WATERFRONT NOTES. The following report was given out by Purser H. C. Siegel of the R. M. S. S. Moana: Left Vancouver Jan. 3d 2:42 p. m.; arrived Victoria same date 8:29 p. m.; sailed same date at 11:30 p. m.; arrived Honolulu 12th at 10:45 p. m. Experienced after leaving Victoria a strong S.S.E. to S.W. gale with fierce squalls, and high sea was met with, ship was compelled to be slowed down, as she was shipping heavy water. The gale seemed to moderate on the 6th, but freshened up again and blew with harder force than formerly. Speed was reduced again until the gale moderated, which was on the 9th, when fresh moderate winds were met with accompanied with heavy swell until arrival. Cargo: 300 cases hinky, 17 cases wine, 11 cases bottles, 5 cases carpets, 6 cases conserves, 4 cases woolens, 3 cases glassware, 27 boxes herrings, 4 cases salmon and sundries.

It has been reported that the German tramp steamer Tolosan, which put into this port in distress a few days ago, has been sold to a Japanese concern for the small consideration of \$60,000. Her cargo of flour and wheat, which was consigned to Vladivostok, Siberia, and which was damaged to a considerable extent by salt water on her rough trip down, is being unloaded here and will be sold at auction. No matter what other things come up, the Tolosan will probably remain here for two or three weeks until she has been fully repaired.

The big Pacific Mail steamship Mongolia, Captain Hathaway, arrived in this port early Sunday morning and left again in the afternoon for the Coast. She carried one of the largest passenger lists away from Honolulu that has been taken on any boat for some time. Nearly ninety people sailed away on the Mongolia for San Francisco. The big steamer had a splendid trip from Japan to this port, not encountering a single day of rough weather on the whole voyage.
