U. S. ALLOWS MEXICAN ARMY TO CROSS OVER

(Special Bulletin Cable.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—The United States government will permit Mexico to send troops from Lower California across American territory to protect the Colorado river dyke in Mexico.

The fight between Road Supervisor Wilson and the Board of Supervisors was carried on today, when letters from Wilson to the health committee and the road committee were read before the board. In the first Wilson refuses to turn over the garbage department and defies any attempt to make him do so.

Charles L. Hopkins, the veteran Hawaiian interpreter of the Judiciary department, has been selected by a special committee of the Representatives to be the Hawaiian interpreter of the House.

Only 14 Members for the Senate

Senator H. T. Moore, who is ill in San Francisco, will not have to attend the Legislature to draw his salary for this session. The other Senators have practically agreed that he will be excused on a physician's certificate as ill and unable to appear, and that his \$500 salary will be given him just the same.

MURDERER PAYS DEATH PENALTY

Under the personal supervision of High Sheriff Henry, Espiridon Lahon, alias Theodoros Texan, a Filipino, who murdered Eugene Miranda, a fellow countryman, on Hawaii, was this morning hanged in the Oahu Prison yard. The execution was carried out at 8 o'clock and fifteen minutes afterwards he was pronounced dead by Dr. W. L. Moore, the prison physician, and Dr. G. F. Straub.

Espiridon Lahon murdered Miranda at Kaele, Hamakua, Hawaii, and was indicted by the grand jury, on the charge of murder in the first degree, on November 25, 1910. He was tried before the Hon. C. F. Parsons, presiding judge of the Circuit Court of the Fourth Judicial Circuit, December 16, 1910. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and Governor Frear set the date of his execution.

All Ready For Sixth Session

SENATE WILL NOT BE BOUND BY ENDORSEMENTS OFFERED BY REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE

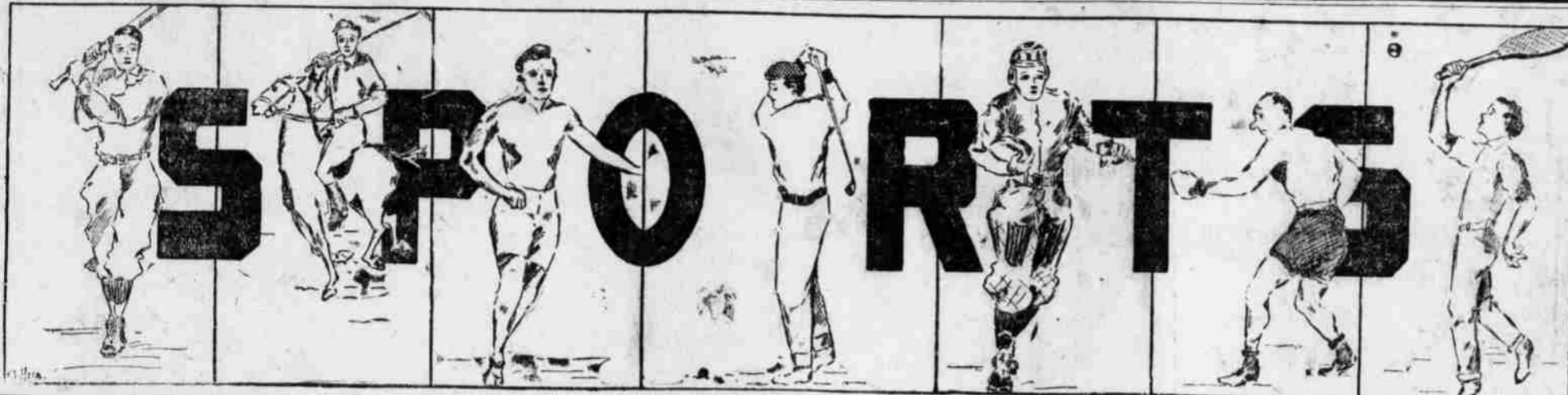

RUNNERS WORKING STEADILY FOR MARATHON NEXT WEEK

KING AND JACKSON DOING ROAD WORK TOGETHER — KAGO ON THE JOB BUT QUIET—TRACK IS BEING PUT IN PROPER SHAPE—WATCH TSUKAMOTO.

"I shouldn't be surprised to see Jackson, the Marathon Kid, finish close up to the first man in the Marathon race of February 22," said Soldier King when he dropped in to see the sporting editor of the Bulletin this morning.

"Jackson and I did fourteen miles yesterday afternoon out around Diamond Head, starting from the Y. M. C. A. building. We did the distance in one hour and thirty minutes, and both felt well when we had finished."

King is a good publicity man for himself, and so is Jackson, but it is hard to get a line on the other runners who will take part in the race.

The old Wai'alua Horse is doing steady work and he may be seen on the streets occasionally, but no one on the outside knows just what the Hawaiian champion of the Marathon distance can do, and when the eventual day comes he is likely to spring a surprise in the way and time he gets over the track which will put the other runners so far behind that they will hardly know they are in the race at all.

It would be strange if Kago should be beaten over his favorite distance, after having held the championship for so many years, and his backers are confident that he will show a clean pair of heels to all the other runners in the race.

King beat Kago in the fifteen-mile go a few months ago, but he did this in a long lead which could not be overcome by the Hawaiian at the last, and it was freely stated by the backers

Cables Scully That He Can Not Arrive March First.

Jimmie Fitzgerald has cabled to Jack Scully that he can not get away in time to be here on March 1, but will come later, as he explains in a letter forwarded by mail.

He was in Auckland, New Zealand, when the cable from Scully reached him, and was unable to get to Australia in time to connect with the steamer, sailing this week for Honolulu.

Jimmie and King would put up a good race here, and one which would draw a good crowd. They have run together on several different occasions on the Coast and each knows all about the other.

"Jimmie has the worst temper ever," said King in talking about him the other day. "He will get so mad over some little thing that he can't talk, and then it is fun to watch him. When he is talking ordinarily he thinks faster than he can get the words out, and before he finishes telling about one thing he has gone off in his mind on something else and begins telling about that, so that no one knows what he is saying. He gets another story started before he finishes the first one."

"I would like to run Jimmie here," King concluded. "For I would like to see how he has improved since he has been in Australia."

BICYCLE RACES WILL BE GOOD

Japanese Association Issues Program for Events at Athletic Park.

Late yesterday the program for the races to be held on the Athletic Park track by the Japanese Bicycle Dealers' Association next Sunday was decided upon, and the prizes for the different events were named.

There will be five events, and perhaps six, during the afternoon, and substantial prizes will be given for three first men in each event.

It has been decided that the ten-mile race for all will be the real race of the day, and Harano, who won this race last year, will be on hand to show the other riders that he is still in the game and can cross the line a second time the winner. There will be but one prize in this event, a gold medal properly engraved.

The Races Planned.

- Five-mile race for Japanese only.
- Five-mile free-for-all, championship of Hawaii.
- Five-mile for boys under fifteen years of age.
- One-mile free-for-all.
- Two-mile free-for-all (perhaps).

Prizes to Be Given.

The men who finish first in all the races except the ten-mile championship free-for-all will receive bicycles as their reward, and the machines for this purpose will be the best on sale in Honolulu.

For the men who finish second, silver medals will be provided, and for the third-place men, watches which will be good time-keepers will be given by the association running the racing day.

Up to today, no officials have been chosen for the races, but there will be a meeting of the association members within a day or two, at which time the officials will be named for the day.

Track in Condition.

Officials of the Athletic Park have a large gang of men at work on the new track, and it will be finished by Friday, they claim, so that everything will be in readiness for the races on Sunday.

The riding events on the six-lap track will be much better for the crowd than on the old track at Kapohalahi Park, for here the riders can be seen from start to finish of the race, while the spectators are in the grandstand, and out at the mile track they could only be seen at the start and as they came around each mile.

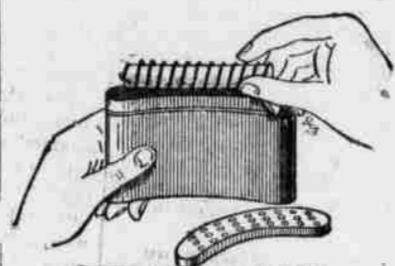
