LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.
OPIMUM BILL GOES TO SELECT COMMITTEE OF FIVE.
Appropriation Bill Completed on Second Reading in Senate—Government Land Bill Attacked in House.
FIFTEENTH DAY, MARCH 9TH

Senator Hocking moved to insert an item of \$500 for surveying and laying out a road through Koolau district to Hana, Maui. Carried.
Senator Rice moved to reconsider the item of \$2000 for landings and buoys on Kauai and increase it to \$4000. Carried.
The Attorney-General called attention to the recent establishment of a small hospital at Waimea, Kauai, and suggested that an addition of \$1000 be made to the original item of \$10,000 for the support and maintenance of hospitals.

Rep. Robertson presented a report of the joint committee on the question of the general registration of the male residents of the republic or of certain classes thereof. The committee favor the proposition, but want the registration to be universal, and submit a bill based on those of 1892 and 1895.
Rep. Robertson presented a question to the Minister of Finance, as to what rules of the Board of Equalization of Taxes were now in force, and what changes in such rules had been made from those of former boards.
Rep. Hanuna renewed his question about reports being presented in English without Hawaiian translations.

for a reduction of appraisement of another class of homesteads. If this bill passed, the lands originally intended to be free of rent might be appraised so high that nobody would take them.
Minister Cooper stated that it was not originally intended to have this class of free homesteads provided for. It might be very well if only native Hawaiians were to be the beneficiaries of this particular part of the Act, but people of any nationality upon getting letters of denization had the privilege of taking out this class of leases. In answer to Rep. Winston the Minister said the amendment was not an after thought, as the provision sought to be amended got into the bill by inadvertence.
Rep. Kamaoaha thought that, as the Executive had to carry out the law, due consideration should be given to its reasons in favor of the proposed amendment. He therefore moved that the bill be deferred until tomorrow. Carried by casting vote of the Speaker.
Adjourned at 11:25.

CUSTOM HOUSE SCANDALS
EMPLOYEES OF APPRAISER'S DEPARTMENT UNDER ARREST.
The Police Believe They Have Unearthed a Systematic Scheme to Smuggle Goods by Japanese.
There was consternation among the employes of the Appraiser's Department of the Custom House this morning a little before noon when Deputy Marshal Hitchcock and a posse consisting of Detective Kaapa, Officers Toma and Evans and Interpreter Chester A. Doyle made their appearance, and commenced a systematic search of each of the employes from C. J. Fishel, the appraiser-in-chief, down to the porters. In Mr. Fishel's pocket book were a number of papers which were carefully examined, and together with some gold returned to him. The Deputy Marshal himself searched Mr. Fishel, and in handing the pocket book back said it was not the kind of money he was looking for. Mr. Fishel was surprised and dumfounded at the search but, after mustering up courage to ask what the trouble was, was told the police were doing their duty and would take charge of his office until it was thoroughly searched. Desks, drawers, boxes and trunks of all kinds were opened and papers especially carefully examined. Officer Toma found a sack of silver in a trunk which was taken in charge by the Marshal.
Hoshima, the principal deputy of Mr. Fishel, who assists in counting and examining Chinese and Japanese goods, was placed in arrest and after being searched sent to the police station. After thoroughly searching the Appraiser's Office the police visited George Stratemeyer's department, afterwards returning to the station-house.
About the same time Iwata, a Japanese who lives on the fat of the land and has no visible means of support other than the earnings of his wife, who is a prostitute according to Detective Toma who has had her arrested three times on that charge, was arrested and placed in a separate cell.
Masui, another Japanese, was also arrested and is held pending investigation.
It appears from what information could be gained in the short time allowed that the police have long had the belief that the government has been systematically robbed by Japanese by the passing of goods through the Custom House and have been conducting an investigation unknown to the Customs authorities. The result of this investigation has brought to light the fact that many Japanese business men were selling goods at such prices that necessitated their being landed without paying the proper duties. Informers were set to work and these facts verified, while the further information was received that certain Japanese were dealing in opium.
From information brought to the Marshal's office by the informers, it was soon discovered that the suspected goods and opium came through the Custom House or rather out of it, and this morning the information is said to have been imparted to the Marshal that a payment of \$200, in the shape of four \$50 bills, had been made to one of the employes of the Appraiser's department, as a bribe to get goods through. It was decided to act on this information at once and the search for the four \$50 bills took place as above detailed.
The two Japanese, Hoshima and Iwata, are charged with having opium in possession. The mode of procedure is said to have been to take large-sized lunch baskets

THE SENATE.

President Wilder called the Senate to order at the regular hour this morning, and the usual preliminaries were had.
President Wilder said he found on his desk the report of the president of the Board of Education, which was too voluminous to read. Referred to Committee on Education.
Senator Brown introduced his bill to restrict Chinese immigration and amend the present laws thereon. The bill restricts the occupation of future immigrants to plantations, rice or sugar mills, and domestic service, and provides for their return to China at the expiration of their term. Referred to the Printing Committee.

Senator Rice from the Printing Committee reported printed copies of the Internal Taxes Bill; also the bill relating to appraisement and assessment for damages in opening up new streets.
Under the head of unfinished business the Appropriation Bill from Current Receipts was taken up.
Minister Damon moved that an item of \$2000 be added to the appropriation for the school department for the establishment and expenses of manual and industrial training in the public schools. Carried.

The report of Finance Committee on the petition of Dr. Rodgers to be allowed back pay to the amount of \$280 was taken up, and Senator Waterhouse moved that it be allowed. On motion of Senator Brown the item was deferred.
For the Honolulu Fire Department the sum of \$14,600 was allowed, an increase of \$700 over the last appropriation.
The Electric Light work was allowed \$13,000; public grounds \$2500; lighting streets other than Honolulu \$500; printing and advertising \$8500; expenses of election \$15,000; forests and nurseries \$12,347.

The item of \$20,000 for aid to the Queen's hospital was passed conditioned on the free treatment of government patients.
Additional items allowed were: Expenses filing certificates of boundaries \$100; Kapiolani Park Association \$5000; quarantining of diseased animals \$850; running expenses of laundries \$3300; government pounds \$500; rent Custom House lot at Kahului \$600; department incidentals \$3000; curbing and paving government sidewalks \$6000; new record books for land department \$2000; running expenses new fishmarket \$1000; printing penal code.....
Senator Brown moved that an item of \$2200 be inserted for aid to the Paradise of the Pacific. After some discussion the item was allowed subject to the approval of the Executive, which means that the periodical must be kept up to its present standard and a sufficient number of copies supplied for free distribution.
Further items allowed were: Hilo Fire Department \$3450; subsidy to steamer between Honolulu, Maui, Molokai and Lanai \$5200; telephonic connection between North Kona, South Kona and Kau \$1000; telephonic connection between Pohoiki Court-house, Puna and Hilo, on condition that a like amount be expended by residents of the District, \$1000.

Senator Baldwin moved that an item of \$2500 be allowed for telephonic connection between Hana and Makawao on the same condition. Passed.

The Attorney-General called attention to a shortage of \$564.37 in the Marshal's office in 1890 according to the report of the Finance Committee of the Legislature of 1892. It had been impossible to account for the responsibility of this shortage and it was not fair to have the present incumbents charged with it. He moved to insert an item in the bill to cover the shortage. So ordered. The item was then referred to the Miscellaneous Committee for investigation.
The bill was then referred to the Committee on Enrollment and Revision.
Senator Brown's Opium Bill came up on the first reading. Read by title.
On motion of Senator Brown the bill was referred to a special committee of five. Carried.
Minister Damon announced that he had sent to London for a copy of the report of the Royal Commission in London on the opium traffic, which he had received and was, at the service of the committee. He also presented for its use a translation of the present laws of Japan on the restrictions on the sale of opium in that country. He reserved the right to give an expression of his opinion on the merits of the bill at some future date.
The President announced that he would reserve the appointment of the special committee for the present.

House Bill No. 3, relating to laundries and wash houses was taken up on the second reading and passed without amendment. The third reading was made the special order for tomorrow.
Senate Bill No. 9, relating to internal taxes, was taken up and read by title, and on motion of Senator Brown referred to a special committee of five.
Senate Bill No. 10, relating to appeals in damage suits for the condemnation of land for street purposes, was read the second time by title and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senator McCandless asked the Minister of Finance to furnish the Senate with the following data:
First—Amount of taxes paid by each and every corporation in the Republic of Hawaii during the year 1895.
Second—Amount of taxes paid by each and every sugar corporation on growing crops during the year 1895.
At 11:40 the Senate adjourned.

FIFTEENTH DAY, MARCH 9TH.
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
The House met at 10 a. m., Speaker Naone presiding.
Minister King reported bills signed by the President.
Rep. Halualani presented a petition from Ewa for \$7000 for a bridge over the Waiawa stream, which went to the committee on internal improvements.
Rep. Robertson presented a favorable report from the Judiciary committee on the bill to provide for the safe keeping of District Court records.
Rep. Rycroft presented a report from the committee on public lands and internal improvements on the bill to amend the Land Act. It recommended adoption to the principle of the Land Act as understood at its passage, and therefore that the bill be laid on the table. The report was tabled to be considered with the bill.
Rep. Richards presented a petition from residents of North Hilo, for a reduction in appraisement of their homesteads.

Rep. Robertson presented a report of the joint committee on the question of the general registration of the male residents of the republic or of certain classes thereof. The committee favor the proposition, but want the registration to be universal, and submit a bill based on those of 1892 and 1895.
Rep. Robertson presented a question to the Minister of Finance, as to what rules of the Board of Equalization of Taxes were now in force, and what changes in such rules had been made from those of former boards.
Rep. Hanuna renewed his question about reports being presented in English without Hawaiian translations.
Rep. Robertson gave notice of a bill to better define the duties of the Minister of Foreign Affairs with regard to the military forces of the republic.
Minister Cooper gave notice of a bill and, under suspension of the rules, had it read a first time, to extend certain streets in the district of Honolulu.
The Registration Act was read a first time by title and ordered to be printed.
The bill relating to records of District Courts came up on second reading. It provides for sending the record books when filled to Honolulu for safe keeping.
Rep. Kamaoaha moved that the report of the committee be adopted, and on that being carried that the bill be type-written and read a third time tomorrow. Carried.
Rep. Rycroft wanted to know if it was copies or the original records that were to be sent to Honolulu.
Rep. Kamaoaha raised the point of order that the bill having passed was not before the house. Thereupon Rep. Richards moved suspension of the rules for reconsideration of the bill, which carried and the bill came up again.
Rep. Rycroft, proceeding, said the District Courts might not amount to much today, but with the growth of the country might become very important hereafter. They were legislating for the future as well as for the present.
Minister Cooper said the object of the bill was to have original records at headquarters for reference, as hitherto when they have been sent for, to be used in trials of appeals, in many cases they could not be obtained.
Rep. Hanuna wanted to know why Hilo and Wailuku were exempted from the provisions of the bill.
Rep. Richards said that there was an item in the appropriation bill to provide a place for safe keeping of such records at Wailuku. If the documents were to be sent to Honolulu there would be no need of that expenditure.
Rep. Robertson explained that Hilo and Wailuku being important judicial seats, there were responsible persons at those places to take care of the records. In smaller places there were more frequent changes of magistrates and when records were wanted, not infrequently they could not be obtained.
The bill passed and was ordered read a third time tomorrow. The Government's bill to amend the Land Act, so as to make owners of homesteads pay rent, with the land committee's adverse report thereon, was brought forward.
Rep. Robertson moved that the report of the committee be adopted, to lay the bill on the table. He repeated arguments used when he moved reference to committee on first reading. The Land Act's intention in granting homesteads was taken at the special session to be the providing of facilities for small farmers to acquire holdings for the mutual benefit of themselves and the country. If free land detracted from the independence of the homesteaders, because they were given something for nothing, then let the conditions of their holdings be made more onerous. The fact was, however, that the conditions were already so severe as to have prevented compliance therewith in some cases. There was a petition received from North Hilo only this morning, praying

for a reduction of appraisement of another class of homesteads. If this bill passed, the lands originally intended to be free of rent might be appraised so high that nobody would take them.
Minister Cooper stated that it was not originally intended to have this class of free homesteads provided for. It might be very well if only native Hawaiians were to be the beneficiaries of this particular part of the Act, but people of any nationality upon getting letters of denization had the privilege of taking out this class of leases. 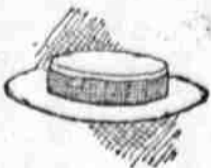

REMOVE IT.

Several administrations have come and been and gone since a strong and numerous signed petition was presented to the Government, asking for the removal of the powder magazine from the place where on either side and below it many homestead lots had been bought and built upon.

After taking possession of the island of Formosa, a prize of the late war, the Japanese authorities sent a force of \$12,000 men to raid the piratical Chinese tribe of the Bootans, who had massacred 92 out of 104 Loochoosans who were on their way to Formosa to found a colony.

Governor Budd of California was invited to speak at a banquet of the League of Iroquois Clubs.

He complied and startled the politicians present, as well as drove consternation into the breasts of office-seekers, with his onslaught upon the spoils system.

BATTLE OF WATERLOO.

Described by the Colonel Commanding the National Guard.

An interesting lecture on the "Battle of Waterloo" was given by Col. McLean at the Y. M. C. A. hall on Saturday evening.

Before beginning, the colonel explained that he was not a lecturer, and that what he would say would be more in the nature of a little talk than a regular lecture.

After speaking of Napoleon's great victories, and comparing the great general with other generals and soldiers, he explained the movements and positions of the different armies which led to the battle at Waterloo.

The battle was lost, the colonel showed, not through any fault of the great general; and the result might have been different, if one of his marshals, who had been following the Prussians, had not failed to turn up with his army at the great battle.

During the talk, the speaker told of an answer Wellington gave to one of his generals, when it seemed that the French were about to win the day.

Several side remarks made by the speaker during the talk were applauded by the audience.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

Native Sailor Killed on Steamer Kauai This Afternoon.

While the I. I. S. N. Co.'s steamer Kauai was discharging sugar into the ship Iroquois this afternoon, a native sailor named Mahoe was instantly killed in the steamer's hold.

A sling of sugar was being hoisted when the fall parted, and Mahoe running underneath was crushed to death by the slingload.

Mahoe belongs to Koolau and is believed to have been unmarried. He was on the steamer Waiakalea but missed his boat, and came over on the Kauai this trip.

CUSTOM HOUSE SCANDALS.

into the appraiser's department each day and take them out at night filled with opium, silk and other contraband goods.

Hoshima's position as assistant to Mr. Fishel gave him plenty of opportunities for this kind of work, as it was impossible for Mr. Fishel to personally count and examine every item in the various invoices.

Iwata is supposed to have been a gobetween for Hoshima and to receive money on his account from the merchants who took the goods. The statement is also made that Hoshima did the crooked work inside and divided with the merchants who handled the goods afterwards.

It is said that this crooked work has been going on a long while and that several Japanese have grown mysteriously rich in a very short time. An instance is mentioned of one shrewd Jap who was an employe of a wholesale liquor store for one year, when he started a dry goods store a few months since.

Collector-General Castle, his deputy Mr. McStocker and Chas. J. Fishel were seen by the reporter but knew nothing. Mr. Fishel described the mode of examining goods and said that necessarily much of the work was done by his assistants, the principal of whom were Hoshima and William Alapai.

It was reported that the latter was also in trouble, but no charge had been made against him up to 2 o'clock.

Deputy Marshal Hitchcock was busy this afternoon in examining several Japanese merchants who are said to be connected with the affair and more arrests are likely to follow.

Hoshima used to be editor of the newspaper Shiunpo, whereby he often got into hot water.

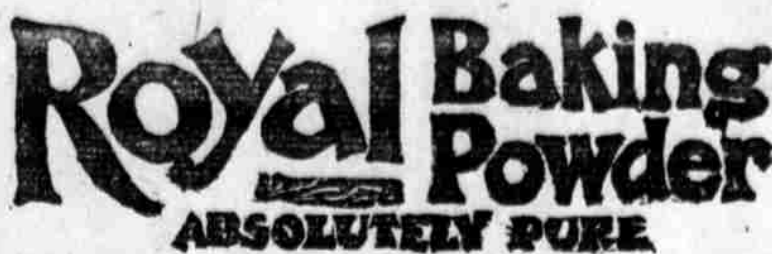

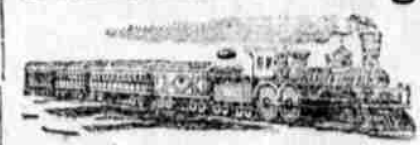

WILL VISIT AMERICA.

Li Hung Chang Accepts Ex-Secretary Foster's Invitation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23.—When it was announced some days ago that Li Hung Chang, the famous Chinese statesman and for many years Viceroy, had been appointed to represent the Emperor at the coronation of the Czar and Czarina of Russia, at Moscow, in May, Hon. John W. Foster of this city, who was associated with Li as counsel in the peace negotiations with Japan last summer, invited him to visit the United States en route to Russia.

Mr. Foster has received a cablegram from Li, acknowledging the receipt of the invitation and stating that he had decided to return to China from Russia by way of Europe and the United States. No date was fixed for his coming but a visit to this country may be expected from the distinguished Chinaman some time during the summer.

We Need the Cable.

It is to be hoped that the differences as to the form of the subsidy for the Hawaiian cable will soon be settled by the Government at Washington, and that plans will be adopted for construction. One of the big needs of the Pacific Coast is a Pacific cable.—San Diego Sun.

It is probable that one of the propositions to build a cable from San Francisco to Hawaii and thence on to Japan or China will be favored by Congress. Canada is arranging for the construction of a similar cable, and the United States should be the first in the field. Both commercially and politically the proposed cable is of the highest importance to this country.—San Jose Mercury.

Leprosy in Boston.

Last month a woman suffering from leprosy was discovered in South Boston and was removed to Philip's Island in the harbor. A dispatch from Boston says: "That it is a case of leprosy is not denied. The fact that she had lived in South Boston five years is given out. She is fifty-five years old, of English birth. The doctors are satisfied that neither the husband nor any of the family has the disease. The family had not mingled with neighbors and as the house has been thoroughly fumigated and other members of the family properly cared for there is no fear of further danger."

Up in Balloons.

The survivors of the 169 persons who left Paris in balloons during the siege have just formed themselves into a society. No fewer than sixty-six balloons left the besieged city, carrying in their cars not only these 169 persons, but 3,000,000 letters and 363 pigeons, which were intended to return to Paris with dispatches, and two boxes of dynamite.

Fifty-two of these balloons fell in France, five in Belgium, four in Holland, two in Prussia and one in Norway, and two were lost out at sea. Eighteen of the balloons fell within the enemy's lines. Of these five were captured by the enemy.—St. James Gazette.

Before coming to this port, she went to the Charlotte Islands for Indians. The Mascot will remain here for two or three days yet, having to make some necessary repairs. She carries besides two sealing boats, four dugout canoes, and the regular sealing outfit. The schooner is lying at Allen & Robinson's wharf, where a crowd of curious natives watched the Indians repairing their canoes.
