THE sudden and unexpected decease of the famous popular novelist, MR. CHARLES DICKENS, is, for the present, the universal topic of conversation in all countries where the English language is spoken.

In the moment of general gloom and affliction, everyone seems to do honor to the genius of the departed, and this is only consistent with the admitted rule "de mortuis nil nisi bonum."

The best writers in the leading European and American journals, with one or two exceptions, have been very liberal eulogiums on the novelist's talent, to some of which we would take a slight exception.

There is no doubt that whilst grief is the all-pervading element for our national loss, any attempt to modify the present public estimate of the genius of the lamented Mr. Dickens, as developed in his numerous literary productions, might be regarded as inappropriate, ill-timed, and unkind.

It is very far from our desire to deny the originality of thought or style, or the intellectual abilities of Mr. Dickens; neither do we desire to deny the strong and beneficial influence which his works have exercised in the cause of humanity, nevertheless, we can not indorse the sentiment of that influential organ of public opinion, the London Times, that "statesmen, savans, and benefactors of the human race can leave no such void when they die."

We happen to know something of the earlier days of the author, and may say of the novelist's future fame, and what we admit his almost indubitable power of portraying the human character in all its phases, it must also be allowed that his position in early life afforded such favorable opportunities for the development of his talents, that no writer before, or perhaps since his time, was so well situated to do so.

At the age of 22 or 23, Mr. Dickens was what is called in London, a third-class reporter on the Morning Chronicle, his special duty being to report the police cases at the head office in Bow Street.

It seems to me, on reading the reports of the legislative doings from day to day, that a great deal of breath was spent to little purpose. Why Kapite was absent when the vote on the above question was taken, I do not know.

The Fijian Difficulty.

Since the publication of our first article on this subject, a new proposition for the solution of "the Fijian difficulty" has been started. It has been stated that the Government of Victoria has entertained the idea of "annexing" the Archipelago to that Colony. And although the protecting shadow of the white settlers there would be less satisfactory to the white settlers than that of the Union Jack, or even that of the Stars and Stripes, they would still be a boon.

It is a pity that such expectations, which seem to be seriously entertained by some of the settlers, should be doomed to almost certain disappointment. No Colonial Government has power to assume or accept an extension of territorial rule. Any exercise of the functions of sovereignty in Fiji by persons commissioned from Victoria, would be just as illegal as a similar assumption of power by a "governing committee," elected by and from the white residents themselves. The members of the Victorian Government can never, therefore, have had the intention attributed to them. It is highly probable that there have been urgent solicitations for the good offices of these gentlemen, and it is not impossible that such good offices may be used with the British Government, to press for a reconsideration of its decision as to Fiji. It is very possible, too, that there may be some idea of making Fiji a dependency of Victoria, in the event of the Imperial Government consenting to such an arrangement. But there is very little reason to hope that any such consent will ever be given. It is in the highest degree improbable that the Imperial Government would delegate to any colonial administration such extensive powers as would be necessary for the annexation and government of Fiji. If the decision already arrived at were reversed, and British rule established in the Archipelago, it would be to officers appointed by, and directly responsible to, the Imperial Government, that such rule would be entrusted.
