than the San Francisco firm that receives the contract.

Princess Kaulani's Birthday.

AMIDST FAMILIAR SCENES

Judge Hitchcock Started the Plantation on Which He Died.

The Court Reporter is Given Forewarning of the Judge's Death by a Dream Some Days in Advance.

P. Maurice McMahon, the court reporter who went from Hilo to Kohala with the late Judge Hitchcock to attend the October term of the Fourth Circuit Court there, in a private letter in which he wrote feelingly of Judge Hitchcock's death, said:

"Judge Hitchcock laid down his burden of earth at 10:45 a. m. Oct. 9. Several days ago he took ill at the Kohala Sugar Company's place, where he was staying with Geo. Renton the manager, and strange to say he (the Judge) was the man who started that plantation long years ago, in the extra good missionary days—and there he returned to die.

Several days ago I said, 'The Judge will die, I fear,' for I had strange dreams, and the Judge and the court were mixed up in them. I was in deep sorrow. The Judge was on the bench in a strange courtroom, anxious to try the cases. I was seated at the table, with half the leaves of my note book torn across, trying to find a blank space whereon to write, but the leaves were all full. Lawyer Wise was asking questions of a witness, and I was insisting for him to stop till I could find a book wherein to write. Oh, we were all terribly excited, with the Judge in great anxiety and impatience. Then the Judge sent me off somewhere, and I wandered around Hilo, looking for I knew not what, suddenly finding myself by the Foreign Church, amidst crowds of men and women thronging into the building, when my mission seemed ended, and I turned away—and awoke.

"My head and neck ached throbbingly, my nerves were all unstrung. Yes, that was the end—the church, the Judge's cast-off body inside; the last act in the tragedy of life—for the present, at least."
