### A SOUTHERN WOMAN'S BOLDNESS—AN INCIDENT OF THE CIVIL WAR.

There was a funeral of a woman near New Haven, Ind., recently who came near being the cause of a deal of bloodshed at one hour of her existence. It is a fact well known to old soldiers that Southern woman were very loyal to the Southern cause, and that their loyalty often led to difficulties between the Federal soldiers. Margaret Wilson was an Alabamian by birth, and a firm believer in Southern rights. When the Union forces occupied Memphis she was to be seen at almost all hours of the day engaged in something which would exasperate the Yankees.

One day in the summer of 1863 many prisoners were arriving in Memphis from Arkansas, and were being guarded on the levee by some men of the Fifty-fourth Ohio. Mrs. Wilson came down in sight of the prisoners and their guards, having her little Rebel flag, which she waved over her head. The prisoners saw it and began to cheer it. The Captain saw the cause of this sudden outbreak of loyalty, and going up to the woman, ordered her not to display that flag again. But no sooner had he turned from her than she pulled a little piece of painted muslin from her bosom, where she had thrust it when the Captain came up, and flourished it again. The Captain turned to her, trembling with excitement and anger, and told her if she dared to show her flag again he should arrest her. By this time there were probably 5,000 persons on the levee, attracted by the cheering. Everyone expected bloodshed and that the few Union soldiers would be mobbed and killed before assistance could come. The Captain bestowed some vigorous words on the offending woman and turned to leave her. He had not gone ten steps before out came the little flag, and high above her head she flourished it. The Southerners cheered as if his horned majesty himself had arrived in their midst. The Captain turned on the offending woman, white with anger, and, rushing up to her with clenched fist, had so far forgotten himself as to be about to strike her, and would have done so had not Lieutenant A. C. Gregory of the Thirty-second Wisconsin seized his arm.

Lieutenant Gregory, who had just come up with about thirty men, then undertook to arrest the offender, and she resisted with all the tactics known to women. She threw herself on the ground—kicked, scratched, and yelled. The situation was critical in the extreme. The crowd, numbering many thousands, was one swaying mass of yelling, angry men, and all sympathizing with the woman. A sergeant and private were trying to gather the woman up in some shape in order to carry her, while the mob was closing in on every side. The Lieutenant, drawing his revolver, stepped toward the crowd, and shouted that he would shoot the first man who advanced a step nearer, ordering his men to do the same. Thus the angry men were held at bay for a moment, and then an Indiana regiment came hurrying forward, and, at the point of the bayonet, cleared their way to their comrades. Mrs. Wilson was taken to headquarters, and the next morning was sent outside of the Union lines. She passed through many scenes during the way, but she was never so near to causing death as on that morning when the Memphis mob surrounded Lieutenant Gregory and his thirty men of the Thirty-second Wisconsin.—*Decatur (Ind.) Dispatch to the Cincinnati Enquirer.*

## WHY MORE FISH?

It is said that fresh fish has become more abundant in the Honolulu market during the last month or two past than for the previous few months, and in response to our query, Why? two different reasons have been assigned by two different parties. The first is, that the prevailing winds of the winter months cause certain kinds of small fish to retreat to shallow water, near the land, thus placing themselves within reach of the fisherman's net. The other reason given is this, that the occupation of catching and bringing fish to market is being quietly and quickly monopolized by Chinamen, and that these Chinamen being more industrious, patient, and persistent than the native fishermen, succeed in filling their nets when the latter would fail from lack of those attributes. Whether this be the true reason of increased supply or not, it is a fact that much, if not most, of the fish bought and sold at the fish market, is caught and brought there by Chinamen; and it is not improbable that this means of livelihood and source of revenue to the native Hawaiian will ere long be completely controlled by the unobtrusively aggressive Celestial. Well-wishers of the native race are constrained to exclaim, What a pity that the rightful occupant of the soil should thus tamely submit to be pushed to the wall!

## SHIPPING NOTES.

Capt. McIntyre has kindly lent us a Hull paper containing an account of the loss of the Fiona, off the English Coast, last December. She was bound from San Francisco to Hull, with a cargo of wheat. The shore was strewn with wreckage, reduced to a little better than match-wood. The captain's wife met her husband at Falmouth, but came to Hull by train, and was in the town when news of the wreck of the ship and the loss of all hands, including her husband, arrived.

## LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

Work has been started again on the lower end of Fort Street.

Messrs G. W. Macfarlane & Co., have removed to their new premises on the corner of Fort and Queen Streets.

Why is the Hon Godfrey Rhodes appointed a member of the Board of Immigration? Are we to have East Indian coolies at last?

We are requested to state, by Mr. Cecil Brown, that he has refused to have any thing further to do with the Coronation Races.

A public reception will take place at the Palace to-day, from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m., after which the Palace will be thrown open for inspection.

We hear that the Ministry have appointed Mr. F. S. Pratt to the position of Registrar of Public Accounts, vice Mr. G. Brown.

We understand, officially, that it is not the intention of the new members of the Board of Education to discharge any of the employees already in its service.

We are constantly hearing such stories as these: The Government is charged \$2 a day for labor on the roads or other works, and the men

only get \$1½. The locale of the story varies slightly, but the main fact is always the same. Now, if this be true the Government is being swindled.

Some one has had the goodness to fill up those dangerous holes on King Street beyond the soap works. He deserves the thanks of the community.

On Sunday evening last the Rev. H. H. Parker's Post Office box was broken open, and it is believed a certain letter was taken from it. The thief is suspected.

The present Ministry have shown themselves plucky at last. Perhaps, however, they wish it to be said that they died game. If so, we hope their wish will be gratified.

The question was asked yesterday, referring to the Ministry, "On what kinds of meat doth this, Our Caesar, feed?" and the reply given was, "Probably on Lanai mutton."

The Steamers Iwalani and Like-like sailed at the same hour last evening. As both steamers have lately been cleaned and thoroughly overhauled, some fast traveling may be expected.

The invitation to the Ball seem to have been issued with great discrimination, as many of our best citizens who have never before been omitted from such gatherings have been left out this time.

We understand that that bad piece on the Waikiki road is not the fault of the Road Supervisor at all, but of some private person who obtained the necessary authority to repair it and did so.

Our West Maui correspondent writes us that that part of the island has been visited with a very unusual rainstorm. For more than a week it rained every day and part of the time the rain fell very fast, for the lee side. It seemed like Hilo.

Our attention is drawn to the fact that one of the express drivers' regulations is almost constantly evaded. We refer to the wearing of the badge on the left breast conspicuously. Many do not wear it at all, while others hide it under their cap or wear it on their hat.

We understand that His Majesty gave orders to his staff and others on Saturday night to invite those ladies and gentlemen of their friends whom they might see in the grounds to come up to the upper balcony. His Majesty made no distinction as to who was to come up but left that to their judgment. An over officious person made himself still more obnoxious by preventing some of those thus invited from coming up and kept them on the lower verandah. Well may His Majesty exclaim, "Save me from my friends."

We have now two Boards of Education in this country. This curious state of affairs comes about in the following way. Late on Monday evening a note was sent by the Premier to each member of the Board stating that His Majesty had commanded him to ask for their resignations. Owing to the lateness of the hour at which they were received no reply was forwarded. Next morning in the "By Authority" columns of the Hand-organ a notice appeared appointing other gentlemen Members of the Board vice the previous members resigned. Now those gentlemen had not resigned and we understand they have refused to do so. So that we have two Boards of Education on our hands at the present time.

If there is one thing more calculated than another to inspire the public and foreign capitalists with confidence in the splendid mismanagement of our Finances, after the retention in office for 9 months of Mr. Kaai, it is the dismissal of a capable, business-like, and thoroughly trustworthy and reliable man like Mr. Godfrey Brown, from his position as Registrar of Public Accounts. Owing to the way in which the

Chiefs of the Finance Office has been selected during the present Ministry it required a man of that kind to run the office, and they had one. Now they have dismissed him and that without any reasons being assigned. Would this be tolerated in any other country?

MR. EDITOR:—A great deal has been written about forming a society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals but up to the present time no one has been found willing to take the matter in hand. At the present time, when the roads are in such a heavy state, owners and drivers seem to have little or no compassion for their stock—drays and wagons are piled up with goods without any heed of weight. On Monday several bullock teams were employed hauling stone, and it was estimated—by parties well informed as to weights—that each cart contained from 2½ to 3 tons of stone. Each cart was drawn by four bullocks, and it was only by a severe application of whips, kicks and pokes that the poor brutes were able to drag the load a few yards at a time without resting. Every body knows that an ox cart, empty, is a heavy vehicle, but to load one with, say, 2 tons, and compel 4 half-fed bullocks to drag it through the streets in their present condition, is an outrageous outrage. Officer Wond is doing splendid work among hacks and hackmen, and if the Authorities would invest this officer with a little more power, in regarding to overloading drays, cruelty to animals would soon be a thing of the past.

## LONDON GOSSIP.

An amusing incident has just occurred in Dublin, showing how zealous are the newly imported marines, in discharging the duties for which they have been brought over. On the second day of entering upon their somewhat uncomfortable service, the Archbishop gave a dinner at the Palace in St. Stephen's Green, and, as one or two "unpopular" guests had been bidden to the feast, two of the new force, in their role of detectives, were stationed furtively on the watch outside. Most of the company had arrived, when a suspicious-looking person, wrapped in a long cloak, was seen hovering about the entrance to the house. Suddenly, as a carriage containing one of the "unpopulars" drove to the door, the suspected one advanced, and was just feeling stealthily beneath his cloak, when he was pounced upon by the watchful marines, who, with a "Not so fast, Mister," took him captive.

It turned out, however, that their prisoner was no less a personage than the Bishop of Ossory, who, fearing that he might be too early, had been waiting until he saw a vehicle approach with some other guests, and had then proceeded to feel in his pocket to make sure that he had not forgotten his latchkey, before ascending the steps.

I mentioned before that the cashier of the Moscow Foundling Hospital had defrauded that institution, of the sum of 340,000 roubles, and been sent to Tomsk to spend the money there. I have now before me a trustworthy Moscow paper which states that during the last year or two, the defalcations and embezzlements of a dozen Russian officials amount to a grand total of twenty-seven million roubles. First on the list is Rykov, director of the Skopin-sky Bank; evidently a financial genius; for he has spirited away

**The Magnesio-Calcite Fire Proof Safes,**

twelve million roubles. Then follow some technicians of Odessa, who have calmly defrauded the Government of six millions, in provender. Third on the list is the Cashier of the Bank of Cherson. The building took fire, one fine evening, but the flames were extinguished, before any damage was done; except of course a trifling deficit of two or three millions. The Director of the Bank at Vladikavkas cannot explain the absence of 1,700,000 roubles from the cellars of the Bank; and the Director of the Bank of Cronstadt is in a similar predicament; but with a deficit twice as large. In Odessa, a certain Matkovsky got possession of a million, by means of a forged certificate and unlimited matches (tea-money-tips.) A Cashier of the South Western Railways was satisfied with 400,000, and Melitsky with 340,000. The purveyor of quinine, during the Turkish war, got 250,000 roubles for certain imaginary quantities of this medicine; and the Government, after having paid 80,000 roubles for the light-house at Archangel, to the technicians of that town, have discovered that said technicians disbursed in all 20,000 roubles for the structure. My Moscow authority details further numerous minor defraudations; but I have said enough to give you a distinct idea of the universal corruption in Russia at the present day.

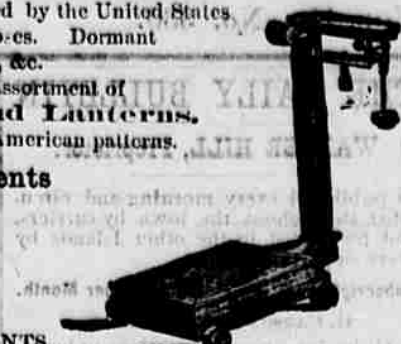
