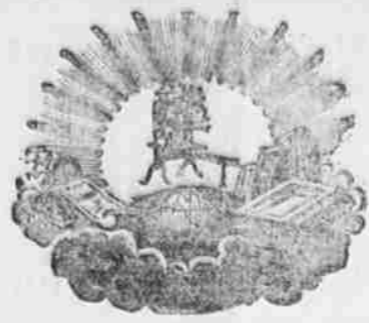

SCHOOL NOTICE.

EDUCATION OFFICE, Honolulu, March 3, 1888. The regular vacation of all Government Schools, at the close of the first school session of the year, will extend from Friday, the 6th, to Monday, the 30th of April next. The additional week has been given this year for the purpose of holding conventions for the instruction of teachers. The time to be devoted to that object will extend from Monday, the 16th, to Friday, the 20th of April, both inclusive, and all Government teachers within the sections designated in the published notice of the Inspector-General of Schools, on the subject, will be required to attend.

J. K. Birkett, at Lihue, for Kauai teachers.

J. H. Van Gieson, at Halawa, for Molokai teachers.

Kau teachers may present themselves at Kona Waena; Hamakua teachers at Kohala or Hilo as they desire.

The Board of Education authorizes the several School Agents to pay the expense of transit to and from the places designated.

ARBITRATION SUPERSEDING WAR.

The Association of the Chamber of Commerce of the United Kingdom unanimously passed a resolution advocating an arbitration treaty with the United States, for the settlement of all difficulties that may arise between that country and England. It is an item of news by the mail brought by the Belgic last week. Of late years a strong disposition has grown up among the thoughtful of those two great nations, and apparently grows stronger every year, to settle all disputes and misunderstandings which may occur between them by arbitration, instead of resorting to force. It is to be hoped that the disposition is sufficiently strong to secure, by solemn treaty, this desirable object ere long. There are special reasons why the United States and Great Britain, above all nations, should always continue on the most amicable terms, and mutually agree to arrange any difficulties that may happen to arise, by the rational and humane method indicated. They are closely related by blood and language, and their respective institutions and methods of government have much in common. If these two great powers decide that arbitration shall supersede war, so far as they are concerned in their dealings with each other, an example will be furnished to the civilized world which cannot fail to have influence in inducing other nations to exercise thought in the same direction. Warfare, which is legalized murder, is a severe reflection on our boasted civilization and Christian advancement; and the sooner it comes to be regarded as barbarism, and the Christian nations adopt a less ferocious method of settling their differences, the sooner will they conform to the precepts of the Great Teacher in whom they profess to believe.

ROPED IN.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—"Haul in!" is the curious Honolulu cry when the police are wanted to catch a thief, or to stop some midnight brawl. One of the curious Honolulu sights, too, is the Hawaiian canoe, with its huge pile of net heaped up, which the fishermen will bye-and-bye take out and spread out, drawing it then closer and closer, till the big school of fish finds itself "roped in." That is the predicament in which some of us think we find ourselves through no purpose or fault of our own.

We had supposed, when we went into this Reform movement, that we were going to secure the choice of officials, and the adoption of measures, that would give us "responsible" government; that is, as we understood what we expected, government by "responsible," sensible, honorable people, not by an "irresponsible," ignorant, impetuous Hawaiian. But we find ourselves in a very different position from what we expected. Our "responsible" government turns out to be a rather different affair from what we thought we had a right to expect. "The power of control in legislation, by the particular and qualified negative called a veto," given by the Constitution to the King, seems to have so scared the Cabinet and Legislature, that they lost their wits; for how else could they have forgotten all sense of moral "responsibility," in attempting to prove that the Constitution does not mean what it says; and that they had not given to the King what they told him that they had given him.

Now that the Supreme Court has decided that the Constitution was intended to give the King this veto power, and does give it to him, we ask those who framed the Constitution and presented it to the King, who is "responsible" for trying to make the King and the community believe, that Article 48 did not give any such power, and was never intended to put any such power in the hands of the "irresponsible" Hawaiian? Have we been all these weeks, clamoring for a "responsible" government, and think that we are going to get it by making Ministers "responsible," by giving them control over the King, only to find that we have been "roped in" to support a scheme, which was only a delusion and a snare. Who is "responsible?"

HILO NOTES.

Work on our streets has begun under the direction of the new Road Boarder. Other places may lack the material to make a Board of, but Hilo has men who are both suitable and willing to undertake this work. Phrases of difficulty in finding suitable men with public spirit enough to undertake the work

without pay, have failed of fulfillment in this district, at least.

Capt. Matson, of the brigantine Lurline, is not in the habit of putting in eighteen days on the trip down from San Francisco, and he declines to break in upon his established course of action. Consequently he is now under quarantine regulations in Hilo Bay. The Lurline arrived on Tuesday evening, twelve days out from San Francisco.

H. B. M. S. Caroline arrived Wednesday and Capt. Sir William Wiseman took a horse and started for the volcano soon after her arrival, in a regular Hilo rain. By the way, rain has been falling so much of the time lately that the stock question, "Do you think it will rain to-day?" is giving way to, "How much do you think it will rain to-day?" A thunder-storm kept some nervous people awake a good part of last Tuesday night. Wednesday afternoon, when the clouds cleared away a little, Mauna Kea showed about as much snow as she ever exhibits. Hilo, March 1st.

THE PARABLE OF THE PLANTER.

Then, behold, the ships departed,  
and came not back again, but went  
to another port, because it was more  
convenient.

And, lo, the people lifted up their  
voices and wailed, and said, What  
shall we do? And they were all sore  
afraid for the future, and the desola-  
tion which they saw coming upon  
them.

At this juncture, there arose a  
man who knew a thing or two, and  
he said unto the people: Let not  
your hearts go down into your  
boots, nor shake your lives out of  
your bodies with fear because the  
ships that catch the great fish of the  
sea have left us. Have we not  
here a soil that will grow anything,  
from a blade of grass to a bottle of  
grog, from a cabbage to a constitu-  
tion? We will plant a soft stick  
which the natives call ko, and from  
its juice, which is like unto honey  
for sweetness, we will make a food  
that people of other lands covet,  
and when they hear thereof, they  
will send their ships hither and buy,  
and we shall become as rich as  
Croesus and as proud as Lucifer.

When the people heard this they  
were much pleased, and exclaimed  
with one voice: Verily, this man is  
a cousin to Solomon, and knows a  
thousand part more than he.

And it came to pass that some of  
the people who could see to the end  
of their nose, and had some pluck  
withal, went into the country  
where nobody lived, and tilled the  
ground, and the fruits of their labors  
they put into bags, until their  
barms were full to overflowing, like  
the storehouses of Egypt; and the  
news thereof became known  
throughout the world.

Then there came great ships and  
carried away this produce, leaving  
in place thereof bags of gold, which  
made the planters exceedingly rich.

These people which tilled the  
earth having thus realized the  
reward of their patience and toil,  
they visited their former friends in  
the city of Honey-Looley, and gave  
to them of their wealth, until the  
city became great and opulent.  
Mansions sprang up like mush-  
rooms. Money boxes that had long  
been empty split with a plethora of  
coin, and the people who had walk-  
ed on two legs now rode in chariots  
drawn by four-legged steeds; they  
who had long stood idle in the  
market-place, praying for a job to  
turn up, and getting none, found  
"more work than they knew how to  
do; and they who before got a  
penny a day, and thought them-  
selves lucky, now had six, and  
"trowled because it was not enough.  
And the people grew and multiplied  
and spread out on the Plains, and  
built up summer residences at Wai-  
kiki, and prospered immensely.

Afterwards it came to pass that  
the food called sugar, which the  
planters made from the juice of the  
stick that grew out of the earth, be-  
came abundant like the sand on the  
seashore; and the price thereof was  
"cheap as dirt; so that cash grew  
scarce, and the inhabitants were  
forced to pull in their horns.

At this time there arose some  
among the people whose cantanker-  
ousness waxed warm, and being  
over-much filled with anger, there  
was no room for reason; and they  
spoke great swelling words against  
the planter, saying: Let us clip the  
wings of this bird which they say  
lays a golden egg. Who is this  
haughty fellow, that he should lord  
it over us! If we squelch him, pros-  
perity will return to us, and we  
shall be happy. Let us sit upon  
him, and run the country on our  
own hook. And they all shouted,  
"Hurray boys! This is no humbug!  
Then there arose one among them  
with seedy raiment and a stupid  
countenance, and said: Men and  
brethren, you are a set of dunder-  
heads: you look as far into the fu-  
ture as the strongest among you  
can drive his nose into a stone wall.  
Know ye not that the planter whom  
ye despise is the financial life of the  
land! If you knock him out of time,  
your time, too, comes suddenly to  
an end, and six months thereafter  
all that will be left of this flourish-  
ing city of Honey-Looley will be  
two ancient pigsties, and a fowl-  
house; also, the remains of a medi-  
eval adobe hut. Its population,  
male and female, will comprise an  
old wahine and a tom-cat.
