EDITORIAL NOTES.

Some of the water running to waste in the burnt district, could be usefully employed in the street-cleaning operation. So dry is the muck swept up by the scavengers, that the wind raises it in clouds before the gathered heaps are carted away.

The widening of the old streets and the opening of new ones in the burnt district, as proposed by the Minister of Interior and recommended by the jury appointed to inspect and report, will effect a material revolution in that portion of the city. The carrying out of the changes contemplated will be the accomplishment of a great good and the production of an obvious improvement. Narrow, dismal thoroughfares will be substituted by wide, open streets, and parts that could previously be reached only through dark lanes will in the new city be accessible through proper streets. The increase in size and number of streets will proportionately diminish the building area, but the increase of value of what remains will at least cover the loss sustained by land owners in the reduction of size. It is to be hoped that everybody interested will see the wisdom of the proposals, and in no way attempt to obstruct their execution.

THE BURNT DISTRICT.

REPORT OF JURY ON IMPROVEMENTS.

The jury appointed on Wednesday last, by His Honor Chief Justice Judd, to view the fire district, and report upon the plan of proposed improvements submitted by His Excellency the Minister of the Interior, met yesterday morning and at once began the discharge of their functions. In their exploration of the burnt district, the jury were accompanied by Marshal J. H. Soper; Messrs. J. F. Brown and C. J. Lyons, of the Government Survey; Mr. Julius H. Smith, Superintendent of Public Works, and Mr. C. W. Hart, Road Supervisor. Having thoroughly inspected the ground, the jury agreed to recommend improvements as follow:—

1. The widening of Bethel street throughout its length to fifty (50) feet, from the Ewa side of the Post Office.
2. The widening of Rose Lane to forty (40) feet, from the Waikiki side of Messrs. Castle & Cooke's premises.
3. The widening of Nuuanu street, between King and Hotel streets, to fifty (50) feet, from the present line on the Ewa side.
4. The widening and straightening of the line of Smith and Meek streets to a clear width of fifty (50) feet, from Beretania to King streets, as indicated on the accompanying map.
5. The widening and straightening of Maunakea street to a clear width of fifty (50) feet throughout its length, condemning for this purpose as far as possible an equal area on each side of the present street line.
6. The opening of a new street of fifty (50) feet clear width from the proposed extension of Hotel street to the proposed extension of Queen street, parallel with and one hundred and eighty (180) feet north-westerly from the proposed new line of Maunakea street.
7. The extension of Queen street, from the Fish Market to King street, with a clear width of fifty (50) feet, as indicated on the map.
8. The widening of King street to a clear width of fifty-six (56) feet, running south from Haalilimanu bridge, as indicated on the map.
9. The widening and extension of Hotel street to the full width of fifty (50) feet, from its present mauka side, beginning at the Ewa side of the Campbell block and running northwesterly to the Nuuanu stream.
10. The opening of a new street of a clear width of fifty (50) feet, which shall commence at a point on

the Ewa side of Nuuanu street, two hundred and fifty (250) feet mauka of Hotel street, and run north-westerly parallel with Hotel street to the Nuuanu stream, and at a distance of eighty (80) feet from said stream, a new street, running, in a general manner, parallel with the stream to King street, as indicated on the map.

RICE AND SUGAR.

Williams, Dimond & Co.'s circular, per S. S. Rio de Janeiro, San Francisco, April 13, says:

There is no change to note in the condition of our local market. Refined is in good demand. Shipments of raw sugar continue to go forward to the Eastern States under the low rates. The railroad companies are expected to advance rates the latter part of the present week, at which time these shipments will probably cease. Since our last report prices of raws have advanced in New York, and a firmer feeling has prevailed. Cuba centrifugals 96 percent test have advanced 3-16c per lb. The business transacted has been of moderate proportions, but the market has developed quite a buoyant temper and the situation presents a more encouraging aspect than for some time past. Advances from London have also been more favorable, and although beet has only advanced a little, still the market has continued steady for some time, and this has had the desired effect on the New York market. Buyers have shown more confidence to replenish their stocks, and cover future requirements, and the strong statistical position of supplies has enabled holders to gradually advance their views and insist upon higher prices.

It is worth noting that Germany made 245,000 tons from Feb. 1st to Sept. 1st, 1885, while this year during same time only 90,000 tons remain to be made, and the quantity afloat on rivers and in Hamburg, not included in stocks, in this year 125,000 tons less than last year. Austria and other countries will also make 75,000 to 100,000 tons less for the remainder of this season than for some time last year. Latest telegraphic advices from New York quote Cuba centrifugals 96 percent test 5 11-16c; market firm and advancing. London, same date, beets 88 percent test 12s 7d. European and foreign markets steady.

RICE.—With free receipts of the Eastern article, Island rice is salable at not over 4 1/2c net to 4 3/4c at 60 days.

Mr. Levey will still to-morrow morning, at 10 o'clock, two old buildings on Nuuanu street, above the Royal Hotel.

The Mutual Telephone Company have restored all their wires destroyed by the late fire, and completed their connections.

The Rio de Janeiro landed 108 Chinese here yesterday, and took hence 117 for Hongkong. She sailed this afternoon.

THERE is a considerable batch of prisoners in the cells keeping Good Friday, there being no session of the Police Court to-day.

Dr. John Herman Zuckertort, the great chess player, now in San Francisco, attributes his defeat by Herr Steinitz to sickness.

MR. NOLTE this afternoon warmed the gastronomic department of the BULLETIN with hot coffee, to go with Horn's and Love's buns.

REV. ALVIN OSTROM, whose arrival by the W. H. Dimond was recorded in yesterday's issue, has come to take charge of the foreign church at Kohala, Hawaii.

We are under obligation to His Excellency the Minister of the Interior for a splendid map of the burnt district, showing the proposed new streets, etc.

A DONATION of books, consisting of 10 volumes, has been presented to the Honolulu Library and Reading Room Association, by Mr. Hutchinson, of Gonsalves and Co.

A TYPOGRAPHICAL transposition yesterday made officer Reynolds supervise the anchoring of the S. S. Rio de Janeiro, instead of the landing of her passengers in quarantine.

THE Benedicts vs. Hawaii play to-morrow at Makiki, and Dodd's bus leaves for the grounds at 3 o'clock. The match will be enlivened by the playing of the Royal Hawaiian Band.

MR. E. B. THOMAS'S horse came dashing down Fort street this morning, with broken shafts and entangled harness dangling about him. He was stopped at the water front and taken up to town.

E. P. ADAMS & Co. sell the Daigle premises on Pensacola street, again, at noon to-morrow, the former sale having been disallowed by the Supreme Court, on an objection raised by the widow.

THE children and young people of the Bethel Union Sunday School are requested to be at the Lyceum on Nuuanu Avenue to-morrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, to rehearse for the Easter services on Sunday evening.

HARNO LUNG KEE & Co.'s safe, manufactured by McNeale & Urban, was opened yesterday by the combination. The external parts exhibited symptoms of exposure to considerable heat, but the inside bore no marks of fire whatever.

Two German families were burned out on Sunday last, making, with the case given in this paper yesterday, at least three white families then rendered homeless. One of the German households was accommodated in the hospital building of the Reformatory School.

MR. F. HORN this afternoon sent the children of the Kakaako Branch Leper Hospital, through the BULLETIN office agency, a generous treat of hot cross buns and candy. At the same time his benevolence has not failed to reach the employees of this establishment.

J. A. KAMAHOA, a promising young Hawaiian who had been studying at King's College, London, died at Torquay, Devonshire, on March 26. He had gone to England in 1882, along with Matthew Makalua and A. C. Pianaia, and was an apt learner. The European climate has proved fatal to his Hawaiian constitution.

THE Bell Telephone Company are advancing rapidly with the restoration of the wires destroyed by the late fire. Our item of two days ago seems to have been misunderstood in some quarters. The item referred to stated that connection between every instrument and the Central had been established, which was perfectly correct, and not that the private wires had been all replaced.

AMONG the heroes of the late fire is Frank May, who escaped with life but not without injury. He was working with the hose of Engine Co. No. 2, on the second floor of a house on Maunakea street, when the floor gave way, and he was precipitated among the ruins below. He was badly burned about the head and painfully bruised in other parts of the body. When dragged out he was in a state of unconsciousness, and although now able to be around is still in a pitiable condition.

THEO. H. DAVIES, Esq., writes to this morning's "Advertiser," recommending the raising of a fund for the relief of sufferers by the late fire. Following is the final paragraph of the communication:—"If this proposal finds a generous response, I will gladly be one of five contributors of \$1,000 each, or one of ten contributors of \$500 each, and I venture to think that a subscription list so commenced would be liberally supported. I trust that this proposal may be considered of sufficient interest to justify the calling of a meeting at an early date for the inauguration of a general relief fund, and the appointment of a committee for carrying it into execution."

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE Y. M. C. A.

The annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. met, pursuant to adjournment from the 15th inst., last evening in the hall of the Association building. Mr. J. B. Atherton presided at the opening. With him, on the platform, were the President elect, Mr. W. A. Bowen, and Rev. A. O. Forbes. Miss Hesse Dickson acted pianist for the occasion. The meeting opened with the singing of hymns, and prayer by Mr. Forbes.

The statement of the year's finances was presented by Mr. T. S. Southwick, Treasurer:—

Mr. W. A. Bowen read the report of the committee on devotional meetings, showing that two public preaching services, 124 noonday meetings and 50 Sunday evening meetings had been held since last annual meeting, and that a decided impetus had been given to the work of the Association by the visit of Mr. McCoy and the arrival of Mr. S. D. Fuller, General Secretary, in the early part of the year.

The temperance committee's report was read by Mr. P. C. Jones. From April 18th, 1885, to March 20th, 1886, 49 meetings had been held, the smallest attendance being 8, the largest 48, and the average 21.

The report of the committee on entertainments, by Mr. Theo. H. Davies, enumerated 9 entertainments, and made a cordial acknowledgment of the valuable assistance rendered by the ladies and other friends in making the entertainments occasions of great interest to the public as well as to the Association. The report stated that, "It is probable that this association may vie with any other in the city in the record of its production of music, the consumption of ice cream and the development of that genial glow which warms men's hearts and makes them feel their brotherhood."

The Reading Room committee's report, in the absence of the chairman, Rev. C. M. Hyde, D. D., was read by Mr. W. W. Hall. The attendance at the reading room, during the year, aggregated 14,248. The tables have been supplied with two dailies, 37 weeklies, and 12 monthlies, of which 6 are local, 2 each. Of the monthlies, 2 are literary, 3 religious, 1 art, 1 juvenile, 1 commercial and 1 German. The weeklies are classed: 15 secular, 11 religious, 4 illustrated, 1 scientific, 1 literary, 1 reform, 1 juvenile, 1 Portuguese and 2 German. Contributions of 17 weeklies have been made by Hon. A. F. Judd, Messrs. Theo. H. Davies, P. C. Jones, T. R. Walker and A. Sheppard. The room is open from 9 A. M. to 10 P. M. daily, except on public holidays.

The General Secretary's report gave a resume of the year's doings, accounts of which appeared, in due course, in the columns of this paper, and, on behalf of the association, tendered grateful acknowledgments to the gentleman who generously donated the oil paintings adorning the walls of the hall; the Government officials for two fine maps for the reading room; the donors of 135 cane seat chairs; the young men who paid for the royal palms ornamenting the grounds in front of the building; the contributors of papers and magazines; the ladies who presented a handsome covering for the hall-table and book-rest; the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and all other friends "who have made us so deliciously cool with ice cream;" the gentleman who purchased the dishes in which to receive the ice cream, and who stands with open purse to meet deficits in the finance department; the gentleman who

paid the bill for parlor games; the merchant who, in the early part of the year, donated a lot of crockery; that large circle of pleasant friends who, by musical and literary genius, kindly helped at entertainments, making every one of them a grand success; the ladies who have beautified the hall this evening with tasteful floral and other decorations; the press of the city, and the DAILY BULLETIN in particular, for the helpful notices of the association's work, and the full and accurate reports of meetings and lectures; and, on his own behalf, personally, to the members and friends of the association for the warm-hearted welcome accorded the General Secretary in their homes and elsewhere.

An address was delivered by Mr. J. B. Atherton, retiring president, in which was an ably presented demonstration, from a commercial as well as moral standpoint, of the importance of a due observance of the Sabbath or Rest-day, with quotations from the Hon. W. Gladstone, Lord Macaulay, and other eminent persons of both Europe and America bearing upon the subject.

A motion was adopted that the directors make arrangements to have the retiring president's address, together with all the reports of the evening, published in one number of The Friend as the annual Report of the Honolulu Y. Unger, Dr. Brodie, C. B. Wilson and J. W. Hingley. The marksmen will have ten shots apiece at each range. The shooting for prizes at Fort-street gallery continues to attract Honolulu crack shots. 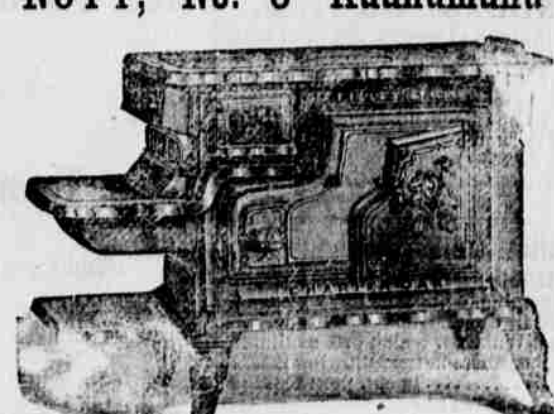

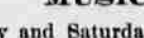
