

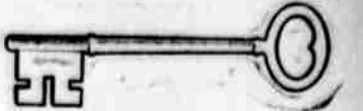

## LADIES COMMITTEE FOR PACIFIC FLEET TARIFF CONFERREES MAKE FINAL PLANS

### Million Dollar Ditch Will Soon Be Started

Arrangements for the floating of the million-dollar bond issue by the Hamakua Ditch Company, which is to pay for the construction of the proposed lower ditch, have been practically completed, and within a couple of months this great piece of engineering work will be started.

These good tidings were brought this morning by F. M. Lewis and J. T. McCrossen, who returned in the Alameda after an absence from the Territory of ten months.

"We spent most of the time we were away in North Germany and England," said McCrossen this morning. "We made two trips to the latter place from San Francisco, and there we made arrangements with a syndicate for the floating of \$800,000 of the million-dollar bond issue, \$200,000 of the total being taken up in Hawaii. The arrangements have not been completed owing to the fact that the syndicate which has taken

### Final Arrangements For Tariff Meeting

Next Monday evening the first big meeting for the discussion of tariff ever held in the Islands will come off in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce. This morning Governor Frear was visited by those men who have been taking the most active interest in this work, and preliminary plans for the meeting were discussed, although nothing definite was done. Prince Cupid, Mr. McClellan, Mr. Tenney, W. O. Smith, James F. Morgan and others were present at the conference in the Governor's office, and the general proposition of what matters were to be taken up were discussed.

No resolutions of any nature have yet been drafted, as all this will be taken up at the meeting Monday evening. Governor Frear and the Delegates have fathered the tariff discussion to the greater extent all through, feeling that, in a measure, the industrial welfare of the Islands depends on the tariff.

The special session of Congress will undoubtedly be called immediately after the inauguration of the new President, about March third, and it is the intention of the Governor to have the

### WILDER APPEALS PINEAPPLE CASES

Will Fight Exemption Allowed By Tax Court

Certificates of appeal from the decisions of the Tax Appeal Court with regard to the pineapple companies have been filed by Tax Assessor Chas. T. Wilder, and were placed on record this morning. The pineapple companies of Oahu were all allowed exemption under the law by the recent decision of the Tax Appeal Court, and it is to these exemptions that Wilder takes exception.

The cases will be fought through the Supreme Court of the Territory. The Wahiawa Pineapple Company, whose property valuation is placed at \$89,885, was allowed a total exemption and this will be contested, as will also the exemption of the Hawaiian Pineapple Company, in which the valuation of the property in dispute is named at \$144,957.93. An appeal has been taken by the Tax Assessor also in the exemption allowed the Honolulu Packing Company, with a property valuation of \$25,625, and in the Pearl City Fruit Company, whose property valuation is placed at \$66,072.

### AUDITOR FISHER'S REPORT COMPLETED

Disbursements For Year Largely Exceed Receipts

The annual report of J. H. Fisher, Auditor of the Territory of Hawaii, has been completed and has been printed in pamphlet form. Auditor Fisher sums up the work of his department during the past year in the following letter to the Governor, which introduces the pamphlet: Honorable W. F. Frear, Governor of the Territory of Hawaii.

Dear Sir:—In pursuance of Section 1516, Revised Laws, I have the honor to transmit herewith the report of this Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908.

By reference to the comparative statement of the receipts and disbursements of the revenue of the Territory on pages 53-59 you will notice that the disbursements exceeded the receipts for the year by \$146,922.49, which is accounted for in part by the payment to the Counties of one-half of the amount collected on account of licenses, or \$102,590.14.

### MONEY QUESTION STUMPS COMMITTEE

But It Decides To Use Atlantic Fleet Funds

The principal difficulty encountered at the first meeting of the Pacific Fleet Committee, which took place this afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, was the question as to whether the funds turned over to it as a balance of the Atlantic Fleet Committee funds could be expended for the entertainment of the Pacific Fleet, whereas it had been originally subscribed for the entertainment of the Atlantic Fleet, without first obtaining the consent of the subscribers. This matter was discussed at some length, but finally it was decided that it would be practically impossible to obtain such consent, and that it might be considered safe to assume that the donors would offer no objections.

The meeting was presided over by G. W. Smith, those present being Smith, H. P. Wood, A. L. C. Atkinson, F. L. Waldron, and L. T. Peck.

Smith stated that the Governor had suggested that the best work could be done by limiting the number of members on the committee. He suggested that one man be chosen as the head of each sub-committee with power to appoint his associates, not to exceed five.

Waldron suggested that the entertainment on the part of the committee be limited to a trip to Pearl Harbor, and to let the hotels look after balls, receptions, etc.

Smith said that some ladies had asked him to let them give a subscription ball for the Fleet and also a garden party. He added that no additional funds were needed.

L. T. Peck was elected treasurer of the committee.

Smith said that he thought that the entertainment should be limited to sports, Pearl Harbor trip, and a ball.

Waldron said he did not think that

### KALAKIELA GOOD GAMBLER CATCHER

Figures Show He Beats Records Of Former Months

In order to refute the statements which have been made to the effect that Chief of Detectives Kalakiela has not made as many arrests of gamblers since he took that position as was done previous to that time, Sheriff Lauka has had a statement compiled which shows the number of arrests made for this offense during Kalakiela's incumbency as compared with the number made for the same cause during the last three months of his predecessor's regime.

Kalakiela's record is as follows:

July 27	10	19
July 30	15	3
August 13	38	68

To which may be added a large number, as the cases of a number of gamblers are still in court.

The arrests made for gambling during the three months previous to Kalakiela's appointment were as follows:

The latter figure includes many of the arrests made by Kalakiela, as can be seen by referring to the figures above.

### ONE SALARY ALL OFFICIAL CAN DRAW

Thompson's Bill Makes Test Of Old Question

Attorney General Hemenway has filed his brief for the auditor in the matter of the appeal of L. T. Peck, A. F. Judd, A. J. Perry, and James A. Thompson from a ruling of the auditor. Thompson was recently employed to do some type-writing work by one of the Territorial Boards, and he did this outside of his regular office hours, working at night. He put in a bill for \$60, which was turned down by the auditor, on the grounds that a Territorial employee cannot receive compensation for employment on two Territorial jobs that exceeds the highest salary paid for his regular office.

This is also the stand taken by the Attorney General,—that Thompson when he accepted two positions, could, under the law, accept only the highest salary attached to one of them.

### FIGHT IS RENEWED ON STANDARD OIL

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 21.—The Government has filed a petition for a rehearing before the Court of Appeals of the famous twenty-nine-million-dollar Standard Oil case.

The decision of Judge Landis against the Standard Oil people and levying a heavy fine was reversed by the Court of Appeals. This brought out a criticism of the court by President Roosevelt that was interpreted by enemies of the Administration as an attack on the legal system of the country. Frank Kellogg of Minnesota will conduct the Government's case. Attorney General Bonaparte gave out the following statement of his plan of action:

"The government will make every effort in its power to secure a revision of recent decision and opinion of the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Seventh District in the case of the Standard Oil Co., of Indiana, either by the Court of Appeals itself, or if necessary by the Supreme Court of the United States. LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 4.—Acting under orders from President Roosevelt, Professor Jeremiah Jenks of Cornell and Professor Fernando Sanford of Stanford are in Los Angeles to conduct an investigation of the immigration service. They have visited several other cities of the Coast, where inquiries have been instituted in connection with alleged smuggling cases. A significant fact in connection with the visit of the commissioners here at this time is the unusual activity displayed by the inspectors of immigration along the Mexican border. Several arrests have been made lately by the officers and reports have been circulated that organized bands of smugglers were bringing Chinese coolies into the United States by the hundreds. A new record for wireless telegraphy was established when the operator at Point Loma, Cal., succeeded in establishing a connection with the Connecticut, flagship of Admiral Sperry of the Atlantic battle-ship fleet, which was 2900 miles away.

SYDNEY FLEET PROGRAM

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 21.—During the afternoon of Friday following the arrival of the American Fleet and the official calls, the men from the battleships landed and paraded through the principal streets of the city, being the first armed body of foreigners to march on Australian soil since the establishment of the present government. For the parade the government waived the law forbidding forces to land with their arms from visiting warships. The paraders were given a great reception from the citizens.

ANOTHER LUSITANIA RECORD NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 20.—The Cunarder S. S. Lusitania arrived today from Queenstown, establishing a new trans-Atlantic record. She made the run in 4 days 15 hours.

CHINA CARRIES 500 SUBMARINE MINES Steamer Due Monday Has Unique Cargo For Manila Five hundred huge submarine mines to be used in the defense of the Philippine Islands are in the hold of the P. M. S. S. China, due here Monday en route to the Orient. The fact that the China will call at Manila on her way to Hongkong explains the reason for the shipment being made by the Pacific Mail line. It is reported another large consignment of the mines will be taken by the steamer Asia, to sail from San Francisco September 8th.

EDITORIAL: Gun carriages, a vast amount of ammunition, and several submarine mines have been forwarded to the Philippines within the last few months, but this lot of half a thousand heavy zinc mines, only one of which, loaded with the customary charge of explosives, is able to blow a battleship to atoms, is the first notable shipment of submarines forwarded to the archipelago. Most of them are to be used in the defense of Manila harbor and Subig Bay, but there are apparently enough to provide for the protection of every port or landing of any consequence in the Philippines. The mines resemble anchoring buoys, but are more substantially made, and weigh nearly 200 pounds each, without the charge of explosives. Needless to say, the mines are not yet loaded. A close-fitting screw forms the top of each one, and wires to be attached to the mines near the cap will lead to the explosives inside. By electrical current, or by contact with the top of the mine, to be a few feet below the surface, explosion is effected. In addition to the mines the China carries 2000 tons of general supplies for the government at Manila, the freight consisting of all kinds of stores for the army. The same character of supplies is usually sent forward in the transports, but space for the supplies now being forwarded is

Fortunately, there was carried over from the last period the large balance of \$313,476.02 of available cash; this has now been reduced, at the beginning of the second year of the period, to an available balance of \$165,845.48 and will require the strictest economy on the part of the heads of the several departments to conduct the business of their departments to the end of the period without the necessity of the registration of warrants by the Treasurer. I am publishing in this report a balance sheet of the books of the Territory showing a debit to Surplus Account of \$3,549,466.04. This account would, of course, show a large credit balance if there was some provision of law for the valuation of the real and personal property of the Territory and the values so determined could be charged against the several properties on a property ledger. **NEW PROMOTION MEMBERS MEET**

R. L. Turner of San Francisco wrote asking the committee if he could get in this Territory a flower known as the gulena sorrel. He will be furnished with the necessary information.

A message from a passenger on board the Matson liner Lurline was received in the city on Wednesday evening by way of San Francisco.

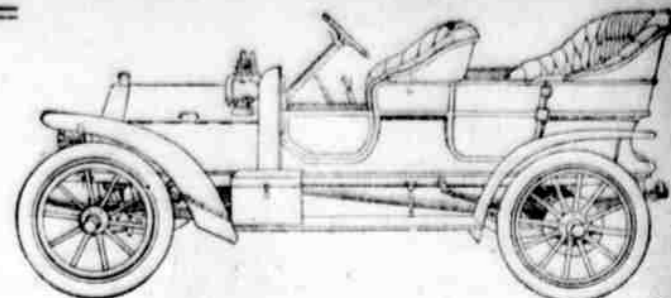

interest of the impartial and effective administration of our laws, such action on the part of the Government is imperatively demanded by the circumstances of the case and the possible consequence if this opinion should stand as an authority without question by the Government.

"To this end an application for a re-argument of the case and a motion for a modification of the opinion will be submitted to the Circuit Court on behalf of the United States at the earliest possible moment. Other appropriate steps will be taken afterwards, their character to be determined by the court's action on this application. The pending prosecutions in which the giving or receiving of rebates or offenses of like character are charged, will be pressed to trial and judgment by the government with all possible energy and as promptly as may be practicable. In the view of the government's legal advisers the reversal of the judgment in the case recently decided in no wise affects the merits of that controversy or the necessity and duty of bringing to punishment if possible in this connection any other cases, any individual or corporation shown to have evaded or defied the laws."
