HYPNOTISM.

I WISH I HAD NEVER SEEN HIM. I wish I didn't always want to know the reason why. I wish I wasn't perpetually troubled by an impertinent curiosity. Why couldn't I have been content with what I had got from "Encyclopedia Britannica" and "Inquire Within upon Everything"? Why should I be always posing as an intelligent inquirer? It has cost me exactly \$10,000.

I am his only nephew, and I corresponded with Uncle Boubly ever since he emigrated as a stowage passenger seventeen years ago. You see Uncle Boubly had been very kind to me as a boy. He used to take me out fishing with him and give me shillings, the kind of uncle a boy likes. ACCORDING to the telegraph, the British colony of Barbadoes in the West Indies, is seeking to have a reciprocity treaty with the United States.

THE NEW VOLCANO HOTEL.

The plans and elevations for the new Volcano Hotel having been accepted and approved, the contract assigned and the lumber despatched, it may not be out of place to give some description of the hotel that is to be, before the month of July is gone, at least so the contractor says.

The old Volcano House will be utilized, a hall running right through it lengthwise with bed rooms, drying room, etc., of 8x14 ft., the whole being newly lined and ceiled so as to hide the frames and rafters, ample ventilation being provided.

Travelers will alight under a roomy port cochere of 19x20 feet, and ascending a few steps surrounded by a platform, which may be utilized as seats or for flower-stands, enter the new part of the hotel. The reception room, 22 ft. by 23 ft., with an office adjoining, is provided with a large open hearth fireplace, using logs for fuel.

The liquor traffic. Mr. Editor: Whoever desires the true welfare and prosperity of this community, must rejoice that the policy of the Government, as expressed in its legislation, is not favorable to the development of the liquor traffic, but seeks, as all legislation should, the enforcement of wholesome restrictions on such a business.

A staircase leads from near the office to the upper floor where are eleven bed-rooms varying from 9x14 ft. to 12x17 ft., and one bow-windowed room of 18x21 ft., the bay rises above the roof as an ornamental turret with flagstaff.

A wing turning at right angles with the crater front of the hotel and facing towards the Kau road, contains the kitchen and offices, pantry, wood and coal stores, etc., and a second staircase. The manager's quarters are opposite to the office and near the foot of the main staircase.

Several three-roomed cottages will be built nearer to the brink of the crater and the present fence in front of the hotel will be removed. The stables, carriage house, provision stores, etc., will be built on

the bluff at the back of the hotel, and being at some height above the main building roofed with corrugated iron and provided with tanks, will supply the upper story with water, as well as supplement the general supply. The steam from the sulphur springs will be led into comfortable bath rooms on the side nearest to them. The whole hotel, cottages, etc., will be roofed with iron.

Already vehicles can be driven the whole distance from the Kau landing to the site of the hotel, and on the Hilo side the most difficult half of the work is done.

Indeed every thing promises well for an opening in August or soon after, and we hope that by that time the crater may have begun to resume its usual characteristics and bring successive groups of tourists to help in keeping the hotel full.

A Contrast.—Prohibition vs. License.

The Iowa penitentiary it is said is almost empty. The Ohio penitentiary has over 1,600 convicts. Iowa has a "crazy," "cranky," "visionary," "unpractical," "puritanical" prohibitory law.

Ohio has a "practical" law which legalizes the crime-producing traffic in rum and regulates its evils by the "restraints of restrictions" and thus keeps her prisons well filled with convicts.

Lord Chief Justice of England is of opinion that "two-thirds of the jails could be shut up if the country could be kept sober." Prohibition says keep them sober and the penitentiaries and jails empty. License says let them drink, get drunk, commit crimes and thus keep the prisons well filled with convicts.

There can be but little doubt that if professed Christians and temperance people would unite their votes and influence to abolish the rum traffic it would be done, and other states as well as Iowa could be blessed by prohibitory laws and their jails and prisons kept comparatively empty.

If we can abolish the cause of so much misery and crime and will not do it. What shall be our reward? "He that knoweth his master's will and doeth it not shall be beaten with many stripes." So I take it that Christians and temperance people who sustain the licensed rum-shop even by silence must certainly come in for a large share of the "stripes," as they are surely responsible, though indirectly, for most of the misery and crime caused by the rum traffic.

Their sin is the sin of omission. They can prevent the evil but won't do it for some unaccountable reason. Under this showing let me ask who are we working for, the Great Master to maintain love and happiness in the world, or for Satan to multiply sin, misery and crime?

Society licenses the rum shop, rum shops breed criminals, and society imprisons or hangs them, and this is the work of professed Christian civilized society.

Let all ask ourselves, "for how much of this am I responsible?" How much will my prayers and pretence assist the Master to check sin, misery and crime in the world? Are we really helping Satan do his dirty work of destroying both the bodies and souls of men through the instrumentality of the rum-shop?
