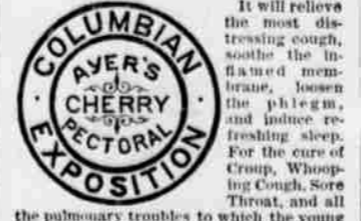

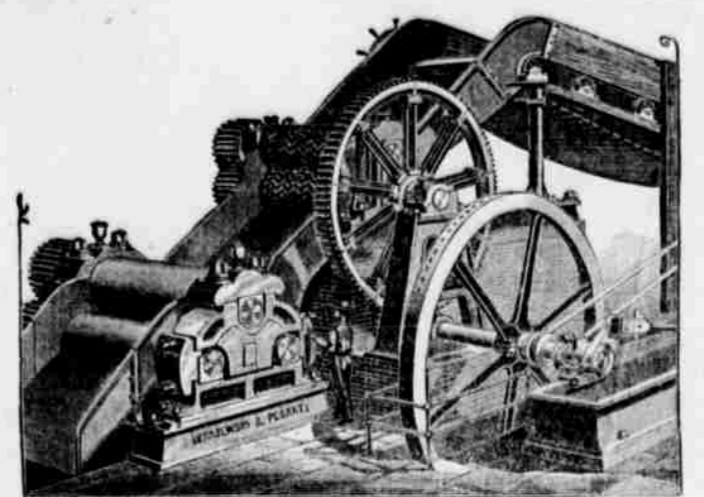

NATIONAL CANE SHREDDER.

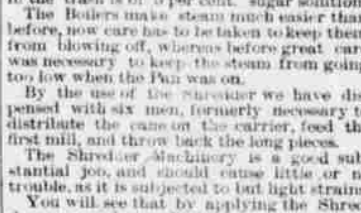
Patented under the laws of the Hawaiian Republic. One of these Shredders has recently been installed at the mill of the Panhaun Plantation Company, Hamakua, Hawaii, and Mr. Andrew Moore, the manager, writes concerning it

PAHAUN PLANTATION CO., HAWAII, JAN. 10, 1895. Wm. G. Irwin & Co., Ltd., Honolulu, HI. GENTLEMEN:—The mill has been running during the past two weeks, with the National Cane Shredder lately installed, giving the most satisfactory results. Our mill consists of three sets of two rollers, 22 in. dia. by 22 in. long. The shredder shows being 5 ft. 7 in. long, driven by an automatic engine 11 in. dia. cylinder by 14 in. stroke.

The rollers being milled is as hard as if it were for cane to be having been subjected to a severe drought during the whole period of its growth, and growing on land with a trade wind exposure. Our experience with the shredder, particularly with above cane, proves it to be just what our mill requires. It has worked better than formerly after passing through the first mill. The first mill is allowed to open 1/16 in. instead of 1/8 in. as formerly, so that the trash now leaves the first mill better ground, than it formerly did the second, and this without the old timed grinding, chocking, and straining of the machinery.

Behind the first mill second mill we apply hot water, the quantity for the past 12 days, as per statement attached, has averaged 35 per cent. on the total juice from the cane. The trash from the first mill is cut up much finer than before the shredder was applied, a lot of it remaining saw dust, it contains as per statement 20 per cent. of moisture and makes good fuel, the juice from the last mill stands 5 degrees Brix., so that the moisture in the trash is 10 per cent. sugar solution. The rollers make a clean cut, sugar cane before, now care has to be taken to keep them from becoming too hot before going to the shredder, as it is subjected to hot light strains. The shredder machinery is a good substantial job, and should wear little or no trouble, as it is subjected to hot light strains. "Though the fashion in woman's dress has changed a hundred times in a hundred years," said a young lady of observation quoted by the New York Sun, "it has been a change of detail rather than of style, while of changes of costume—that is, of dress which can be said to mark a historical epoch—there have been but two.

"Of changes of distinctive fashion in woman's garb there have only been nine during the past 100 years, which, I think, is greatly to her credit. From 1705 to 1810 or 1820 was the era of the short waist.

From 1820 to 1835 there was a distinctly marked spell of broad shoulders, big sleeves and bell skirts. In fact, our present fashions have been considerably based on that decade.

From 1835 to 1843 there were sloping shoulders and big, full skirts. From 1843 to 1865 there was the reign of the crinoline, the longest rule of a fashion that ever prevailed, I guess.

From 1865 to 1882 was the period of evolution. The train grew into being, the skirts shrank little by little, growing slimmer and slimmer until the outlines of the figure were once more revealed.

From 1882 to 1894 was the fashion of the puffers and princess dress. With 1892 came in the re-establishment of big sleeves.

A Curiosity in Locomotion. Many novel modes of locomotion have been proposed since first the problem of rapid and easy transit began to vex the mind of man, but perhaps none more curious than that depicted in the cut, whose advantages the anonymous inventor of the vehicle enumerated as follows:

"My vehicle will carry four people without counting the driver. It is strong, easy to draw and can turn in a horse's length. The driver completely controls the animal, and no dust is thrown up to inconvenience the sitters, for by the time it rises the car is well in advance of it. It is cheap; the harness is simple and safe. The horse is sheltered from heat, rain and flies. If he should fall, there is no more danger to life and limb than if he fell in a carriage, and, last of all, no showy animal is needed so long as his wind is sound and his legs and tail respectable. Travelers in this trap can sit in any position—back to back or face to face, two and two. The weight is all near the collar and the animal perfectly under control. The estimated cost contrasts favorably with that of an ordinary one horse vehicle."

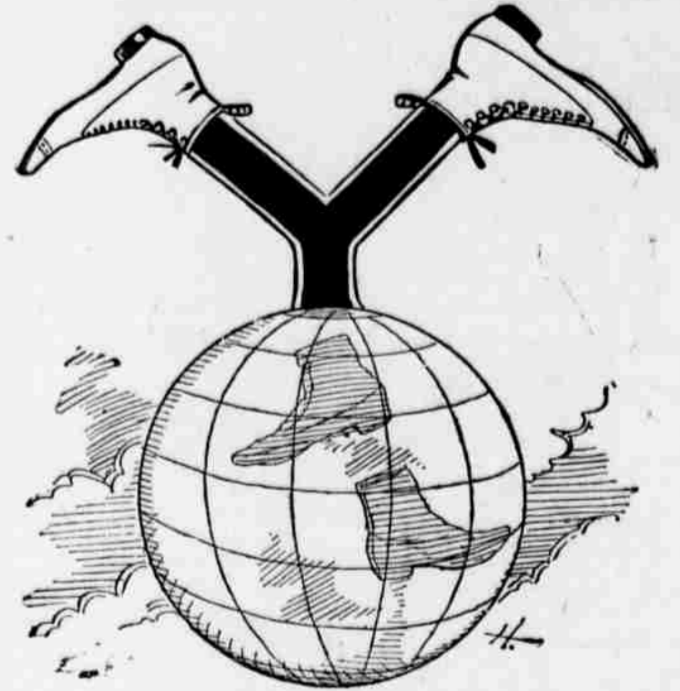
