Items Here and There by the S. G. Wilder.

A trust with \$3,000,000 capital, to control the tanning industry of the United States, is forming at San Francisco.

The gunboat Machias was given a trial trip at New London, Conn., and the cruise was a worthy successor of that of the great New York. She beat the required speed of thirteen knots by two full knots and probably more. The first half of the course of thirty miles was made in 1 hour, 52 minutes, 45 seconds.

The average for the first half was 15.3 knots and for the second half 14.5. The average for the entire trip was 15.17.

Ambrose Bierce is on trial at San Rafael, Cal., for criminal libel. Riverside, Cal., is to have an electric railway.

Oakland, Oregon, has been scorched for \$60,000.

The big battleship Massachusetts was successfully launched from the yard of Cramps, Philadelphia, June 10. She was christened by Miss Lelia Herbert, daughter of the Secretary of the Navy. Her contract price is \$3,020,000.

Its Right Name.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The Star of June 17 says: "The present Government, exercising the powers vested in it by a successful revolution, could impose an educational and property test on the suffrage."

I would ask the Star to answer the following plain question. How in the name of common sense, or what kind of a "precedent" would it be for a nation to take a hand in overthrowing a nation and then treat with that nation on the subject of annexation? To use the term annexation in this controversy, is out of place; it should be called by its right name thus: A bastard conquest, by ex-Minister Stevens.

The Star and its backers may squirm and twist as they will, to hide the facts; still like "Banquo's ghost that will not down," the fact remains—that if ex-Minister Stevens with his Boston troops had not taken a heavy hand in this revolution, Queen Liliuokalani would to-day be on the throne of Hawaii surrounded by a contented people.

Furthermore, we are perfectly well satisfied that President Cleveland has sufficient evidence of the same. Now, then, a little modesty and a little common sense should teach the Star man to go a little slow, and not blow so much buncum about "successful revolution," and all that kind of rot, until he hears what the mandate will be from Washington on the subject.

Our opinion is, there will be some very bitter pills for some very foolish folks to swallow; probably, before they are well aware of the fact.

MARINE NEWS.

Arrivals, Departures, Vessels Leaving To-morrow, Cargoes from Island Ports, Passengers.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Board of Health meets this afternoon. Diamond Head, 3 p. m.—Weather, cloudy; wind fresh northeast. The Miike Maru comes into dock to discharge 300 tons of freight.

The Japanese immigrants who arrived by the S. S. Miike Maru have all been landed in quarantine. A small black purse containing money has been lost. A reward is offered for its return to W. R. Castle.

Mr. W. J. Smith, Secretary of the Board of Education, has resumed his duties after an illness of a few days. An attempt will be made to get up a cricket match between married and single teams on the Fourth of July.

The battle of the bands at the wharf was intensely amusing. No mistake, the Nationals played down the P. G.s in fine style. At a meeting of the Board of Education, to be held to-morrow afternoon, tenders for erecting the Kilaneas school-house and teacher's cottage will be opened.

LIVELY SEND-OFF.

Charles Nordhoff and Adolph Spreckels Receive a Popular Ovation. Long before noon to-day streams of people in holiday attire were seen heading for the city front. The attraction was the departure of the S. S. Australia at noon. The P. G. and Hawaiian National bands were to give the steamer a send-off.

Perhaps never before had the Oceanic dock held so many people. The wharf was perfectly crowded there being scarcely passing room. It is estimated that the crowd numbered 2000 to 3000. Everybody wanted to see the celebrated Nordhoff, and now and then a whisper which was audible, "Where's Nordhoff?"

Shortly before the Australia drew in her lines Mr. J. E. Bush got up on one of the mooring posts and made a short speech, calling the attention of the people to Mr. Nordhoff as the man who stood alone in the fight for Hawaii and her people. He had accomplished what he set out to do, viz., to find out the true phase of the late overthrow of the monarchy and publish it. He proposed three cheers for Nordhoff, which were given with a will by hundreds of throats.

A regular explosion greeted the speaker's proposal, and cheer after cheer pealed from the throats of the people. It was a rousing outburst. The National Band played the "Star Spangled Banner," "Auld Lang Syne," "The Girl I Left Behind Me," and wound up with "Hawaii Ponoi." After playing the last tune the boys began to sing it, when the P. G. started in to play "Star Spangled Banner." This so enraged the leader of the National Band that he struck up "Queen Liliuokalani March," and the two previous deputy bandmaster Naone, acting in the absence of Prof. Berger on the steamer, was simply out of sight. The National Band drowned the opposition music in "just two seconds." After playing the march the boys felt satisfied that they had paid the score back sufficiently, and they retired while the P. G. band played "Hawaii Ponoi."

TWO PAIRS MADE HAPPY.

Morning Weddings in Two Churches—The Couples Leave by Steamer. Prof. Philip H. Dodge, of Oahu College, and Miss Mary Kinney were married at St. Andrew's Cathedral this morning. Rev. A. Mackintosh performing the ceremony. The couple left on the S. S. Australia to-day to spend their honeymoon in the States. Although it was intended to have the marriage quiet, about a hundred friends of the couple assembled in the church. Mr. W. A. Kinney, brother of the bride, gave her away at the altar. Miss Kinney was highly esteemed for her social qualities as well as her sterling educational services in the islands. The couple took their departure attended by the best wishes of the community for their happiness.

The wedding breakfast was taken at the residence of Mr. H. M. Whitney on King street. Central Union Church was well filled at 10 o'clock by a company assembled to see the marriage of Miss Eleanor Waterhouse to Mr. Arthur Wood. At that bustling hour of the busiest day in the month for Honolulu, it was to be expected that the fair sex should predominate in the assembly. There were beautiful decorations of palms, ferns, vines and flowers on the organ loft and platform. Mrs. A. F. Judd acted as organist. The ushers were Prof. Wood of Oahu College and Willie Rice.

As the bridal party entered, the bride leaning on the arm of her father, Mr. Henry Waterhouse, the organ went from a soft voluntary to the pealing strains of the Lohengrin bridal march. The groom was attended by Mr. Harry Waterhouse, brother of the bride, as best man, the ushers escorting the party down the left aisle. Miss Mary Waterhouse, the bride's sister, Miss Jones and Miss Fuller were the bridesmaids. Whittelsey is not seriously hurt. He is the messenger who stood off the Dalton gang at Red Rock, Ind. T., one year ago.

While two of the bandits were going through the express car three of their companions stood outside firing at the passenger coaches and otherwise intimidating the passengers. Ten thousand dollars in currency and some jewelry were hidden by the messenger and were not found by the outlaws. No attempt was made to rob the passengers and as soon as the outlaws had cleaned out the express safe they fired a parting volley, put spurs to their horses and dashed off southward. The train was run back to Cimarron and an alarm given. A Sheriff's posse was soon in pursuit, but could only track the outlaws a few miles, where they stopped and divided their booty, as several dollars were found.

**GAUDAU WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP.**  
The Austin rogatta came to a close yesterday. The great professional race was between Gaudaur, Peterson and Rogers. The prizes were \$1500 first money, \$500 second, \$300 third and \$200 for the fourth, distance three miles with a turn.

The start was good. Peterson and Stansbury seemed to be the most vigorous, but Gaudaur's long steady stroke was sufficient to give confidence to his backers, although he was slightly behind up to the turn stake. On the turn he did the quickest work and got on the stretch with the same long steady pull that he started with. Peterson turned second, Stansbury third, Hanlan fourth, Teemer fifth and Rogers last.

On the stretch there never was a doubt as to the victory. Gaudaur easily got the lead, length by length, until he was ten lengths ahead of Peterson, and he made the finish at that distance, followed by Peterson, Stansbury, Hanlan, Teemer and Rogers. Time, 19min. 6sec., which beats the best previous record 25 seconds.

The consolation race between Teemer, Teneyck and Rogers was won by Teneyck by a quarter of a length, Teemer second. Time, 22 min. 29 1/2 sec.

THE QUEEN OF ITALY'S LACES MISSING AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

Startling were the disclosures made at the fair grounds this evening, says a Chicago despatch, when the priceless laces sent here by Queen Margherita of Italy were unpacked. While the laces were being taken out of their cases and each piece counted, it was found that thirty pieces were missing. Cablegrams were immediately sent to Rome apprising the Queen of the loss.

It seems that the loss will not fall upon the exposition company, its bond not covering the safety of laces in transit. The company is under \$100,000 bonds for their safe return to Italy. It is impossible to secure any details as to the loss except the statement of Custom-house Inspector Grant to the effect that the laces were missing, and that cablegrams have been sent to Rome conveying news of the loss and making inquiries about the shipment.

PROSPECTS OF FIGHTING AT NICARAGUA.  
A special from Mexico to the New York Times, from Nicaragua, represents that there is grave danger of a collision between the United States marines and the population. Troops, it is stated, have landed and thrown up fortifications at Santa Fe in order to protect the Canal Company's property. The Government of Nicaragua will endeavor to prevent an outbreak, but the situation is serious.

HOPE FOR THE AMERICAN CASE.  
Frederick R. Couder, who went to Europe as associate counsel of the United States in the Behring Sea case, has returned to New York on the steamship New York. He said he believed the impression made in the presentation of the claims of the United States was a most favorable one and he looked for a decision favorable to this country from the arbitrators.

THE WASHINGTON CALAMITY.  
The collapse of Ford's Theatre has occasioned discussion of several other public buildings in Washington alleged to be unsafe.

Lewis W. Boody and M. M. Jarvis, previously reported killed, are alive and well.

**EUROPE.**  
James Gordon Bennett is rapidly recovering from his fall in Paris.

A liquor veto demonstration of temperance people was held in Hyde Park, London. More than 100,000 were present, and speeches were made from twenty platforms.

MIXTURE OF POLITICS IN GERMANY.  
A Berlin despatch of the 10th says: At the general elections for members of the Reichstag on Thursday next and the bye-elections sure to be required 397 members of the House, the full complement, will be returned. The present week closes with 1550 candidates in the field. Not only new aspirants for seats but new political factions appear daily, and as election day draws gradually nearer the confusion grows worse.

Instead of the eight recognized parties in the late Reichstag holding the electoral field in the present campaign there are about twenty sections, each fighting for its own program.

Among the latest developments in the political situation is the break-up among the anti-Semites. The Jew baiters now consist of three distinct factions, and final results must depend on political combinations on the ballots. Everything promises that the new Reichstag will be the most motley Parliament known to history.

The report that the American Congress will consider the currency question in September creates lively

interest in financial circles in Berlin, and more so in Austria. Austria and Hungary each requires 120,000,000 florins in gold to complete the currency conversion, and the prospect of the United States draining gold from Europe excites anxiety among the Rothschilds syndicate, which is working the Austro-Hungary conversion. Financiers calculate that the cost of the Austrian currency reforms will become greatly enhanced if Cleveland's plans are approved.

**HOME RULE SICK.**  
Sexton's resignation from Parliament is attributed to sulks over the Freeman's Journal dissensions. John Dillon and William O'Brien are accused of devoting their energies, since they came out of jail, to undoing the work of national rescue from chaos which was performed during their confinement. They are not mad men, but they are ingrained egotists, wholly unable to conceive of anything helpful being done in Ireland or in Irish politics which does not recognize their heaven-born leadership.

So says Harold Frederic by cable to the New York Times, relating at the same time the story of how these men captured the Freeman's Journal from the man who had fought the fight for it and owned it.

The same despatch has the following dispiriting news for home rulers: Poor old Gladstone departed for Brighton yesterday afternoon to snatch two days' rest from his great burden, all unconscious of the wantonly vexatious addition to it being piled up in the committee-room of fifteen. No telegrams apprising him were sent down last night, but today two Ministers have gone down privately to discuss the situation in fear that this new revelation may affect his nerve and depress his spirits. The most disturbing feature of the whole wretched affair is the circulation of various versions of his reported remark that he does not expect to live through the summer. These are now widely circulated through Parliament and the Liberals are gloomier than at any time since the election a year ago.

**FIRST AMERICAN AMBASSADOR.**  
Thomas W. Bayard, the first Ambassador to London, received an ovation on landing at Southampton in the steamer Paris. In replying to an address of the Chamber of Commerce he referred to his passage in a steamer under the American flag, saying he was sure she was the precursor of a fleet of vessels American built, finer and faster, which would ply between the United States and Southampton. He congratulated the citizens of Southampton upon selecting their home as the terminus in Europe of such an extended commerce as the future would develop. He said he valued his official designation chiefly as a means of giving greater facilities to more perfectly bring about harmony of interests between two great branches of the English-speaking races. Bayard's manner and words captivated everybody.

**BRITISH PROTECTORATE WANTED IN SPAIN.**  
Riots have broken out in Corunna, their cause being the indignation aroused against taxation arising for military reforms. The Provincial Defense Association is circulating pamphlets advocating that the province of Corunna should be placed under a British protectorate. The movement is of a local character and does not extend to other parts of Spain, but the authorities appear to be alarmed by the agitation, and have ordered troops to be concentrated promptly to suppress the disorders.

**BICYCLE RECORD BROKEN.**  
In a scratch mile cycling race at Horne Hill, England, the American, Sanger, was beaten by the Englishman, Harris. It was a grand race. Sanger came to the front in the second lap, and held the lead until 200 yards from home, when a splendid tussle ensued. Harris spurred and won by a yard and a half. Time, 2 min. 34 sec. The last quarter-mile was done in 29 1/2 sec., beating the record by one-fifth of a second.
