KAHUKU PLANTATION SHOWS NO REASON FOR PESSIMISM; ANNUAL MEETING IS HELD

Kahuku Plantation Company, which "The total area of cane of which this took place this afternoon at 2 o'clock crop consists has been altered some-On the contrary, the reports are optimistic.

Mr. Cooke prophesies that the divi dend of Kahuku, ten cents monthly will not be reduced during the year while Manager Adams not only points to a profitable year in the fields, but is sanguine of the success of the campaign against the cane-borer.

Manager Adams in his report says: "Crop of 1910.

"The yield of sugar from Kahuku fields harvested for this crop was 5, 466.2295 tons. An additional yield of 187,322 tons sugar from the fields of outside cane planters brought the total crop to 5653,5515 tons. Unusual con ditions, familiar to you all, which prevailed while this crop was approaching maturity, hampered the sort of cultivation which cane at that period of it growth should receive and probably influenced the yield of sugar therefrom The sucrose in cane from Kahuku fields averaged only 11.55 per cent. The short rattoons, fertilized in accordance with the formula to which reference was made in the last annual report, had a higher sucrose content than the long.






