OUR WAILUKU LETTER.

"The Fifteen Club" of Wailuku is a thing of the past, as at the last meeting of the few who still "hung on" those bearing all the expenses of the club, it was decided to disband. Its commencement was a new era to Wailuku. All eyes were turned toward them and the old Bailey Hall, (the club's headquarters), rang with laughter and the popping of soda water "bottles" told of the merry gathering; but it was only of short duration and it crashed like a meteor. Many will never forget the first banquet of the club, as the number of the members present to celebrate the occasion was the unlucky "Thirteen" and to cast all superstitions misfortunes aside a way-man friend was invited.

At the last meeting of the Maui Racing Association, new members were elected and the program scheduled for the 4th of July meet, comprising a series of good and tempting purses amounting to \$1,200. Horsemen are getting their horses ready, and eight running with a few trotting horses are seen early in the morning going at a terrific fast rate. Maui men will make a good showing this year and are not afraid to compete with any Honolulu imported stock.

The 21st driver's badge has just been issued making 21 licensed vehicles in this little town. It is wonderful how they can manage to keep up as the Wailuku of to-day is not the Wailuku of days gone by when money was plentiful.

Dr. Boote has left George Hons and moved to the office formerly occupied by Dr. Raymond, commonly known as "Kalua's Office," where he, with two large, airy and comfortable rooms, can attend to callers both professionally and socially.

More pay being offered to Hawaiian teamsters by the neighboring plantations 15 Hawaiians, old hands on this plantation, have left and are now mustering on the gold-dust-like regions of Kamsomao.

Some of the school teachers have not received their pay for some months past, and are wondering when they will ever be compensated. Notices were received (may be to just only a few of the teachers, most of whom no doubt are Hawaiians), that as the appropriation is exhausted, they must hoomanawanui till the coming legislature for their pay. How does this shortage come in? It can only be attributed to the enormous pay that is being given to some teachers whose work is not worth the pay and whose school hours are mostly taken up by useless lessons. How is this for a tip, Mr. Mott-Smith?

There has been much talk of late about the Huelo Plantation that the step towards the legality of the existence of the lease by J. K. Smythe, trustee of the Hui Land of Huelo to Akanalili, trustee, has largely been investigated. Parties from Honolulu who "smelt the rat" came up last week in favor of the affirmative and left with 40 signatures of the members of the Hui supporting the lease.

Tourists are now numerous visiting Haleakala, and of late Wailuku has been visited by more strangers than heretofore.

The K. P.'s will give a dance to-night at Spreckelsville. Most of the order being of that place it was decided to "hold forth" there. Many are invited and a hot time is well assured.

Sheriff Baldwin left for Hana by the Claudine last Wednesday to investigate a shooting affair. Jack Neil, a luna on the Hamoa Plantation, after firing a stray shot to frighten a Japanese laborer with whom he was engaged in a rough and tumble affair was compelled to aim straight as his life was in peril and so shot his Japanese opponent

through the leg. The first time that "Jack" was ever forced to extremes. He has always been an easy victor.

There will be a dance here at the Court House on Queen Victoria's birthday, and the orders for the dinner will be forwarded to-day. Wailuku, May 20, 1899.

GET OFF THE SIDEWALK.

There is no doubt that the recent order of the Marshal to his officers to clear the sidewalks is excellent, but it is unfortunate that too broad instructions are given to men who lack discretion. "Use your clubs" is the instruction given according to the testimony of an officer who was on the witness stand in the District Court this morning. We are not in "Bowery" land yet, and the officer's club should be used only in an emergency or in self defense. Last night a number of white employees of the Honolulu Iron Works came out from a Nuuanu street restaurant and remained on the sidewalk smoking and talking prior to going to their dreary rooms. There is no traffic on Nuuanu street on a Sunday evening, and they certainly did not interfere with anybody or obstruct any business. An officer, however, bobbed up, ordered the men to "disperse" and threatened to use his club "according to instructions." Fortunately for him he didn't. On the corner of Hotel and Fort streets another officer did the "dispensing" with his club, hitting a man who was leaning against a telephone post, twice. That loiterers who infest the street corners, and through ribald and insulting language make certain parts of the town nearly dangerous to women and decent people should be made to "move on," we fully approve of, but no sweeping order like the one quoted should be issued to men who lack discretion and who obey their orders literally. We remember that at one time an order was given not to allow anybody to gather outside the Police Station. The intention was to clear the sidewalk of the crowds of Chinese and Portuguese who used to come away from the Court room to discuss the merits of their cases, and who obstructed the street. One day three of our most distinguished taxpayers met outside the Station House and started talking about some very important business, when suddenly a police officer appeared and told them to "git off the sidewalk." The man obeyed his instructions, but the affair resulted in ample apologies and explanations from his chief, whose order had been too "broad" altogether.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

It would be well if some of our British residents remembered the discussions in Parliament when Disraeli proposed the title of Empress for Queen Victoria. The Queen is "Empress of India" alone and the title runs not in Europe as "Imperial Majesty." The British in Parliament objected to the use of the continental title. A brief search amidst authorities will substantiate this statement.

Why does not the prosecuting officer in the District Court call the calendar in the rotation as the cases appear on the list before the Court. If they would do so it would be a great convenience to lawyers and litigants. The prosecuting officer is simply a servant of the tax payers and there is no earthly reason why he should keep case No. 1 waiting for disposal while he tries No. 20, and finally tell the people in No. 1 that he isn't ready for trial. We don't mean that the cases should be tried in the order as they appear but they certainly should be called and temporarily disposed of according to the Court's daily "bill of fare."

 Funeral from the Roman Catholic Cathedral at 3 p. m. today. Friends and acquaintances are invited to attend.

Murder Cases Finished.

The second charge for murder against the Japanese rioters of Kahuku was disposed of this afternoon. Two of the men pleaded guilty to manslaughter and were sentenced to imprisonment for 20 and 10 years respectively. A nolle pros. was entered in the cases of the other accused men. This ends the Japanese murder cases.

Will be Ordained.

On next Sunday, being Trinity Sunday, the Reverend Koug Yin Tet will be admitted to the order of priesthood by the Bishop of Honolulu, at St. Andrew's Cathedral at 6 a. m.

To be Hanged.

Kihara, the man who was found guilty of murder in connection with the Kahuku was sentenced by Judge Perry this morning to be hanged on the 28th of August.

AT REMOND GROVE.

The First Regiment Takes a "Day Off" in Camp.

It was very warm and sultry at Remond Grove yesterday as the train pulled up at the encampment of the National Guard of Hawaii with a goodly number of guests, and as the day progressed it became warmer and more sultry and more suggestive of wearing life away in hammocks than in worrying through military tactics.

The white tents of the camp were prettily and tidily placed on the tops of the slopes of the slightly rising hills surrounding the pavilion, but alas! the ground was somewhat moist after the heavy rains of the previous day and consequently genial hilarity mostly usurped the hours of sleep and good tempered fun held within the bounds of orderly discipline was rampant.

Almost at day break there was a march out to the adjacent foot hills and an imaginary encounter with blank cartridge which decently tired the men but put them in the spirit of thoroughly enjoying Berger's music and sweet concourse with fair friends.

On their departure on Saturday evening President Dole, Commander-in-chief, inspected them from horseback at the head of Fort street. The boys returned very early this morning having registered only "one kick" and that against the scarcity of "pork and beans" on Saturday evening. Apropos of this we give a consolatory "poem" from the Hongkong Telegraph showing the alarm of their cousins across the sea under somewhat different circumstances.

We record a very well deserved compliment for our "boys in blue" for their good conduct in Camp Mott-Smith.

A Noah's Ark.

A Hawaiian employee on board the Kinau got hilarious on Saturday night and needing a change of air took a ride in an old hack belonging to an elderly Chinese driver. He didn't like the look of the vehicle and endeavored to improve it by tearing the lining off. The Chinaman then had him arrested and charged with malicious injury. Judge Wilcox who heard the case this morning said that he failed to see why Sam Macy permitted such specimens of Noah's Ark to appear as licensed vehicles and he asked the owner how much the damage amounted to. The Chinaman gave the very characteristic answer: "Suppose I take him (the carriage) to a haole shop, I pay \$10, suppose I go to Chinaman I get him for \$6." The Kinau boy got a chance to settle before to-morrow. He will patronize the Chinese shop.

Breaking a Bottle.

A "haole" was fined \$1 this morning in the District Court for committing a common nuisance by breaking a bottle on a public highway. The offender stated that it was a mere accident. He had a flask of whiskey in his coat pocket and in pulling out his handkerchief the bottle dropped out and was smashed. The Judge didn't think it was a very serious case. Had it been an empty bottle he would have imposed a severe penalty on the defendant but he did not think it possible that any man would intentionally break a bottle containing whiskey and spill the contents.
