Cox was locked in with the other officers and about forty Chinese. The latter tried to force the door. The sheriff, but he successfully resisted them. Dr. Reid arrived shortly after midnight. The wounded man was examined and at 2 o'clock pronounced out of danger. The doctor extracted the bullet and found it to be a 22 caliber pistol ball. As the policemen all carried 38 caliber pistols, it was clear that they could not have fired the shot. It was evident the Chinaman was wounded by one of his own crowd. When this was made clear the officers were released. In police circles here opinions of the case vary and are interesting. Some people are disposed to believe that the lock of system betrayed by the Deputy Sheriff and his men. No arrests have been made. POLICE ARE ROUTED. WITH THE 1ST REGIMENT. A POSSE MAKING A RAID OVER-COME BY CHINESE. Shooting at Wailua—Officers Were Captured and Locked UP. About dark Wednesday night Deputy Sheriff Cox of Waialua and three officers went over to Gaspar Silva's ranch to make a raid on a game of fan tau, being played by Chinamen. Two officers were sent to one house. The third and Cox went to the house of a native woman named Kaku. After reaching there the Sheriff heard firing in the direction of the first house and immediately dispatched his companion to the place following soon after himself. It was found that a sharp fight had taken place. The jailor of Wailua, who was one of the party, had arrested two gamblers and started off with them. He was immediately set upon by about twenty Chinamen, who released the prisoners. The second officer rushed up to assist and was knocked down with a club. The jailor and the third officer sent by Cox then opened fire on the mob. Numbers of shots were returned, some of the Chinamen being armed with pistols and muskets. After a short fight, during which all of fifty Chinamen had assembled, the two officers were overpowered. Their badges and pistols were taken and they were locked in a neighboring building.
