A COMMON SCOLD.

It is fortunate for the "Gazette" that the old English law for the punishment of common scolds is not in force in this Kingdom. If it were, our respected contemporary would be in danger of the ducking-stool. Its exhibition on Wednesday was perhaps the worst fit of the kind it has had for some little time. Of course it may be useless for us to offer advice to one of so much experience, and most likely it would be deemed an impertinence; but at the risk even of wasting counsel and giving offense we would suggest that no party can be benefitted by senseless vituperation of its opponents. There is not even a shadow of foundation for any of the charges formulated by the "Gazette" against the Government as a whole or its members individually. We should be sorry if our contemporary weakened its usefulness in any way, but it is in great danger of compelling even its most interested supporters to consider whether they can afford to be identified with a publication which disregards all elements of truth and fairness in its criticism of the responsible Government of the Kingdom.

THE TRANSVAAL REPUBLIC.

As a matter of news, it may be stated that "the Transvaal Republic is bankrupt and unable to meet its engagements." This is interesting as the inevitable sequence of events that must be fresh in the memory of most of our readers. The Boer leaders applied successively to Holland and Germany for financial aid, but met with no response. When it suited the Dutch and German Governments to embarrass the British, the warlike spirit of the South African Dutch was encouraged; but it does not suit either power now to offend England, and the Transvaal Boers were told that they must meet their own engagements and make the best terms they could with England.

Baffled in this quarter, they turned their eyes to the Orange Free State and asked to federate, but this Boer Republic would not listen to their overtures, although it was willing to federate in 1857, and rendered secret aid in the war against the English during 1880-1. The Boers are bad financiers, however. In 1868 the Volksraad authorized the President to borrow £300 (\$1,500); but as only \$250 could be raised on "good security," the authority to borrow was withdrawn; £12,000 (\$60,000) was raised by issuing notes on the Republic, and when these became due \$100,000 was borrowed to pay principal and interest. This was the state of the Transvaal debt when England annexed it in 1877.

They resented annexation and petitioned for retrocession. Sir Bartle Frere, who had an Indian reputation, was sent out from England to the Cape, but he only complicated affairs, and Lord Wolseley, then Sir Garnet, incensed them afterwards by declaring that their country was annexed to England and that to England it would belong while the sun continued to shine. This boast was on a par with his fixed date for entering Khar-toum. When the Zulu trouble began the Boers resisted a civil process, raised their Republican flag, put 4,000 deerstalkers in the field, and whipped the British at Ingogo, Laing's Nek, and dis-trouly at Majuba Hill, a place like Punchbowl, where two hundred British were killed and wounded, including General Colley, the balance, being picked troops, seeking safety in flight. Then Sir Evelyn Wood signed an armistice with the Boer triumvirate resulting in peace. The Transvaal regained its independence, the Boers undertaking to pay England's expenditure in governing the territory during the annexation. This was £265,000 (\$1,325,000), and was to bear 3 1/2 per cent interest, payable in twenty-five

years. Their other debts increased their liabilities to £398,667 (\$1,993,335). By the London Convention of February, 1884, the English Government threw off £25,000 (\$125,000), but this did not seem to help them.

This debt is secured on the public lands which are valued at £400,000, or two million dollars. And now the Transvaal Republic has come to a financial deadlock, being unable to pay interest. Despite this, bands of them are engaged in predatory warfare on the border, and Sir Charles Warren is conducting field operations to restrain them within their own territory. Peaceful evolution is not to the taste of these man-stealing descendants of the God-fearing Dutch settlers at the Cape of Good Hope, who went forth into the wilderness rather than submit to British authority and abstain from capturing and pressing into servitude men and women of the native races.

This has been a poor year for the "sheepmen" of California, as they are called. Wool only fetches eight to nine cents per pound, but then California wool averages 75 per cent sand and burrs, and the figures quoted are fair value for the short staple clipped semi-annually from the much-traveled sheep. The distance which California sheep travel for food, as a rule, keeps them lean and the wool pinched, while the uncertainty of natural pastures always makes sheep-raising in the Golden State very risky. Of course we speak of the open ranges. Sheep farming would pay in California as well as in England, Belgium or Saxony; and it would also pay here.

PROPERTY OWNERS in Honolulu have reason to be satisfied with their lot in the matter of taxation. The Government "Gazette" of the British colony of Hongkong notifies that during the year ending June 30, 1886, the municipal rates in the city of Victoria will be 13 per cent; at Victoria Peak, 8 1/2 per cent, and in British Kowloon and other outlying districts of the colony, 6 per cent.

THE Manila "Commercio" states that news from Madrid intimating that an act had been introduced into the Cortes, providing that colonial sugar be admitted duty free, had been received with the liveliest satisfaction. It was believed this would have the effect of stimulating sugar production on the Philippines, so that the output would equal that of the largest crops of former years.

The Allie Rowe.

It appears that the brig Allie Rowe was surveyed in Hongkong by an official surveyor and rated A 1. When she left Hongkong August 19th for Tientsin she no doubt got caught in a typhoon when one hundred miles out and was compelled to put back. Messrs. Freeth & Peacock, her agents, have the certificate here. Our information as to her having to put back owing to her leaking so badly was from the "Liongkong Daily Press" of August 22d. It is worthy of note that it took only just a month for that paper to reach here from Hongkong. The agents received advices up to the 19th instant and of course were surprised to find that we had later news of the vessel. It does not often occur that correspondence can be received here from Hongkong inside of a month.

The new schooner Domitilla was registered at the Custom House yesterday under the Hawaiian flag. Her measurement, according to the Hawaiian register, is seventy-three tons.

ISLAND NOTES.

KILAUEA, Kauai, Sept. 22, 1885.

On Friday last, about 7:30 p. m., a cane field on the Kilauea plantation was discovered to be on fire. The plantation hands, of all nationalities, turned out with alacrity, and under the able direction of the manager and his lunas, the flames were soon conquered and the fire extinguished. The damage sustained is considerable, compared with what might have happened had it occurred two or three hours later, when all hands would probably have retired for the night. The area of cane destroyed is somewhat less than half an acre. A reward of \$100 has been offered for the conviction of the person or persons who set the cane on fire. Up to the hour of writing no discovery has been made, and the probability is the incendiary that caused the blaze will remain unknown.

A fracas took place along the Kilauea Portuguese on Sunday last. As is usual in most squabbles, there was a woman at the bottom of it. A Portuguese living at Kealia fell in love with an Azorean at Kilauea. A marriage quickly followed, though it is said the mother of the bride was averse to the union. The honeymoon over, the young husband allowed his wife to go and see her mother, who kept her daughter until called for. The deserted husband, finding single life miserable after a few months' experience of conjugal bliss, repaired to his dear mother-in-law, who resides at Kilauea. In accents anything but sweet and low, he demanded immediate delivery of his wife. The irate parent refused compliance with the request. A forcible entry into the dwelling-house was made, where a free fight ensued, in which the old lady received a deep cut above her right temple. A policeman soon appeared and took the young man in charge, lodging him in jail in Hanalei. The District Judge, Sheriff, and a large retinue of native lawyers, came up to Kilauea this morning to deal out justice. As I write the trial goes on, and is likely to go on for several hours longer, interpreting in three languages—Portuguese, English and Hawaiian—having to be resorted to in order to get at the facts.

On the same day as the above occurred there was a marriage among the Portuguese. The newly-wedded pair looked upon the disturbers of the peace with an air of anxiety, and turning away, vowed they would endeavor to steer clear of similar imbroglions. Viscount Tori arrived here yesterday on his tour of inspection. He visited the Japanese quarters, and expressed himself highly pleased with the provisions made for the comfort of his countrymen and women. He also spent several hours interrogating them individually, and from what can be learned, there were hardly any complaints made to him. On the other hand, he was well pleased with what they had to say to him concerning their treatment.

Weather fine and everything looking blooming. The darkest blot on our existence is the irregularity of our once favorite island steamer, James Makee.

Murder on Hawaii.

The steamer Kilauea Hou, which arrived last evening from Hamakua, Hawaii, brings news of a brutal murder which took place at Kamaea, Hakalau, on Sunday afternoon last. A native named Umiloi, twenty-five years of age, married the daughter of Wahakole, a man about seventy years of age. On Sunday both men had been drinking okolehao. Umiloi whipped his wife, which displeased the mother-in-law, and she remonstrated with him, but it was of no use, and he struck her on the mouth, and told her not to interfere. Wahakole ordered him out of the house, and also told him not to hit his mother-in-law again. This took place in the house. A few seconds later both men were outside and the quarrel was resumed. Umiloi picked up a piece of wood about three feet long, and two by three inches wide, and struck Wahakole three times on the head, making three big holes, killing him almost instantaneously. The Kilauea Hou brought Sheriff Kaulukou, the Deputy Sheriff and the doctor from Hilo to Hakalau. Umiloi was arrested and is held for trial on a charge of murder. He will probably be brought down to Oahu Prison on Sunday morning by the Kinau.

Reception by His Majesty the King.

On Thursday at noon the Captain and officers of H. I. M. S. Cristoforo Colombo were presented to His Majesty the King at Iolani Palace. They were met at the entrance to the palace by Colonel E. W. Purvis, Vice-Chamberlain, and were received by His Excellency Walter M. Gibson, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and were then escorted to the audience hall. His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs presented Mr. F. A. Schaefer, Italian Consul, to His Majesty. Mr. Schaefer presented Captain Volpe. Captain Volpe presented the officers. His Majesty was attended on this occasion by His Excellency Governor J. O. Dominis, His Excellency Walter M. Gibson, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Colonels Curtis P. Iankea and James H. Boyd, and Major J. H. Holt.

Signor Farini leaves San Francisco with his opera troupe on October 15th. A great musical treat is in store for the people of this city, and we trust they will show their appreciation of the enterprise which provides it for them. It is no light enterprise to bring a company of first-rate opera singers over two thousand miles across the Pacific to a small community like this, for after all the number of those who can appreciate opera in Honolulu is very limited.

Hawaiian Hotel Concert.

Last evening the Royal Hawaiian Band gave a complimentary concert at the Hawaiian Hotel to the Captain and officers of H. I. M. S. Cristoforo Colombo. Manager Graham had the verandas illuminated with colored lanterns and the grounds with torches. H. B. M.'s Commissioner Major J. H. MRS. GRANT'S LITTLE JAP. An Incident of 1879 - A Wife's Watchfulness and a Servant's Promptness.

"It was my fortune," said an old newspaper man, "to be one of the few people who were with the Grant party in their tour through the United States in 1879. The general had then just returned from abroad, and, with keener appreciation of his character, the people were more eager than ever before to manifest their admiration and their affection.

"At that time the little Jap was Grant's close body servant, and a gesture or a look from Mrs. Grant was acted on with a promptness that caused one of the reporters to say that the little Jap was built upon telegraph principles.

"When the Japanese boy heard the whistle for down breaks he would put his head out of the window, take a quick glance at the crowd and the place, and at a hint from Mrs. Grant, would take off the general's traveling hat, give his hair and whiskers a brush, and if the train was going into a city would put on his silk hat.

"This hat business was a source of great amusement to the newspaper men, and they laughed a good deal with Mrs. Grant about it, and occasionally the general himself joked her about this nice distinction in the matter of hats, but she and the little Jap kept up the enthusiasm about it until the last.

"Comparatively few people know that the sines of war for several musical campaigns, in which Theodore Thomas has been the generalissimo and Charles E. Locke his adjutant, have been furnished by a New York lady, who is a native and patriotic patroness of music and a warm admirer of Mr. Thomas's gifts as an orchestral leader.
