Fifth District May Name Senators For Fourth

A Fifth District delegate said this afternoon that the Fifth expected to name the Senators for the Fourth District and thus defeat Cecil Brown. It is his way.

Delegates from the Fourth and Fifth meet together to name the Senators for this island. It is agreed that the three Senators this year shall be divided, two to the Fourth and one to the Fifth.

So far so good. If the Fourth District delegates can decide on their two men the Fifth was promptly to register its satisfaction and the Fourth will return the courtesy for the one selected from the Fifth. If, however, the Fourth cannot reach an agreement the voting on the candidates will be open to the whole convention and the Fifth thus gets a direct hand in naming the Senators for the Fourth.

Two years ago the tables were turned. The Fifth had a fight on its hands and the Fourth came in and decided it.

By this token Cecil Brown's enemies think they can beat him. Brown's forces, on the other hand, say they are not afraid.

Two Thirds To Fitch Of Widow's Mite One Third To Client

Rendering an opinion today on demurrer to petition of M. A. Gonsalves to show cause in the matter of the estate of Jose Antonio da Silva, deceased, Judge Gear, sustaining the demurrer, finds occasion to severely criticize Attorney Thomas Fitch, as well appear, together with the cause of action, in the following quotations from the decision:

Petitioner alleges that Antonio d'Aguiar da Pallos was duly appointed the attorney-in-fact and agent for Antonio da Silva, on March 18th, 1901, Antonio being the widow of the deceased; and that as such attorney and agent he has received property which he has retained in his custody and refused to pay over to the widow. It is further alleged that the petitioner was on Sept. 8th, 1903, duly appointed the agent and attorney-in-fact for the widow by an instrument in writing which revoked the power of attorney formerly given to da Pallos. Petitioner asks for an order that da Pallos show cause why he should not deliver to petitioner the money and property in his hands due the widow.

To the petition a demurrer was interposed by da Pallos setting up a want of jurisdiction of the court in these probate proceedings to grant the relief asked.

On November 13th, 1900, Jose da Silva died intestate at Honolulu. Letters of administration were granted (Continued on Page 4.)

GAELIC ENJOYED EXCITING VOYAGE

Sighted Russian Cruiser Novik In Full Flight.

ENCOUNTERED TYPHOON ON LEAVING SHANGHAI

SAW CRUISERS ASKOLD AND GROMBOI LYING DISMANTLED AT SHANGHAI—BADLY BATTERED.

The Occidental & Oriental steamship Gaelic arrived off port from the Orient late last night. She remained off the harbor until this morning, when she entered and was docked at the Hackfeld wharf at about 8 o'clock.

The Gaelic's outward trip was quite an interesting one. While she was on her way from Nagasaki to Shanghai she sighted a war vessel standing from the direction of Van Diemen's Strait. At the time she was not able to make out the vessel's identity but later on she learned that the war vessel was the Russian cruiser Novik, which was fleeing northward, but later on fell into the hands of the Japanese. Only the hull of the cruiser could be made out plainly. She was moving rapidly.

At Shanghai the Gaelic saw the Russian cruisers Askold and Gromboi. Both had been dismantled at the time. Both cruisers bore plentiful marks of the fearful contest from which they had escaped. The Askold especially had been badly used. A big hole gaped in her side amidships, half of it being below the water line. Her smokestacks were cut and riddled and dents were to be seen all over the vessel.

Finally after leaving Shanghai the Gaelic ran into a typhoon but rode through it without suffering any damage.

The Gaelic brings only one passenger for Honolulu, S. Saito, who is a Japanese consular agent.

Among her passengers for San Francisco is A. W. Buschendorf, a prominent hotel man of Tsintao.

C. B. Franklin is a postoffice employee from Manila. He is accompanied by Mrs. E. Gowan returns from China, where her daughter has recently wedded the secretary of an American legation.

J. D. Sloan is a mining engineer who has been interested in oil wells in Sumatra.

Captain A. E. Wilson was the master and John B. Steel the chief engineer of a British steamship now in the Orient.

Miss M. N. Stubbs is the daughter of a prominent O. & O. S. S. Co. official. She is returning from a pleasure trip to the Orient.

The Gaelic brought only 255 tons of Oriental freight for this port. For San Francisco she has 2,650 tons of freight including a shipment of 1,200 bales of silk. She carries treasure amounting to 500,000 yen, or \$250,000 in gold.

On September - in latitude 31:5 N and longitude 177:2 E. the Gaelic met the P. M. steamship Manchuria bound for Yokohama.

The Gaelic will make one more complete round trip to the Orient before she retires from the service of the O. & O. Co. After that trip she will go from San Francisco to Hongkong and thence back to England to her owners, the White Star line. Whether a new boat will be sent out to substitute the Gaelic is not known, but steamship officers are of the opinion that nothing of the kind will be done at present. There has been some talk about sending the White Star liner Majestic, which for years has been in the Liverpool-New York run, to take the Gaelic's place. The Majestic is, however, built on an entirely different plan from the trans-Pacific boats, she being principally intended for passengers. To make the Majestic fit this trade much of her passenger accommodations would have to be ripped out to make space for freight, and other great alterations would have to be made.

The Gaelic sails for San Francisco this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

STARVE OUT PORT ARTHUR

Wanted Candidate For Senate To Withdraw Name

The biggest weathervane that has appeared in the local political pale in the last three days and one that shows how the wind was blowing this forenoon, was the caucus of managers, held for the purpose of inducing either Mr. Dowsett or Mr. Bishop to withdraw from the senatorial race. The caucus, or conference rather, was attended by Attorney General L. A. Andrews, Sam Johnson, W. W. Harris, J. M. Dowsett, To mHarvey and one or two others. The meeting took place at 10:30 o'clock today and notwithstanding the presentation of the case, neither Mr. Dowsett or Mr. Bishop were willing to withdraw at this stage of the fight.

The conference is taken to mean that Attorney General Andrews has avowed to the futility of further opposition to the nomination of Brown and sought to avert a Liaoyang in the convention tonight by a fine piece of strategy. Those who are keeping minute tab on the drift of things today see a big majority for Cecil Brown in the Fourth District. The sentiment in all factions in both districts which favors the endorsement, interchangeably of the strongest candidates in the other district, will doubtless result in the adoption of the rule in caucus or convention. The object of such a rule is to promote harmony and not give the balance of nominating power to delegates outside of a given district. If the rule is adopted, the Brown supporters expect an easy victory for their man. Whether the rule is followed or not, the Brown supporters figure to win.

ALEXIEFF RESPONSIBLE.

Berlin, Sept. 5.—Colonel Gaedke, the war correspondent of the Tageblatt, writing from Liaoyang under date of August 9, declared that it was not the intention of General Kuropatkin to defend Liaoyang to the utmost, but to retreat to the next position, which was said to be Tieling, about sixty miles north of Mukden.

"The peculiarity of all these positions—Haicheng, Anshanshan, Liaoyang and Tieling," writes Colonel Gaedke, "is that naturally they are the strongest, but very weak when fortified and an army sits down passively within them."

Colonel Gaedke says it is possible that the Russians may retreat even further than Tieling. He writes in the bitterest terms of Viceroy Alexieff. He says that the arrival of the imperative needed troops had been suspended for three weeks, by which General Kuropatkin had been deprived of at least 75,000 men, which might turn the scale in his favor.

Position in Game A (Ruy Lopez). [BLACK]

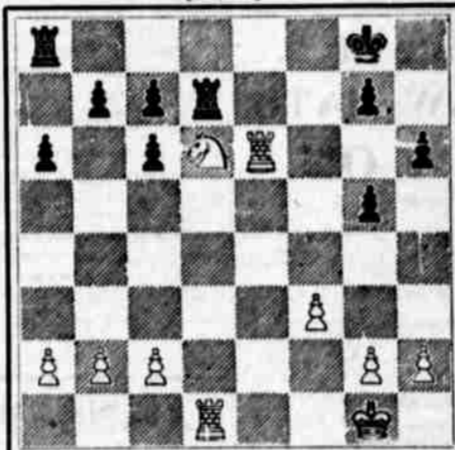
