

## Mayor's son believed killed by sharks off Rota

A young man who went out fishing with a friend the other night met a cruel death after he was swept away by big waves into a dangerous area off the island of Rota and was believed to have been eaten by sharks.

The body of Frank Manglona, said to be the son of Rota Mayor Prudencio Manglona and a brother of Senator Paul A. Manglona was

reportedly found early yesterday morning just beyond the reef.

Sketchy reports had it that Manglona, who was in his early twenties, was busy catching crabs with a certain Gary Toves somewhere in the reef portion of the island when he was taken aback by huge waves into an area believed to be shark infested.

Sensing trouble, Toves report-

edly asked for help from divers who were immediately dispatched to locate the young man who by that time had already been missing.

When found the next morning, Manglona's body was mangled, with the lower part (from his waist down) severed. Indications were that he may have drowned and may have been eaten by a huge fish, possibly a shark.

When sought for comment, Mayor Manglona was not available. His secretaries said that the mayor was busy arranging for the final burial rites for the deceased.

The incident was the second tragic incident in less than three months for the family of Mayor Manglona whose other son, Roy perished last December in the US mainland due to a sudden illness.

Frank's demise was also the third tragic loss for the Manglona family after another Manglona daughter died some two or three years back.

As of press time, the deceased had been laid to his final rest. Family members including Lieutenant Governor Benjamin T. Manglona were in attendance.

## US Labor Dept gains on Willie Tan case

The United States Department of labor can seek triple damages for workers who allegedly suffer retaliation when they complain about reported substandard wages, in the \$10 million lawsuit filed against a five-company garment manufacturing con-

glomerate owned by Saipan tycoon Willie Tan.

US District Court Judge Alex R. Munson recently penned a ruling that punitive damages can be sought on the Labor Department's lawsuit filed under the Fair Labor Standards Act, where employers

are alleged to have terminated and otherwise discriminated against workers who were attempting to secure wages to which they were legally entitled.

The garment factory owners had argued that the department was limited to seeking only back wages

and liquidated damages.

The department sued the five companies last July to collect these unpaid back wages allegedly owed some 1,350 contract workers imported from China.

Labor Secretary Lynn Martin, in a news release from the department said she was pleased with the ruling because "it gives another avenue to redress the more egregious conduct of some employers toward their workers.

"This department will not tolerate an abuse of our wage standards anywhere we have jurisdiction because ultimately it undercuts all our efforts to create decent jobs," the labor secretary added.

The legal action stemmed from investigations conducted by the Labor department's Wage and Hour Division in 1990-1992 of the five Saipan-based garment manufacturers who allegedly employed contract workers from mainland China at substandard wages to produce "Made in USA" goods for American consumption.

The department estimates the five companies ship about \$100 million worth of duty-free garments to the US annually.

The companies paid some \$3 million in back wages to the em-

ployees in November 1990, but federal investigators have alleged that many of the workers were intimidated or coerced into returning their checks.

It was further alleged that workers who refused to return their checks were fired and shipped back to China, the investigators said.

According to the Labor department, the Chinese workers were paid an hourly rate ranging from \$1.63 to \$1.75 or less and that they averaged 11 hours a day on their machines Monday through Saturday and eight and a half hours on Sunday and did not receive overtime pay as required by federal law.

The department further alleges that these pay and work practices have been going on since at least July of 1988. The garment factories produce cotton, acrylic, and wool sweaters and shirts for both men and women.

The garment workers have been protected since last July 30 under a preliminary court injunction requiring the firms to pay the proper overtime wages and to keep accurate payroll records. Judge Munson has appointed an independent auditor to monitor

## Abuse of gov't vehicles said to be rampant

Floor Leader Stanley T. Torres will urge the leadership of the House of Representatives to form a committee that will investigate on the reported misuse of government vehicles by certain government men.

In an interview at his Office at Capitol Hill, Torres announced that he is about to initiate the inquiry on possible vehicle abuse apparently because of an anonymous letter addressed to Governor Lorenzo I. DL. Guerrero early this month.

The unknown sender insinuated that a good number of government men have arrogantly, rampantly, and totally abused public property and money by using government cars on "non-essential businesses and after-working-hours" for any given day.

Such alleged abuses were reportedly being also done by some department heads, chiefs, and others for their personal errands, i.e., as personal transportation to and from work; to and from shopping at stores; and even to and from amusement centers and bars.

This was being brought to the

governor's attention on account of an alleged memorandum for the curtailment of the usage of government cars issued by Guerrero, supposedly during the first six months of his administration.

"When a person wishes to have a car of his own, all he has to do is to apply for a job in government and he becomes assured of a car for his personal use, rather than go through the usual red tape for a car loan at the bank.

Upon learning of the anonymous letter, Congressman Torres expressed his displeasure, and decided to drive around from

Koblerville to San Roque and back to San Vicente and Dandan last Saturday to verify on the alleged abuses.

According to Torres he has observed that the abuses claimed in the anonymous letter were generally true.

"I am very sorry to say that the problem is even worse than the letter states," said Torres.

Confirming Saipan Cable TV's earlier report which point to vehicles assigned to the Commonwealth Utilities Corporation but are being used by non-CUC employees, the floor leader said he personally saw cars

parked at the homes of these same employees.

"Since when did CUC have enough money to buy cars for other government employees," he questioned.

Feeling a bit outraged, he indicated his intention of coming up with a committee composed of House members to do an investigation on the allegations. He said if appointed by the speaker, he will be willing to spearhead such a committee.

"I will be writing a letter to House Speaker Thomas P.

## Release talks for kidnapped American in RP bog down

**Manila** - Negotiators failed to win the release of a kidnapped California businessman but remain optimistic he will be freed soon, a police spokesman said Monday.

Deputy National Police Director Gerardo Flores reported that "some kinks came up" in the negotiations

for the release of Michael Barnes of Long Beach, California, vice-president of Philippine GeoThermal.

Flores declined to elaborate on what problems stalled the release of Barnes, who was kidnapped January 17 near his office in the

Philippine capital's financial district.

Senior Police Superintendent Reynaldo Wycoco said last week that police expected Barnes would be released by his abductors by Sunday.

Police have not yet identified

the group holding Barnes. Speculations have ranged from Communist rebels to one of several kidnap gangs responsible for about 50 kidnappings in Manila during the past year.

An official of the Philippine GeoThermal, subsidiary of the California-based Unocal, said a man later called the company demanding \$20 million in ransom. A police official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, has said the ransom actually was 20 million pesos or 754,716 in US currency.

US Ambassador Frank Wisner has warned that the Barnes' kidnapping may hinder the Philippine efforts to attract badly needed foreign investment.

Last Saturday, the Petroleum Association of the Philippines

praised Barnes as a friend of the country and urged the kidnapers to free him.

Wycoco said that police officials were optimistic because "we know that (Barnes) is very much alive and that there are negotiations going on."

"We are almost certain that he will be released," he said. "But, as in any kidnapping, the ball is not in our court, it is on the kidnappers, so we cannot actually impose our will on them."

Barnes is the second Californian to have been kidnapped in the Philippines in the past two years. Arvey Drown, a businessman, was seized in October 1990 by Communist rebels in the north and is still being held.

## Market potential for Tahiti limes widens

**Washington**—Tahiti limes have been found to be free of the Caribbean fruit fly in the US Department of Agriculture and University of Florida tests, expanding domestic and export market potential for the juicy, seedless Florida fruit.

"Right now this variety of limes can not be exported to Japan because it was reputed to be naturally infested with the Caribbean fruit fly," said Michael K. Hennessey, an entomologist at the agricultural Service's Subtropical Horticultural Research Laboratory in Miami.

It was reported that California and some other states have also banned Tahiti limes because of the fly.

Hennessey said tests for the presence of the pest have been running for over a year. "We started this research at the request of the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences."

"We did not find a single fruit fly," said Hennessey. "This evidence suggests that any quarantine restrictions based on the natural

host status of fresh commercial Tahiti limes could be lifted."

Richard M. Baranowski, IFAS entomologist, worked with Hennessey in collecting over 102,000 Tahiti limes from 184 groves in Florida on 60 different harvest dates from May 1990 to May 1991.

"We selected samples from unwashed, unsorted and ungraded fruit. Some limes were damaged and rotten. We held samples over sand in field tests for over 30 days to collect any larvae or pupae of the Caribbean fruit fly that might be present," said Baranowski.

A standard way of conducting tests for larvae is to hold the fruit over sand. When larvae drops down, they burrow into the sand and then develop into flies.

The entomologists inspected not only the fruit flesh, but also the peel and albedo—the cottony substance between the flesh and the peel. But all the limes including the rotten ones, were fly-free, Baranowski said.

US consumers have a taste for limes as evidenced by about 54,000 metric tons imported in

1990, primarily from Mexico, at a value of over \$9 million.

According to Gail Walsh, secretary of Florida's Lime Administrative Committee, Tahiti limes, also called Peruvian limes, are available year-round, but have peak seasons in June, July, and August.

About 7,000 acres of trees in Florida's Dade and Lee Counties produced more than 1.5 bushels of the fruit in the 1991 growing season.

"When you eat Key lime pie, chances are you're eating pie made with Tahiti limes. That's the case here in Florida," said Walsh. Key lime are smaller, yellow, and have seeds, unlike the seedless, grass-green Tahiti that is about two inches in diameter.

An average Florida lime, she said, will yield about two tablespoons of juice and two teaspoons of grated peel.

High in vitamin C, a cup of raw lime juice has only 65 calories and more vitamin A than ten grapes. Limes also contain calcium, phosphorus and potassium.

## Hearings for Olomana Golf Course sought

The Save Mount Olomana Association is calling for public hearings on permits granted by the administration of Mayor Frank Fasi for the development of two golf courses on Windward, Oahu.

The City Council last year adopted a resolution calling for the public hearings to review the

permits granted by the Department of Land Utilization in 1986 to Royal Hawaii Country Club Inc.

Association spokesman Michael Wilson said Sunday that the group wants to know why the hearings weren't held.

Another Association member E. Lawrence Gay of

Maunawili, charged that the company has failed to comply with requirements mandated by the permits.

Gay said the non-compliance covers various issues, such as parking, construction of a clubhouse and strip-grading on the slopes of Mount Olomana.

## \$20M offered for Coconut Islands

Although rumors that Coconut Island in Kaneohe Bay is up for sale are being denied, the owner reportedly is willing to listen to offers of at least \$20 million.

Japanese businessman Katsuhiko Kawaguchi bought the 25-acre island in 1987 for \$8.7 million.

Kawaguchi's company Hachidai USA recently denied

rumors that the island has been placed on the market.

But Greg Porter, Hachidai's assistant development manager, said Kawaguchi will listen if the offer is high enough.

State Rep. Terrence Tom has submitted a bill calling for the state to buy the island where the University of Hawaii Institute for marine Biology is located.

Tom said he heard that Kawaguchi might be willing to sell in part, because of immigration problems.

Kawaguchi was deported in 1988 when for failing to report his Japanese criminal record when he filed out an application for a U.S. visa. He is now allowed only short visits to Hawaii for medical reasons.

## Hawaii Shipping Line shuts down

**Honolulu (AP)**—The only ocean shipping link between Hawaii and several South Pacific Islands has closed down with its parent company filing for bankruptcy reorganization.

The shutdown of the Hawaii-Pacific Lines Ltd. has left about 75 containers of cargo and 62 vehicles stranded at Pier 1 in Honolulu Harbor.

Much of the cargo is destined for American Samoa and Western Samoa.

Company President Michael Hansen said the four-year-old company managed to break-even in 1990, but started losing money because of the Middle East conflict and could not recover.

Hansen, who owns the parent company, Hawaii-Pacific Maritime Inc., said he had requested a \$950,000 loan from the state's Hawaii Capital Loan Program, but it was turned down Friday evening.

State Department of Economic Development and Tourism deputy director Rick Egged said the state wanted to see the cargo service

continued, but couldn't see enough cash for or collateral to support the loan.

Hansen said he had no alternative but to curtail and ask all shippers to claim their cargo before this Thursday.

Hansen said he knows of no alternative to shippers other than by Hawaiian Airlines.

Theo Davies Marine Agencies President Demetrius Panagopolus suggested that Blue Star Pace Line, which serves Fiji, might be interested.

Panagopolus said his firm will talk with Blue Star Pace Line, for which Theo Davies is the agent, to see what assistance it might provide.

The shutdown of Hawaii-Pacific put 13 people out of work, Hansen said.

The line was using a chartered 300-foot German ship, Urte, as its sole vessel.

It made 46 voyages from Honolulu to Samoa, Tonga, the Cooke Islands and Christmas Island and back to Honolulu, averaging about 31 days per voyage, Hansen said.

## Court upholds case vs CNMI, Japanese partner

The CNMI's land management agency and a Japanese developer lost in their bid to have a lawsuit filed against them by a Garapan lawmaker dismissed by the court.

The Marianas Public Land Corporation (MPLC) and Nakamoto Enterprises lost in their

bid to have Superior Court Presiding Judge Pedro M. Atalig dismiss the charges filed against the two entities by Cong. Stanley Torres.

In denying both parties bid to have the case dismissed, Atalig stated in his January 23 ruling that sufficient allegations are exist to state a claim for relief.

Atalig issued the ruling after hearing arguments from both parties concerning the legality of the MPLC's existence. Torres' counsel Atty. Rey Yana argued that the MPLC was already non-existent when the land lease agreement between Nakamoto Enterprises and the agency was consummated in August last year.

Yana contended that MPLC is already non-existent when the lease was consummated. He said that the Constitution mandates that the agency will only be in existence for 12 years after which its functions will then be transferred to the executive branch.

MPLC's legal counsel Brian McMahon on the other hand, argued that the mandate to have the MPLC dissolved 12 years after its creation was not self-executing. In his arguments, McMahon stressed that under Article XI of the Constitution, the land management agency will

continue to exist as long as the legislature does not enact a measure transferring the agency's function to the executive branch.

Nakanoto's counsel Douglas Cushnie also argued that the MPLC's dissolution will open the doors to the violation of rights of innocent third parties and will wreak havoc on those who have dealt in good faith with the agency.

Cushnie contended that the adoption of a self-executing dissolution of MPLC as suggested by Yana, would result in chaos.

Atalig is scheduled to hear pre-trial arguments on February 26.

## PDI challenges Tasi Tours exclusive service to Managaha anew

## Still no clues, no suspects in Cris Robles murder case

Exactly a week after the Filipino contract worker Crisanto M. Robles was initially reported missing and eventually found dead with clear signs of foul play near Banzai Cliff, police authorities have still to apprehend a suspect in the brutal murder.

Police Chief Tony Reyes said yesterday that they are still facing a blank wall in their investigations of the murder case.

Sources other than the police department, however, maintained that they have enough grounds to suspect that Robles was mistakenly assaulted then, killed mercilessly thinking he was the guy they were after when in fact it was another man.

The same sources pointed to threatening phone calls made to them even after the murdered Robles was found.

They said the threats were quite serious which made them take extra precautions fearing that another one of them is still a target for murder.

Meantime, Reyes said they are still verifying various reports reaching them including the "mistaken identity" angle. He said they are hampered by the lack of sufficient evidence and credible witnesses to help them in their investigations.

The police chief also said that they are still awaiting the complete autopsy report from government pathologist to give them a concrete lead in their investigations.

In another violent incident which occurred last Friday night, a nineteen year old student identified as Pedro T. Cruz was stabbed by an unidentified suspect while resting from a game at a basketball court near the Paradise Disco in Chinatown district.

According to a police report, Cruz was seated on a bench near the playing court when the suspect approached him saying "what is your problem?". Then, without any provocation at all, the suspect allegedly proceeded to stab him near his lower chest and hurriedly fled.

Cruz reportedly survived the attack but was immediately rushed to the emergency ward of the Commonwealth Health Center for treatment of his stab wounds.

## U.S. Attorney echoes denial of INO chief on permanent residency report

United States Attorney David Wood yesterday dispelled reports circulating among the Filipino community in Saipan that the government was now entertaining applications from alien workers who had stayed in the Northern Marianas since 1986 for a change to permanent residency status.

"Nothing has changed! There are no different requirements in effect now", Wood stressed as he virtually belied rumors that their office is now issuing the necessary forms to prospective applicants.

So as to finally set the record straight and the lay the issue to rest, Variety sought a clarification from the U.S. Attorney's Office yesterday especially after receiving reports that many Filipino applicants were trooping to the same office for the necessary forms.

"This office (the U.S. Attorney's) simply provides application forms to applicants as a matter of courtesy to them so that they will no longer have to go to Guam just to file the necessary forms", Wood explained adding

that they only issue these forms to applicants who have a legal basis to seek the change to permanent residency status in accordance with existing rules which have long been in effect.

Wood, thus reiterated what acting Immigration and Naturalization chief Jose P. Mafnas had earlier maintained, saying that the INO chief was correct in describing the report as baseless.

Another 'report' which apparently fueled the rumor indicated that an Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) officer from Guam had recently arrived on the island last week and distributed application forms for permanent residency status to Filipino workers here in Saipan.

Mafnas earlier said that normal protocol requires their being officially informed of such a change in existing regulations for proper coordination but that they never got any information to that effect.

"You tell me where all these rumors originated from!", Wood exclaimed when asked how all these rumors started. But no, there is no basis whatsoever for all it, he added.

## Tips on murder case

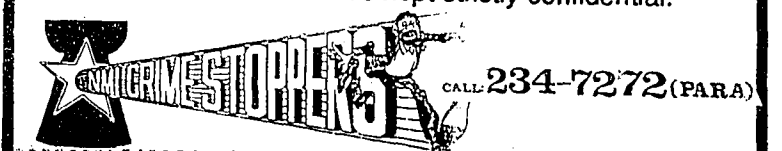
On January 5, 1992, at approximately 1:04 p.m., the decomposing body of Crisanto M. Robles, 32 a photographer for Saipan Photo Lab was discovered within the vicinity of Banzai Cliff in Marpi. The body of the victim showed signs that the person or persons responsible for this crime dragged Robles to the grassy area where he was found.

A close-up examination revealed that the body sustained multiple puncture wounds around the neck area and that the still unknown assailant(s) tried to burn Robles' body. According to police report he was last seen at about 10:30 p.m. on February 3 while he was leaving the company barracks in Chinatown.

The vehicle that he was operating, a gray Alto Suzuki sedan with license plate no. AAP-943 was reported abandoned the next day in an isolated area in Kagman with the presence of blood stains in the back seat of the car.

The Department of Public Safety Criminal Investigations Bureau is treating this as a homicide case and NHI Crime Stoppers is asking the general public's assistance for giving information about this crime or any other crimes.

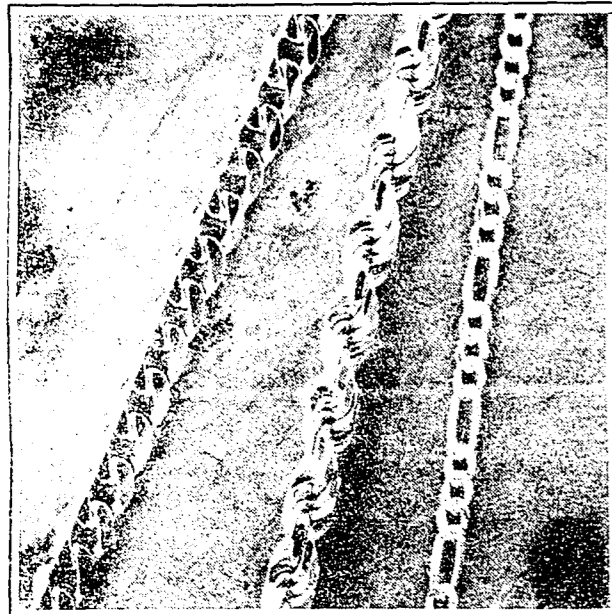

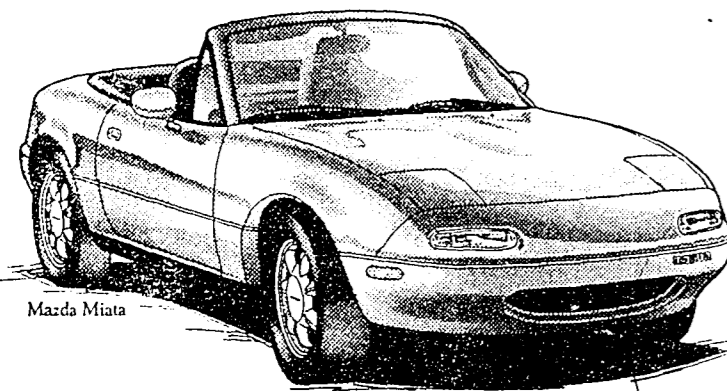

## MPLC's dissolution proposed in a legislation

More than twelve years later and after a string of lawsuits questioning the legality behind the existence of the CNMI's land management agency have been filed in court, legislators are now proposing measures that will finally lead to the dissolution of the Marianas Public Land Corporation (MPLC).

In the upper house, Senate President Joseph Inos and Saipan Senator Juan S. Demapan have introduced proposed statutes which seeks for the MPLC's gradual dissolution.

Both Senators are proposing that a land management department to replace the MPLC be created within the Executive Branch.

According to the Inos proposed bill, the new department will take over the surveying duties of the Department of Natural Resources among a host of other duties which are currently under the scope of MPLC.

The Demapan bills on the other hand, proposes for the creation of homestead and land exchange offices which will be in existent until a land management department has been created in the executive department. His other bill aims at reducing the MPLC's power and responsibilities gradually until the proposed department is already in existence.

Like their Senate counterparts, house leaders are also astute in seeking ways to either improve or totally dissolve the MPLC.

After a closed door meeting almost a week ago between the MPLC Executive Director William Concepcion, House members were under the impression that all is not well with the land management agency.

Issues such as the MPLC's effectivity as a department and its method of handling business such as short exchange and land exchange deals were among those that have been discussed during the meeting.

Cong. Heinz Hofschneider (D)-Garapan, was quoted that he wanted to see an autonomous agency which has a definite and clear-cut function.

The MPLC has been the focus of controversy within the last several months. Not only was the agency criticized by several of Saipan's known environmental activists on the way it has leased the CNMI's scarce lands but questions have also been raised concerning the MPLC's decision to lease land without first settling land exchange disputes.

The MPLC was a carry-over of the Trust Territory. Under the Constitution, the functions of the MPLC will be turned over to the executive branch, 12 years after its creation.

## US Congress approves \$3M NMC endowment

Six years after the Northern Marianas College became a federal land-grant institution, US Congress has authorized an endowment of \$3 million for Saipan's lone college.

In a voice vote during a February 4, 1992 session, the US House of Representatives accepted the US Senate's version of the Omnibus Insular Areas Act of 1992 passed by the upper chamber last January 31st.

The measure, known as House Resolution 1668, goes to US President George Bush for signature before it becomes law.

"I have worked so long and hard to get this endowment authorized. Now that it has finally happened, I am very pleased and excited," said Washington Resident Representative to the US Juan Babauta in a news release from his Washington office.

Referring to the approval by Congress as the primary hurdle in the granting of the endowment, Babauta said the bill would have to go to the Appropriations Committees of both the US House and the Senate to obtain the \$3 million appropriation.

"But that is after the president signs the Act into law," said

Babauta.

According to the news release, congressional spending takes two steps: first, a law is enacted which authorizes the spending, and then a law is passed which appropriates the funds to be spent.

Babauta added that the passage of the authorization early in session means that there would be time for the CNMI government to go to the appropriators and ask for the endowment money in this year's spending bill.

"We're very happy about the approval of the bill by Congress and I am sure NMC President Agnes McPhetres, who has put so many of her hours into getting this will be pleased," Babauta beams.

Upon learning of the good news, McPhetres said the money will be invested and the interest will be used to improve relevant program areas.

The college president further indicated that since becoming part of the Land Grant program, the CNMI has been eligible for the funds since 1986, but that the problem has been in getting the money appropriated.

McPhetres has reportedly been

working with CNMI, federal, and congressional officials since 1987 to obtain the said funding.

The endowment for the NMC is not the only provision of the Omnibus Insular Areas Act that

affects the CNMI, as it also includes a provision that would enact the release of some \$3 million in disaster assistance money which had previously been appropriated but could not be spent because no authorization has been made.

The money, to be shared among the insular areas, will now be available for the reconstruction of public facilities damaged by recent storms and for the hardening of existing infrastructure to withstand future natural disasters.

The measure also increases the amount that may be provided to the insular areas for disaster clean-up, and will ultimately be viewed to give the said areas more favorable treatment than that enjoyed by the states.

The act also clarifies that the NMC is eligible for federal disaster relief. The laws has been vague

on-CNMI eligibility, although assistance has never been denied for this reason.

Permanent authority for insular area governments to make purchases through the US General Services Administration is another feature of the act mentioned, giving the insular areas permanent entitlement instead of on a year-by-year basis.

In addition to the provisions that will benefit the CNMI, the act addresses special needs in American Samoa and the Virgin Islands. A new Salt River Bay National Historical Park is established on St. Croix in the Virgin Islands.

The park and ecological preserve is the site of a landing by the second expedition of Christopher Columbus and includes a mangrove forest, reef system, and submarine canyon.

The act calls for the Department of the Interior to comprehensively assess infrastructure needs in American Samoa through the year 2000 and to report the findings to Congress by the end of this year.

It was said that Congress wants to know how much money would be required to fully address these needs.

## Environmental education at school proposed

The Senate Committee on Health, Education and Welfare will conduct a hearing this week on a proposed legislation aimed at establishing an environmental education program within the Public School System.

The hearing for the Environmental Education Program Act of 1992, known as Senate bill 8-1 as introduced by Senator Juan S. Torres, will be held today at the Senate Chamber.

Environmental Education as defined in the Torres bill, is a "learning process dealing with the interrelationships among the natural world and its man-made surroundings.

It is experience based, interdisciplinary in its approach and is a continuous life-long process that provides the basic knowledge and skills necessary in achieving and maintaining a sustainable balance between man and the environment.

The Torres bill proposes the implementation of a comprehensive environmental education program in all of the CNMI's elementary and secondary levels of education.

Aside from providing educational education to students, it will also give technical assistance and resource support to educators and other agencies.

According to the proposed bill, the program will be carried out by a five member advisory council who will also be tasked to conduct an assessment of the program.

**Importers to pay Customs overtime fees**

Importers of merchandise coming into the CNMI will now have to pay the corresponding fees for overtime work on inspections and clearances.


Acting Customs Services Chief Marcie Tomokane said in a recent interview that effective January this year a new directive was issued by the Director of the Department of Finance which orders consignees to pay overtime charges for inspections and clearances of containers from incoming vessels.

Normally, according to Tomokane, the customs services branch at the seaport headed by Capt. Tito C. Alipuyo do not open containers after 4:30 p.m. for inspections and clearances. These are carried out within the government allotted working hours, that is from 7:30 in the morning and up until 4:30 p.m.

But to better improve these services at the seaport, the Department of Finance decided to allow overtime inspections and clearances of containers which are to be done on weekends and holidays, Tomokane said. And consignees have to make the requests for such overtime work with the chief of customs services for the appropriate schedules, she added.

With respect to the fees, the department orders consignees to pay a minimum amount equivalent to two hours of overtime for every request plus a fraction of the same more in case of excess or longer overtime job.

This improvement in customs services at the seaport, according to Tomokane, is expected to ease the backlog of containers from incoming vessels that to pass customs inspections and clearances. It would also help importers avoid delays in the processing of their shipments from abroad.

**2 more ladies join Saipan Police Force**

Equality of the sexes is here to stay in the Northern Marianas. And nowhere is this fact more evident than in Saipan's police force itself wherein there are already eight lady cops working with the force.

Soon, in about seven months from now, two more ladies will become members of Saipan's finest.

Twenty-seven year old Connie Indalecio and Shirley Camacho, who is of eighteen summers, were among 28 new police trainees who were presented to the top officials of the Department of Public Safety yesterday at the start of the 11th Police Cycle which officially starts the training program for the new recruits.

Indalecio, who is an accountant by profession and a mother of three, had to travel all the way from Germany and come home in time for the start of the screening for new police recruits.

Although she had a lot of work experiences from being a marketing assistant, then an account executive in Germany, Indalecio said she had always wanted to be in the (police) Academy and become a cop.

"If we now have women who work as electricians, why not women as cops", Indalecio remarked.

According to her, it was Police Officer Josefa Kaipal, one of the lady cops currently with the police force, who encouraged her to join. And when she graduates from the academy, Indalecio said she wants to specialize in handling traffic.

Her co-trainee this year, the much younger Shirley Camacho, however, dares to be bolder in aspiring to be a topnotch detective.

Asked what her major motivation was for joining the police force, Camacho said even as a little girl, she had relatives and friends in the police force whom she admired so much for the way they valued their responsibilities as enforcers of peace and order.

"It was a bit hard at first, but we have a lot of trainers here who helped us overcome the initial difficulties. Besides, everyone here treats me like a sister. We're like a big family", Camacho recalls the training since she joined the group early this January.

She also admitted that there were initially some moments when she thought of letting go like when some of her friends kept on saying it wasn't like her wanting to be a cop simply because she was too feminine.

But then, she claims nothing could take away the lessons she has learned since early from the academy, especially the sense of discipline.

"I even managed to lose

some weight to become fit and trim and I see to it that I am at school from 6 in the morning up until 6 p.m.", Camacho said with a tinge of pride in her new-found ways.

For the next few weeks up to a month or two, all the 28 new police recruits, including Indalecio and Camacho will be

taught and trained in the basics of police work and crime prevention by local instructors.

This was disclosed by training specialist Lawrence Camacho who also said that the group will later receive more advanced training from foreign training specialists such as those coming from Guam.

# Europe & Pacific neighbors to crowd CNMI for tourism share

While the Northern Marianas remains to be a favored destination by Japanese travellers, many of those involved in the travel-

trade industry should start to re-think strategies and continue to improve their quality of service to assure the CNMI's reputation as one of Pacific's tourist mecca. Current trends however show

that the Northern Marianas may be in for competition not only against its neighboring islands but, some areas which are currently making a comeback as a tourist destination.

Sandra Gamo, the Deputy Director for the US Travel and Tourism Administration of the US Department of Commerce said in her recent speech before the general membership of the

Marianas Visitor's Bureau, the CNMI will have to compete with Europe as a favored destination among Japanese travellers.

Gamo said the trend will continue through 1992 as the focus shifts on Europe which is the site of several of this year's major events including the Olympics in Barcelona, Spain and the forthcoming World's Fair in Seville.

Tour agents and air carriers alike, are also taking advantage of the situation by offering attractive tour packages to visitors.

While this year may be good to those in Europe, "this may not be a good one for those in the Pacific," Gamo said.

One way to lure repeat travellers to the Northern Marianas Gamo said, is by exerting extra effort in providing receptive services comparable to those found in other world-class destinations.

Gamo said the those in the travel-trade industry in the CNMI should continue to improve the quality of their service to enhance its reputation as a semi-domestic site for Japanese repeat travellers.

Tour agents in the Northern Marianas should consider lowering down their rates to accommodate more of Japan's travellers. Expensive packages, Gamo said "is a definite deterrent and one which should be seriously considered."

As more and more Japanese opt to visit neighboring countries for rest and recreation, they have also become sophisticated travellers who select their destinations and tour products carefully.

Current trends show that Japanese tourists chose their destination based on personal preference. Although they appear to be good spenders, Japanese tourists are now becoming price conscious and are demanding more for the dollar they spent during their trips.

Current figures also show that about 30% of the total foreign travellers nowadays utilize brand-package, wholesale package tour products as compared to travellers of some 15 years ago, Gamo said.

While Saipan continues to enjoy the economic boom, Gamo is concerned that such developments may create the CNMI as a deluxe and high-priced resort.

"The Northern Marianas should broaden its base to bring back those visitors who were lost during the development days," Gamo said.

According to her, the CNMI can draw a greater share of Japan's tourism market by creating for itself a more diversified tourism-interest structure. Those in the tourist trade business may consider turning an expensive facility into a dormitory-type building with the youth as its target market.

Those in the real property business should also consider renting condominiums and luxury apartments for families and small group visitors who plan to stay on the island for several days. She also suggested more activities and programs geared for visitors of all ages.

# Lawyers win postponement, Imelda heads north to stump

MANILA (AP)-Imelda Marcos' lawyers asked a court Monday to consolidate 33 charges of illegal currency transfers under one judge as she headed for her husband's northern stronghold to pursue her quest for the presidency.

The widow of former President Ferdinand Marcos was to have been arraigned Monday on eight counts of transferring money abroad during her late husband's administration.

Judge Corona Somera agreed, however, to study a defense request to try all currency charges simultaneously. The judge's decision was expected Feb. 20.

Mrs. Marcos, who returned from exile Nov. 4, faces more than 80 civil and criminal charges in connection with alleged corruption under her husband's administration.

Marcos was ousted in the 1986

uprising that propelled Corazon Aquino into the presidency. He died in exile in Hawaii in 1989.

Despite her legal problems, Mrs. Marcos is among eight major contenders for the presidency in the May 11 election. Mrs. Aquino ruled out a second term and is backing former Defense Secretary Fidel Ramos.

Mrs. Marcos planned to Kick off her campaign Tuesday in Laoag, the capital of her husband's home province, Ilocos Norte. She faces a strong challenge from businessman Eduardo "Danding" Conjuangco, Mrs. Aquino's estranged first cousin and an ardent Marcos admirer.

Several of her husband's most influential allies have urged her to abandon her campaign and support Conjuangco, who fares better in public opinion surveys and has a stronger nationwide organization.

Nearly 870 candidates have filed for the presidency to succeed Mrs. Aquino on June 30. The Commission on Elections was to begin screening out "nuisance candidates" on Monday.

The large number of serious contenders has raised concern that the winner may enter office with a weak mandate. There is no runoff and a majority vote is not required for victory.

On Sunday, Mrs. Aquino ordered soldiers and police to remain neutral in the elections.

"I want the military and police not to side with any one candidate because they need to stay neutral and leave the decision to the civilians," Mrs. Aquino said in her weekly radio broadcast.

Regional military commanders have in the past been accused of pressuring voters into supporting local politicians. In addition to the president, Filipinos will be electing a new Congress, provincial governors, mayors and thousands of local officials.

Also Sunday, former Senate President Jovito Salonga promised to stay in the race for the presidency and accused the administration of trying to break up his coalition.

Salonga told reporters in Cagayan de Oro, 500 miles (800 kilometers) southeast of Manila, that his center-left coalition had rejected appeals to join Ramos.

"We intend to give a vigorous campaign," Salonga said.

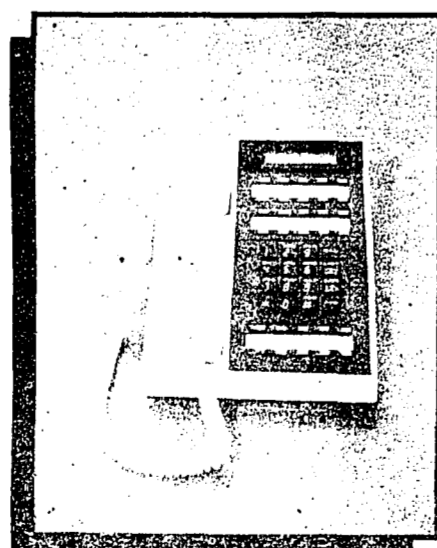

**Bizarre political lineups mark Philippines politics**

MANILA (AP) - Nearly 20 years ago, Emilio Osmena was jailed by president Ferdinand Marcos during martial law. Osmena is now running for vice president with Marcos' former police chief.

Osmena, governor of Cebu province and running-mate of Fidel Ramos, is not the only Osmena seeking the vice presidency. His brother, Sen John Osmena, is running with businessman Eduardo "Danding" Conjuangco, one of Marcos' closest associates during his 20-year administration.

Politics, it is said, makes for strange bedfellows. Never has that

statement been rare than it the May 11 contest to succeed President Corazon Aquino. The campaign officially began last Saturday.

Mrs. Aquino has endorsed Ramos, her military chief of staff and defense secretary. Mrs. Aquino assumed the presidency in a 1986 uprising which had been brewing since the assassination of her husband, Benigno Aquino Jr., two and one-half years earlier.

At the time of the assassination, Ramos, a second cousin of Marcos, was commander of the national police. Cojuangco, an unabashed admirer of Marcos, is Mrs. Aquino's first cousin.

All of the major alliances, including the ticket of Marcos' widow Imelda, include candidates who were in rival camps at one time or another during the Marcos

administration. The bizarre lineups show that expedience still plays a more important role than ideology Philippine politics. Candidates need the financial and organization support of a powerful patron, even if they share few of his principles.

Some critics believe this reflects the failure of Mrs. Aquino to bring fundamental change to a system dominated by regional power brokers and political clans.

"Had the ideals not been betrayed by Corazon Aquino and her administrators, the electoral game would have been played differently today and in the years to come," wrote commentator Ninez Cacho-Olivares, a strident Aquino critic.

The scramble for support has produced strange political alli-

ances. Cojuangco's Senate ticket includes retired Maj. Gen. Alexander Aguirre, who won a reputation for crushing coup attempts against Mrs. Aquino which the government suspected may have been financed by Cojuangco.

Conjuangco, who was exiled with Marcos in 1986 and returned nearly four years later, denies the allegation. Cojuangco's Senate ticket contains several other Senate nominees who had been stalwarts of the anti-Marcos movement.

Rep. Anna "Nikki" Coseteng, a former anti-Marcos activist and prominent feminist, signed on with the former Marcos "crony" after rivals in the center-left Liberal party kept her off their ticket.

No candidate is more heavily traveled along the political spec-

trium than Sen. Ernesto Maceda, chairman of the Senate defense committee. After serving as Marcos' executive secretary, Maceda moved to the United States and became a confidant of Mrs. Aquino's husband.

He returned to the Philippines, switched parties twice and ended up on Cojuangco's ticket after failing to win a spot on the Struggle of the Democratic Filipino party.

Political sources said Maceda was scratched from the Struggle ticket, led by House Speaker Ramon Mitra, because he had criticized presidential relatives.

Family interests often transcend politics here. Even though Mrs. Aquino is campaigning against the Struggle party's presidential candidate, several of her Aquino in-laws play key roles in the organiza-

SAN DIEGO (AP) - President Bush today authorize federal disaster aid for Micronesia and the Marshall Islands to help in the cleanup from typhoon Axel last month.

In the Marshall Islands, the declaration will make federal aid available to affected individuals and local governments on the island of Kili and the atolls of Arno, Jaluit, Majuro and Mili.

In Micronesia, the assistance will be available in Kosrae State, the island of Pohnpei, Mwoakilloa Atoll and Pingelap Atoll.

Axel was a tropical storm when it hit the Marshall Islands on Jan. 6, and built to a typhoon when it struck Micronesia two days later.

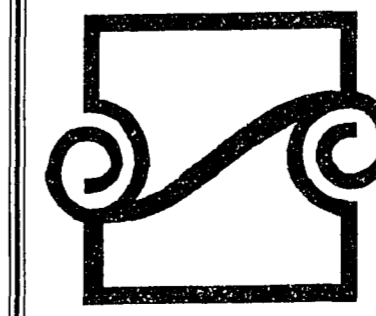

puted facts in support of motion for summary judgment, that the relevant provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act do not apply in the CNMI.

According to the statement, Congress has explicitly exempted the Commonwealth from coverage of the FLSA.

According to Guam-based lawyer David Mair, the Northern Marianas is not included in the list of territories over which the Act has jurisdiction.

Additionally, the Covenant itself has also precluded application of the FLSA to the Commonwealth, after it has given the Commonwealth the right to regulate its own internal affairs.

Section 503 (c) may not be used, therefore, as a bootstrap for entry of the FLSA. It was said that to apply the Act in this manner would serve none of the purposes and goals of the Covenant.

Also, to use the Covenant Section 502 (a) (2) as an automatic rubber stamp for the application of the FLSA in the Commonwealth simply because the Act applies in Guam would be to deliberately circumvent and ignore Congressional intent and discretion.

Two other Cyclones scored in double digits with the Palacios brothers, John and Jun scoring 22 and 21 points respectively.

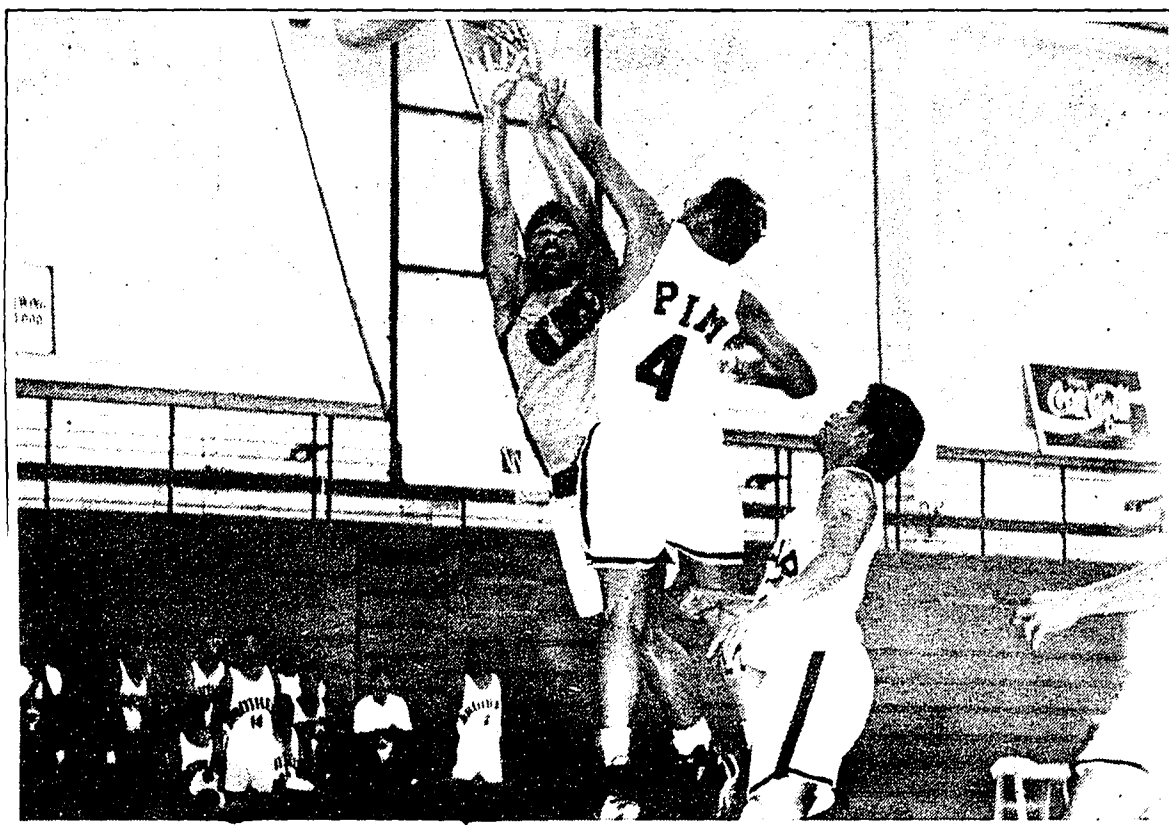
Allan Labrar of the Sunrisers topped his team scoring with 19 points.
