Red And Black Piles Will Mark Fairway

NEW SYSTEM OF INDICATING THE CHANNEL WILL BE INAUGURATED—PILES ON STARBOARD SIDE ENTERING HARBOR WILL BE PAINTED RED—THOSE ON PORT SIDE WILL SHOW BLACK.

Work has been begun on the driving of piles to indicate the fairway of the harbor. The pile driver has been at work the last day putting the piles in place.

It is planned to put five piles on either side of the channel entrance. They will be placed in two rows so that there can be no possibility of the entrance being mistaken. On the starboard side there will be five piles painted red while the five piles on the port side will be painted black. The piles will be placed about 30 feet outward from the edge of the channel so that there will be no danger when the dredging is begun of the piles caving in.

JAPAN SENDS A REFUSAL

A REJECTION OF THE FUNDAMENTAL POINTS IN RUSSIA'S LAST PROPOSAL SAID TO HAVE BEEN SENT BY THE JAPANESE GOVERNMENT—THE SITUATION IN THE ORIENT VERY GRAVE.

TOKIO, Dec. 22.—Japan's reply to Russia's latest proposals has been sent and is reported to be an utter rejection of the fundamental points insisted upon by Russia. The situation is regarded as extremely grave, unless Russia consents to reconsider her demands. War preparations continue, and it is feared that Japan's last answer to the Czar's government may bring about hostilities.

AMERICAN'S BIG CARGO.

The S. S. American of the American-Hawaiian line is discharging one of the largest cargoes ever brought to Honolulu. She is putting out 5,000 tons of general stuff. She will finish discharging and get on a partial load of sugar so as to sail Christmas afternoon for Kahului.

UNKNOWN SHIP SIGHTED TODAY

An unknown ship was sighted today by Diamond Head Charlie. She is coal hauled. She is probably the Henry Villard. There is no wind so she will probably not be able to beat up until tomorrow.

DEFENDANT REPORTED DYING.

E. Paine one of the men who was arrested in the raid of Mrs. Howard's house Saturday night is said to be dying of consumption so the case against him was nolle prossed in the police court today.

MADE MANY CALLS.

United States Judge Dole, District Attorney Breckons and Marshal Hendry this morning paid visits to Admirals Evans and Cooper and the captains of the men of war in port.

TO CONNECT WITH ALAMEDA

Quite an important change is announced by the Wilder S. S. Company in its mail schedule to Hawaii. Commencing with January 1 the company will dispatch the steamer Maui for Mahukona, Kawahae and Hamakua ports at noon so as to sail on the day when the steamer S. S. Alameda arrives from San Francisco. The Alameda arrives at Honolulu every third Friday. The Maui will be operated so as to handle mails, freight and passengers and sail regularly on the date when the Alameda makes this port.

THE SUPERVISORS NEED INTERPRETER

PRELIMINARY MEETING HELD THIS AFTERNOON TO DISCUSS ORGANIZATION OF THE COUNTY'S BUSINESS—DISCUSSION IS INTERPRETED FOR SUPERVISOR MAHOE, ALSO LATTER'S REMARKS.

The meeting of the supervisors this afternoon at two o'clock adjourned to four without doing any business, on account of the absence of Supervisor Hocking. The other six members of the board met in the hall above Castle & Cooke's office and waited half an hour for Hocking, but he did not show up. Gilman suggested that Hocking possibly understood that the hour of meeting was four o'clock as it had been so published through an error. Supervisor Lucas wanted to go ahead with the business of the meeting, and argued very vigorously for action. "We can't be coming up here every day and adjourning for one man," he said. "I have business of my own to attend to. Let's go ahead and do our work and if Mr. Hocking arrives in the meantime we can tell him what we have done. There are six of us here and that is enough." This was in answer to a motion by Supervisor Harvey, that the meeting adjourn to tomorrow morning. Gilman said that Hocking's presence was necessary, as he was one of a committee having figures regarding headquarters. "We shall have to settle upon a meeting place before January," he said, "and meet with heads of departments and decide about their work, so that things may continue on January 4 without interruption. We must also fix the amounts of officials' bonds so that they may have time to get bonded."

Supervisor Robinson also thought that Hocking ought to be present, and an adjournment to four o'clock was taken.

The discussion was interpreted into Hawaiian for the benefit of Supervisor Mahoe, and the latter's remarks were given in English for other members, indicating that interpreting will have to be a feature of the board meetings.

The Fleet May Sail In a Few Days

IT IS NOT IMPROBABLE THAT ADMIRAL EVANS' FLEET MAY SAIL NEXT SUNDAY OR MONDAY FOR CAVITE VIA GUAM—HENCE THE ENTERTAINMENT WILL BE ON SATURDAY NIGHT.

It is not improbable that the fleet may sail Sunday or Monday for Cavite via Guam. While no orders regarding the date of departure of the warships have been received it is not improbable that they will depart on either of those dates. This uncertainty regarding the movements of the vessels has led to a change in the date for the entertainment to be given by the officers of the fleet. It had been thought yesterday that the dance and reception on the battleships Kentucky and Wisconsin should be given next week, but the possible departure of the fleet then caused the committee having the affair in hand, to decide to have the entertainment this week. Saturday night will probably be the date for the dance aboard the two warships. The hours will probably be from 8 p. m. to midnight. The minstrel show which the sailors were talking of giving on the Naval wharf No. 3, Christmas eve, has been abandoned. Only the one affair on Saturday evening will be given.

Coaling of the fleet will be completed today. The cruisers Albany and Raleigh and collier Nanshan are coaling today. After these vessels shall have cleaned ship there will be nothing more to do but to await the arrival of the naval transport Solace and the S. S. Alameda from San Francisco. Admiral Evans has been ordered to take naval stores from those boats. After this work shall have been completed he will notify the Department that he is at its disposal and ready for sea. Definite orders for the departure of the fleet will then probably be cabled to him.

The colliers are to be sent ahead of the fleet. The collier Pompey will sail Thursday morning for Guam via Midway. She will take the mail and any package that people may desire to send to the men at Midway. From Midway the Pompey will proceed to Guam and await the arrival of the fleet. The collier Nanshan is to depart the same day, but will proceed directly to Guam. According to present indications the fleet will depart together and travel together from Honolulu to Guam and probably over to Cavite.

Battalion drill was held at Naval wharf No. 2 this morning by men from the battleship Kentucky. The police have received a list of 18 stragglers from the Kentucky, and other vessels of the fleet. Some of them are marines and others sailors. The crowd are being rapidly rounded up by the officers. Four of them were delivered to the Kentucky this morning.

There will be a game of football this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the baseball park between eleven from the Oregon and Wisconsin. Both of these teams have played before, but the match was a tie. They are evenly matched. They will be no admittance fee charged.

PETITIONS FOR TITLES

THE FIVE NEW MAUI PLANTATION COMPANIES PREPARING TO GET TORRENS LAND TITLES FOR THEIR HOLDINGS OF REAL ESTATE, AS REQUIRED BY THE TERMS OF THE NEW LAND TITLE LAW.

Petitions are being prepared by the five new corporations recently formed on the Island of Maui, in connection with the Kihel deal, to secure Torrens land titles for their holdings. The corporations in question are plantation companies and were formed since the Torrens law was passed. Their petitions for titles will make considerable work for the land court, as their land holdings are extensive.

Under the terms of the Torrens act new corporations are required to get Torrens titles for their lands. In other cases it is a matter of choice, but with newly formed corporations it is compulsory. The five petitions will probably be filed this week.

WILL NOT INDICT

TERRITORIAL GRAND JURY SAID TO HAVE LACKED ONE VOTE TO COMPLETE AN INDICTMENT IN CONNECTION WITH THE INVESTIGATION OF HOUSE VOUCHERS—REPORT IS EXPECTED TOMORROW.

The Territorial Grand Jury has finished with the House vouchers and it is stated that there will be no indictments in connection with them. The jurors are said to have failed to bring an indictment by just one vote. They will report to Judge Robinson tomorrow morning.

The matter will be brought up again before the jury of the January term, it is stated. Owing to the shortness of their time the present jury was not able to go into the matter thoroughly. Some investigation was made, however, and it is understood that the jurors were very near an indictment, having eleven votes in favor of such action.

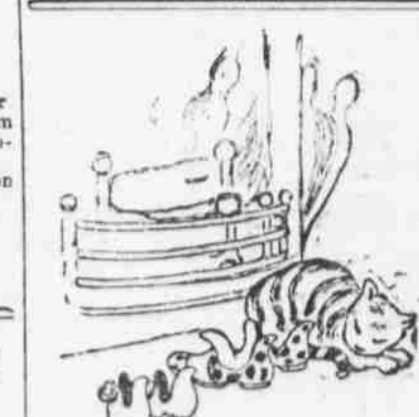

THE NEW RIVAL OF LANTANA

A WEED OR SHRUB THAT IS THREATENING PASTURES ON THE ISLAND OF MAUI.

The first comprehensive account of Pamakani, the plant or shrub of which so much complaint has been heard from Maui during the past year or two, was given in a paper on the subject presented by L. von Tempsky at yesterday's meeting of the Hawaiian Live Stock Breeders' Association. The principal portions of the paper are as follows:

My attention was first drawn to Pamakani about 1885 or '6 at Ulupala. I must have been growing there right along, but it was only when it began to spread over the mauka land that it first attracted itself to me. It was then growing at an altitude of approximately 5,500 feet on the side of a steep hill, the soil being composed principally of cinders with a little loamy top soil; prior to the advent of the Pamakani, Pipiwi, and it grew there quite profusely. This was very soon obliterated by the Pamakani and from that time I noticed a steady increase, slowly at first, but as it began to spread and attain a larger area from which to draw its seed supply, more rapidly growing both mauka and makai till now it can be found as low as 2,900 feet, and as high as six thousand. The elevation it does best at is from four to five thousand feet.

In 1897 it had reached Makawao, and Kaupo in 1900; a distance of about twenty miles in either direction. To give an illustration of the rapidity with which it can spread itself when it reaches a locality which is suitable to its growth, I may tell you that in February, 1901, I went from Kaupo to Makawao through the crater of Haleakala, at an elevation of about 4,500 feet I noticed a few scattering plants of Pamakani, when I made the same trip in May of this year lands to the extent of about five hundred acres was so completely covered with it, that it is impossible for either man or beast to get through.

The conditions in that locality are, frequent light rains and a soil composed of loam and gravel. I have so far seen no Pamakani on the northern side of Maui from Kaupo to Makawao. It may of course be there, but it doesn't seem to be known as a pest in that part of this island. Pamakani will however grow in the parts of Maui where the Trade-wind rains occur, as I have seen a patch of it in the woods near Kauihi growing up amongst dense Hilo grass.

Pamakani is I understand referred in Hitchcock's "Flora of Hawaii" as "Sonsocot" and also "Phuplantines" there being evidently two plants of that name. This shows that Pamakani must have grown on the islands for a long period, and the only reason I can deduce for its not having spread before 1885 and '6, is that probably prior to that date there may have been some insect or blight that kept it in check, which insect or blight must about that time have disappeared.

The so-called Maui Black blight kills Pamakani, but very slowly; also I have noticed this year for the first time, the olinda beetle in certain localities has stripped it perfectly clear of leaves; but as it comes up again from the roots I cannot hold out much hope for that source, for any material help towards its extermination.

Pamakani is perennial grows in a bunch of stems starting direct from the roots, color of stems nearly claret, has a dark green diamond shaped leaf, and a cluster of white flowers at the extreme end of each stem. The seed is very minute, and light, therefore easily carried by the wind. The plant grows in very favorable localities to a height of six and seven feet, but usually about three or four is what is found. It is not a hard plant to dig out having when young very shallow roots; and I have no difficulty in keeping it out of my lands in Makawao; it is only when it becomes thoroughly established that it is hard and expensive to eradicate.

CATTLE FOR DRY LAND RANCHES

A PAPER ON THE MERITS OF DEVONS AS A PROFITABLE MARKET ANIMAL IN HAWAII.

The following interesting paper was read by G. C. Munro at the meeting of the Live Stock Breeders' Association, considering the most suitable breeds of cattle to use to improve and keep up the quality of the island herds where beef production is the principal aim, and taking into consideration the peculiar conditions existing on many of the ranches, periodical scarcity of food, occasional protracted droughts, long distance to water, driving on very hot and dusty roads, or rough rocky trails, and shipping off the coast under very awkward and dangerous conditions. It seems to me that there is more in favor of or less objection to the Devon herd than any other class of cattle.

The characteristics of the Devons, quoting from "Breeds of dairy cattle" Farmer's bulletin No. 196, "Compactness and general beauty, hardiness, activity, intelligence, docility, aptitude to fatten, and quality of milk" are a desirable points to meet the conditions here, and being only a medium size is an advantage, considering that they are heavy weighers for their size, and it is quite likely that on the dry ranches as much weight will be obtained by Devon grades as by the grade of heavier breeds.

As beef animals the Devons have no superior, unless in size, the steers being profitable alike to the grazier and the butcher to the former in the good use made of the feed consumed and to the latter in the amount and quality of the beef on the carcass. As milkers they do not hold first place, but they rear their calves exceptionally well, and on many ranches would probably be as profitable milkers as other breeds; some fair milking records have been made by Devons. As working cattle the steers are first class, getting over the ground more quickly than others, and in Devonshire

were considered equal to horses for plowing.

The Devon bulls are very active and aggressive and if other bulls are on the same pasture the Devons will leave the majority of calves, their strength and sagacity fitting them to vanquish much larger rivals. Their best points are also readily transmitted to their offspring. In my personal experience I have found that under favorable conditions in New Zealand the Devons do not compare with the Durham Short-horn as a general purpose animal, being inferior in milk supply and in furnishing the largest class of store steers that are in demand there.

On the Makawell ranch where a fine class of shorthorn grade cows were kept some years ago, a change having been made from Devons originally carried there, the Shorthorns were too delicate for the range, and it was found desirable to go back to the Devons. The steers from the Devon bulls used in this change were splendid animals, with good points of both breeds and the rustling quality of the Devons, the ranch having good beef cattle during a series of dry years. The Makawell changes were exactly the opposite of my early experience in New Zealand and are an example of difference in conditions giving different results, not that the Devons did not do well there, but the Shorthorns were more profitable the opposite being the case at Makawell.

The grade steers from an importation of Devon bulls to the Makawell Ranch a few years ago, and bred with a fair lot of cows of various strains, are just coming into the market and they are well marked amongst the other stock, their bodies being very full and rounded before the purse fills, whilst other grades with a full purse, denoting prime condition show considerable sleekness in the beef points, a few of the Devons sold last year gave weights up to that of older and larger animals of other breeds, of course some allowance must be made for the fact that the Devons were nearer the pure blood than the others.

The Devon grades keep better condition during the dry season and pick up quicker when the feed improves than most other strains. Other ranches have I believe used the Devon cattle in improving their herds with favorable results.

ELECTRICAL PARTY. W. E. Shaw of Brookline gave an "electrical party" the other night, the feature of which was the exhibition of an electric clock for blind and deaf mutes. Mr. Shaw is deaf and dumb, and he was assisted in demonstrating the workings of his invention by "Tommy" Stringer, blind, deaf and dumb, who is making great progress in the sciences. The clock tells the time, and alarms the sleeper by agitating a lever, which is connected by a string to a pillow, causing the pillow to move up and down, the vibrations being communicated to the sleeper by touch. A circuit is closed by which an electric current is sent through a small incandescent lamp in front of a parabolic mirror, the rays of which are thrown into the face of the sleeper. It releases a spring connected with a hammer, which falls upon a fabricating cap, the noise of which at close quarters is perceptible to a deaf person.

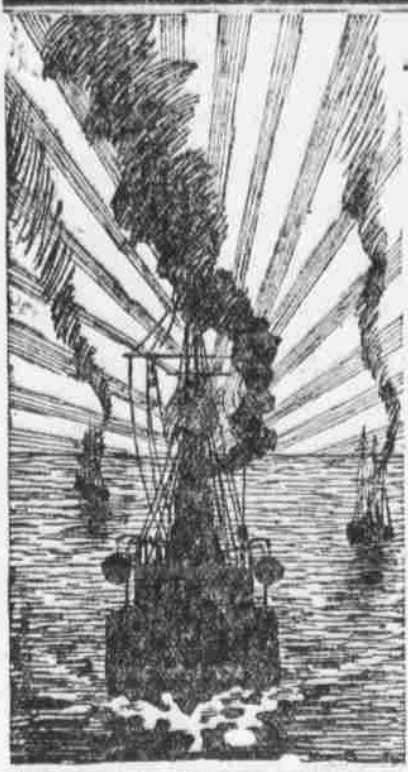

KILAUEA SEEN IN THE NIGHT TIME

BRILLIANT CONURCATIONS OF FIRE HALF-LIGHT UP THE WALLS OF HALEMAUMAU.

Commissioner J. W. Pratt and I took the afternoon train from Hilo and after a twilight drive from Mountain View through the grand Olua tree fern and banana forest reached the Volcano House about 7:30 after a drive through rough roads part of the way.

Commissioner Pratt, Mr. Fischel and I started down to the crater after a good supper. An hour's ride brought us to the corral where the guides tied the horses. I was on foot, by preference in that cool place. A mile of trudging over steaming lava, in the dark, guided by the lanterns of the guides, brought us to the southwest edge of the present small crater of Halemaumau, where the guides had built a low stone wall on the verge of the pit, where one could look back over the yawning gulf beneath to the lights of the Volcano House some four miles distant, up in the dark mass of black beyond. We had no time for this, however, notwithstanding the guide signalled with his lantern for we were fascinated by the sight down in the bottom of the hole, say eight hundred feet below. It was so bright starlight, and no moon. The opposite wall loomed black and forbidding beyond, about one thousand feet by daylight estimate. The steep sides shelving down into the awful pit were underlined by the black mass of lava at the bottom, but blow holes and small flows, cracks and glowing spots, broke up the floor into many lights, and cast an awesome half-light upon the side walls of the monstrous cavern and the terrific silhouette of that enormous pit. Scarcely any steam or smoke was visible. Pele was too busy to be smoking.

An intense white spot perhaps six or eight feet in diameter was most in evidence. Even without glasses this spot shone like a sun out of the black mass on the northern section of the lake. There was a rattle and pebbled cracking as of Chinese New Year crackers and from this hole there spouted lava in thin scintillating stars, much like the standard Fourth of July "volcano" for which boys save their dimes to lay up against that great day.

That cone spouted for a few seconds with much noise and ceased. Immediately a bright gloomy spot on the east quarter began its "stunt." It spouted a mass of lava as an entrance box, and then began to flow out from its spot a fan shaped mass of white hot rock toward the center of the crater slowly and solemnly as molasses would, flow on the marble table at a children's "candy-pull." The spot where the lava oozes out is white hot but the end of the miniature flow soon cools to a brown fringed with white, in sharp contrast to the inky blackness of the lake itself. Between these extremes all values of light from intensest white to blackness mark the mass of slowly flowing rock. By close observation or by the glass one can see the lines of flow-marked like golden watered silk, as distinctly but solemnly moving down the slight cone formed by this small eruption. While we were noting these phenomena, there was quite a patch in the west quadrant of the crater more bright than the cracks of light threading their way in all directions throughout the lake. This lighted from the center and broke out in many directions like the limbs of a squid and two great white glowing eyes broke forth at its center and stared a-while, but closed again in slumber, while another small crater appeared in the south, and began its fan-like flow. It was the turn of the spouting cone to appear again and we were watching its symptoms of coming seasickness when a rattle of rocks falling down the precipice drowned the rattle of the craters in the cone. I had a camera set to catch Pele in the act, when my attention was attracted by the guide picking up his lantern and retreating from the precipitous bank. Major Pratt noted the same. He gave a silent order to retreat with the guide and of course I had to follow the Major's lead, tumbling through the darkness from the awful rattle of rocks falling into the pit. It ceased, however. The guide stopped. The Major like Sheridan came up to stop the rout, when the guide stopped, and we went to the front again. The cone spouted gaily, the flowing cone separated into two lights, broke out and flowed into one, the caving rocks broke loose again the guide shamed by the Major stood to his breastworks, and we saw a second repetition of the stunt before we left for the Volcano House at eleven o'clock.

Post to Madame Pele, may she never grow old.

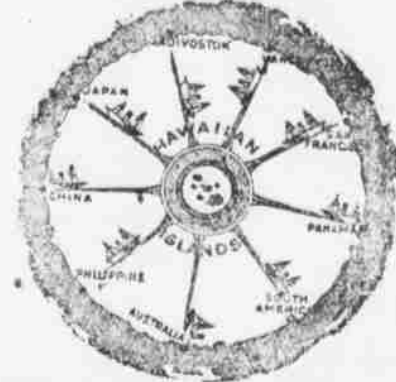
