THE MINISTERIAL TOUR.

To be sure, it is the duty of Cabinet Ministers to acquaint themselves with the country's needs, and they cannot well and thoroughly perform this duty by perpetual confinement to their offices; therefore, Ministers are quite within the sphere of their legitimate work when they make a tour of the island. And why shouldn't they make as many speeches as they please on their rounds? And why cavil if they throw in a little sentimentality, here and there, to moisten the dryness of the more solid material? Surely, if no other good comes out of the tour, it is something for the metropolis to be supplied with a little new sensational reading! Of course, there is sure to be a "few vulgar, silly, sore-headed" people, who will have the "bad taste" to "insinuate," although they may not "clearly aver," that the printed reports of "cordial receptions" and "enthusiasm of the people," &c., would have more weight if it were quite clear that the reporter and publisher were quite independent of ministerial control. These are minor matters that do not trouble large minds; but there are so many inquisitive people who originate such queries as these: Would not a little less talk and a little more action be better for the country? Is not that concern for the people's health which manifests itself in doing preferable to that which is only heard in promising? Is not the half of one year a period long enough in which to make a beginning of some of the great things that are to be accomplished for the public good?

CORONATION WEEKS.

The coronation of His Majesty the King will be celebrated for two weeks, commencing Feb. 12 and ending Feb. 24.

Monday, Feb. 12, a salute of 21 guns will be fired from the Esplanade Battery at sun rise.

At 9 A.M. a procession will be formed in the front of the Bethel Church, under the supervision of Hon. J. A. Cummins.

At 12 M. the ceremony of the coronation. Immediately after the coronation the Royal Party will go to Aliolani Hale, and there unveil the statue of Kamehameha I, if it has arrived in time.

After this the Royal Party will return to the Palace and then distribute the decorations.

In the evening a general illumination of the whole city.

This ends the programme of the day.

POLICE COURT—DECEMBER 13.

CRIMINAL DOCKET.

Chas. Baker, smuggling opium. His Honor, before passing judgment requested the defendant to state how long he had been at sea, and also how long he had been an officer of a vessel. Defendant stated that he had followed the sea from a boy, and that he had held the position of officer on three successive vessels. His Honor said he could not see how the defendant could be ignorant of the laws here in regard to the introduction of opium, and did not believe he could have been, as he himself admitted that he had been here a few months ago, and the very fact of his having brought the opium on board in his trunk, and a few days before reaching port having transferred it under his berth looked very suspicious, if he had been misinformed as he said he had, and had intended to bring the opium down as freight, he would have entered it on the vessel's papers as freight, and on arrival here, when he found it could not be entered, he could have let it remain in the Custom House until the return of the vessel, and then sent it back. Having carefully considered this case and the evidence, the Court could not feel justified in giving a light sentence, therefore passes judgment that defendant shall be imprisoned at hard

labor for six months, to pay a fine of \$200 and costs \$1.40.

Lin Hee, affray, discharged.
Kealoha (boy,) larceny of a banjo. Mr. Hill, the Principal of the Reformatory School, stated that this boy had been committed there for his minority, that he was a good boy and obedient, but that he would steal anything he could lay hands on, that it seemed to be a weakness with him. His Honor thought a severer punishment than to be returned to the school was in this case necessary, so sentenced him to 12 months' hard labor and to a fine of \$5 and costs \$1.

The Chinaman delivered him the bread, but the man refused to pay him and left the store. The Chinaman then called out haul-in, in about five or six minutes four native Policemen arrived at the store, but the native had left before the arrival of the Policemen at the store.

Mr. Citizen wants to know why it was the constable at the Treasury Department did not come out to the rescue. I asked the constable there why he did not come out, and his reply was that his orders were never to leave the Treasury under any consideration.

Furthermore, the native on Sunday morning paid the Chinaman two dollars for damages that had been done there. As to the other matters Mr. Citizen speaks of I know nothing about them.

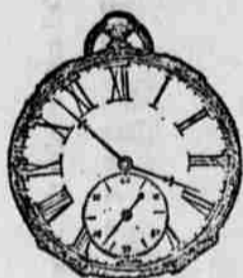
