## LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

London, Aug. 13.

The removal of Baron De Lesseps from the presidency of the Suez Canal Company is probable, and it is likely that he will be succeeded either by the present English Consul-General, Sir E. B. Malet, C.B., or the British Vice-Consul, Mr. Raphael Borg.

The Turkish Press has been warned not to comment on the delay in landing troops in Egypt.

It is not true that Germany is adding to her fleet of gunboats.

The Marquis de Rays has been arrested in France for frauds in connection with the ill-fated New Ireland expedition.

The riot at Beyrout was suppressed. A few were wounded. The town is now quieting.

An Italian man-of-war has gone to Caprea in consequence of a report that an expedition is contemplated to carry Garibaldi's will into effect by cremating his body.

The condition of affairs in Ireland is decidedly improving.

There is still some excitement in America over the arrest of suspected Americans in Ireland.

It is proposed that the Khedive shall command the combined forces in Egypt.

The Conference of Powers will disperse as soon as the Convention is signed between England and Turkey.

Arabi is reported to be very strongly entrenched.

General Ignatieff has been arrested. Alexandria, August 13.

A body of rebel Egyptian troops commanded by Arabi in person, made an advance to-day against Fort Mex. Their approach was however detected by the outposts, and a body of British troops from the fort was despatched against them. The enemy was repulsed without difficulty, and retreated to the interior.

Constantinople, August 13.

The proposed military convention between the British Government and the Porte, a draft of which was laid before the Conference by Lord Dufferin yesterday, has not as yet been completed, and notwithstanding the concession which the British Government has offered with regard to the command of the Ottoman troops in Egypt, the Porte is still disinclined to accept the convention, and further negotiations are expected to take place.

SHELTER SHEDS ON THE WHARVES.

The rainy season is coming on again and still a considerable part of our wharf accommodation is unsheltered. How are the men to work and the freight to be protected on these open and uncovered wharves?

It is a universally received axiom that all accommodations and facilities given to the public or any section of it, ultimately repay their cost not only in increase of business but in hard cash. Every branch of the public service not only in this but in other countries affords numerous examples of it.

The facilities for the receipt and discharge of cargo affect our two greatest industries, the planting and the mercantile. The planter is interested in seeing that his produce is shipped promptly and expeditiously and that as much care of it is taken as possible; the merchant that his goods are exposed to as little danger of damage as possible.

And it is to meet both of these ends as well as to ensure the comfort of the laborer employed in the transshipment that we advocate the erection of shelter-sheds on all our wharves. It is a well-known fact that most of the sugar arrives in the wet season and that so far there has not been sufficient facilities for its protection from the weather.

West Maui.

Our West Maui Correspondent says: The railroad, the material for which is expected at an early date, is to extend to the cane fields of Kaanapali.

The roof of the Lahaina mill is to be raised to make room for improved machinery.

Mr. and Mrs. Hitchcock and their young friends who have been camping on the mountain have returned—too much rain.

WE take great pleasure in notifying the appointment of Mr. C. N. Arnold as Road-Supervisor-in-Chief for the island of Hawaii. A similar office is much needed on every island.

ONE of the late members for Honolulu was brought up at the Police Court on Monday, for disturbing the quiet of the night by disorderly conduct. What a fine example.

WE hear that Miss Lewis, of the Royal School, has accepted a position in the Oahu College. We congratulate the Punahou people on their good fortune in getting such an able and ladylike teacher.

"It is remarkable," says a friend, "that the United States, the home of liberty and freedom, and the determined opponent of crowns and thrones, should manufacture crowns and thrones for little petty royalties."

THERE were five deserters from bond service at the Police Station yesterday afternoon. Lately the police have had an unusually large number of haul-ins—16 cases were tried on Monday and 15 yesterday.

WHAT's is plot concerning the safety of the Branch Hospital at Kakaako? Who left the giant powder there and wouldn't take it away? We pause (and for a long while too) for a reply.

THERE is a fine specimen of painting on glass now being exhibited in the window of Thrum's, Fort Street Store. The artist is a young Spanish lady. All those who are interested in art should call and examine this.

Two little children, brother and sister, aged 8 and 6 years respectively, crossed from Liverpool to Philadelphia alone. Their mother had left them in an industrial school in Liverpool three years ago, and had gone to Philadelphia. When she had saved sufficient money she sent for them.

DR. KING, U.S. Army physician, has been writing considerably on the influence of locomotives on the public health. He asserts that many parts of the large Eastern cities, which were formerly uninhabitable from the miasma arising from swampy land, are now healthy localities, owing to the purification of the air by the heat and incessant

motion of the locomotives. The theory is well worth consideration.

A LETTER, dated Albany, West Australia, July 17th, was received by a gentleman in this town from Capt. Mellen, of the steam whaler Lucretia. It will be remembered that on the 8th inst., we notified that the Lucretia had turned up there after being missing over a year. The Captain explains matters by stating that on his arrival off Cape Horn from New Bedford he found the vessel so foul that he could not make any westing; he therefore turned eastward and sailed past the Cape of Good Hope to West Australia. He expects to arrive in San Francisco in November.

MARSHAL PARKE sent Captains Mehtens and Tell over to Kaneohe on Sunday to inquire into the disturbance there. As the result of their visit the officials there have been stirred up and we hear that one man has been fined \$150 for supplying liquor to natives on the Heeia plantation; and the sheriff is busily engaged in hunting up more offenders. It would be well, we think if a little more stirring up of this kind was done. Let a vigilant officer be selected to go round the islands as a general inspector and hunt up these cases. We hear that the Marshal, with his usual foresight, has the matter under consideration.

THERE is a man in this town who is capable of doing a smart thing occasionally. Going into a shop a little while ago he spoke of his facilities for bringing trade to it, and asked what commission he would get. The answer was satisfactory, and for some time he busied himself in bringing customers in and afterwards going for the fees. By and by, however, his business got slack and he adopted a new mode. Taking his stand at a convenient distance from the door, he waited till he saw some one go in and then he would accompany them and see what they bought. Of course he claimed his per centage. This too began to get played out and one day as he was in the shop, he noticed a gentleman buying some trifles, so turning to one of the shop people, he said, "I shall persuade him to buy a big lot from you tomorrow. I know he wants something." "You are too late," said the other, "for he just bought what he wanted, yesterday." Now comes the point. "I shall collect my per centage on that, then," said he. The Channel tunnel works are still going on. The principal gallery has attained a length of 2,000 feet. It is estimated that at least 25 tons of earth and rock are extracted daily. The workmen are employed during the day only, and a guard is placed over the works at night. Great secrecy is observed, and no one is permitted to view the works without an order from the director, Sir E. Watkin.

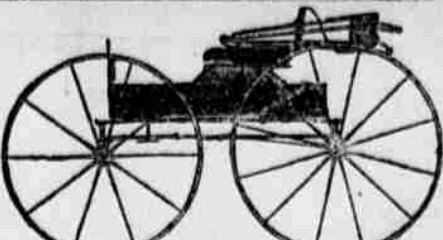

A cheap supply of oysters is being obtained by the Italians. The system of cultivation is successful and simple. From April to November bundles of brushwood are submerged in the outer sea, and to these the spawn readily attaches itself. The

brushwoods are then raised and those on which the tiny oysters have settled are submerged in the "Mare-Piccolo," where, in about two years, they attain their full size.

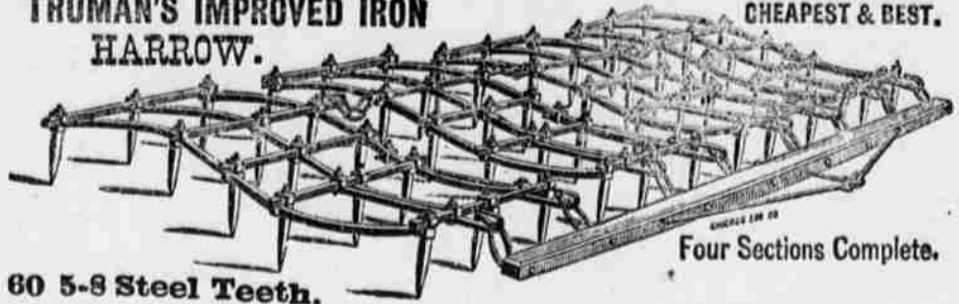

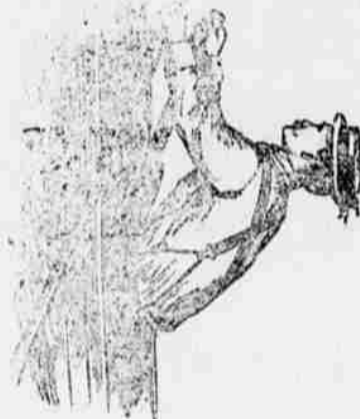
