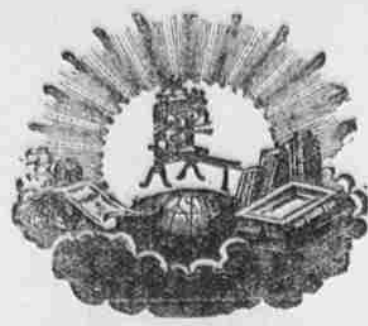

DULL TIMES.

Dull and bright times, in a com-
mercial or momentary sense, alter-
nate in the history of all producing
or manufacturing countries. Sus-
tained active demand for the staples
of a country puts up prices, and
these in turn stimulate activity in
production. As long as the two
continue material prosperity lasts,
and times are bright. But the re-
verse condition is sure to follow,
soon or late. The supply, under
extra stimulus, will ultimately ex-
ceed the demand, prices fall and dull
times prevail.

Such are the general principles
which regulate the commercial and
monetary thermometer of producing
and manufacturing communities, yet
it is admitted that other and minor
causes frequently have a greater or
less helpful or detrimental influence
in determining conditions.

Bright or prosperous times usually
beget habits of extravagance and
costly living in a community, which
disqualify for times of scarcer cash,
when they come, and induce mur-
muring and discontent with dull
times which are absolutely not so
dull as the complaints indicate.

The change from bright to dull
times, or from the latter back to the
former, is seldom sudden. The
process is slow and gradual.

Dull times have come upon us in
Honolulu and at the Hawaiian
Islands. They have come gradually.
Our present time is dull, com-
paratively dull, dull in contrast
with periods in the past. Al-
though as yet we are strangers to
the low depths of depression which
have been recently and are now
being felt in some other parts of the
world.

Before the reciprocity treaty with
the United States of America we
were in a state of general depres-
sion. The treaty revived our hopes
and stimulated enterprise. Foreign
capital flowed into the country, and
within a couple or three years of the
ratification of the treaty we con-
sidered ourselves a prosperous peo-
ple, and seemed to think that our
prosperity must last for ever. A
large increase in our staple pro-
ducts followed; these were mar-
keted at a high price; wages rose to
a figure previously unknown in the
kingdom, and ready money became
abundant. Out of all this grew
wild speculation and loose extrava-
gance.

By-and-by there gradually came
a change. Our principle product,
sugar, began to lower in price, be-
cause so many other countries had
increased their supply, as well as
these islands, tempted thereto by
prospects of large profits. Now be-
gan a checking of the speculative
tendency in this particular industry,
which gradually extended to others,
and was ultimately felt in all
branches of trade and commerce.
So that now we have reached a stage
where the majority of people think
there is something wrong, and em-
ploy their time in complaining and
fastening the blame for the dull
times on some particular class of
the community, or some particular
preventable act or acts of persons
controlling the national policy.

Overlooking the primary cause
already indicated, of our dull times,
and the inevitable reaction of over-
speculation, some people account
for the entire depression by the pre-
sence of the Chinese element, appar-
ently ignorant of the fact that the
Chinese merchants and traders feel
the dullness as keenly as any class
of the community. Others unrea-
sonably aver that the sole cause is
to be found in the Government.

How or in what way the Government
is accountable, or by what means it
can cause a return of the "good old
times," does not appear.

To be sure, no candid man will
deny that times with us are dull—
comparatively so, at least; and no
intelligent man will deny that some
minor circumstances within our own
control may help to augment the
dullness; but the main cause or
causes are of a nature that we are
unable to regulate. Therefore it is
true wisdom on our part to unite in
curing what is curable; and for the
rest, cheerfully make the best of
our circumstances, hoping for better
times until better times come.

DR. FANNY.
EDITOR BULLETIN:—I am sur-
prised at the sentiment of two of
your locals in last evening's paper
in regard to the appointment of
Government physician for Hilo. Had
you been personally acquainted with
the facts, I am certain that the
items would not have appeared in
your paper.

"Dr. Fanny," as Hiloites like to
call Miss Francis Wetmore, M. D., is
pre-eminently qualified, scientific-
ally, physically, and by her thor-
ough knowledge of the natives, to
fill the position of Government
physician in the Hilo district. She
had become familiar with many of
the usages in medicine before she
went to the United States to take a
practical course in one of our best
medical schools, then she came
back and practised medicine for
some time. When she saw that for
some diseases almost peculiar to
this country it would benefit her to
study under celebrated specialists,
so she again went to the States and
remained another year. Her suc-
cess since coming back the second
time has been very great, so much
that the larger part of the inhabi-
tants, especially natives and Portu-
guese, have for some time employed
her. She is sympathetic, gentle
and industrious.

"Dr. Fanny" is not hampered by
any of the sham conventionalities of
so-called polite society, but prop-
erly dressed for her work and for
protection against the weather. She
mounts her horse and let the rain
come down in torrents, or the night
be ever so dark she is instantly off
to any part of the district to al-
leviate suffering, never asking whether
the people wanting her be rich
or poor. Of all the appointments
made by the Board of Health, none
will give the satisfaction to the peo-
ple of Hilo that this one will. And
if a selection of Government phy-
sicians for Hilo was left to a popular
vote, Dr. Fanny would certainly re-
ceive nine-tenths of the votes, let
her opponents be whom they might.

THOSE DESTRUCTIVE BEES.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I wish in a
friendly spirit to correct the impres-
sion that the bumble bee is the in-
sect that is doing so much destruc-
tion to buildings in Honolulu and
elsewhere at present; the insect is
the carpenter bee (*Xylocopa viola-
cea*), and very different from the
other insect.

The bumble bee is really the bum-
ble bee (*Bombus muscorum*), to
which name it has got corrupted.
They are found in meadows and are
valued for the good they do, carry-
ing pollen from plant to plant, there-
by fertilizing them. They are espe-
cially fond of clover. They build
their nests on the ground and often
I have seen them cut in half by the
mower.

I feel sure that this is the insect
that the Kentucky firm has a con-
tract for and not the other destruc-
tive insect that would be of no use
to them in fertilizing clover.

I do not think we have the bum-
ble bee otherwise called bumble bee
on these islands; if any of your
readers have seen it I should like to
hear of it.

PORTUGUESE CRITICISM.

SOUTH SEA ISLES.

ONE VIEW OF THEIR SEIZURE BY
GREAT BRITAIN.

Washington, April 24.—The al-
leged seizure by British vessels of
certain small islands in the Pacific
ocean is probably no seizure at all,
but simply protection to the British
subjects occupying them, as Ameri-
can citizens occupy others. A gen-
tleman who is visiting Washington,
who occupies several such islands,
says:

"A certain Mr. Arundel, repre-
senting Houlder Brothers in Lon-
don, has had for many years these
islands under the protection of the
British flag, and has worked them
for the deposits of guano. After
removing these deposits he has
planted coconut trees, and I think
it very probable that this was done
under the same theory of occupa-
tion as that under which the British
Government granted him protection.
A Scotchman named Gregg some
thirty years ago went farming on an
island, and it became his by right
of possession. He lived there with
a few natives, raised a family, and
for many years made coconut oil,
which he shipped to Honolulu for
sale. I fancy that if anything has
been done it is merely to continue
the protection of the British flag
to Gregg and his successors. Penrhyn
is an island which Arundel had in
his possession under the British flag.
Christmas island has a large area,
with a few coconut trees at one
end, but with no guano deposits on
it of any value. The island has no
possible value for the future save in
coconuts."—[S. F. Chronicle.]

MATERIALS FOR STREET RAIL-
ROAD.

The Ferris S. Thompson which
arrived yesterday, brought a lot of
tools and other materials purchased
by Mr. Gribble in San Francisco,
for the first breaking of ground for
the Street Railroad, and we learn
that notwithstanding the non-arrival
of a portion of the Rail material
from Sydney, (viz: the fish plates)
work will commence next week on
the King street road at the Palama
end, and a half mile of road will be
immediately constructed running
from about the vicinity of the Soap
Works, to Kawaiahoo church—this
will consume the 60 tons of rails
brought by the Alameda, and work
will then necessarily be delayed until
the arrival of the ship load of rails
and material due in about 2 1/2
months. We believe it is the inten-
tion of the company to operate at
once. The half mile of road after
its completion, and it will no doubt
pay to do so, as King street is such
a busy thoroughfare. It is said
that the next piece of road to be
built will be along Alakea street,
from King street down to the wharf.
Why this hot, dusty, out-of-the-way
street has been decided on, we are
at a loss to imagine, but as the main
traffic from the wharf, (say from the
Oceanic Steamship Co.'s wharf), is
up Fort street, and particularly as
the rails are to be laid flush with the
street and no inconvenience can re-
sult to carriages or other vehicle traf-
fic, we would by all means recom-
mend a change of the line to Fort
street, intersecting King, thence
along to Richard to Beretania,
thence to Nuuanu, down Nuuanu,
intersecting King street again. This
would encompass the city nicely.

Late Foreign News.

AMERICA.

New York, April 24.—It is re-
ported here on what is said to be
high authority that President Cleve-
land's choice of Chief-Justice will
be Associate Justice Stephen J.
Field of California, the ranking
Democratic Justice on the Supreme
bench, and brother of David Dudley
and Cyrus W. Field. Minister
Phelps will then be nominated as
Associate Justice in Field's place,
and ex-Mayor Cooper of this city
as Minister to England in Phelps's
place. Cooper, who is a brother-in-
law and partner of Mayor Hewitt,
was a candidate for the place when
President Cleveland assumed office,
and the failure to appoint him caused
much disappointment in Demo-
cratic circles here, as Cooper had
contributed heavily to the campaign
fund in 1884. His appointment at
this time would, it is thought, indi-
cate that politics are becoming a
bigger factor in the policy of the
Administration now than at the be-
ginning of the Presidential term.

Advices from Panama are to
March 31st. Religious instruction
has been made compulsory in the
public schools of Colombia. The
Bishop of Cartagena has issued a
pastoral letter against Freemasonry.
In the election in Ecuador on March
7th there was a riot, the citizens
being attacked by the troops, but
the popular candidate, Eloy Alfaro,
was elected President. Times are
hard in Peru, many mines being
closed and work being scarce in the
towns. The population of Costa
Rica by last December's census is
200,187, importations \$5,569,014 for
the year, and exports \$6,236,563.

Salt Lake City, April 24.—A dis-
patch received this afternoon from
General John T. Caine at Washing-
ton says, President Cleveland has
pardoned D. H. Schettler, who is
now serving a term in Utah peniten-
entiary for unlawful cohabitation.
Schettler is cashier of the Zion
Savings Bank, and refused to pro-
mise to obey the law when he was
sentenced, for which Judge Zane
lectured him severely, telling him
that if a man in his position could
not live under the laws of his coun-
try he had better get up an leave it.
Louisville (Ky.), April 24.—The
report of the commissioners appoint-
ed to investigate absconding Treas-
urer Tate's office was submitted to
the Kentucky Legislature to-day.
It contained no sensational disclos-
ures, the deficit being placed in the
neighborhood of \$230,000.

San Francisco, April 24.—The
Centennial Hotel at Butte, M. T.,
was burned yesterday, and two per-
sons were fatally and others less
seriously injured.

San Bernardino is suffering from
the depredations of an apparently
organized gang of burglars and rob-
bers.

The trial of S. P. Maslin, clerk
of the Board of Examiners, for
throwing Reporter Carson out of the
Governor's office, was begun in the
Sacramento Police Court yesterday,
and some amusing features were
presented.

The construction of the Southern
Pacific branch road from Huron to
the coal mines near there is to begin
to-day.
Washington, April 24.—The De-
mocratic caucus last night discussed
the Republican committee's ultima-
tum on the tariff debate, and the
general sentiment was that it was
inexpedient at this time to limit the
debate. The following resolution
was adopted.

Resolved, That it is the opinion
of this caucus that the tariff discus-
sion be resumed to-morrow and con-
tinued to a conclusion, to the exclu-
sion of other business, except that
night sessions may be held, and if
not required for debate upon the
tariff, shall be employed in current
legislation. The direction hereto-
fore given touching an amicable ar-
rangements as to the time of the
debate on the Tariff bill to continue
in force.

London, April 24.—The "Times"
prints a joint letter in which Drs.
Mackenzie and Hovell announce
that they have brought a libel suit
against the Cologno "Gazette" and
the "Kreuz Zeitung." The suit
grows out of criticisms concerning
the treatment of the Emperor.
