ANOTHER SHIPLOAD OF IMMIGRANTS

Supreme Court Hands Down Opinion In Lanai Case

LEAVES MATTER FOR U.S. SUPREME COURT

In the Supreme Court this morning a written opinion, signed by Justices Frear and Hartwell, was handed down in the matter of the Lanai case. The opinion, which is written by Chief Justice Frear, side-steps any action in the matter, though it tells what might and what might not be done. There are a number of interesting features to be found in it, however.

The tremendous roasting which the Attorney General's Department was subjected to at the hands of the Supreme Court is very mildly spoken of in the following clause: "The Court expressed surprise." The meat of the opinion is that the case is left for action by the United States Supreme Court in case an appeal or a writ of error is allowed, and that if the decision should be set aside or modified, the decision of the Court could be enforced, notwithstanding the consummation of the exchange.

A decision having been filed on the 1st instant reversing the decree of the circuit judge appealed from, sustaining the demand for the bill, and dismissing the bill, but without in terms dissolving the injunction which had been granted by the Circuit Judge restraining the respondent Pratt from exchanging certain public lands for private lands, the complainant moved the court on the 13th instant to enter a decree in a form which followed the decision and also provided that the injunction should continue in force until further order of the court for the purpose of permitting an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States. The Attorney General, on behalf of the respondent Pratt, filed an objection to granting the motion, on the ground that the complainant desired the decree merely for the purposes of appeal and that no appeal lies for the reasons that the record does not disclose that the amount involved exclusive of costs exceeds the value of \$5000 and that no federal question is involved. He also stated orally that upon the rendition of the decision, on the 1st instant, the exchange had been made on his advice, but that he did not object to a continuance of the injunction on that account and that

his only objection to the entry of the decree was that it was only for the purpose of appeal and that no appeal lies. The court expressed surprise that the Attorney General had advised the completion of the exchange before the entry of the decree and stated that the question of the continuance of the injunction for the purposes of appeal, whether by the Court or the Justice allowing the appeal, was one upon which he need not be heard as matter of right, and that, although he might be permitted to be heard as a matter of discretion, the Court did not care to hear him under the circumstances, particularly in view of the fact that he, the natural one, as the successful party, to prepare and present a form of decree, had chosen not to do so, but on the contrary to rely entirely upon the decision and had taken the position that no decree should or need be entered and had acted accordingly in advising the completion of the exchange before the entry of the decree, which, in the opinion of the Court, was im-

More Europeans For Home Building In Hawaii

The Board of Immigration yesterday authorized Collector Stackable to charter another vessel for immigrants to leave Europe between the first and fifteenth of April. The immigrants will be from Malaga, Spain, and Madeira, and the guarantee of the charter is for 1250 fares.

This is the third shipload of immigrants for which the Board has arranged and indicates that the representatives of the Board have established excellent connections for obtaining settlers from the sections mentioned.

LIGHTKEEPER OF BARBER'S POINT DIES SUDDENLY

William Hutton, who has faithfully tended the Barber's Point light since it was erected, died suddenly at 10 o'clock last night, soon after he had retired for the night.

The special cause of death is not known. Hutton was probably seventy years of age and apparently in good health. He was in town yesterday to see one of his new grand children. His wife and a nephew were with him at the time of his death.

Hutton was born in Lahaina. He has been a whaler and captain of inter-island ships. His service as lightkeeper proved him to be a man thoroughly worthy of trust, and his advancing age did not check his ambitions to do better. He successfully passed the first examinations for appointment by the Federal government when it took over the lighthouses and later took another examination which enabled him to secure a raise of salary.

APPLICATIONS FOR JOBS PASSED UP TO CAUCUS

The Republican County Committee Submits Conflicting Reports on the Municipal Bill

Much important business was taken up at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Republican Central Committee yesterday afternoon, the Delegate's suggestion that an appropriation be guaranteed by the Legislature to cover the expenses of the trip of twenty-five Congressmen and their wives to Hawaii, the applications of the multitude who sought the endorsement of the committee for positions in connection with the Legislature, and the reports of the County Committee on the Municipal Bill being all considered.

The Executive Committee decided to endorse the suggestion of the Delegate, which was brought before it by Senator John Lane. The matter has thus become a party measure, and there can be no doubt but that one of the first things to be done after the legislative session opens will be the passing of a concurrent resolution whereby both Houses agree to pass the necessary appropriation. It will be done in this form in order to save the time which the three readings of a regular bill would require, and as an answer has to arrive at Washington by Feb. 25.

The committee also considered the large bunch of applications for endorsements, but did not select any particular ones from them for recommendations. It merely passed on the applicants in regard to their standing in the party, passing the selection of the individual applicants for office up to the caucus of Republican members of the Legislature, which will take place next Monday.

All the applications were passed along in this manner, with the exception of that of Col. Knox, a colored gentleman of uncertain political faith, who applies to be janitor of the Senate, which position he held in 1905. In this case action was deferred.

The committee did, however, pass on the more important matter of the leaderships of the two Houses. It endorsed E. Faxon Bishop for President of the Senate and H. L. Holstein for Speaker of the House. The endorsement was unanimous.

OAHU TO HAVE POWERFUL FORTS

Fourteen Inch Guns To Protect Wide Channels

Washington, Jan. 28.—There is every reason why the fortifications at Hawaii should be made ready.
Secretary Taft thus expressed himself today in an urgent letter to Senator Allison, chairman of the Committee of Appropriations, regarding his request for an additional appropriation of \$250,000 for the purpose of fortifying Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.
Late yesterday the Senate passed an appropriation bill for fortifications which contained an allowance of but \$100,000, which is \$250,000 less than the Secretary asked for. There is now \$250,000 available under last year's appropriation, and it is said to be the Secretary's desire to expend about \$600,000 for fortifications in Hawaii.
The text of Secretary Taft's letter to Senator Allison is as follows: "I write to urge on you that the appropriation for Pearl Harbor be made \$250,000 instead of \$100,000. We can certainly expend this in the next year, and there is every reason why the fortifications of Hawaii should be made ready. Will you not bring this to the attention of your committee and the Senate? The enclosed statement from the National Coast Defense Board, recently appointed, shows the facts. I send it to you at the suggestion of Senator Perkins."
The report of the National Coast Defense Board, referred to by the Secretary, was made to the President and by him transmitted to Congress a year ago. In sending it the President himself strongly endorsed the Board's recommendations, which included a sweeping revision of the plans of the old Endicott Board designed to apply modern methods to the Coast Defense plans. The Board makes a strong argument for the construction of fourteen-inch guns, a type now unknown in the service, instead of the twelve-inch guns, for the fortification of these points, in view of the wide channels to be protected.
The defense scheme for Pearl Harbor and Honolulu, as finally submitted, is upon the basis of the existing types of ordnance and the Board has asked for these items:
Six 12-inch guns, four 6-inch guns, sixteen 12-inch mortars, costing with their carriages, altogether \$2,544,390; submarine mines, \$225,260; power plants, \$54,400, for the central and \$14,400 for the reserves; \$85,000 for searchlights; fire control, by which is meant an elaborate system of electrical communication enabling the commanding office to control the fire of all the batteries with precision from one point, \$220,656, making the total of the estimates submitted \$3,254,446.
The defense Board says: "Pearl Harbor is of such strategic and historical importance that the National Coast Defense Board arranges for such a first-class defense, stating that these places cannot be held unless fortified before the outbreak of war. Today not a gun is mounted to defend either. They are located in such a way that the fall of one involves the loss of the other. Defenses should be immediately installed at both places."

TO AVOID PANIC FROM ANY CAUSE IN LARGE SCHOOLS

A special meeting of the Board of Public Instruction was called yesterday afternoon to confer with the principals of the larger schools of the city regarding the advisability of fire drill for speedily clearing the schools and to prevent a panic from any cause.
Principals Scott, Mackintosh, Wood and Mrs. Fraser were present with Superintendent Babbitt and Commissioners Wilhelmine Dowsett, Hutchins, Farrington, Dodge and Al. Each of the principals stated what had been done toward a fire drill in each school, although it was admitted that a fire in any of the schools was somewhat remote. In connection with the also remote probability of earthquake, it was noted that the thing to do was to keep the children within the school room. To let them out would be to subject them to the greater danger from falling walls.
Commissioner Hutchins spoke of seeing the San Francisco high school for girls, after the earthquake. The walls fell while the general frame of the building stood. Had school been in session and the children left the building they would have gone to certain death. It was a very interesting point as the general disposition in time of an earthquake is to get out of a building.
After a general talk it was voted that Commissioner Hutchins be a committee of one to confer with Chief Thurston of the fire department and visit the larger schools to arrange the drills best suited to each building.
Previous to and following the meeting with the principals, Superintendent Babbitt brought before the Commissioners incidents of routine to keep them fully informed on what the department is doing. There was no action taken at the executive meeting, it being purely a conference for information on what is being done.

VIDA FINED \$50
Willie Vida, who was arraigned before Judge Whitney this morning on the charge of conducting a gambling house some five months ago, pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$50 and costs. Frank Thompson appeared for the defendant.

INTERESTING FACTS IN BABBITT'S REPORT

Wants Additional Medical Attention Given Pupils

The report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction has been received from the printers. It is a very interesting document in which the Superintendent has arranged for the inspectors and teachers to report their own needs for themselves.
The Superintendent's report is a brief and pithy resume. He makes two recommendations which are distinct departures from previous practice in the management of schools, and therefore will attract special interest. These include higher grading of schools in the outside districts and a school physician who shall visit every school of the Territory, and while performing the sanitary work now expected of Territorial physicians examine the children for defects of eyesight, hearing, etc., to which very little attention is usually given.
In this connection the report reads: "The last two years show an increase in the public school attendance of 1,828, the present enrollment being 16,651. In spite of the fact that several new school houses have been erected, the congestion is still great and the erection of new and the enlargement of many old buildings is imperative. Besides those erected on Hawaii, Oahu and Kauai, as given elsewhere in this report, new buildings have been erected at Nahaiku, Huelo, Kihel, and one is in course of construction at Waihee. New ones are needed at Olowalu, Kananapa, Kailua and Paia. The practice of building one and two-room schools should be discouraged as far as practicable. The best instruction for grades. In many parts of the United States a policy of centralization has been successfully carried out, a large school accommodating children from a considerable area, the authorities providing means of conveyance. It seems entirely practicable for some such scheme to be adopted here, whereby several schools could be merged in one and the Department provide transportation. In this way better instruction would be afforded and the expense of up-keep of school houses and teachers' cottages be greatly reduced. Expense of transportation would be considerably less than cost of repairs. Such centers may be roughly mapped out as follows: Kauai—Kapaa to include Anahulu, Keala and Kapaa; Lihue to include Hanamaulu, Linae and Huelo. Maui—Lahaina to include Olowalu, Lahaina and Kananapa; Wailuku to include Wailuku and Wai-kapu; Paia to include Hamakua, Paia, Spreckelsville and Kailua; Oahu to include Haou, Hana and Ulaou. Hawaii—As outlined in Mr. King's report. Such a move should be one of gradual evolution and attempted only as old buildings become unfit for use; but plans might be well laid now for such a change that appropriations for new buildings be made with this in view.
The prevalence of sore eyes, skin diseases and other troubles in the schools emphasizes the need of thorough and systematic medical inspection. Inattention, backwardness and unruliness of children can so often be traced to physical defects that a system whereby each child might be given a thorough and private examination promises beneficial results. It should not be the part of this Department to treat children for organic or other diseases, but if the attention of parents could be called to such, in most cases remedies would be forthcoming. It has been suggested that recent graduates of medical schools, qualified to diagnose diseases of the eyes, ears, throat and organic troubles could be secured at a moderate salary, whose sole duty should be to travel from school to school giving each child a thorough examination at least every two years, preferably every year, and address teachers' meetings on matters of sanitation, etc., and give teachers instruction in 'first aid.' I would strongly recommend that such a man be employed under the direction of the Board of Health to whom full and systematic reports be rendered."
