KAMALO DIRECTORS RESIGN

At a meeting of the Kamalo directors yesterday afternoon, the following business was transacted: David Dayton was elected president and the Hawaiian Trust and Investment Co. (not George Carter) treasurer. Cecil Brown's resignation as vice president was accepted and Captain Clark of the Wilder Steamship Co. was elected to fill the vacancy. Harry Armbrage resigned as secretary. No one was appointed in his place at the time it is understood D. H. Lewis will be appointed to fill the vacancy at another meeting of the directors this afternoon. Frank H. Foster has decided to resign as a director at this afternoon's meeting. He will be succeeded by Harry L. Evans. Chas. Phillips and H. R. Hitchcock are the only two of the old directors who remain on the list. The latter is the only one of the original directors. L. H. Dee says he will withdraw his \$15,000 bond tomorrow, which will have the effect of raising the injunction in restraint of selling delinquent stock. This stock will then come under the hammer, giving himself and others an opportunity of getting it, probably, at a low figure.

Judge Estee Finds Strong Opposition

Washington, May 17.—It begins to look as if M. E. Estee would not be appointed United States District Judge for Hawaii after all. It is now nearly two weeks since the President decided to appoint him, and then reconsidered the matter in deference to some Californian. Now word comes here that Representative Metcalf of Oakland, who went home on account of illness in his family a month ago with the intention of not coming back until next December, will arrive in Washington tonight. Metcalf wants Judge Green of Alameda county appointed to the Hawaiian judgeship. Long ago, it appears, the entire California delegation endorsed Green, and then some of the members made arrangements to have Estee appointed. Metcalf is Green's particular partisan, and it is reported that he is coming here prepared to put up a pretty stiff fight. It is certain that when a man of Mr. Metcalf's disposition makes a 3000-mile trip for an appointment he means business.

Damage Suit. Charles E. Bartlett vs. Hawaiian Carriage Manufacturing Co., damages, is being tried before Judge Davis by the following jury: C. B. Gray, John Effinger, Fred. Philp, C. R. Collins, Geo. Angus, J. D. Tregloan, W. M. Cunningham, L. C. Ables, Theo. Wolff, J. J. Egan, W. H. Smith and F. S. Lyman. Smith and Mead for plaintiff; Finney, Ballou & McLanahan for defendant. Plaintiff claims \$1000 damages for breach of a parol agreement whereby the defendant company employed him for one year as foreman of its woodshop. He alleges he was discharged without cause after working one month and three days.

Protet For Honolulu. S. F., May 14.—The French cruiser Protet will leave port on June 4th, according to present arrangements, sailing for Seattle. After a brief visit there the cruiser will go to Honolulu, thence to the Society and Marquesas Islands, in the South Pacific, where the ship will remain a year or two. Officers and crew express themselves as under great obligations for courtesies extended to them here. In addition to the hospitality shown to Commodore Germet and the officers of the vessel, the entire crew, upon two occasions, have been the guests at treacher parties of George E. Hall, Consul-General of Turkey in this city. Until the Protet sails shore leave will be given to the crew.

Death of Plague at Brisbane. Melbourne, May 15.—The first death from bubonic plague has occurred at Brisbane, where three fresh cases are officially reported. Two cases are reported at Rockhampton, Queensland, where there has been one death.

Lilloakalani Coming Home. Friends of ex-Queen Lilloakalani in San Francisco write that she was to be at the California hotel on the 18th inst. on her way home to the islands.

ROBERTS IN THE TRANSVAAL

British Force Now Fight in the Domain of Krueger.

Results at Mafeking Are Still in Doubt—Tuller Heard From—Boers Prepare for the Last Stand.

London, May 17, 2:18 p. m.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts: "Kroonstad, Wednesday, May 16.—Rundle yesterday occupied Mequatlings Nek and Modderpoort without opposition. "Hunter has entered the Transvaal and has advanced within ten miles of Christiansa. "Methuen has reached a point twelve miles on the Hoopstad road without seeing the enemy. "Natives and local whites have confirmed the previous reports of the disorganization of the Free State. "The situation here is unchanged."

Hunter in Christiansa.

Kroonstad, May 17.—Hunter has occupied Christiansa without opposition, the enemy having retired to Klerksdorp, under the impression that the latter was threatened by a portion of this force from Parys. Rundle's force was close to Clocolan yesterday evening. The country was clear of the enemy. The Resident Commissioner in Basutoland reports that a number of Boers living in the Ficksburg and Bethlehem districts have applied to him for advice and as to the conditions of surrender. This is very satisfactory.

Buller At It Again.

London, May 17, 2:15 p. m.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from General Buller: "Dannhauser, May 17.—The Second division has reached Dannhauser and I hope that my advance patrols are at Newcastle. The fifth division is echeloned from Elandsaatge to Glencoe, repairing the railway. The fourth division is at Sunday's river drift, on the old Newcastle road. "Several Natal farmers are handing over their arms. "All reports agree that about 7,000 of the enemy passed north very hurriedly May 14 and 15."

Mafeking Not Taken.

Pretoria, Tuesday, May 15.—An official bulletin announces that the Federal troops stormed and occupied the forts around Mafeking on Saturday morning. The same night the Federals were surrounded, losing, so far as known, seven killed and fifteen wounded and a number taken prisoners. The British casualties are said to be fifty killed or wounded. It is reported that the advance guard of the force proceeding to the relief of Mafeking from the south was repulsed yesterday.

Biggarsberg Abandoned.

Volkswater, South African Republic, Wednesday, May 16.—The Federals have abandoned the Biggarsberg and it is believed also abandoned Newcastle this morning though their mounted men are still on the other side of the Boer, keeping the British at bay.

Victoria Day Reception.

The reception at the British Consulate, Palama, in honor of Queen Victoria's birthday was largely attended. Many ladies were among the callers. Consul Hoare and Miss Hoare received the guests in the parlor. Among those who paid their respects were Judge Stanley, German Consul J. F. Hackfeld, Chinese Consul Yang Wei Pin and Vice Consul Goo Kim, Spanish Vice Consul Dr. Alvarez, British Vice Consul T. Rain Walker, Hon. Paul Neumann, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, J. B. Atherton, C. M. Cooke, Jas. G. Spencer, F. M. Swazy, Dr. Garvin, Dr. Pratt and Prof. W. T. Brigham. The government band played on the grounds during the reception. "God Save the Queen" was timed for high noon, when the Queen's health was drunk on Judge Stanley's proposal. A fine collation was spread in the lanai.

JAMES NEIL WILL COME

Season of Drama Opens at the Opera House June 23d.

Managing Director C. A. Parker Arrives in Ala-mo-da—Honolulu Scheduled for Season Each Year—Public Can Choose.

The James Neil Company will open a season of twelve performances in the Opera House, Saturday evening, June 23d. This item of interest to the many lovers of high class legitimate drama was announced by Managing Director Charles Astor Parker who arrived in the Alameda this morning. "We have never seriously considered giving up the trip to Honolulu," said Mr. Parker. "Our tour is arranged in such a manner that we can easily play a summer season each year, and we contemplate placing Honolulu on our regular schedule. "As is generally known among theatrical people, the Neil Company is the premier of all stock organizations. There has been no change in the company for five years. It was from our organization that the Frawley company came and I understand Honolulu likes the Frawleys. The length of our seasons speak for themselves: two years at Cincinnati, seven months at St. Paul, 72 consecutive weeks at Los Angeles and we have just closed a 72 weeks' season at San Francisco. We hold exclusive rights to all the best plays for the country west of the Mississippi. "We shall open in Nat Goodwin's big success 'An American Citizen.' My disposition now is to offer the list of plays and let the people make their choice. Instead of playing Saturday matinees we will give performances Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday night. The company will bring all its scenery and equipment, that fill two 60-foot cars. The sale of seats will open in the near future.

WANT HAWAII'S PLAN.

The President of the Board of Education has received a letter from Capt. Albert Todd in charge of the Department of Public Instruction at Manila, P. I., stating that it is the intention of the United States Government to establish there in the near future a modern educational system—for the systematic study of English. Capt. Todd states that at present educational affairs in the Philippines are in a chaotic state and it is his opinion the difficulties to be met are along the same lines as those encountered in Hawaii during the inception and development of the school system here. Having been informed that the Hawaiian Department of Education has been very successful in establishing English schools and methods of instruction, Capt. Todd requests that the secretary send him copies of the Hawaiian school laws; course of study, any manuals or bulletins issued for the use of teachers, reports of Inspector Generals and others, published documents relating to education, a complete set of the books used now or in the past, if available, and any other books or publications which will serve as a guide for work in the Philippines. Secretary Rodgers is already preparing a reply to Capt. Todd's letter and as full instructions, information and samples will be sent by return steamer as can be collected in that time.

Hawaiian Agriculturalists.

The Hawaiian Agricultural Society will hold a meeting tomorrow evening for permanent organization, to which all who are interested in agriculture or any of its departments are invited. The meeting will be held at the High school on Emma street. The constitution has already been adopted. At the meeting tomorrow evening Allan Herbert will deliver an interesting address, and short addresses will probably be delivered by others present. Those behind the present reorganization of the Agricultural Society are thoroughly in earnest and under the new conditions of the Territory of Hawaii its future success is assured. The membership fee has been placed at the reasonable sum of \$1, and certificates for life membership will be issued at \$50 each.

Czarina for Honolulu.

The O. S. S. Co. has decided to send the S. S. Czarina to Honolulu to bring the surplus freight which the regular steamers of the line have been unable to take. The Czarina should arrive in Honolulu not later than June 1.

Army Officers Worried Over False Economy

New York, May 17.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: Army officers are becoming more concerned than ever over the danger believed to be involved in the policy adopted by the War Department authorities in not appealing to Congress to provide for a permanent increase in the enlisted strength at the present session. The necessity of a continuance of all the present available force in the Philippines for at least another year is now regarded as indisputable yet under existing law it is imperative that a beginning must be made not later than November in the repatriation of troops serving there. In the Philippines there are 31,000 regulars and 33,000 volunteers. By July 1st of next year, all the volunteers must have been discharged from the service and the entire regular army on duty in the United States and in the islands must be reduced to 27,000. Allowing 6,000 regulars for duty in the United States, Porto Rico, Alaska and Hawaii, at least 43,000 men must be brought home from the Philippines before the end of the next fiscal year. With the present ocean transport facilities neglecting chartered tramp steamers which are hardly fit to carry mules and forage, it will take at least six months to return and discharge the number of men essential to reduce the army to its authorized strength. It is declared to be out of the question to attempt any reduction of the force in the Philippines just now, when, as a matter of fact, many operations have been ineffective for lack of force and it is feared that when reductions begin in November the departure of troops will have a disastrous effect by giving encouragement to Tagal leaders. But this is nothing compared with the danger of protracted debate over the proposed permanent increase in the next session of Congress. Little can be expected in the way of such legislation in December or January and prominent officers frankly declare that the matter should be settled this summer.

Washington, May 17.—Commissioner General Powderly is taking active steps to establish a system of immigrant inspection of the Hawaiian Islands, and to that end he has detailed Mr. F. H. Larned, the chief clerk of the Immigration Bureau, to proceed to Honolulu and make a careful examination of the conditions there and establish a system in all important particulars the same as is now in operation in the United States. George E. Baldwin, also of the Immigration Bureau, here, has been appointed an inspector for Honolulu. Roman Dubler, an inspector at New York, will very soon go to Porto Rico to make an examination as to the situation on the island. He will secure statistics of the number of arrivals from other countries, their character and condition and will make a report as soon as possible to Mr. Powderly. Congressional action will be necessary, however, before an immigration system can be established at Porto Rican ports with authority to examine and deport objectionable aliens.

Japanese Are Dubious.

Yokohama, May 5 (via Victoria, B. C., May 17).—Affairs in China are in a state of extraordinary quiescence, while forebodings of a coming storm are in the air. Russia has gained her points in Korea in the shape of a large tract of land bordering upon the magnificent harbor of Lasampo. Much chagrin is felt by the Japanese and it is everywhere surmised that the day of reckoning cannot be long delayed. But all foreign and other considerations seem at present to be set aside and superseded in the absorption of the national mind by the approaching wedding festivities.

Drawback on Sugar Syrup.

Washington, May 17.—Assistant Secretary Spaulding has issued a modification of the instructions of the Department of October 12, 1898, prescribing a rate of drawback on syrup, the refined product of imported raw sugar. The drawback is reduced from 50 per cent to 36 per cent of its net value in tank at the refinery in condition as thrown finally from the centrifugal, in the regular process of sugar manufacture. The limitation as to price of the syrup is also removed. These instructions will take effect May 18, 1900.

Mounted Patrol Drill.

Captain Fox and the Mounted Patrol went out to Punahou pasture yesterday afternoon and there indulged in a drill. Runaway horses were caught and a short sham battle during which several rounds of ammunition were fired off, was held.

Geo. Mueller Fined.

In the Police Court this forenoon Geo. Mueller was fined \$5 and costs on the charge of assault and battery on his wife. Mueller was defended by Attorney H. R. Hitchcock.

Work for Hawaii.

Washington, May 14.—Representative John Allen of Mississippi called on the President today to recommend A. S. Humphreys for a Judgeship in Hawaii. Humphreys formerly lived in Mississippi and is a Republican. The Senate today passed Senator Morgan's bill creating a new customs district of Hawaii, with one collector who shall reside at Honolulu. The salary is to be \$4000 a year and such deputy collectors as other er customs officers will be allowed as the Secretary of the Treasury shall deem necessary.

**Verdict of Manslaughter**  
 in the First Degree

At 3 p. m. yesterday the prosecution rested in the trial of William Eston, the negro charged with murder for the killing of Toyo Jackson. Judge Stanley granted a recess of ten minutes for consultation with defendant by his counsel. The jury was warned against reading accounts of the trial in the afternoon papers. Clerk J. A. Thompson saved them trouble by scissoring the Bulletin's report out of the copies for the jury.

Mr. Creighton made an able address to the jury on behalf of the defendant. He claimed there was not a particle of evidence connecting the knife exhibited with the defendant. The verdict should be either guilty or not guilty of murder, and if defendant stabbed Jackson a clear case of self-defense had been proved.

Mr. Dole was eloquent and dramatic in his address for the Republic. With the knife in his hand he showed how it might have been concealed by the defendant, when he came back to the saloon and lurked in the doorway before advancing toward Jackson and Cockett. As to the theory of the defense, regarding a possibility that Jackson might have held the knife and had it turned upon himself in the scuffle, Mr. Dole held such an utter impossibility. There was no time unaccounted for, wherein Jackson could have opened a knife. Eston could not have done so himself in the five seconds or so of the tussle in the alleyway, therefore he must have opened the weapon when he left the Pacific saloon the first time, and returned holding it in readiness to revenge the blow given him by Jackson before.

After receiving the charge of the Court, the jury retired at 5:20 and in twenty minutes returned with a unanimous verdict of "guilty of manslaughter in the first degree." The penalty for this homicidal offense is imprisonment for not less than ten, nor more than twenty years. Sentence will be pronounced tomorrow morning. Defendant's counsel has given notice of motion for a new trial.

**Alameda a Day Late.**  
 The Alameda, Van Oterendorp commander, arrived in port this morning, one day late. The delay was caused by the non-arrival on time of the English mails, these having been sent on the Umbria, a slow boat. Pursar Smith reports bad weather the first night out from San Francisco and thence to port, moderate weather.

 London, May 15.—The War Office has received the following from Lord Roberts, dated Kroonstadt, May 15, 1 p. m.—"Baden-Powell reports, under date of May 7th, all going well. Fever is decreasing; the garrison is cheerful, and the food will last until about June 10th."

Our war with Spain brought to forceful notice such lack of preparedness for a war with a first class power that the sentiment "in time of peace prepare for war" becomes something more than a hollow campaign cry. As American borders are extended a continuation of the old policy of false economy leads merely to national suicide.

**PERREIRA HAS TROUBLES.**

San Leandro, Cal., May 17.—Joseph Perreira, a wealthy resident of the town, announced his intention of going to Crockett on business last Tuesday. He departed, but returned much sooner than planned to find his wife entertaining Mr. Borgia, late candidate for Town Marshal. He immediately proceeded to put them both out of the house and then took his wife's belongings and piled them up on the lawn. He went about the work in a collected manner, even calling the neighbors to witness the unpleasant task. After locking the house he went away, when Mrs. Perreira gained entrance and secured more of her goods and supposedly left for Oakland. Borgia will make no statements about the affair.

Perreira came here from Honolulu and has made considerable money in business. The couple have been married over twenty years and have borne good reputations.

**CORBETT WAS DEFEATED.**

Seaside Club, Coney Island, N. Y., May 11.—In the fastest, prettiest and closest heavyweight ring battle ever fought in New York, James J. Jeffries has reaffirmed his right to the championship. In the arena of the Seaside Sporting Club tonight he decisively defeated Jim Corbett, once champion of the world himself, after twenty-two rounds of scientific fighting.

It was a clean knockout that came so quickly that it dazed the thousands of keen, alert, intent spectators and left them in doubt as to just how the winning blow was delivered. It was avowed that it was a left hand jolt to the jaw, but Jeffries himself, and Referee Charles White, who stood at his side, say it was a right hand swing.

There is credit for the victor and credit for the vanquished in this cleverest of ring battles. Jeffries must be awarded the laurels of victory, yet his opponent is entitled to honor for his wonderful fight. That feature of the contest stands out in relief as the most striking one of the battle.

**FINE VESSEL LAUNCHED.**

San Francisco, May 17.—Next Saturday evening one of the finest four-masted schooner built on the Coast will be launched from Matthew Turner's shipyard at Benicia. The vessel is the Rosamond, built for Messrs. Williams, Diamond & Co. She will be employed in the trade with the Hawaiian Islands, and when in commission will be commanded by Captain D. H. Warde, late of the bark Diamond Head. The Rosamond is the largest vessel of her class ever built on the Coast and is constructed with all the perfectness that Turner gives to his work. She will be able to carry 2,000 tons of sugar as cargo, it is estimated. A convenient adjunct to the usual donkey engine will be a gasoline hoist aft, which will greatly facilitate the setting of sails and relieve the work on the forward engine. Two hatches can also be operated at the same time. The Rosamond will be patently furnished in the after cabins.

**Mondell Renominated.**

Cheyenne, Wyo., May 16.—The following delegates and alternates were elected by the Republican State Convention:

Delegates—United States Senator F. E. Warren, United States Senator C. D. Clark, Congressman Mondell, Governor Richards, Colonel Jay L. Torrey, Geo. H. Gobel.

Hon. Frank W. Mondell was unanimously renominated for Representative in Congress. The platform adopted strongly endorses the Administration.

**Senate Test Vote on the Canal Bill**

Washington, May 14.—Conjecture is rife tonight as to the probable fate of the Hepburn Nicaragua canal bill in the Senate, to which it was favorably reported today without amendment, by the Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals. If it were not for the general desire for the adjournment of Congress early in June, there could be little doubt that the friends of the canal would be able to force the bill through the Senate. As it is, its friends realize the danger of losing their hold on some of its halfhearted supporters who may stand out against strong pressure for adjournment. Now that it has been reported to the Senate, however, it remains to be seen whether all those who have been counted on as its friends will remain true under fire.

Senator Morgan will undoubtedly force the issue before long by moving to take up the bill, and it will tax the tactical resources of the opponents of the measure to escape being put on record for or against immediate consideration. It remains an undeniable fact, however, that the steering committee of the Senate will not permit the canal bill to be taken up at this session if it can prevent it. This will prove the supreme test of the influence of the leaders of the Senate, and they are by no means sure of the outcome of a test vote in the open Senate. They can count with certainty on the loss of a number of Republican votes when the issue is squarely joined on a motion to take up the bill.

The objections to the passage of the bill because the Hay-Pauncefote treaty has not been ratified by the Senate will not hold good and Senator McBride of Oregon, an ardent Administration man and a member of the Republican steering committee and one of the members of the Inter-oceanic Canals Committee, who voted today to report the bill said this evening: "The terms of the bill are in harmony with the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. Great Britain could not justly take offense at the enactment of a measure in harmony with a treaty to which she has already assented, even though it has not been ratified by the United States Senate."

There were only five members of the committee present at today's meeting. A motion was made to report the bill and without debate the vote was taken. Senators Morgan, McBride, Harris and Turner voting in the affirmative and Senator Hanna in the negative.

**INVESTIGATE CUBAN FRAUDS.**

Washington, May 16.—Discussion of the administration of affairs in Cuba by agents of the United States occupied the attention of the Senate during the greater part of today's session. Bacon of Georgia addressed the Senate at length on his resolution directing the Committee on Relations with Cuba to make an investigation of the conduct of financial affairs of the island. He said it was due the people of this country to know just how affairs in the island were being conducted, and since the disclosures of the past few days had been made with respect to the alleged misappropriation of funds in the postal service, the obligation upon Congress to make an investigation was doubly heavy. He urged that the honor of the country depend upon its being able to clear away the fraud and corruption which, it was charged, had been discovered. He insisted that the Government of the United States has no authority in Cuba, and demanded to know how soon it proposed to redeem its pledge and leave the government of the island to its inhabitants.

The following measures were passed: House bill repealing the provision of law allowing merchandise passing through the United States from any foreign country to be transported free of duty, so far as the Mexican free zone is concerned; also a resolution offered by Lodge calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury for information in regard to the influx of Japanese labor into the country, and whether there had been any violation of the contract labor law.

**BARKER CALLS ON MCKINLEY.**

Washington, May 17.—Mr. Wharton Barker, the nominee for President of the Middle of the Road Populists, called on President McKinley today to pay his respects. These gentlemen have known each other ever since the latter entered public life. Later Mr. Barker said that his nomination makes the election of Mr. Bryan impossible.

"At the last Presidential election," he said, "Mr. Bryan received 6,500,000 votes. Of this number at least 2,000,000 were Populists. This year I will get 1,500,000 or possibly 1,750,000 of that number. This will cut Bryan's vote to 5,000,000 or less. Where is he going to get the other votes necessary to elect him? It is estimated that Mr. McKinley received 1,500,000 votes from the Democratic ranks four years ago. These will not go to Bryan this year to make up his loss of Populist votes. If German or some other Eastern man had been nominated by the Democrats this year he would carry New York, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware in the East, not to count doubtful States elsewhere. The fight this year will not be made on the money question. Transportation, expansion and other live subjects will make up the issues."

**Six Million Starving**

New York, May 13.—The Indian Famine Relief Committee tonight issued an appeal asserting that despite systematic aid furnished 6,000,000 people in India, at least 6,000,000 are starving. The appeal says that America ought to send at least a million dollars.

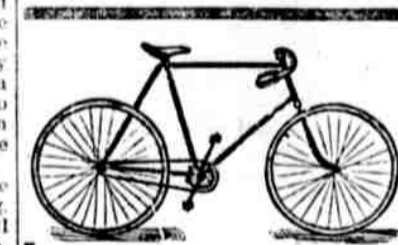

**DAMAGES FOR MINSTREL**

The will of the late Chief Justice Judd is holographic, written with the attestation entirely on one page of foolscap. It was executed on October 15, 1887, the witnesses being William Foster, who has died, and J. H. Reist, left the islands, the former having been at the time chief clerk and the latter second deputy clerk of the Judiciary. As no valuation is given for the Koolau property of deceased in the petition for probate, and the personality represents the par value of securities at large premiums, the actual value of the estate is doubtless far greater than given in the petition.

Kana, widower, petitions for probate of the will of Kaaooakaha, his deceased wife, which leaves him her entire estate valued at \$1000 and names him as executor. S. K. Kaeo of Lihue, Kauai, is a nephew.

The jury before Judge Davis awarded Thurlie Thyoens, one of the Hogan minstrel troupe, \$175 damages against the Canadian-Australian Steamship Co., for refusing him passage in the steamer Mowera. The trial lasted four days.

**Transport Logan.**

The transport Logan hauled alongside the Pacific Mail wharf between 6 and 7 o'clock last evening, after a quick trip from San Francisco, which port she sailed from May 16. She has aboard a large number of officers and others for Manila for which place she will sail as soon as she has taken on enough coal. The officers of the Logan are as follows: Captain J. N. Patton, quartermaster; Capt. Wm. P. Stinson, captain; Geo. A. Kolb, chief engineer. There are 174 men in the crew.

**Cholera in Bombay.**

London, May 14.—The Bombay correspondent of the Times says: The cholera continues to rage in the famine camps. There have been 400 deaths in three days at Mandivee. So numerous are the cases at Godra that it is impossible to collect the bodies, which lie for days in the sun. The people have fled and cannot be induced to return. A similar state of things prevails at Broach.

**Thousand Made Homeless.**

Yokohama, April 25.—One of the great conflagrations to which Japanese cities are peculiarly subject occurred at Tukin, a large town on the western coast, on the night of the 18th inst. Originating in the suburbs, a high wind carried burning brands to several parts of the city, at once rendering the fire brigade practically powerless. Not until the flames had been raging for six hours were they gotten under control, after the destruction of 1600 houses, including thirty temples and all the principal structures. The loss of life was unusually great, sixteen persons perishing in the flames and nearly a hundred being more or less injured. Property loss is estimated at 5,000,000 yen, or about \$2,500,000. Of the buildings destroyed not more than one in twenty was insured. Much complaint is being made of the inflammable character of the oil of the Echigo wells, to the use of which the origin of the fire is attributed.

BIG NEWS HELD BACK. London, May 17, 3:20 a. m.—The British relief column fought the Boers at Kraal Pan, thirty-two miles south of Mafeking, on Tuesday, according to a telegram received Wednesday at Lourenzo Marques from Molopo, 100 miles north of Mafeking.

A correspondent of the Morning Post, presumably John Stuart, is reported captured by the Boers at Kraal Pan. The British public is kept expectant of the announcement that Mafeking has been relieved, in army circles the opinion seems to prevail that this has already been accomplished, although two hours after midnight the War Office asserted that news of the relief had not been received.

Douglas Storey, the Mail's correspondent at Pretoria, wires: "The Boer Government is holding back some big news. Fever prevails here. President Kruger is working day and night. The latest Boer official bulletin is that the relief column has been defeated with great loss." Lord Roberts continues passive at Kroonstad. His cavalry are stretching like a semi-circular screen many miles in length, without lapping flanks.

BRITISH AT DUNDEE AGAIN

London, May 15.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from General Buller:

"Dundee, May 15, 1 p. m.—We have occupied Dundee. About 2,500 of the enemy left yesterday for Glencoe, where they entrained. Their wagons also left yesterday by DeJager's Drift and the Dannahuser road. Their Kafirs said they were going to Laing's Nek. Almost every house in Dundee is completely looted. The navigation colliery is all right. The machinery of the Dundee colliery is destroyed. The houses of the town are damaged, but are structurally intact."

Judging from dispatches from General Buller published by the War Office today the British advance in Natal is little more than an arduous march. The Boers, who were active at first, later appear to have shown the same readiness to retreat which is now marking the movements of the Federals in the Free State. Apparently the burghers are about to evacuate Natal and concentrate for the defense of Laing's Nek northward and Van Rensselaer's pass west. The reoccupation of Dundee by the British places the coal supplies there again in their hands. Dundee was the scene of the first battle of the war.

Washington, May 15.—The trust question led to an animated discussion in the House Committee on Judiciary today, a constitutional amendment finally being adopted by a party vote giving Congress power to define, regulate, control, prohibit or dissolve trusts, monopolies or combinations, whether in the form of a corporation or otherwise. This amendment and a bill restricting trusts were framed some time ago by a special sub-committee on trusts.

Coal From Newcastle. S. F., May 17. The ship Kensington, which is entirely arrived, brought the only cargo of coal from Australia that has come to port for the past sixty days, and an authority on the subject says the situation has not been paralleled for twenty-five years. It is said that there will be no considerable increase in the consumption of Australian coal here until it falls below the British Columbian article in price. There are at present forty-seven charters for Australia coal to this port but some of the vessels will not arrive this year. The rates from Newcastle are easy, but Honolulu prices is a better market for the Australian coal at present, though that market will soon have a sufficient supply, and the ships, in looking for business, must come to San Francisco with coal.
