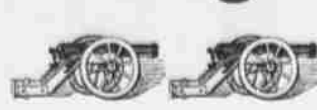

MAGMA THEORY EXAMINED

(Concluded from page one)

In his "own theory" and in the "minor
points." If I may yet once more tres-
pass on your courtesy, I will endeavor
to show this in the one instance in
which Dr. Bishop avers that I seem to
impute to him an absurdity of thought.
In his effort to elucidate how gases in
liquid or solid form got "inside of the
molecules of the magma" (sic) he says,
"when the formless clouds of meteorites
originally gathered out of chaos into a
solar system, and into our globe, all the
substances comprising the frozen con-
tents became embedded together in the
depths of their combined masses with-
er sun or planets." What Dr. Bishop
meant when he wrote, unless he meant
words, terse and clear, unless he meant
what he said, no man of course is com-
petent to judge. Taken in conjunction
with the whole context of the letter the
words mean that, the presence of liquid
and frozen (solid) gases in the earth's
interior today, are to be accounted for
on the above theory, because they be-
came embedded together in the depths
of their combined masses, whether sun
or planets! No word, sir, do we read of
any nebulous sphere, alluded to by the
writer when criticising the above singu-
lar quotation from the doctor's first let-
ter. Mark, Mr. Editor, the conjunctions.
The meteorites, with their frozen
freight gathering out of chaos into a
solar system, and into our globe, with
all the substances forming their frozen
contents, and the embedding of them
together. Now sir, if, as I said in my
last letter, it be true that meteorites
are the primordial stuff of the universe,
and were the means by which our solar
system was built up, then there was no
embedding them together. On the con-
trary they were immeasurably disper-
sed. Absolutely dissipated. Completely
dissociated. Their combined masses be-
fore collision would not have formed a
sphere as large as our sun, but after the
collision, became one so immense that
its radius must have been, according
to the Doctor's own figures, at least
thousands of miles. No embedding there.
Mr. Editor, no embedding of the frozen
contents of the meteorites in the depths
of their combined masses; on the con-
trary, utter and complete dispersion.
Dr. Bishop says the writer "would
be the last one to place the difference
between the liquid and gaseous states
of matter in the distance of the mole-
cules." I must again express surprise
at the Doctor's mode of argument, and
have again to point to the apparent in-
extricable-entanglement of the Doctors
and when speaking of gases in the so-
called liquid form. The point at issue
in this particular instance is not touch-
ing the difference between the gaseous
and liquid states of matter, but the
difference between normal gas, if I may
so speak of it, and gas in the so called
liquid state. Instead, sir, of being
amongst the last to account for the
difference between these two conditions
in the distance of the molecules, I
should be amongst the first, and hap-
pily so, for one of the greatest sources
of satisfaction is to stand on the van-
tage ground of truth. It appears that
Dr. Bishop chooses to introduce the
difference between these two conditions

FIVE LABORERS.

The Lennox brought upwards of 200 free Japanese laborers, that is, laborers not under contract. As these enter Hawaii under practically the same terms that they could have entered the Mainland, and so large a proportion of the Lennox's company have actually come without contract, there would seem to be in it an indication that Japan may still be looked to as a source of labor supply. There is more or less feeling against imported contract labor in the United States—rather more than less. In Pennsylvania it is against Hungarians and Slavonians. Along the Canadian boundary line it is against Canadians. In Florida it is against the Cubans. But, collectively, it is against imported contract labor. Our representative at Washington will doubtless be made aware of the feeling, and the feeling seems more likely than anything else to militate against our interests there. The arrival of so many free Japanese laborers may be a straw tending to show that the contract system has served its purpose and is no longer essential or necessary as it was in the earlier days of labor importation. If that should prove to be the case another stumbling-block in the way of desired legislation is removed.

SAMOA.

The news from Samoa, both that brought by word of mouth and that contained in the Samoa Weekly Herald is that everything is quiet and orderly in the group, business and industry is reviving, and things are assuming their normal condition. But a careful perusal of the proceedings of the Supreme Court, the Municipal Council and of the Provisional Government shows that feeling has not entirely subsided and that the lines of division between the respective parties of Mataafa and Malletoa are still very clear and distinct. It is clear that in the consideration of every public act, this division of the people is kept in mind. A dominating consideration is always "How can this breach be bridged?"

It is evident the representatives of the three powers are working harmoniously, or at least that each is actuated by a determination not to give offense, nor to be the one through whom discord, division or trouble shall come. In this respect at least the situation is hopeful. It shows that men, when they are so minded, whether from natural disposition or the pressure of circumstances, can work for a common end without loss of personal dignity or national prestige. It shows, what has been evident all along, that the trouble in Samoa has not been due to a real clash of interest among the three signatory powers, but to a petty struggle for precedence among the representatives of the powers. There were doubtless many contributory factors prompting to this struggle, ambition to make a good showing, each to his own foreign office, that would result in his advancement, social consideration, a misconceived notion of advancing the prestige or power of the nation he represented. But in the outcome it resolved itself into struggle for precedence with entire neglect of the interests of Samoa or the real interests of the respective powers.

The tragic events which followed brought a glow that recalled men vividly to their real duty, and they seem to be doing it. But it is after all under the pressure of circumstances. And the evils already wrought weigh heavily on the Samoan people. This is shown in many ways; in none more strikingly than in the appointment of agents to carry out minor details of administrative government. When one would do, two are appointed, one a Mataafa partisan, the other a Malletoa partisan, so that the balance of political feeling may be kept. But this requires two salaries to be paid, instead of one, out of a treasury by no means full, and which can only be filled by taxation.

While the greatest credit is due the men actually administering affairs for the fact that they are actually exercising great tact and prudence and seem sincerely desirous of restoring peace, order, good government and good feeling, the situation only emphasizes the fact that tripartite government in its

very nature is impracticable. At least it is impracticable in so small a sphere as the Samoan Islands. Far better for Samoa, far better for the peace of the world, far better in real fact for each of the three powers, either that the group be divided among them, or still more desirable, that it be turned over to one of them alone.

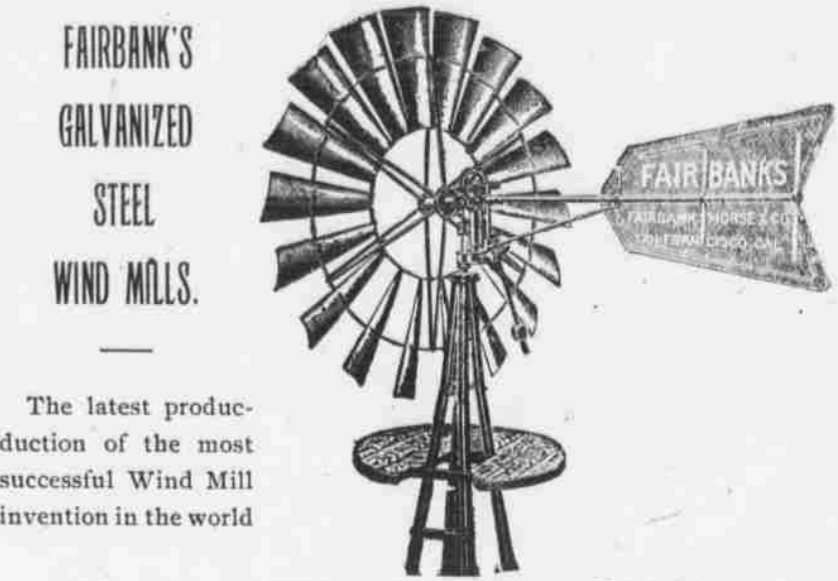

HAWAIIAN COAST SURVEY

SURVEY STEAMER PATHFINDER COMING.

Will Spend the Winter Months Here and Then go to Alaska to Finish Work There.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 6.—Upon the arrival of the Pathfinder the vessel will be overhauled and will then be ordered to Hawaii to make surveys of the coast lines of the Islands during the winter months. On the approach of spring she will proceed to Alaska and join the fleet already stationed there. Professor Pritchett expects to have the Alaska coast line well surveyed by the end of next year and will furnish to the public correct maps of that locality.

CROWDS AT QUARANTINE

SEVEN HUNDRED JAPANESE ARRIVE.

Another Steamer Expected in Today From Yokohama With Emigrants. Lennox May be an Army Transport.

The British steamer Lennox arrived at 6 o'clock last night from Yokohama, bringing 596 Japanese emigrants, 599 of whom are under labor contracts. The Lennox brought 560 men, 124 women and 12 children. Five Japanese were on board as cabin passengers. The arrival of the Lennox with her large number of emigrants makes busy times at the Quarantine and today was no holiday for the officials there. Captain Williamson was anxious to get away as soon as possible and no time was lost in beginning to send the Japanese ashore. The Lennox has a clean bill of health and the removal of her passengers to the Quarantine Station was begun early this morning. There were 300 Japanese and Chinese already at the station from the last arrival and nearly 250 Portuguese from the Victoria. The Japanese and Chinese were ready for removal today, but another steamer from Yokohama is expected any moment bringing another load of Japanese laborers. She was billed to leave on the same day as the Lennox. The Spanish and Portuguese emigrants were subjected to the usual fumigation and medical examination yesterday. Only two cases of sickness were found and these are not serious. The patients, a man and a woman, were taken to the Queen's Hospital. The Lennox will go to Portland from here, leaving this evening if she can land her emigrants in time. She will probably be chartered by the Government as an army transport for Manila.

CAPTAIN EVANS' STATEMENT.

Did Not Try To Enter Harbor Without a Pilot.

Captain D. T. Evans of the bark Coal-linga wishes to correct reports which have got into circulation regarding himself and his vessel. He says he did not try to enter this harbor without a pilot. He began signalling for a pilot as soon as he rounded Diamond Head, which was just at dusk, and continued his signals up to the time he touched the reef. His first indication of this fact was when he picked up the bell buoy. He immediately downed helm to stand out to sea, but before he could get about, the wind being light and the swell strong toward the land, he touched the reef. He had two men sounding all the time, one on each side of the ship. From eighteen fathoms, the next throw of the lead showed ten fathoms and the water shoaled up to three fathoms within five minutes. So far from attempting to enter the harbor without a pilot, he used his best endeavors to get out, and falling in that had no intention of seeking to come in at night.

FROM GOLDEN KLONDIKE
THE LATEST REPORT OF CONSUL MCCOOK.

Gold Output Reduced One Half—Lazy Miners—Some Noted Gamblers—Order is Well Kept.

Consul McCook sends, writing to the Treasury Department, reports in regard to conditions in Dawson City and vicinity. The city, he says, is being rapidly rebuilt after the recent fire. The following is from his reports:

"There is a great deal of activity in shipping at present; at one time, there were 17 steamers at the Klondike wharves. The boats are provided with improved accommodations for passengers, and I do not see why excursion parties are not organized to come and see this land of gold, now that traveling is made so comfortable. I should think a trip up the Yukon would be more interesting to Americans than a trip up the Rhine."

"The bulk of passenger and freight traffic will hereafter come by the upper river route, several lines of steamers connecting this port with Lake Bennett. The rates from Dawson to Puget Sound are: First-class \$185; second-class \$100; but these will probably be reduced one half as the season advances. The rates charged by the companies running boats to St. Michael's, there to connect with ocean steamers, are \$150 first-class and \$100 second-class mail matter will be brought in or sent out for the present as the rates are too high. No second-class mail matter was received all winter, and if anyone wishes to send papers or magazines to their friends, they should mail them as first-class matter."

"Instead of \$20,000,000, which was reported as the probable output for this district for the past 12 months, I am informed that \$10,000,000 will fully cover the product. Reports from Alaska indicate that more gold will be found there than will ever come from this territory. Alaska is rich in placer mines, but requires development. Very little prospecting was done here last winter. The miners simply ate up their grub and waited for someone else to report discoveries of gold. If the indications are good, they go on a stampede, dig a hole or two, and if they can not find pay dirt at once, they say the creek is no good and return. This country requires indomitable pluck and energy. It is very difficult to take care of one's health, as the canned food and poor cooking are hard on the system. Typhoid fever has already broken out—six weeks earlier than last year. The ground upon which the city is built is being drained, \$13,000 having been spent on this work. There are several hundred destitute persons in Dawson, who want to get out of the country and have not the means."

"The city is overcrowded at present, most of the work on the mines having ceased for the season, and the gambling fraternity and saloons are reaping rich harvests. At the junction of Eldorado and Bonanza creeks, 14 miles from here, quite a town has sprung up since last year, chiefly composed of gambling houses. All sorts and conditions of men are found in this country—doctors, lawyers, politicians—working at anything they can find to do. At one gambling table there sat recently four men, three of whom had been chiefs of police in cities in the United States, and the fourth a well known Pinkerton detective. The authorities are now fining the gambling houses, however; and, in spite of all the drinking, etc., order prevails. Dawson is comparatively quiet and safe, and the laws are enforced."

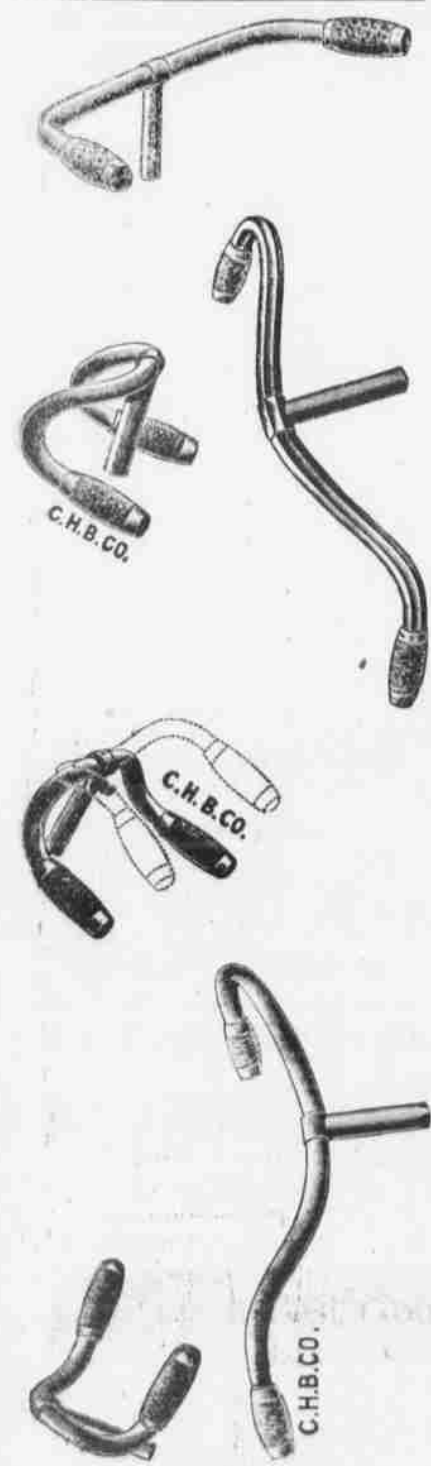

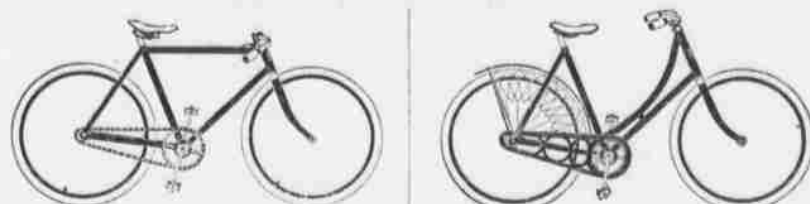
