## HAWAII'S "BLUE" LAWS

CONSTITUTION and LAWS

Framed by the Missionaries

LAWS of the HAWAIIAN

ISLANDS.

11 If goods are brought here from foreign countries and deposited with the design of exporting them again, those goods shall pay duties like all others. But if the owner give notice in writing that they are for exportation, he shall then be entitled, when they are taken away, to receive back two and a half per cent, leaving one half per cent transit duty. This shall apply to every kind of property that is landed, but the collector of customs must direct in relation to the storage of such goods. If goods are brought into a harbor for reshipment they shall pay the same transit duty as if landed.

12 It shall be the duty of the Governor of each particular Island to see this law executed at his place. The Governor shall establish such officers as are necessary, and shall give the licences, to keepers of stores, and houses of entertainment and he shall pay the moneys into the hands of the Treasury Board.

13 It is further enacted in relation to all ships which anchor at Lahaina, that whereas, masters of ships have uniformly refused compliance with the Quarantine laws, and the expense of examining their ships has therefore fallen on the Government, and whereas the income of the Government is not so great as the expense incurred, therefore from this time potatoes will not be presented in the manner they have formerly been. Ships will however continue to pay ten dollars each for anchoring, after which trade no shore will be free.

## A Play to the Gallery.

## The Mouse Gets Out Of The Mountain.

There is something extremely amusing in reading the report of something which calls itself a "nominating convention." A Senate and a House of Representatives have been formed or will be elected through the valiant endeavors of a number of delegates.

Out of the above mentioned list there are four senators who have been seen in politics before. J. N. Wright and H. W. Schmidt are new comers. Mr. Wright is a well-known horse man and a prominent G. A. R. Mr. Schmidt is a member of the Consular Corps, representing Sweden and Norway. He is also an author of librettos of no mean quality. It is presumed that he has resigned his Consular office and will feel satisfied in posing as a senator.

The representatives with one exception are unknown to the political world of Honolulu. The speech-making in the next Legislature will be of a Shakespearean turn and highly edifying to the common herd.

The wise men assembled adopted the following platform which shall have our attention in a coming issue. It will never have the attention of the "representatives" of the Times and the Maca.

1. We declare unequivocally that the foremost mission of the American Union Party shall continue to be unreserved efforts to secure the political union of Hawaii with the United States of America.

2. We cordially commend the efficient, courageous and honorable conduct of public affairs by the officers of the provisional government and republic of Hawaii.

3. We are proud of the party's policy of the internal improvements and development, and in witness point to the inauguration of extensive public works, to practical projects of similar nature, and to plans of settlement for open lands.

4. We oppose the employment of prison labor in any mechanical pursuit.

5. We are opposed to the employment of Asiatics upon any public works.

6. We declare against the importation of labor or material of any kind whatever by the government.

7. We recommend that the government at once secure absolute ownership of all water-front lands in every harbor throughout the group where the possession of such lands by other parties is detrimental to necessary wharfage facilities.

8. We favor a revision of the tax system, whereby all property, improved and unimproved, shall be taxed on an equitable basis, and recommend a consideration of the graduated tax system.

9. We favor such legislation as will promote the occupancy of all public lands by small holders, and foster the development of varied industries, believing it to be of vital importance that "many acres should be for many men." We ask that Hawaiians have the opportunity to secure homesteads upon more favorable terms than granted to others.

10. We are in hearty sympathy with the spirit which actuated the government in its dispatch of a commissioner to seek to Eu-

rope labor for the industries of the Islands; as a further earnest of the intent of the dominant party in these promises we refer to the creation of the Labor Commission by the councils of the republic.

11. We pledge all the power and influence this party may possess to aggressive endeavor to bring about at once the restriction of Asiatic immigration. In this connection we again point to the menace of Asiatic encroachment, and demand legislative protection from these people for Hawaiian, American and European mechanics and tradesmen.

12. We urge the enactment at once of a law that will cause the Asiatics brought to these Islands for plantation labor to continue in that service, or return to their homes.

13. We demand such revision of the Tariff as will prohibit competition with American products and manufactures; protection to which America is justly entitled by virtue of the Treaty of Reciprocity, and which we deem necessary to insure the existence of our merchants who are being rapidly superseded by an element having nothing in common with the principles lying at the foundation of our institutions.

14. We urge the government to secure for the islands cable communication; that no exclusive franchise be granted, and that no agreement or contract be made which does not meet with the unqualified approval of the United States.

15. We ask that there be continued effort in the direction of extending and improving the system of free schools.

16. We declare our opposition to monopolies and trusts of any kind.

17. We declare full allegiance to the Republic of Hawaii, citing its constitution and the present peaceful condition of the country as work of the American Union Party.

### A SEVERE REBUKE.

The *Hawaii Shimpo*, a Japanese newspaper published in Honolulu contains a strong article against an outrageous attack on the Japanese that appeared in the *Star* last week, and on which we have previously commented. We publish a translation of the *Shimpo* editorial which proves the interest that our Japanese fellow-citizens take in the doings in this, their adopted country and the resentment with which they treat the uncouth slurs of men and papers who know nothing about the true state of the sons of the Rising Sun.

The article is headed *The Outrageous Comments made By the Hawaiian Star*. And reads as follows:

The *Star* in its issue of the 8th inst, has abused the subjects of the Japanese Empire in a most despicable and malicious manner. We have been used to attacks from newspapers, which have been couched in a very rude language. We took no notice of them. We consider it childish to enter into a fruitless discussion, and we allowed the abuses to go on unanswered. In this instance the *Star* editor has dipped his pen in poison and we consider it our duty to say a word or two in response. Had the unfair criticism appeared in Japan our patriotic and brave brethren would have answered in the strongest terms.

The *Star* calls the Japanese Empire semi-civilized, the people egotistic and her statesmen, "pigmy statesmen." Such language is outrageous! Are you, who boast of being "civilized" not ashamed of using such degrading and indecent terms. Your language points to barbarism rather than to your claimed civilization.

"Japan is semi-civilized," says the *Star*. By what authority do you make such a statement? What do you call semi-civilization, what civilization? Are you not aware that the revised treaty between England and Japan has been concluded, and that today the two great powers stand on an equal footing? Many of the best principles in our constitution and laws have been adapted from English and German law, and Japan has never been behind in learning from her sister nations. The honesty and impartiality of our judicial and executive officers have never been doubted, but are admitted by all the world. Can you say the

same for your boasted "civilized" courts? Do you know that most extensive communications through railroads, telegraphs, and steamship lines have been completed and joined the mountain and the lonely village with the outside world? Have you any idea of the educational work done by our schools colleges and universities? Do you know that the national wealth is so great that the Japanese government has been more troubled in devising means to spend the surplus than in raising revenues? The present progress of Japan can hardly be realized by a man who has spent a decade in a place not bigger than a bean.

Do you know the actual state of Japan's civilization today? You, who claim to be civilized proves your total ignorance of Japan when you call her semi-civilized. You are writing your paper without responsibility to truth. You are an offender against journalistic decency and a poisonous creature in journalistic circles. When you attack Japan, you simply put a lot of words without meaning together. Your ignorance of your subject does not lessen your offense of misleading the community which reads your paper.

If you really want to know about Japan call around, and we shall furnish you with all the knowledge you can desire.

You also said, that Japan has to learn that it is not the guns that win a battle, but the men behind them. The present war has well proven that Japan lacks not the men behind her guns. Are you aware of the fact that most of the men-of-war who fought so bravely in the recent battles were built in our dock yard at Yaku-suka? Have you ever heard about the Shimonoose explosive powder or of the highest qualities of the Murata rifle? The powder and the rifle are of Japanese invention and manufacture and every military journal in Europe and America has been loud in praise these implements of war.

While your little paper tries to belittle the Japanese the *London Times* and *New York Herald* are ceaseless in expressing their admiration for the bravery of Japan, and their appreciation of the grand progress of our glorious country.

If you cannot give facts justly and honestly, we suggest to you at least to give up the impolite and disgusting expressions used against our countrymen. If you claim to possess civilization show it in your acts and avoid insulting reflections on a people that has never offended you. In conclusion, we advise you to remember the following words:

*Nose te ipse*

The police force is used for stage-effect but we can state that senior captain Parker knows his business too well to interfere in matters where his authority has not been called.

The lady in question is today enjoying the beautiful climate of Waikiki, and is feeling rather amused over the *Advertiser* sensations.

Mr. George Lycurgus has closed Sans Souci as a hotel, and the lovely resort will in the future be occupied as a private residence. Mr. Lycurgus is to be congratulated on being the happy possessor of the finest bathing place in Honolulu, and Honolulu is justified in using harsh names against its indiscretion led to the closing of the most popular resort.
