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Saipan-Palau-Manila flights eyed

NMI officials head to Manila meeting

REACTIVATION of the Saipan-Palau-Manila route abandoned two years ago may begin as early as December, as CNMI legislators and Aviation Task Force members are set to meet with Air Nauru and Palau officials in the Philippines next week to map out the much-awaited move, it was disclosed yesterday.

Hopes are high Air Nauru will fly at least twice a week using Boeing 737 aircraft when it starts to operate in the said route formerly serviced by Continental Micronesia, according to Marianas Visitors Authority (MVA) Board Chairman David Sablan who is also a member of the CNMI Aviation Task Force (ATF).

The meeting in Manila, Philippines will be on Nov. 22.

Air Nauru's move has come at an opportune time, with the urgent need for an airline to transport a growing number of passengers from Saipan and Palau to Manila and vice-versa.

The CNMI contingent for the

meeting includes Sablan. ATF Chair-JM man Guerrero, Rep. David M. Apatang, Rep. Manny Α. Tenorio, and

David Sablan Common-

wealth Ports Authority Board Treasurer Roman T. Tudela who will represent CPA Board Chairman Roman S. Palacios, also an ATF member.

The Manila meeting is a follow-up on the exploratory discussion held here in Saipan in July,

when officials from the CNMI led by Gov. Pedro P. Tenorio, Air Nauru and Palau agreed to push for the reactivation of the said air route.

"They may start (their service) at least twice a week. I was told



they might start as early as December, but I'll find out (more) when I come back from the Philippines . . . We will be

Teno adviser chides Senate for 'inaction' on admin bills

Variety News Staff ONE OF Gov. Pedro P. Tenorio's special advisers yesterday expressed disappointment that several administra-

tion bills, crucial to revitalize the economy, have remained pending at the Senate.

Dan Nielsen

governor's special assistant for education, cited the Free Trade Zone bill: the proposed measure requiring that only certified public accountants perform auditing services; and the tax certification bill, which provides certain incentives to investors, as among legislation that will help boost revenue collections, if enacted.

"They are still sitting at the Legislature," Nielsen said in an interview with reporters.

Nielsen also lamented that another administration bill, which will allow students to finance studies through a special loan program, may likewise gather dust at the Legislature.


The bill, which is still being drafted, is seen to address mounting problems besetting the education sector as it allows students to avail of loans at government expense, which will then be repaid upon graduation on easy terms.

"The governor hopes the Legislature will pass a Guaranteed Student Loan Program bill, and enact immediately the Board of Accountancy, Tax Certification and Free Trade Zone legislation to generate more revenues.

"This can be used to pay off the (\$80 million) deficit and then we will have ... more money to spend on social and other programs," said Nielsen.

Senate Floor leader Pete P. Reyes (R-Saipan), in a separate interview also yesterday, said

Visitor arrivals up 20%; prospects bright for tourism recovery

VISITOR arrivals climbed up by almost 20 percent in October, traditionally a slow travel month, and this has been the highest monthly growth since the CNMI tourism industry got hardly hit by the Asian economic crisis.

The Marianas Visitors Authority (MVA) yesterday re-

ported a total of 40,941 visitors for October 1999, up by 19.93 percent from last year's 34,137 during the same month.

Charter flights and bigger aircraft used by Japan Airlines, Northwest Airlines and Asiana Airlines, as well as the surge in the strength of Japanese yen against the U.S. dollar fuelled the arrival growth for the first month of fiscal year 2000.

Perry Tenorio, MVA managing director, said arrival forecasts for the months of November and December will surpass the records of last year during the same periods.

MVA Board Chairman David Sablan, however, said the tourism agency should not rest on its laurels.

"All in all the arrivals look very good. It goes to show we are


doing our job properly but it's not enough. We still should concentrate on consistently increasing arrivals . . . The 20 percent increase (in October) is a good way to start the new fiscal year," said Sablan during yesterday's Board meeting.

Japan — CNMI's largest market — posted a 25 percent arrival increase from 24,753 in October 1998 to 31,045 last month. While


October has always been considered a slow travel month, direct flights statistics indicated a strong demand for the destination.

MVA said load factor from Tokyo went up by 36 percent, while the load factor from Osaka climbed by 49 percent. Moreover, 84 percent of the total Japan arrivals came directly from Continued on page 50

Japan OKs curbs to doomsday cult

TOKYO (Reuters) - Japan's powerful lower house of parliament Thursday passed a set of bills aimed at curbing activities of the doomsday cult accused of a 1995 nerve gas attack on the Tokyo subway system.

The bills, expected to be enacted next month, were submitted in response to public outcries demanding the government take action against the Aum Shinri Kyo (Supreme Truth Sect) amid fears t was staging a comeback.

The bills do not directly name the cult, but target activities of any group that has engaged in "indiscriminate mass-murder" in the last 10 years.

Key Aum members, including cult guru Shoko Asahara, are on trial and have been convicted in connection with various murders including the Tokyo gas attack, which killed 12 and made more than 5,000 ill.

Under the first bill, a group implicated in serious crimes could be placed under the surveillance of the Public Security Investigation Agency for up to three years and could be forced to report on its activities every three months.

The bill will also allow police and public security officials to inspect such a group's facilities at any time thought necessary. If found to have committed illegal activities, the group can be banned from acquiring land or facilities for up to six months.

The second bill, which aims to help compensate victims of crimes committed by Aum, allows courtappointed trustees to collect assets of bankrupt groups. Aum was stripped of most of its assets in 1996 when it was liquidated by court order, but has managed to amass large funds through businesses and purchases of property in many parts of the country.

The bills also include a clause which calls for a revision every five years to address concerns that the legislation could be applied to groups other than Aum.


The government hopes to see the bills enacted in time to prevent a senior Aum member from returning to the cult after he leaves prison around late December, Kyodo news agency quoted government sources as saying.

The cult's former charismatic spokesman, Fumihiro Joyu, is currently serving a three-year prison term for perjury.

Aum said in late September it would close its branches, stop recruiting and no longer use its current name, in a move seen aimed at deflecting further opposition.

Investigation sources believe there are still about 2,000 followers of the cult, which refuses to accept responsibility for subway attack or abandon its anti-social teachings of Asahara.

Ex-PM Sharif handed over to Pakistan police

KARACHI (Reuters) - Ousted Pakistani prime minister Nawaz Sharif was handed over to police Thursday as the military government widened its crackdown on corruption with more middleof-the-night raids.

Police in the port city of Karachi said they now had Sharif in custody, but would not say when he would appear in court.

"He's in our custody now. He was handed over to us early Thursday morning," said a poice official who asked not to be dentified.

Military sources have said Sharif, who was moved to Karachi from Islamabad, may appear in court on Friday after a complaint accusing him and four others of criminal conspiracy, hijacking, kidnapping and attempted murder was filed last week.

The hijacking charge carries maximum punishment of death. During the last military regime of General Mohammad Zia-ul-Haq, deposed prime minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto was hanged on a disputed conviction of conspiring to commit a political nurder.

About a dozen women from Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League party marched in Karachi on Thursday, calling for his release. The protesters blocked a road

and chanted "Free Sharif" and "Restore Democracy" before peacefully dispersing.

The charges were connected to an alleged attempt to divert a plane bringing military chief General Pervez Musharraf to Karachi from Sri Lanka. Hours later Musharraf overthrew Sharif.

Sharif was moved to Karachi as the military spread its anticorruption drive, with newspapers saying another nine people were detained early on Thursday after 21 prominent politicians and business leaders were arrested on Wednesday.

Officials have said 105 people are listed as wanted for arrest, but The News newspaper reported that the National Accountability Bureau wanted to detain more than 350 people and question them on allegations of corruption or loan default.

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In illegal gambling case Bellas disqualifies Arriola


THE SUPERIOR Court yesterday issued a decision disqualifying lawyer Joseph A. Arriola from participating in the alleged illegal gambling case for conflict of interests.

Associate Judge Timothy H. Bellas said Arriola is representing private clients, not the CNMI Senate and he has raised an issue on behalf of his private clients which is clearly adverse to the interests of his other client, the CNMI government.

"Therefore, under the facts of this case, the conflict is real and not merely apparent," said Bellas, adding that the court must find that such real conflict disqualifies Arriola from continuing his participation in the case.

Court records showed that the Attorney General's Office (AGO) Investigation Unit operatives and police officers raided the former Abracadabra Dive Shop in Garapan last July 3.

During the operation, businessman Cheung Ping Yin and sev-

eral other persons were arrested and subsequently charged with illegal gambling activity.

Chief Prosecutor Kevin Lynch asked the court to disqualify Arriola from representing Yin and co-defendants for violation of the Government Ethics Act since the lawyer is currently employed as CNMI Senate counsel on a halftime basis.

Lynch also contended that the lawyer should be removed from the case on the basis of his participation as a member of the CNMI

Board of Parole.

Bellas ruled that it appears that the controlling issue is not whether Arriola is conflicted under the Government Ethics Act, but whether a conflict exists based on the fiduciary duties a lawyer owes in situations where the attorney represents an interest adverse to an existing client.

"It is undisputed that defendants' counsel is currently representing the CNMI Senate. It is immaterial to the ethical issues under what contractual terms that representation is occurring," Bellas said.

"It is clear that a relationship of attorney-client exists. Therefore, the next relevant inquiry is: who is Mr. Arriola's client? Is it only the CNMI Senate or the entire CNMI Government?" the judge said.

In keeping with the general purpose of the Act to define when a conflict of interest exists, Bellas explained, it specifies that the "Commonwealth government" includes, among others, the Executive and Legislative branches of the CNMI.

Therefore, the judge noted, Arriola's client cannot be the CNMI Senate only, but the entire CNMI government.

Bellas stressed that such analysis does not preclude the attorney from representing the CNMI Senate against any other part of the CNMI government because there is a specific statutory exemption for him to do this.

The judge said that in this case, however, Arriola represents private clients against the CNMI. "If the court's analysis were to

stop here, there would a serious impact on the ability of government to function under such a narrow reading of the statute," he said.

Essentially, Bellas said, the court would be adopting the view that a mere apparent conflict is sufficient to disqualify an attorney from the type of representation involved in this case.

"Where there is legal support for this proposition, the court will not adopt such a narrow reading of the statute," he said.

With regard to the BOP issue, Bellas said it appears to the court that to disqualify Arriola on the basis of his participation as a member of the Board is a very broad and inappropriate reading of the Act.

"Of course, this would not be the case if defendants "counsel, as a BOP member, were obviously representing a client who had any business before the BOP," Bellas said


Heinz prefers Kagman site for a planned 2nd Saipan high school



REPRÉSENTATIVE Heinz S. Hofschneider (R-Saipan) has expressed preference for Kagman as site for Saipan's second high school, citing the need to plan the traffic distribution on the island.

Hofschneider, who heads the House Committee on Health, Education, and Welfare, said building the high school in Kagman would evenly distribute the flow of traffic in the morning, when students, as well . as professionals, rush for work and school.

"We need to break out the traffic distribution. Also, there's a growing population in the south...," said Hofschneider.





the second high school are Capi tol Hill and Koblerville.

The legislator said the Public School System (PSS) should move away from further building schools down south, since Hopwood Junior High School (HJHS) and Marianas High

School (MHS) are already situated around that area.

Today, the CNMI State Board of Education are expected to decide on the final site for the second high school at a board meeting at the Garapan Elementary School (GES), at 6 p.m. Hofschneider expressed confidence that the board will be able to come out with a sound decision.

"I'm sure that the board members are looking at each site's advantages and disadvantages and considering them. I know there's a lot of pressure on their part to build the second high school, the urgency is there since they have considered the PSS bonds," said Hofschneider. Last month, BOE opted to go

Federal budget negotiators give CHIP funds to CNMI WASHINGTON - White House on Wednesday informed CNMI Resident Representative Juan N. Babauta that budget negotiators have agreed to continue the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

through fiscal year 2004 with increases over this year's funding level. The White House and Congress have concluded negotia-

tions for budget appropriations for fiscal year 2000. (Only yesterday, a budget deal

was reached by the Whie House and the Republican-controlled Congress, as per Associated Press reports.)

According to Babauta, the massive bill they are working on contains numerous provisions - such as the CHIP decision - setting spending levels beyond the current fiscal year.

"I was very glad to hear from Mr. Jeffrey L. Farrow of the White House inter-agency group on insular affairs that our efforts in support of CHIP have been successful," says Babauta in a news release.

"And I want to congratulate the president for winning the debate on providing a health care safety net for children."

Babauta said he has for several years worked for increases in the program, which provides health care coverage for uninsured children in the CNMI.

Last year's lobbying produced a one-time increase in funding from \$118,000 to \$469,000.

This year, measures continuing the increase through fiscal year 2007 were introduced in the House and the Senate. The

president's budget also proposed extending the higher CHIP allotment for the CNMI.

Negotiators have apparently now agreed to accept the president's numbers. The CNMI will be eligible to receive up to \$493,900 in fiscal years 2000 and 2001, and up to \$394,900 in 2002, 2003, and 2004

Congress may vote on the omnibus appropriations bill containing the CHIP provision this week. The bill is the last major item on Congress agenda for the year.

The CHIP program works as an add-on to Medicaid. When CNMI Medicaid funds are exhausted CNMI may use CHIP funds to continue providing health care to children (up to 19 years old).

After Medicaid and CHIP grants are used up, the CNMI is responsible for providing care to those who cannot otherwise afford it.

<u>PSSmeed s seven new school buses</u>

TWO to three Public School System (PSS) buses experience engine break downs on a daily basis and according to Administrative Services Officer Jess Sanchez, this situation needs immediate attention from higher-ups.

To avoid compromising the kids' safety, Sanchez said that PSS needs to acquire at least seven additional buses.

"Some buses develop mechanical problems and break down on top of the hill, which is very dangerous for all passengers," said Sanchez.

He noted that even school buses on Rota and Tinian also experi-

ence the same engine troubles. "We also have busing problems there and we try to service them with the two skilled mechanics

we have," he said. There are many factors that contribute to the delay of bus repairs, according to Sanchez.

"One factor that I find to cause delay in getting the buses on the road is the availability of parts. There are only a few vendors on island that carry bus parts and we are only one of several agencies that compete for such parts.

"I am thankful to the Deputy Commissioner of Administration for allowing us to at least have an open account in the amount of \$1,000 for different vendors...to

readily withdraw needed parts so that our two mechanics can provide the buses immediate attention," Sanchez said. But when it comes to bulk parts,

Sanchez is sad to say that it takes a little longer to acquire.

'We work with our vendor, and the vendor has to make an off island order because even the vendor doesn't stock that in their warehouse," he said.

Sanchez is optimistic that CNMI leaders would further consider the needs of the PSS busing services.

"I would like to solicit help from the executive branch and the Legislature...to assist and work Continued on page 46

NMHC sells Sugar King units

THE NORTHERN Marianas Housing Corporation has been successful with its plan to sell 51 of 52 housing units located in Sugar King, according to NMHC executive director MaryLou Ada. Ada vesterday said that NMHC

has numerous applicants that are interested in buying units and in fact the agency had just managed to "close" four houses.

"We've just closed the deadline (for submission of applications) a couple or days ago, we have a lot of applicants...we're doing it (screening) by batches, interviewing them and making sure that they've completed their applications as always been our problems," said Ada in an inter-

Tenants of the units had vacated after NMHC sent them notices to leave the premises. The sale is done on a lottery system for qualified first-time homeowners

Of the 52 units, one is not for sale as NMHC reserved it for the

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police substation which is currently holding an office there. The agency was reportedly expecting to get \$3 million to \$4 million

with the sale. "It is really time consuming and it is very stressful both on the part of the applicants and on the hous-

ing officers to do all the work ... " Ada said.

The four-approved applicants, Ada said, have been picked up through the lottery system.

The four families, however, she said, have not moved into the units yet because there are some renovation to be done considering that the houses have been "abandoned.

Court notes law enforcers deviated from procedures

Variety News Staff THE SUPERIOR Court noted a significant deviation from procedures established for the seizure of evidence by authorities who conducted the raid at an alleged illegal gambling joint in Garapan.

"While the deviation may be from inexperience with the type of case involved in this matter, rather than a purposeful act of nisconduct, it left a gap in the casual connection between the money, the alleged illegal activity that was taking place at the time of the "raid", and any particular defendant," said Associate Judge Timothy H. Bellas. The Attorney General's Office Investigation Unit and police officers raided the former Abracadabra Dive Shop last July 3. The operatives arrested several persons and seized money

and alleged gambling paraphernalia.

The defendants asked the court to return their money and other items as no inventory of the things seized was made and no receipt of properties taken was issued.

Bellas issued an oral ruling last week ordering the AGO to return the money worth \$26,000 to the defendants

Bellas in his written order issued yesterday said it is possible that the defendants, by claiming the seized funds as their own, have re-established such connection between the money, the alleged illegal gambling activity, and any


Bellas said the government has failed to submit any written authority to the court suggesting that the money seized in the case is subject to forfeiture in the event of the conviction of any of the defendants.

The judge said he is unable to find any Commonwealth statutory authority that would permit such a forfeiture based on the alleged underlying criminal activity in the case.

"It would seem that this case is distinguishable from cases in which the item seized is illegal or contraband per se," he said. Examples of such items, he added, would include counter feit items, illegal drugs or fire arms which may not be regis-

tered in the Commonwealth. In ordering the return of seized money, Bellas said, the gov ernment may make any record or notation of the serial numbers or take such other measures that it deems appropri ate to preserve the funds as evidence in the case.

Bellas, however, denied to release the other items seized during the raid.



Ancestral remains on the way home to Saipan, Guam soon

Variety News Staff HAGATNA --- A Local foundation dedicated to bringing back Chamorro ancestral remains stored in Hawaii has announced that the remains could be returned as soon as the end of this month. Norbert Perez, Bring Our An-

cestors Home Foundation president, said a "a very positive" line of communication has been established between his foundation and the Bishop Museum in Ha-

Perez met with Bishop Museum officials earlier this month.

Perez wanted to stage a civil protest outside the museum, but after meeting with museum officials earlier this month, he said the protest action may not be necessary

Hawaiian attorney Eddie "Halealoha" Ayau, who is also director of the state's largest and most successful indigenous movement for the repatriation of Hawaiian ancestral remains and artifacts, helped pull the parties together for what Perez described as a meeting to "clear the air."

Perez said Ayau suggested that the Bishop Museum could and may relinquish custody of the remains to a private party or descendant. Tension has grown over the past months regarding the issue because the Govern-

ment of Guam is also trying to get the remains released after a local businessman donated a burial plot overlooking Fena Valley as a final resting spot.

Parks and Recreation Director Sonny Shelton, who is leading GovGuam's attempts to retrieve the remains, believes that Perez's attempts are futile.

But Perez said there is no law that says a government entity must be the party to take possession of the ancestral remains.

He said he is qualified and committed to get the job done.

Perez told Variety that he does not trust GovGuam to carry through on its promise to bring the remains back.

There are currently over 90 boxes at the museum with ancestral remains from both Guam and the CNMI.

Perez said he has contacted the CNMI's Historic Preservation Office, and has worked out a verbal memorandum of understanding regarding the remains that belong to the Northern Marianas.

Perez said he has also asked the U.S. military to assist in transporting the remains back to Guam because, he added, it was the federal government that allowed the desecration of ancestral gravesites in the 1920s.

He said the military's assistance would bring "atonement and closure" to the issue.

'Confused on public purpose'

Variety News Staff SENATE Floor Leader Pete P. Reyes (R-Saipan) is drafting a proposed measure amending the law defining the extent to which the Legislature can use public funds because, he said, most lawmakers are still at a quandary on the matter.

"We are still having problems with the Department of Finance on definitions of public purposes," said Reyes, lamenting that a request to give \$100 to a CNMI athlete going to Guam for a sports competition was denied because Finance allegedly said sending the person there is "not a significant part of the community."

"We are undecided as to what

we should be doing. The (Finance) secretary has been monitoring our expenses. I guess she (Finance Secretary Lucy DLG. Nielsen) feels she is liable for our funds. So maybe we need to ... make it clear in the law that she is the one who is going to be liable not us," said Reves.

Nielsen is off-island and is not available for comment.

Under Reyes' proposal, a presiding officer will also be appointed for the House of Representatives and the Senate who will then submit travel and similar requests to the director of the Legislative Bureau. The LB head will screen the request before transmitting it to Finance.

"Once we send it to Finance

with a certification that it is for public purpose, all she (Nielsen) hastodois approve it," said Reyes. He argued that defining what is

a public purpose and what is not goes beyond Nielsen's responsibility "That is not her job. That is the

job of the Legislature," he said. The Legislature and Finance have been at odds in the past several months over travel requests that were being turned down by Nielsen for lack of documentation and failure to settle old accounts among other reasons.

Attempting to address the problem, the Legislature set off an initiative cutting off Finance's fiscal powers over the lawmakers. Continued on page 46

Reyes: Not much business sector representation in 12th legislature

THE BUSINESS sector may be up for hard times lobbying at the Legislature as the incoming one does not have enough members representing their interests, said House Ways and Means Chair Karl T. Reyes (R-Saipan). Reves, who worked with the private sector before he became a overnment official, said the 12th egislature will have more members at the House of Representatives who used to be government nployees themselves.

"The Legislature is going to be omposed of a lot more of govemment people, people who used to work for government like educators," said Reves.

He said only former speaker, ndRepresentative-electBenigno R. Fitial (R-Saipan) has business ackgrounds.

the business sector. There is no- nally reach maturity.

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body representing business interest other than Ben Fitial who came from the private sector." said Reves. He said the "entire newcom-

ers" are former educators, which could mean more attention will finally be given to the education sector. There is also none among incumbents who won in the elections that has a business background.

And because of this, said Reves, "The business sector is again going to take the back-seat."

Reves lost in the elections because, he said, some members of the electorate still has the "wrong notion" about the Legislature.

Reyes said several people solicited money and goods from him during the campaign months in exchange for their vote.

He said it may still take some time before the voters may fi-

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

Let land payments start

FINALLY, the lines are drawn on the issue of compensation for the many landowners whose properties were affected by rightof-way and yet have remained uncompensated over the years.

The ruling this week by Judge Edward Manibusan on the Leon Taisacan case is really good news for those who have suffered long and hard in their struggle to get what is rightfully theirs under the eminent domain provision of the Constitution.

The rule is clear: once the government acquires a portion of a person's property and builds a public road or part of a road over it, then government should provide that person just compensation, either through land exchange or monetary payment.

How such a simple rule gets set aside is puzzling and unacceptable for the many landowners who have painstakingly gave their properties up for the sake of the community.

One must remember, it is bad enough for any person to be losing part of his cherished property to public purpose. That can't be helped as that is what the law says.

Government upon determination can take hold of land if it deems necessary for the overall benefit of the entire islands.

But what makes that totally unbearable is when landowners are not paid enough for the acquisition, or worse, get promised but end up not being paid at all.

It's a pity how claims for compensation have not been acted on by government over the years and through several changes in administration. The obligation has long been neglected due to various reasons like declining government resources, land exchange problems, encumbrances and/or other issues, like the issue of prior compensation by the Micronesian Claims Commission.

That some landowners have already received compensation from the Micronesian Claims Commission covering the indefinite use of their land appears to have become an "overused" excuse by government to get around its obligations to landowners.

The Manibusan ruling merely validates and underscores the need for government to live up to its obligations, but such a determination could go a long way in compelling proactive action from concerned agencies.

While money is tight and government is facing an \$80 million deficit, it should at least more seriously consider options, like the proposal recently aired by Rep. Karl T. Reyes for a bond issue which can be secured with money held in trust by the Marianas Public Land Trust.


The important thing is that the groundwork should be laid for the eventual disbursement of money to pay the aggrieved property owners.


As Gov. Pete P. Tenorio himself admits, payment for the affected landowners is long overdue.

It is incumbent that such an admission be coupled with the political will and determination to see to it that the money is identified and prioritized for the purpose.

These people have waited enough. It's a pity that some of them did not even live long enough.

Let's start paying them what is rightfully theirs.





Post-mortem (2)

ONE OF the CNMI's better lawmakers, House Ways and Means Committee Chair Karl T. Reyes, is right.

Most CNMI voters expect their elected officials to be Santa Claus all year long. Which is why, Mr. Reyes told the Variety, he failed to win a third term. He said he wasn't as generous with giving out tents and tables as the other legislators were. As chair of the committee that handles taxes and government appropriations, Mr. Reyes is also considered "responsible" for the scrapping of certain government dole-out programs, specifically the Earned Income Credit (EIC). Because the administration and the Legislature are unwilling to impose new taxes-let alone layoff 300 government employees-there is, of course, no money for the EIC. In addition, several former government employees are still waiting for the benefits promised to them by a law enacted years back. As with the EIC, there is no money for it, but voters believe that they elect lawmakers precisely to find funding for such programs. So voters are to blame for this "give-me-

give-me philosophy" that Mr. Reyes says he does not believe in? Perhaps.

But most of the blame should go to the elected officials who compensated for their lack of ideas by acting like Santa Claus. It is, indeed, far easier to pay a constituent's utilities bill than to draft legislation that would create more attractive private sector employment opportunities for local residents. It is less taxing for one's intellect to hand out tents and tables than to pinpoint why those who used to be selfsufficient and industrious farmers, fishermen and artisans are now content with twiddling their thumbs in a government office.

And while we're at it, who was it that enacted and implemented these dole-out programs and created sinecure government jobs? Who, in other words, campaigned like Santa Claus?

In the U.S., perceptive political analysts have

long noted what this, well, "Santa Clausism" eventually leads to—an enervating dependency on government for security. Thus they caution the government to be careful in coming up with generous, yet costly, programs lest these become "entitlements" and "rights." Over time, those who are supposed to benefit from these programs are turned into timid and fearful people who are addicted to Santa Claus politicians. More and more mainland Americans are realizing that this "soft, kindly meant" style of governance ultimately corrupts the people.

CNMI politicians, like their counterparts on the mainland U.S., know this: The local people, descendants of men and women who defied the Pacific Ocean by sailing across its unpacific vastness aboard frail, wooden boats, instinctively know this. But during elections, all they hear are politicians outshouting each other in proposing freebies and doleouts.

No wonder local voters are "clannish." If all the candidates are saying the same things why shouldn't voters choose someone they, really trust—i.e., their relatives? (This is true elsewhere in the world. I'm surprised that some commentators consider this "trait" as a local invention.)

The CNMI needs real leaders. Happily, they are out there, somewhere. Some are even in the government already. Most of them are unheard and unnoticed, but they exist. They know that leadership is an educative force, as the late Philippine Professor Renato Constantino once said to a nation that is also in need of this type of leaders. Genuine leadership, he said, means "discovering the wishes of the people, working with the people to reshape their desires if these are not truly their long-interest, blazing new paths...expos[ing] false assumptions [and revealing] new lines of thought."

Men and women of all races can take only so much, well, crap from their political leaders. Therein lies the CNMI's and this planet's hope.

RP labor official defends \$65 fee

THE VARIETY seems to be a reliable and trustworthy source of information until I read in your Nov. 5 issue about the "mandatory \$65 (P2,600!) life insurance fee imposed on contract workers."

You even urged "Pinoy contract workers in the CNMI who consider this fee as nothing less than government robbery should complain directly, through letters, to our legislators and other national leaders, as well as to national newspapers."

There's nothing wrong with criticisms provided these are intended to correct or put things in proper perspective. Such could have been done if facts were checked before coming up with such strong words or accusation. For the benefit of Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) in the CNMI who might not possess a library of knowledge or the time to research, allow me to set the records right.

The Philippine Overseas Labor Office (POLO) collects \$4 for the overseas employment certificate while the welfare officer issues receipts for the annual Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA) membership fee of \$25 and Medicare premium of \$36.

OWWA, an agency attached to the Philippine Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), is mandated to look after the welfare and promote the interest of OFWs all over the world. This agency does not get any appropriation from the Philippine Congress to implement the projects and programs benefiting thousands of OFWs all over the world. The funds of OWWA primarily come from the contributions of employers who would like to hire OFWs and workers already at the jobsites who voluntarily elect to become members in good standing.

Aside from medical, scholarship or financial assistance, OWWA provides to its clients and members expanded livelihood program, Kabuhayan 2000, family assistance loan, repatriation of worker, airport assistance, pre-departure seminars, skills-for-employment program, refresher course program, community reach-out program and reintegration preparedness.

The Medicare program for OFWs and their dependents is an innovative approach to address serious concerns of OFWs or their dependents who become sick or is injured. It is created by the Philippine president's Executive Order No. 195 dated Aug. 13,1994. The program provides medical assistance and hospitalization benefits to OFWs and their dependents. It would be a great disservice to OFWs and their dependents who are not as lucky compared with a few Filipinos in the CNMI if this program would be dis continued. Many OFWs, even in the CNMI, still prefer that they have Medicare even if only their dependents in the Philippines might benefit from it. Of course, no gargantuan program such as Medicare would ever succeed if there were no money to back up its implementation. Thus, for only \$36, an ordinary OFW could sleep well, secure in the thought that his dependents in the Philippines are assured of medical assistance and hospitalization benefits if and when those exigencies arise.

There are other services and programs that have been long implemented and are still given to OFWs. The so-called insurance coverage is just one of the many benefits that OFWs and/or dependents are entitled to as members/beneficiaries of OWWA.

Unfortunately, critics seem to harp on the insurance aspect of OWWA despite the fact that thousands upon thousands of OFWs and or their heirs have benefited from it.

On the government's promotion system

THIS is regarding the recent news article on the Senate's quest to pursue a desk audit of government employees, and on the promotion system of law enforcement agencies.

It is commendable that the Senate wants the placement of employees in the correct classification standards. However, if the Senate's desire is to compare job to job, not job to standard and to reward performance on seniority with an upward reallocation, such an action is not proper personnel management. Seniority is already rewarded by annual within-grade increase. Those reaching the maximum step in their grade should aim toward qualifying for a position at a higher grade with increased job requirements and responsibilities.

Now before the Senate develops strategies for an audit, senators should familiarize themselves with the report on the status of efforts to upgrade the selection, training and promotion standards for the Department of Public Safety (DPS), which was submitted to the Office of the Governor in Oct. 1997. Among other things, the so-called, "progressive promotion" standard was approved by the then governor and subsequently implemented.

However, the current administration sacked this standard when it appointed heads of division within DPS in 1998.

This standard should be enacted through legislation to do away with nepotism and politics in law enforcement agencies.

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



DPL chief welcomes bill on BPL

PUBLIC Lands Director Bertha DLG. Guerrero welcomed a bill filed by Senate Vice President Thomas P. Villagomez (R-Saipan) which draws the line between her and the Board of Public Lands.

Guerrero said the bill "is something we definitely need.'

"If the intent is to clarify the line between the board and the division or the Department of Lands and Natural Resources, then it is something that we definitely need," said Guerrero.

Guerrero said she would be relieved if the bill would excuse her against any liability just in case one will arise in the future as a result of the board's decision or action for which the division is not involved.

The director admitted that Public Law 10-57, the statute which created the DPL has a lot of ambiguities, and it is now time to make changes.

The law has specifically stated that the land agency will carry out its primary task which is the efficient distribution of lands upon the approval of members of the board.

However, there had been some instances wherein the division has made recommen-

dations to the board, but which were not concurred or agreed upon by the board.


Guerrero was specifically concerned regarding future lawsuits which may be brought against her and the board arising from the latter's action.

She cited a recent case wherein she was among those that were included in the suit.

The DPL director said it is not hard on her part if her name appeared on a suit as long as the division was a privy to the action which created it, but she said this is not usually the case, since the decision belongs to the board.

Guerrero said this is the reason why she sometimes stood out when she feels there is a need to.

"The law says the board has the final decision and if the

board has the final decision, then just as along as I submit my position and they acted against what the division recommended, then that's their decision. I just want to make sure that if litigation happens, I don't get personally liable." she said.

"I always remind the board of the fiduciary involved and I always make it clear that if they want to be liable with their decision, that's fine with me as long as my liability is protected," Guerrero said.


The Philippine Department of Foreign Affairs informed the Consulate about the older Fajutag's case after his wife, Evelyn, sought help to locate him

Worker appeals to high court

A THAI worker who has been ordered deported for overstaying since 1988 brought his case to the CNMI Supreme Court.

Jennarong Phummee argued that the Attorney General's Office and the Division of Immigration Services failed to show a basis for his deportation.

Phummee denied allegations that he worked illegally in violation of the conditions of his entry permit.

The worker argued that he has not overstayed his entry permit because at present his 1988 labor case before the Department of Labor and Immigration is pending.

The Superior Court found that Phumee remained in the Commonwealth beyond Sept. 20, 1988 expiration of his employment entry permit.

The court last Oct. 14 issued an order finding that the Thai worker remained in the Commonwealth without lawful authority and is subject to deportation.

THE CNMI Food and Nutrition Council's (FNC) subcommittee structure which has made its goals implemented and succeed became the focus of the CNMI's presentation of its own 10-year national plan of action for nutrition (NPAN) at the recently-held World Health Organization (WHO) conference in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Pamela Mathis, CNMI FNC chairperson, was chosen to present a paper based on the Council's organizational structure and its plan of action for nutrition during the workshop sponsored by WHO last month.

"It is my belief that through the fusion or experience of the committee and community representatives, we not only learn how to implement our goals; we also succeed based on committee assignments," said Mathis.

The CNMI is one of the 29 states, countries, unions and islands worldwide which has created NPANs out of the original 159 which pledged to prepare or revise NPANs in 1992.

Aside from the presentations of various countries or states during the conference, group sessions also paved the way for exchange of information and experience of NPANS among the participants.

Some of the ideas also tossed out during the five-day conference were weight loss competition among politicians/popular people, more work with Customs on the importation and labelling of food, nutrition presentations at Association of Pacific Island Legislatures and other regional forum, and work with environmental groups.

The final report of all 24 Western Pacific countries/islands is expected to come out shortly.

'My brother is okay now'

Variety News Staff THE SISTER of a crash victim yesterday said her brother is on the road to recovery at a hospital in Hawaii where he has been confined following a recent car accident in Marpi.

Merced Limes, 26, said her brother, Felipe Litulumar, may be going home in the middle of next month after he had recovered, although not fully, from a pelvis dislocation, which he sustained during the accident.

Limes, however, said her brother still needs further medication.

Litulumar, had his right pelvis dislocated when the red Ford truck he was driving rammed into a pine tree weeks ago.

His sister clarified that he did not break his spinal cord nor his hip as earlier told by organizers scheduled to hold a benefit concert to raise the additional money he needs.

Litulumar, it was learned, overshot his \$25,000 insurance coverage.

Customs: Seized medicines up

WITH STRICTER Customs confiscation procedures, the volume of banned over-thecounter and prescription drugs seized from passengers disembarking from the Saipan International Airport went up by 114 pounds in just a one-month period.

Customs Services yesterday disclosed that from a total of 395 pounds seized in September, the figure climbed up to 509 pounds last month.

Lt. Patrick Tenorio, Customs-Airport Enforcement officer, said the bulk of the confiscated medicine came from citizens of mainland China, while the rest originated from Korea and the Philippines.

The Customs official said there might not be an actual increase in the volume of medicine coming in, but the stricter confiscation procedures at the airport resulted in the greater volume of seized items from passengers.

"Even if we are stricter than ever, they still bring in these medicine," said Tenorio in an interview.

Owners or consignees of

the prohibited medicine are given the option of destroying the items here using incinerator or send them back to the place of origin at their own expense.

Customs said Chinese nationals tend to choose having the items destroyed here rather than send them back to China due to the cost it will entail, and some of these medicine are also banned in their country.

Customs has been confiscating foreign medicine in line with the provisions of the "Rules and Regulations Governing the Importation, Storage, Sales and Distribution of Drugs and Pharmaceutical Products."

Under the said regulations, any medicine with non-English labels will be confiscated at any CNMI point of entry. Imported prescription drugs are also banned from the CNMI, unless they are accompanied by registered doctor's prescription, are consumable within 90 days and are intended only for personal use.

The law also prohibits the entry of over-the-counter drugs from foreign countries other than the U.S. mainland.

Continental to carry AEDs

CONTINENTAL Airlines has announced it will soon begin equipping its entire fleet of 361 jet aircraft with automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) and training its in-flight cabin crews on how to use these devices.

Installation of the Agilent Technologies Heartstream AEDs will begin in the second quarter 2000 and is expected to be completed by mid-year.

An AED is a device that is used to resuscitate a victim of sudden cardiac arrest.

The portable device, about the size of a laptop computer, delivers an electrical shock to restore a normal heartbeat.

The machine uses voice prompts to guide the user through the process, and the machine determines whether the person needs the use of the device.

"We believe defibrillators will be valuable tools to have on board.




ETS/GRE. Acceptable forms of payment are: personal check. money order, cashier's check, and credit cards. Cash is not acceptable.



Guam villagers fear toxic waste

HAGATNA-Mongmong residents fear that land used by the former U.S. Navy Power Plant in the area may present another imminent danger to public health.

Residents are concerned that beginning in 1949, when the power plant first began operation, dangerous amount of toxic waste has flowed through the residential area to the Agana Swamp and into the Agana River before emptying into the ocean.

Last Tuesday evening, dozens of concerned citizens confronted U.S. Navy engineers demanding that answers be given to basic questions regarding their family's safety.

The Navy is in receipt of a letter signed by area residents asking if the consumption of fish caught in the river and food grown and consumed in the soil poses a risk to their health.

Last July, World War II training canisters containing such deadly toxic chemicals as mustard gas and phosgene were found on private property in MongMong.

At almost the same time, high levels of polychlorinated biphenyl's or PCB's were likewise found in the same area.

According to the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services Studies, exposure to PCBs can cause weakness in the body, numbness of the limbs, respiratory symptoms and damage to the body's cleansing organ, the

A long time area resident, Rudy Aguon Paco, said he has received a letter from the U.S. Navy dated Nov. 1, 1999 which says, "the Navy would like to meet with you to discuss possible earthwork on your property in Mongmong in order to address environmental concerns caused by the Agana Power Plant.

The letter further states that the Navy will cover all costs associated with the earthwork. But Paco said he feels that a

"cover-up" is happening. He wants assurances from the federal government that his and fellow residents' health safety is assured.

Paco sites a 1992 criminal case wherein another Mongmong resident, Eduardo Suarex, was fined \$25,000 for backfilling portions of his property, which edged on wetlands.

Paco wants to know why "all of a sudden" the federal government is trying to do the same dirt removal without the federal Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) approval.

Area residents said Tuesday evening that they are tired of hearing the same old "words without actions."

All are demanding that a health risk assessment be conducted prior to any clean-up which many now believe could be an EPA clean-up project.

Navy officials were not available for comment as of press time.

Fisheries panel wants restrictions retained

KOROR (Palau Horizon) — The Committee for the Research and Development of a National Fisheries Management Plan has recommended that bilateral and multilateral fisheries agreements with Japan and the United States, which prohibit purse seiners from fishing both within 12 and 50 nautical miles from all coastal baselines and radius of Malakal Harbor in Koror, respectively be retained.

The committee also wants to retain the existing provision contained in the current locally-based foreign fishing agreements that tuna longliners be restricted from fishing within 12 nautical miles from coastal baselines.

These recommendations, which are incorporated in the National Tuna Fisheries Management Plan, were made, after learning that foreign-based longline fishing fleets tend to fish relatively far offshore throughout Palau's extended fishing zones.

The committee was formed on

June 25 this year by President Nakamura to formulate a national tuna fisheries management plan aimed at establishing consistent tuna fisheries management policies and procedures.

Palau's tuna resources are currently fished by a substantial number of vessel, which included: local commercial, subsistence, and recreational fishermen; locallybased foreign longline fleet operated by Kuniyoshi Fishing Co., Palau International Traders Inc. and Palau Marine Industries Corp.; and distant water fishing nations such as the U.S., Japan and eventually Korea.

The committee also noted that there is no current scientific rationale at this time to support gear separation closures between sports fishing interests and commercial longline vessels.

While majority of sports fishing activities are conducted relatively near the land, the committee stressed that restricted fishing zones are relatively difficult and costly to enforce.

Palau to impose provisional visa requirement for workers

KOROR (Palau Horizon) ----Before the end of 1999, the Labor Division will start requiring all non-resident workers to fulfill all their medical requirements on Palau before they are issued working permits.

Acting Labor Chief Russell Masayos told Palau Horizon that no working permit will be issued to a non-resident worker prior to his or her arrival to Palau. Instead a Provisional Non-Resident Worker's Labor Visa and Identification Certificate will be given. Only after this provisional visa shall have been issued and all medical requirements have been met, will a working permit be given to the worker.

"A worker can come to Palau without the permit, but with the provisional visa. It's the same process, but we will issue the provisional visa to the point of hire. When they're already here and have met all the requirements, then that's the time we will issue

a working permit," Masayos said. At the same time, the labor office will be requiring non-resident workers to have a round-trip ticket in case they fail in their health examination. "If they fail to fulfill all the requirements, especially health requirement, we will repatriate them," the acting chief labor said.

This process would be beneficial for the workers since they can start from the date as stated in the permit whereas in the present set up, many days would be wasted if the permit is issued before the workers could come in to the island, he said.

"This will also stop all those workers who come with communicable diseases," Masayos pointed out.

The non-resident worker must present his/her ticket for transportation between Palau and the point of hire to an immigration officer upon arrival in the republic. The ticket will be returned when the provisional visa is surrendered.

Movements

The Senate has expanded its committees to 12 each chaired by the Senate members and changed as well the chairmanship of two committees following the implementation of the Code of Ethics last Nov. 2 to protect the image and integrity of the body.

Senate President Seit Andres told Palau Horizon over the phone that there had been some major movements in the senate with the Committees on Banking, Insurance and Financial Institutions (SCBIFI) and Capital Infrastructure Projects (SCCIP) and Land Matters having new chairmen.

Except for the Senate Committee on Transportation and Communication (SCTC), chaired by Sen. Sam Masang (2nd District, Koror), the SCBIFI and the SCCIP have new leadership with the former assigned to newly-elected Sen. Alexander Merep (2nd District, Koror) and the latter assigned to Senator Harry Fritz (2nd District, Koror).

Fritz earlier told Palau Horizon that he is willing to relinquish his chairmanship of the SCBIFI as called for by the senate leadership. It would be noted that Fritz is the director and the vice president for public relations of the Pacific Savings Bank.

The other major change is the split made to the effect that a new committee was formed out of the old Committee on CIP and Land Matters formerly handled by Laurentino Ulechong (1st District, Babeldaob/Kayangel). It would also be noted that Ulechong won the contract for the site preparation and water tank installation under Phase I of the \$36.37 million Melekeok capital relocation project. Ulechong now handles the new Committee on Land Matters.

The Senate has agreed to retain Masang's chairmanship of the TC Committee since, according to the senate president, it does not run in conflict with the provisions of the Code of Ethics. Masang is one of the three major shareholders of the Belau Air, Inc. and is also connected with the Motorolla.

Should there be matters that would bring about conflicts of interest, Andres said the SCTC chairman could recuse himself and allow the committee be handled by his vice chair.

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Key Cabinet men may fall

MAJURO - A major political upset is in progress in Majuro, with the Marshall Islands government's two most important cabinet ministers on the verge of defeat by opposition candidates in the national election.

Foreign Minister Phillip Muller and Finance Minister Tony deBrum - both 16 year veterans of the Nitijela (parliament) - were in seventh and eighth place, respectively, in a five seat race with approximately 60 percent of Majuro's ballots counted on Tuesday.

If the Majuro voting trend continues, the balance of power in the nation's capital will switch from a pre-election three-to-two majority for the ruling government party, to a four-to-one edge for the opposition United Democratic Party which campaigned on a strong anticorruption platform that targeted both Muller and deBrum.

The two cabinet ministers are the architects of the Marshalls recent Taiwan recognition, and have been the main strategists for the government party. Muller is the Marshalls chief negotiator in talks with the U.S. on extending long-term economic aid provisions of a Compact of Free Association.

With heavy voter turnout in Majuro, voting didn't end until close to midnight on Monday although the polis closed at 7 p.m. Many people waited four hours or more in long lines to cast their votes for the 33 senators.

The government's radio station, which normally switches off at 11:30 p.m., continued throughout the night, broadcasting ward-byward election results for Majuro. Majuro residents were glued to their radios and few slept as the dramatic results were aired. "Nobody slept last night," said government radio station news editor Antari Elbon.

Electoral administrator Joseph Jorlang said the hand-count halted at 5 a.m. due to the exhaustion of the more than 100 tabulators, and was re-started at 10 a.m. Tuesday morning.

Four years ago, when deBrum was a leader of the opposition, he was the second-leading vote getter in Majuro. But, after more than a year as President Imata Kabua's chief spokesman, he has been all but eliminated in the preliminary count.

With several hundred off-island absentee ballots yet to be tabulated, Muller could still mount a comeback to claim the fifth spot.

Both Muller and deBrum conducted a high-profile campaign ---through newspaper advertising, banners, t-shirts and caps -as part of a three-way team with traditional chief and vice speaker Jurelang Zedkaia. But while Zedkaia, the dominant traditional landowner for Majuro, was comfortably in third place, Muller and deBrum did not share his success.

Witten Philippo, a former chief justice of the high court and first term opposition senator, was top vote-getter in the preliminary count with three wards still to be tabu-


Wilfred Kendall, a former ambassador to Washington, was second, Brenson Wase, a long time senator from Arno Atoll and former cabinet minister who switched to Majuro for this election, was in control of the fourth spot, while former Jaluit senator Alik J. Alik was fighting with UDP colleague Jack Jorban for the final seat for the nation's capital.

The Marshalls election involves vote counts in 24 isolated atolls. Complicating the count are the large number of absentee ballots cast for each island both from other islands within the Marshalls as well as from Marshall Islanders living abroad.

An unofficial vote count for the entire country is not anticipated before Friday. But the final outcome for close races will not be known until after November 29, the two week period required by Marshall Islands law for receipt of off-island absentee ballots.

Estrada alleges Ramos group seeks to oust him

MANILA, (Reuters) - Philippine President Joseph Estrada said on Wednesday that people apparently linked to the previous administration of Fidel Ramos were seeking to bring down his government.


Estrada, speaking in a radio interview, did not identify the group but said his information was "very reliable". "We have information that they are not just holding frequent meetings but they also have funding to sow intrigue and their aim is to bring down and destabilise my administration," Estrada said, speaking in Filipino.

Estrada gave no details and offered no evidence to back up his accusation. But asked whether the group was linked to Ramos' administration, he said: "That's how it looks." Estrada said he had discussed the matter with his advisers, including the armed forces chief, and that they told him not to worry about it.

"(They) said we are running the government well and the economy is slowly picking up so we should not worry," Estrada said.

Ramos, a former army general before he became president and who now runs a private think-tank, could not be reached for comment but he has criticised Estrada for indecisiveness.

Speaking to reporters last week-

end, Ramos stressed, however, he wanted the Estrada administration to succeed. "We are interested in construction, not demolition," Ramos said. Ramos was president from 1992 until 1998.

Barred from seeking re-election by constitutional decree limiting a president to one six-year term, Ramos endorsed former House of Representatives Speaker Jose de Venecia as his candidate in last year's election but Estrada won by a near-landslide.

Estrada's popularity has dived in recent months in the wake of an increase in the prices of basic commodities, rising fuel prices and perceived squabbling among his cabinet ministers.

However, the country's leading pollster said Estrada still had a 56 percent popularity rating in September, albeit down from 78 percent in June.

Estrada's controversial call for amendments to the constitution to remove provisions which he said are discouraging foreign investments has fuelled opposition to his administration. Opponents accused him of planning to remove the cap on the presidential term but Estrada said his only aim was to attract investors to the country and pledged to step down when his term runs out in 2004.

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A Philippine Airlines plane carrying the company president and top aviation officials safely completed a flight aimed at testing the carrier's readiness for the millennium computer bug, PAL said Wednesday.

The test of an Airbus 320 aircraft was carried out by PAL last Friday between Manila and the Clark Special Economic Zone, an airport and industrial complex about 80 kilometers (50 miles) north of the capital, the airline said

Airline technicians advanced the clocks of its date-dependent computer systems to simulate a flight that would be airborne during the critical transition from Dec. 31 to Jan. 1, 2000, a moment some fear could result in aviation accidents.

"It was a successful demonstration. All systems functioned normally and no safety-related concerns arose," said Capt. Manuel Antonio Tamayo, the plane's main pilot.

PAL president Avelino Zapanta, Air Transport chief Jacinto Ortega Jr., and other officials joined the flight, which was monitored by air transport personnel from takeoff to landing. Zapanta said the successful test

showed PAL is fully prepared for the millennium computer bug and ensured that the flag carrier's flights at the turn of the century will proceed safely.

In a statement earlier this month, PAL said it "is confident planes will not be falling from the skies ... there's no way Y2K will jeopardize safety on board."

While PAL will have flights on Dec. 31 and Jan. 1, 2000, the airline said it will not fly any plane at midnight because of slack passenger demand and the usual presence of thick haze over Philippine airports caused by firecracker explosions on New Year's Eve.

PAL Y2K projecthead Roberto Diaz De Rivera said the airline began work on becoming Y2K compliant in 1996, and has spent some 880 million pesos (\$ 22 million) on the project.

However, the airline failed to meet an end-September deadline set by the government's Y2K commission for all Philippine companies to be Y2K compliant.



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Cook Islands PM quits before confidence vote

RAROTONGA (Pacnews) — The Cook Islands Prime Minister, Joe Williams, has resigned just hours before he would have faced a no confidence vote in Parliament.

Yesterday morning Williams was still reluctant to resign opting instead to face the no confidence vote.

However, a meeting between the Prime Minister, his Deputy Tupou Faireka, Terepai Moate, the Leader of the Coalition Democratic Alliance Party (DAP) and New Alliance Party (NAP), and Norman George, the NAP leader, in Rarotonga later yesterday afternoon resolved that Williams would tender his resignation to avoid the no confidence vote against his Government.

Williams handed his resignation to the Queens Representative, Sir Apenera Short, at the Prime Minister's Office.

Parliament resumed in the afternoon when Opposition Leader, Dr Terepai Moate was expected to be announced as the new Prime Minister of the Cook Islands. His Deputy will be Norman George who severed ties with the ruling Cook Islands Party (CIP) last month after he and another DAP Minister were sacked by Williams.

There was no doubt that Williams Government would have lost the no confidence vote if it had gone ahead.

The Opposition coalition has the support of 14 Parliamentarians in the 25-seat House. Moate and George will be sworn in by the Queens Represen-

tative later today. Moate will announce his Cabinet team later this afternoon. Kiribati, Japan forge spaceport agreement

TARAWA (Pacnews) — The Kiribati Government and Japan's National Space Development Agency (NASDA) have finally agreed on the proposed multimillion dollar spaceport for Japanese rockets on Kirimati (Christmas) Island, located about 3218 kilometres (2,000 miles) east of the capital, Tarawa.

A report in the Kiribati Government Bulletin said the two parties agreed to proceed with the multi-million dollar project during their recent final round of negotiations in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The Kiribati Government and NASDA agreed that the spaceport will cover 80 acres of the sparsely populated part of Christmas Island. NASDA will lease the area for

20 years.

During this period there will be three separate reviews on the lease agreement.

The space agency is also required to build a new jetty for Kirimati Island and improve and maintain roads and the two airports on the island.

Under the agreement Kiribati will receive \$AU\$1.3 million \$U\$0.84 million) as an annual service fee from NASDA, but this will be paid at the eighth year of the project.

NASDA will also pay for any

environmental damage to the area as well as allocate \$AU\$20,000 (\$U\$12,882) towards an environment impact assessment study before the project begins.

The space project, which is officially called HOPE-X PROJECT, will be the biggest high-tech project of its kind in Kiribati.

The spaceport on Kirimati Island will be used as a return and landing base for Japanese rockets launched into space from Japan or other parts of the world.

The rockets will be in the form of self-piloted shuttles and will be used to transport communications satellites into space.

Solomons Parliament sitting today

HONIARA (Pacnews) — The Solomon Islands national Parliament resumed its session today after a break.

The House session according to the national broadcaster, SIBC, will only last a few days.

By yesterday afternoon, the Parliament office had received only four Government bills. Among the Bills is the Supplementary Appropriation Bill of 1999.

However, Clerk to Parliament, Elizabeth Anderson is confident another eight or nine Government bills are expected in the next few days.

The main business of parliament during this session of Parliament will be the announcement of the 2000 national budget.

Meanwhile, in today's order paper two Bills have been set down for their First Reading.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Up against a daily assault by Al Gore, Bill Bradley stood by his plan to eliminate Medicaid and accused the vice president Wednesday of playing politics with a broken system that stigmatizes the poor and minorities.

"He's wrong," Bradley said. In sober tones, the former basketball star described his presidential race as "the ultimate game" and issued his sharpest and most detailed defense of his \$65 billion health care plan.

Bradley, in an interview with The Associated Press. also eyed corporate tax loopholes as ripe for closing -"There are quite a lot there," he noted - and said politicians must start evaluating them each year "like any other" spending program."

He also said he opposes sports betting "because I don't think athletes should be roulette chips."

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But Bradley, who represented New Jersey and its Atlantic City casinos during 18 years in the Senate, declined to condemn all gambling. "I buy a lottery ticket every now and then," he chuckled. His reading glasses propped low on his nose, Bradley responded to Gore's escalating charges that Latinos, blacks and AIDS patients would be devastated by the loss of Medicaid.

"He's wrong. He's defending something that needs to be improved," said Bradley, who would give low-income Americans subsidies to buy health insurance in the private market or from the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program.

This week alone, Gore gave an interview on Spanish-language radio, conducted an Internet chat with women and placed ads on black radio stations to spread the word that minorities and other groups

who disproportionately rely on Medicaid might not be able to buy insurance with the capped amount of subsidy in Bradley's plan.

"What you're seeing is constituency politics on the other side," Bradley said. "I mean you know, just go down this group, that group, that group, that group - try to get that group against this group and this group against that - not looking at the whole.

And the whole is that people would be better off if those who were uninsured had a chance to be a part of the federal system." Bradley spoke to AP reporters and editors from his aides' typed page of "talking points," on which he had jammed the margins with his own tight scrawl.

He reeled off policy minutiae with mastery. "Medicaid stigmatizes and says, if you're poor, you just got that. You can't join this other system. You've got to have this sepa-

Medicaid covers a small fraction of the poor and patients often don't have primary care physicians, but are forced

to rely on hospital emergency rooms, he noted. Bradley suggested that his rival's critique hurt most because it denigrated Bradley's "deep and long-standing commitment" to helping minorities and the poor

"It's sad that (Gore) would not respect that," Bradley said. In reply, Gore spokesman Chris Lehane ticked down a list: minorities, the poor, the disabled, senior citizens and those who are HIV-positive.

"Each one of those groups would be disproportionately impacted and left out in the cold if Senator Bradley's health care plan was ever enacted," Lehane said.

Before racing to Atlanta's predominantly black Morehouse Medical School for a discussion of his health and poverty initiatives, Bradley also made these points: -His use of corporate jets is "completely legal, acceptable and fully reported" and not incompatible with his call to eliminate the political influence of big-money special interests. - He gave a tentative thumbs-up to the Clinton administration's deal to support China's membership in the World Trade Organization, despite fierce opposition from organized labor.

"From what I read in the newspaper, it sounds like something I would support." -He "stays in touch" with the Teamsters and United Auto Workers, two unions who opted out of the AFL-CIO's endorsement of Gore last month, to "encourage them to remain neutral" in the Democratic primaries.

- Defense spending should be restructured, rather than increased, to get rid of Cold War relics, such as heavy tanks. -After years of playing down his basketball feats, Bradley recruited fellow NBA stars for a \$1.5 million campaign fundraiser last weekend because, "When you're in the ultimate game, the ultimate competition, you want your friends with you."

Hillary campaign to move

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - Seeking to quiet speculation that Hillary Rodham Clinton may be having second thoughts about running for the U.S. Senate, her spokesman said Wednesday that "this campaign is moving full-steam ahead."

"Hillary Clinton has made a commitment to the people of New York and when she makes a commitment, she keeps it," said Howard Wolfson, spokesman for Mrs. Clinton's political committee. Asked whether that meant the first lady was definitely in next year's Senate race, Wolfson replied, "That's what I've got for you."

Wolfson's statement came after a top supporter of Mrs. Clinton's expected Senate bid said she must quickly announce her candidacy, establish residency in New York and hire a full-time campaign manager to end speculation that she may not run.

"All three of those things ought to happen simultaneously and as quickly as possible, like tomorrow," state Comptroller H. Carl McCall said Wednesday in an interview.

"There's a very strong consensus among her supporters that that needs to be done," McCall added. Wolfson said,

"We appreciate his advice." Mrs. Clinton, like her expected Republican opponent, New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, has been raising money and campaigning across New York for months, although neither has formally announced their candidacies

Dueling TV ads also have begun across upstate New York. Speculation has increased in recent weeks that, as Mrs. Clinton's polls numbers have dropped and she has encountered problems on the campaign trial, she might abandon the race.

But McCall, the state's highest ranking Democrat, said she must "rethink the timetable. "That's what you have to do in a campaign, you have to make adjustments based on what's coming at you, and right now there's a lot of negative stuff coming," he said.

Pressure for Mrs. Clinton to devote herself to the campaign mounted after her official visit to the Middle East last week. Mrs. Clinton sat silently as the wife of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat launched a verbal attack on Israeli security forces.

Mrs. Clinton objected to the remarks only hours later, and after Giuliani had begun criticizing her. The resulting furor prompted New York Democratic Chairwoman Judith Hope, a major booster of Mrs. Clinton, to suggest Monday that it might be time for the first lady "to give up her day job" and concentrate on the campaign.

Even so, Hope said she had no doubt of Mrs. Clinton's intention to run or her ability to win. But a new statewide poll showed Wednesday, as have others, that Mrs. Clinton's support in the state continues to slip.

The Siena College Research

Institute poll had Giuliani ahead of Mrs. Clinton, 48 percent to 36 percent. A September poll by Siena College had the mayor ahead, 43 percent to 40 percent, a statistical dead heat.

The telephone poll of 563 New Yorkers over age 18 was conducted Nov. 8-11 and has a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Meanwhile, advisers to Mrs. Clinton have said they don't think she can announce her candidacy until she has moved into the house she and the president recently purchased in Chappaqua, which would satisfy the New York residency

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Bush mulls policy issues

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — When George W. Bush prepped at Andover, he setup a stickball league and dubbed himself "high commissioner." At Yale, he was a fraternity president and member of the secret Skull and Bones Society.

At Harvard Business School, one image stands out in the yearbook: the two-term Texas governor and would-be Republican presidential nominee, sitting in the back of class, blowing a bubble. On the campaign trail, Bush's carefree demeanor and natural affability win him rave reviews and rock star-like adulation.


But his record as a school socialite, his recent fumbling over the names of world leaders and slipups such as calling Greeks "Grecians" have raised a question: Does Bush have the intellectual heft to be leader of the free world? Left unanswered, it can be politically damaging, as former Vice President Dan Quayle found.

To quiet the speculation, Bush has been attending policy school

with a verve unseen during his high school and college years. Kathleen Hall Jamieson, an observer on political issues and rhetoric, said the schooling shows that Bush is running a smart campaign. "You'd like the campaign to help prepare people to govern, and this is a thing that helps people to govern - and it helps them survive the debates," said Jamieson, dean of the Annenberg School for Communication at the University of Pennsylvania.

The first classes for Bush convened last spring at the governor's mansion, a white Greek Revival home with porch columns that lend a university air. The instructors included a variety of experts in foreign affairs, economics and social and domestic issues.

At the core are fellows at Stanford's conservative Hoover Institution, notably George Shultz, who was former President Reagan's secretary of state, and Condoleeza Rice, who worked for Bush's father, former President Bush, at the

National Security Council. She is now the governor's chief foreign policy adviser.

The cram sessions continue, anchored by outsiders such as Lawrence Lindsey, a former Federal Reserve System governor who advises Bush on economic matters, and Al Hubbard, an Indianapolis businessman with a bent for domestic policy. Bush also has built an in-house policy team, led by Josh Bolten. One way he helps Bush is by distilling material into single-volume binders, one labeled "Airplane Reading" that the governor carries while traveling.

Having taught law at Stanford, been general counsel for U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills and served as trade counsel for the Senate Finance Committee, Bolten has seen his share of deep thinkers. To his eyes, Bush measures up. "I think he's got the heft. What he does not have is the veneer of an intellectual," said Bolten.

"That's what gives people the impression he lacks the heft." Bush's tutors have some common impressions: He asks as well as he listens, he can delve into the minutiae as well as frame the big picture, and he isn't embarrassed to admit what he doesn't know.

"He's not afraid to say, 'Explain that again,' or, 'Lindsey, give me that in English," Lindsey said. Bush, 53, did not want for a top education. He attended prep school at Phillips Academy in Andover, Mass., and graduated from Yale University in 1968.

In 1975, he received a master's in business administration from Harvard University. Critics say Bush has benefited not from smarts but family connections. Admirers say he is a sharp businessman adept at public relations. Bush says he is a leader who knows how to set a tone and, as governor since 1995, to accumulate and spend political capital on a limited agenda. Hubbard said Bush is different from when they attended business school together. "He was not a very serious student.

He's changed a lot since then. Not his personality, but his seriousness about what he's doing vocationally," Hubbard said. As Bush attempts to make the move from Austin to Washington, he has been aggressive about bolstering his policy background.

The sessions at the governor's mansion earlier this year were almost military in their bearing: Six minutes for opening remarks, 25 minutes for one subject, 30 minutes for another, a 20-minute closing toreview the material presented. Topics included health care, social policy, tax reform. "When we have these meetings, it's not just him sitting there," Lindsey said.

"He gets proactive and has an inquiring mind." Domestic issues appear to have come easiest to Bush. He runs the second largest state in the country both in terms of size and population, and he has dealt with microcosms of the challenges facing the nation. Advisers say the bigger challenge has been foreign policy, with all of its nuance.

One resource has been his father. As president, the elder Bush was known for his foreign policy prowess. He was head of the CIA, U.S. ambassador to China and the United Nations, and in 1990 cobbled together a 28-nation coalition against Iraq in the Persian Gulf War. Another tutor has been Rice, a former Stanford provost, and former Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

Today when he's on the stump, Bush takes questions on the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (he opposes it) and isn't afraid to say that the United States should treat Russia and China less as strategic partners and more as economic rivals.

Yethe sometimes stumbles when cornered for specifics, such as a recent television interview when he was asked to name the leaders in Taiwan, India, Pakistan and Chechnya. Bush got just one name.

The education of Bush is still a work in progress. In an interview Tuesday, Bush read from a draft of an upcoming speech to say he would take action "if the Russian government attacks innocent women and children in Chechnya."

Asked whether that was now happening, Bush moved the phone away from his mouth and shouted, "They are attacking women and children, aren't they?" Answer in hand, he resumed the interview and said, "Condi Rice is shaking her head in agreement."



Bush gets donations from 'air polluters'

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Texas Gov. George W. Bush has received 79 percent of the money donated to presidential candidates by employees of oil, electric power and automobile interests during the first nine months of the year, said a report Wednesday by two citizens' groups.

Bush received \$521,714 of the \$658,389 donated by workers of companies belonging to three trade organizations: the American Petroleum Institute; the Edison Electric Institute, which represents electric utilities and power plant owners; and the Alliance of Auto Manufacturers, said the report by the New Hampshire Citizens Alliance and the Iowa Citizen Action Network Foundation, which supports changing campaign finance laws.

The groups attributed support for the two-term Texas governor to his lead in public opinion polls and what they described as his sub-par environmental record.

"He has a record in Texas that most environmental groups would say is not very good," said Tris Newbury, au-

Newbury calculated the totals by examining individual campaign contributions, which require donors to list their employers.

Bush's campaign did not immediately return a telephone call Wednesday for comment. Campaign spokeswoman Mindy Tucker previously has responded to criticism of Bush's environmental record by saying that Texas has seen a 10 percent reduction in industrial pollution and leads the nation in reducing the release and disposal of toxic waste since he became governor.

All major candidates except Republican Steve Forbes took money from these employees. Vice President Al Gore, who is seeking the Democratic presidential nomination, received the second-highest total, \$56,025, about one-tenth of Bush's total. Republican Arizona Sen. John


McCain received \$26,550; Republican Utah Sen. Orrin Hatch, \$21,000; Democrat Bill Bradley, \$20,950; and Republican Gary Bauer, \$12,150. Steve Blackledge, program director for New Hampshire Public Interest Research Group, said the industries are giving heavily to Bush in hopes that, if elected, he will resist tougher pollution standards being proposed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

"If he is elected, these special interests will have special access to the next president," Blackledge said.

Since Bush became governor in 1995, Houston has surpassed Los Angeles as the country's smoggiest city, according to the 1999 U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Toxic Release Inventory Report.

Four other Texas cities are on the verge of violating federal air quality standards. Environmental groups also have criticized Bush's plan to regulate Texas industrial plants that are too old to be covered by the state's 1971 Clean Air Act.

State regulators had been considering mandatory restrictions, but Bush intervened and asked industry leaders to draft their own, voluntary standards.

US budget deal reached

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Capping marathon, year-end budget talks, congressional Republicans and the White House cleared the last known obstacle Wednesday night to agreement on a \$390 billion budget bill with a small acrossthe-board cut in federal programs.

Sen. Pete Domenici, chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, said the deal was sealed after Republicans agreed to White House demands for additional flexibility in the application of the across-theboard cuts.

"Jack Lew (President Clinton's budget director) and I just made the deal," the New Mexico Republican said in the Capitol shortly before midnight.

"... The budget bill has been agreed to." An administration official, Linda Ricci, confirmed that agreement had been reached on the so-called flexibility issue. She added that White House officials were continuing to read the remainder of the massive bill "with a close eye" to make sure earlier agreements funding Clinton's pri-





orities were included accurately Republicans said they would push the measure to a roll call on Thursday in the House - one of a trio of bills to be voted on in a rush to adjourn for the year.

The budget bill will be expanded to include unrelated legislation restoring billions in Medicare cuts, authorizing State Department programs and approving controversial dairy provisions, GOP officials said.

A second bill would keep government agencies in money for up to five or six days, enough time for congressional leaders to grapple with a threatened filibuster on the budget bill in the Senate.

The third piece of legislation would extend a series of expiring tax breaks, including one that grants credits for research and development. In an interview in the Capitol, Domenici said total cuts will amount to 0.38 percent of overall spending throughout hundreds of government programs, although accounts covering military personnel will be shielded from any reductions.

individual account - more than the 5 percent envisioned earlier. While steps have been taken to grant Clinton greater flexibility, he said the agreement also includes provisions to make sure that congressional priorities did not bear a disproportionate burden of the cuts.

"I would assume the administration statement will be supporting it," Domenici said. Disputes over federal support programs for dairy farmers pitted Northeasterners against midwestern lawmakers in both houses.

Senate Democratic Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., had told reporters earlier he thought the bill "probably wouldn't pass the Senate" unless some provision was made to help satellite television viewers in rural states.

And Sen. Robert C. Byrd, a fierce defender of West Virginia's economic interests, sought inclusion of a provision to help mining companies in his state - an amendment that other lawmakers said was detrimental to the environment.

While Byrd's amendment was apparently being omitted from the final bill, the other issues seemed certain to be grafted onto the bud-

get bill, complicating efforts to gain passage.

The emerging budget deal represented a classic political compromise, crafted to allow both sides to claim victory.

The White House could boast of increased spending for teachers and police, the elimination of several environmental riders sought by Republicans, and the release of long-overdue money for the United Nations. Even with the cuts, spending would rise roughly \$32 billion more in fiscal 2000 than last year.

Republicans claimed they crafted a budget that did not dip into the Social Security trust fund, that achieved across-the-board cuts and that won restrictions on funding for overseas abortions.

Senate nixes food merger moratorium

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate today soundly rejected a proposed 18-month moratorium on mergers of food and agriculture companies that Midwest Democrats argued are squeezing farm income

"If you want to help farmers, this is not the way to do it," said Sen. Gordon Smith, an Oregon Republican who made millions in the frozen foods business. The Senate voted 71-27 against attaching the moratorium to a bankruptcy reform bill.

Many producers are blaming the shrinking number of food processors and farm suppliers for a severe downturn in the agricultural economy.

"We've got to do something about getting some competition back into the food industry," said Sen. Paul Wellstone, D-Minn. Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., said companies "are choking the economic life out of the little guy, the little producer.

Why? Because they can." Economists, however, say that worldwide overproduction of grain, not agribusiness consolidation, has driven down commodity prices. The moratorium would have applied to all mergers where one company had net revenue of more than \$100 million and the other had more than \$10 million.

Midwest Democrats say the Justice Department hasn't done enough to curb a recent wave of agribusiness mergers and acquisitions, including the purchase by giant grain trader Cargill Inc. of one of its major competitors.

Justice is currently reviewing another deal in which the nation's largest pork processor, Smithfield Foods Inc., would take over its nearest competitor.

The Monsanto Co., a major supplier of seed and farm chemicals, is reportedly in merger talks with some of its competitors.

Justice Department officials have told Congress that existing antitrust laws are adequate to protect the interests of farmers and consumers



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
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
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US budgets \$100B on Y2K repairs

WASHINGTON (AP) --- The government pinned a staggering \$100 billion price tag Wednesday on the nation's repair bills for the Year 2000 technology problem, or \$365 for each man, woman and child. For all that, the Commerce Department predicted the impact of Y2K computer failures on the economy would be merely "something like a tangled shoelace for a worldclass marathon runner."

In a new report, the government said America's booming economy was sufficiently "stable, large and resilient" that failures even those overseas - will not seriously affect the nation's \$9 trillion gross domestic product.

"Any glitches that pop up next year should not hurt our economic growth," Commerce Secretary William Daley said.

"I am not going to lose any sleep." The \$100 billion figure for total repairs from 1995 through 2001 was generally in line with other estimates but still is an enormous amount.

Private analysts last month put the figure at \$114 billion. It roughly is the same as the total spent last year by seven of the largest federal agencies and just more than the personal fortune of Microsoft's chairman, Bill Gates.

Commerce Undersecretary Robert J. Shapiro said some Y2K precautions - such as companies adjusting inventories to

hedge against possible supply problems - could affect the "pattern and timing" of economic growth.

Those rising expenditures, for example, could add to growth during the last three months of 1999 but likely would slow it during the first months of 2000 to compensate.

Shapiro also said consumers who decide to stockpile food, water or other supplies could drive up prices in the final six weeks of this year.

Another government report, being released Thursday, predicted only a slight risk of "serious or widespread disruptions" in the nation's food supply.

Consumer hoarding and weather-related problems could cause spot shortages, but food companies have made "remarkable progress" in getting their computerized systems ready, the report said. President Clinton's top Y2K expert, John Koskinen, also cautioned Wednesday that "several hundred thousand" smaller companies nationwide have not performed any repairs and apparently intend to fix problems after they occur.

Koskinen warned that business owners will find long waits for technical support and new equipment in the earliest weeks of the new year, and "some of them may lose their customers and go out of business."


"We are getting close to it being too late to start," said Koskinen, chairman of the President's Council on Year 2000 Conversion.

Daley's generally optimistic remarks mirror statements made during past months by top U.S. financial leaders.


Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, for example, has warned that stockpiling and inventory hedging against possible failures could cause more trouble than the Y2K glitch itself.


The new report said spending on Y2K repairs climbed from \$5 billion in 1995 and peaked last year and this year at about \$30 billion each.

It was predicted to drop next year to about \$5 billion. The federal government has said previously it will spend \$8.4 bil-





Deal in NY mall racism case

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The family of a teen-ager who was killed by a dump truck on her way to her job accepted \$2.55 million Wednesday to settle a lawsuit accusing a shopping mall of racism for not letting certain city buses drop passengers off on its property.

Cynthia N. Wiggins, 17, died in 1995 while crossing a busy sevenlane highway outside the Walden Galleria in suburban Cheektowaga, where she worked at a fast-food restaurant.

The Wiggins family filed a wrongful-death suit against mall owner Pyramid Cos. after it was revealed that the mall did not allow buses from predominantly black neighborhoods to drop passengers at the mall.

The family also sued the regional transit agency - the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority - and the truck driver.

The family, represented by Johnnie Cochran Jr., was seeking \$150 million. On Wednesday, in the middle of the trial, a settlement was reached under which Pyramid will pay \$2 million, the driver \$250,000 and the transit agency \$300,000.

Ms. Wiggins' 4-year-old son will receive the money. None of the defendants admitted any wrongdoing in the young woman's death.

"You have an attractive 4-yearold sitting here and the jury are going to look at him and think about how he doesn't have a mother," said Robert P. Watkins. a lawyer for Pyramid.

The Wiggins family contended that the highway served as a "moat" to keep black inner-city residents away from the mall.

Pyramid explained it wanted to prevent problems with rowdy young people. The bus company and mall pointed out that Ms. Wiggins could have transferred onto a bus with a stop closer to the mall. They also said she was jaywalking when she was struck.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A plan to compensate nuclear weapons workers who became ill through exposure to beryllium was proposed Wednesday by Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, who called the workers "the forgotten soldiers of the Cold War."

"This action is long overdue," Richardson said at a news conference also attended by Democratic members of Congress.

Under the provisions of the bill, people who worked at Energy Department plants between January 1952 and February 1993 and suffered from some beryllium-related illnesswould be eligible to receive medical benefits, lost wage reimbursement, and optional job retraining or a single lump-sum payment of \$100,000.

Oak Ridge, Tenn., would be the site of a pilot program to determine whether any current and former employees are sick as a result of beryllium exposure there.

The legislation expands on a similar bill introduced in Congress last February to include employees at DOE plants in Paducah, Ky., and Oak Ridge.

The earlier legislation had not included workers at the two plants. Beryllium is a lightweight, strong metal that has been used over the past 50 years in the production of nuclear weapons.

It can cause Chronic Beryllium Disease, an often fatal lung condition that may not appear in those affected until 10 or more years after exposure.

An estimated 20,000 workers may have been exposed to beryllium at various Energy Department sites, though medical experts stress that only a small percentage would develop beryllium-related illnesses.

Richardson said an interagency review, led by the National Economic Council, is continuing to examine whether there are different illnesses at other sites, such as the Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant in Piketon, Ohio, that warrant inclusion in the new program.

Richardson said a report on the Piketon plant should be finished by March. Rep. Paul Kanjorski, D-Pa., who introduced the original compensaefits to affected workers and contract employees who worked for the Defense Department.

"This is an incredibly good start, but it is just that - a start. It is not the end of the story," said Kaptur.

Richardson said the Justice Department is still looking at partment had refused to acknowledge that some workers' health problems were linked to work at the weapons plants.

Bishops OK college controls

WASHINGTON (AP) --- After a nine-year struggle, America's Roman Catholic hierarchy gave lopsided approval Wednesday to new rules, shaped to Vatican specifications, that are aimed at controlling theologians and what they teach at

the nation's 235 church-related colleges.

Despite public and private alarms from academic circles, a bishops' meeting took the historic step by a vote of 223 to 31.

The action is highly significant

because many theologians have criticized official policies since colleges became more independent of the church beginning in the 1960s. The text goes into effect one year after it receives the expected ratification from the

Vatican.

The most disputed provision, requiring that all present and future theology professors hold a "mandate" from the local bishop in order to teach, will not be applied immediately.

The U.S. bishops first must write procedures for granting - and removing-such certification. Catholics United for the Faith, a conservative lay group based in Steubenville, Ohio, stated after the vote that "we are encouraged by and affirm the efforts of our bishops to faithfully implement the Vatican's directives."

The group said 90 other Catholic organizations joined in support of a decree on Catholic colleges, "Ex Corde Ecclesiae," that was issued in 1990 by Pope John Paul and the Vatican. Rome's decree laid out general principles that are to be applied by the hierarchies in each nation.

The U.S. bishops have worked on the issue ever since. The Americans adopted a more liberal policy in 1996 but it was rejected by the Vatican.

"I think it's a turning point," said the Rev. Thomas Reese, editor of the Jesuit magazine America, which editorialized against the latest version.

"The bishops are saying they're going to decide who is and who is not an appropriate teacher of Catholic theology.'

Reese predicted a wave of future lawsuits against bishops and colleges from teachers who are denied appointments.

But Cardinal Anthony

Bevilacqua of Philadelphia, a major player in the drafting process, assured the bishops that "there do not see to be serious legal implications.

This is not to say there will no be litigation, but the risk of negative rulings would be minimal" according to lawyers consulted by the bishops, he said.

Bevilacqua was one of four U.S. members of the College of Cardinals urging passage during the 90minute floor debate.

The others were Bernard Law of Boston, Roger Mahony of Los Angeles and John O'Connor of New York, who was absent but sent a message that was read on his behalf. Law said the bishops "cannot ignore the history of institutions that were sponsored by Protestant communities of faith but are now thoroughly secular."

But Bishop John D'Arcy of Fort Wayne and South Bend, Ind., who is responsible for the University of Notre Dame, said "we can use the Protestant universities as a wakeup call" but "we don't have to go down the road."

He warned that the mandate requirement would worsen the bishops' relations with theologians. The only other bishop who criticized the document was Archbishop Rembert Weakland of Milwaukee.

"I believe passage will create a tremendous pastoral disaster for the church," he declared. "The tension between theologians and the hierarchy now is the most I have witnessed in 36 years as a superior in the Catholic Church."

Egypt shocked at suicide theory

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A relief co-pilot who died aboard EgyptAir Flight 990 was described by his son, in an interview published today, as a responsible man who sent money home to pay the bills and took his young daughter to the United States for medical care.

A day before the crash, Capt. Gameel el-Batouty sent his family money to pay a phone bill, his son Mohammed el-Batouty said.

He denied media reports that his father had sent his life savings because he had planned to commit suicide and said his father had no life insurance.

The younger el-Batouty told the daily newspaper al-Ahram that he spoke to his father, who was in the United States, two days before the crash and asked him to send \$300 with a friend traveling to Cairo to pay a local telephone bill.

"Weurged him to send the money before the due date, and that's what he did," said Mohammed.

Egyptian airline officials have tentatively identified the person in the co-pilot's seat at the time of the crash as el-Batouty, 59, who was scheduled to take over much later in the flight from co-pilot Adel Anwar, a source close to the investigation told The Associated Press in the United States.

The officials identified el-

Batouty's voice after listening to Habashy, returned to the cockpit the cockpit voice recorder at the headquarters of the National Transportation Safety Board.

Another source close to the investigation, also speaking on condition of anonymity, said the tape showed that el-Batouty apparently came in at some point, "said he wanted to fly" and his request was accepted

The Egyptian Pilots' Association today rejected any suggestion that the co-pilot may have caused the crash in an effort to kill himself.

In a statement, the association's head, Capt. Walid Murad, said that the utterance of the co-pilot indicates he realized "there was a danger looming and he was about to die." "Committing suicide is not a trait that Egyptians and Muslims are known for," the statement said.

It is strictly against the Muslim faith to commit suicide. The New York Times reported today that el-Batouty was left alone in the cockpit, repeating an Arabic phrase that can mean "Ientrust myself to God" at about the same time the jet's

autopilot was turned off. The plane began a steep plunge from 33,000 feet just after that, regaining some altitude before

dropping into the sea. Investigators suggested the pilot, Capt. Ahmed Mahmoud el-

and struggled to regain control of the jet, the Times reported, citing unidentified government officials

U.S. Embassy spokesman David Ballard said two investigators were in Egypt in connection with the EgyptAircrash, one from the NTSB and the other from the Federal Aviation Administration.

No FBI agents have been sent from abroad, he said. El-Batouty's family refused to talk to reporters early today after local newspapers carried front page reports about claims that he might have been in the co-pilot's seat at the time of the crash

A plainclothes policeman with a pistol stood outside the seven-story apartment building where the el-Batouty family lives in the middleclass Cairo neighborhood of Heliopolis. He and the doorman said the family did not want to be disturbed

Security officials said the family had requested the police guard. Friends and neighbors refused to believe any suggestion that el-Batouty could bring down the plane.

"He was very religious," said

Samiael-Sheik Sayyed, aneighbor who has known the el-Batouty family for 30 years.

"He knew our God, and he performed the pilgrimage this year with his wife." She was referring to the annual Muslim pilgrimage to Mecca

In interviews with Associated Press Television News following the crash, family members described el-Batouty as a loving father and an understanding and sensitive man.

El-Batouty's 10-year-old daughter, Aya, suffers from lupus ervthematosis, an immune disorder that affects the vascular and connective tissue.


El-Batouty had planned to take

"She was everything to him," his brother-in-law, Essam Dahi, told the AP recently. "Only God will be able to give her the kind of love her father offered."

"He was one of the best fathers in the world," el-Batouty's son Mohammed told APTN last week "He didn't leave us in any financial need.'

Son defends EgyptAir co-pilot

CAIRO (Reuters) - Egypt reacted with shock and incredulity Wednesday to suggestions that a suicidal crew member might have caused the crash of EgyptAir Flight 990.

The Cairo-bound Boeing 767 crashed Oct. 31 off the Massachusetts coast, killing all 217 people on, board. Information Minister Safwat Sherif told reporters the government had received no report on the results of American investigations into the disaster.

He categorized foreign media reports on the possible cause of the crash as "speculation, theories and fantasies, which do not measure up to the facts."

Egyptian reaction homed in on evidence from the plane's cockpit recorder, on which one of the crew was heard to utter a religious phrase in Arabic, arousing concern among U.S. investigators that the plane may have been deliberately put into a fatal dive.

Cairo newspapers carried a report by the official Middle East News Agency which said: "Uttering the shihada (short declaration of faith in Islam) is normal in times of crisis or when a plane experiences an emergency."

American investigators said Tuesday they were holding off a decision on whether to turn the probe into the crash into a criminal investigation until more Egyptian experts, including translators, heard the recording. Cairo airport sources said Abdel-Fattah Kato, chairman of the Egyptian Civil Aviation Authority, had left for the United States to listen to the tape.

EgyptAir Operations Manager Captain Hassan Misharrafa was due to depart for New York early Thurs-

day to participate in the investigation and review the flight voice recorder tape

The Egyptian Pilots' Federation dismissed suggestions of suicide by a crew member. "EgyptAir pilots are subject to rigorous medical check-ups every six months," the federation said in a verbal statement.

Captain Walid Murad, head of the federation, told reporters the record of Egyptian pilots was honorable and there had been no single suicide recorded in the history of Egyptian aviation.

The wife of relief co-pilot Gamil al-Battouti, who is believed to have spoken the religious words, said she could not imagine her husband had committed suicide.

"My husband had a certificate of appreciation from Air College, numerous certificates from EgyptAir, had worked for 38 years and trained most of the civil and

military pilots," Umayma al-Dahi told the state-owned al-Gomhuria newspaper

"How can I believe he would commit suicide?" she asked, adding that he had many hopes and plans. U.S. authorities have said that the cockpit tape showed that, after the pilot, Captain Ahmed al-Habashi, left the cockpit, another crew member uttered the religious phrase.

A senior law enforcement official said the plane's autopilot was then disengaged and, seconds later, the aircraft went into a steep dive. Cairo businessman Mohamed Ahmed typified Egyptians' shock and dismay at the suicide theory.

"The pilots are all Muslims, they pray and are all God-fearing people,"he said. "If the pilot wishes to commit suicide, what is the secret behind him doing it on the plane? He could commit suicide on the ground."

TV programs for the blind mulled

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chet from television description ser-Avery picks the television shows he tunes into very carefully. Dramatic programs with lots of dialogue are fine. Avery is blind.

That means shows with highaction content and little conversation are difficult for him to follow

"When you watch television you rely upon the kindness of your wife or members of your family to fill in when there is silence," said Avery, 62, a retired Education Department administrator who lives in the Washington suburb of Arlington, Va.

"I know some blind people that never watch television because of the frustration. Television is not for them.'

Federal regulators and advocates for the blind say the time has come to give those with impaired vision access akin to what the deaf have now with closed captioning.

The Federal Communications Commission is expected to offer proposals Thursday on how to mandate video description services, which describe the scene and action not captured in dialogue, for television programming.

It's part of a broader FCC effort to make technology more reachable for people with disabilities. "We must ensure they're full participants in the information age," FCC Chairman Bill Kennard said in an interview.

"If you think of it as an afterthought, it doesn't get done." That's one reason regulators and advocates want to act now so they can set the stage to bring those services along as television makes the transition from analog to digital.

There are 1.6 million blind people in the nation, but as many as 9 million have vision problems such that they could benefit

vices, says Corinne Kirchner, director of policy research at the American Foundation for the Blind.

Blind activists say the service will mean one less obstacle they face in daily life.

"If I as a blind person don't have access to what really happened during the presentation of a program, I am not able to communicate with my friends and associates on the same level," said Charlie Crawford, executive director of the American Council of the Blind. Description services will also benefit people who have poor or failing vision and people with learning disabilities, said Margaret Pfanstiehl, chairwoman of the National Television Video Access Coalition.

"This is something that's going to affect millions of people," she said. The service works like this: Descriptions of events are squeezed into the natural pauses already in the program.

For example, television audiences could hear that a character in a scene is boarding a plane or decoding a computer program.

This is typically done using a separate audio track that audiences can switch on or off. A secondary soundtrack channel also is commonly used to provide Spanish language dubbing of programming.

Since 1993, all television sets manufactured in the United States have been equipped to receive this secondary audio track, typically at negligible costs to consumers.

The FCC's proposal will ask for comment on such issues as how much programming should include video description and whether certain shows - for example, those during the primetime slots - should offer the service first.



WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Dan Burton, chairman of the House Government Reform Committee, expressed outrage Wednesday after hearing administration witnesses testify that Cuba is not a major transit point for illicit drugs bound for the United States.

"When you come and testify before our committee and you tell us this stuff, it just drives me up the wall," said Burton, R-Ind.

He speculated that the administration's position is based on a desire of President Clinton to establish normal relations with President Fidel Castro.


Administration officials insist Clinton has no such intention. Burton, who has been one of Clinton's chief tormentors on Capitol Hill, said the evidence is overwhelming of Cuban government complicity in drug shipments from South America to the United States.

He cited information that Castroonce had a friendship with Jorge Cabrera, a Cuban-American drug trafficker who admitted after his arrest by U.S. authorities that he sent "freighter-loads" of cocaine to the United States, using Cuba as a transit point.

Burton also cited the case of a 7.2 ton-cocaine seizure by Colombian authorities from a vessel in the port city of Cartagena in December 1998.

He said a months-long investigation by House Republican staff members demonstrated convincingly that the Cuban government was involved.

"For this government and this president to say this (Cuba) is not a major transshipment point for drugs is just unbelievable," he said, glaring at a lineup of administration witnesses from the State

Department, the Drug Enforcement Administration and an interagency task force responsible for monitoring drug trafficking.

Clinton infuriated Burton and other outspoken critics of Castro on Capitol Hill last week when he excluded Cuba from the official list of countries regarded as "major" drug-producing or drug-transit countries.

The list, updated each November, included 26 countries and territories. Cuba was described as a country of "drug-trafficking concern

Rear Adm. Edward J. Barrett, who directs an interagency drug monitoring operation in Key West, Fla., testified that there is "little indication to suggest that cocaine traffickers use Cuba as a transshipment point for markets in the United States.

"Almost all cocaine headed for this market bypasses Cuba via other routes, typically Mexico, Central America, Haiti and Puerto Rico," he said.

Randy Beers, the State Department's top law enforcement official, disputed Burton's contention that the cocaine seizure in Colombia 11 months ago should have been enough evidence to earn Cuba a designation as a major trafficker.

Beers said an "all-source inter agency assessment" indicated that the cocaine shipment was earmarked for Spain and not the United States.

A country is labeled as a major trafficker only if drug flows have a significant effect on the United States.

Beers added that information exchanges between U.S. and Cuban authorities resulted in signifi cant marijuana seizures by Cuban Border Guard agents on two occasions earlier this year. The two Cuban-born members of the House, Reps. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen and Lincoln Diaz-Balart, both Florida Republicans, joined with Burton in accusing Castro of involvement in drug trafficking. Ros-Lehtinen said it was naive to suggest that Castro is oblivious to drug trafficking though Cuba.

US, China sign postal agreement

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S and Chinese postal authorities signed an agreement Wednesday aimed at improving the flow of mail between the two countries and sharing ideas for developing new services.

U.S. Postmaster General William J. Henderson and China's leading postal official, Liu Liging, signed the agreement in ceremonies at a Washington hotel. Liu and other Chinese postal officials have been touring U.S. postal facilities in Washington and New York.

The agreement calls for expansion of cooperation between the two postal services and continuing efforts to improve existing mail delivery and pursue new services. It covers business development, financial management, training and technical coopera-

MIAMI. (Reuters) - Federal officials on Wednesday said they are closing in on a deal that would return approximately \$150 million in additional U.S. rum tax collections to Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands over several years.

The federal government levies an excise tax of \$13.50 per proof gallon on rum the United States imports from the two U.S. territories in the Caribbean.

Under a 1993 law governing the return of the tax proceeds to the territories, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico received \$11.30 of the per-gallon tax. That amount,

often referred to as the rum cover over, dropped to the current level of \$10.50 when the law expired in October 1998.

Territory representatives since have been lobbying for a full return of the \$13.50 tax. In a deal struck late Tuesday night, House and Senate lawmakers, along with White House negotiators, agreed to send \$13.25 back to the territories, a spokesman for New York Representative Charles Rangel, the ranking Democrat on the House Committee on Ways and Means, told Reuters in a telephone interview on Wednesday.

The rum tax measure is expected to be passed by lawmakers, who are eager to wrap up work and adjourn for the year, Jon Sheiner, an attorney for the committee said in a phone interview.

If approved, the new cover over would be retroactive to July 1, 1999, and extend to Dec. 31, 2001, Sheiner said.

The Virgin Islands' rum tax revenues are pledged to \$541 million in rum tax bonds issued in 1998 and now are roughly equal to reserve requirements on that

Excess revenues generated by the proposed increase will flow into the Virgin Islands' general fund, which could see about \$15 million a year from the increased rum tax cover over, Hiebert said. "The agreement is well-timed for the people of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands as they cope

with Hurricane Lenny.



Hurricane Lenny threatens Caribbean

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)-Beleaguered residents of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands scrambled to prepare for Hurricane Lenny, a late-season surprise that gathered strength over the normally placid Caribbean and headed for the U.S. territories today. Lenny's sustained winds strengthened to nearly 125 mph today, after the hurricane passed south of heavily populated and vulnerable Haiti and the Dominican Republic on Tuesday, unleashing torrential rains on its unusual west-to-east course.

The hurricane veered northeast in the evening, validating forecasts and sparking a last-minute rush at grocery stores and gas stations throughout the islands in its path. Officials in Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands warned that the storm could dump up to 15 inches

of rain The National Weather Service warned of isolated tornadoes. At a Home Depot near San Juan, nervous shoppers consulted a large wooden map where employees posted stickers tracking Lenny's relentless advance.


"We're taking no chances," said Gadiel Rivera, a 30-year-old accountant buying plywood to board up the windows of his home. "Everyone remembers Georges, who gave Puerto Rico a real beating."

Hurricane Georges, which hit in September 1998, steamrolled the island and killed more than 500 people throughout the Caribbean.

To many islanders who considered even last month's relatively weak storm Jose a late-season wonder, Lenny offered a glum reminder that hurricane season truly extends to the end of November - a time when rain-soaked terrain increases the likelihood of floods and mudslides, which pose the greatest danger.

The combination of the late date and easterly path left even experienced observers agape. "It's unheard of," said veteran meteorologist John Tewey on San Juan's WOSO-AM radio. "This is a oncein-a-lifetime event."

Outer bands of the storm already created torrential rain and danger-





ous, battering waves off Puerto Rico's southeast coast, the Weather Service said.

There were also high seas and damaged boats as far south as Aruba, just off the South American coastline.

Farther east, the storm hurt the endeavors of a Kentucky lawyer attempting to become the first American and the first woman to row solo across the Atlantic.

Tori Murden has rowed more than 2,500 miles since she left the Canary Islands in mid-September and is within 400 miles of her des-



The storm was expected to reach southeastern Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands by midmorning.


In the U.S. Virgin Islands, Gov. Charles Turnbull declared a state of emergency and a curfew after 9 p.m. to prevent looting, and the U.S. National Guard was placed on alert. Tourists crowded at airline ticket counters in an increasingly vain effort to leave.

The St. Croix airport closed, and the St. Thomas airport was scheduled to close. "We're trying to get to Miami," said Stephanie Lewis of New York City.

"I'm amazed that they didn't schedule more flights." In the nearby British Virgin Islands, schools, government offices and airports closed Tuesday afternoon. Only nurses, doctors, police and essential workers remained.

In Puerto Rico, there were concerns about a group of protesters camping out on a U.S. Navy bombing range on the outlying island of Vieques.

The protesters, who are opposed to live-fire training on the island, planned to ride out the storm inside an abandoned army tank used for target practice by the military. The government said it would open 328 hurricane shelters in schools Tuesday afternoon, and Gov. Pedro Rossello issued a ban on liquor sales at 6 p.m.

Rebels attack in Colombia

Eight police officers were killed in attacks by leftist rebels in rural states around Colombia, officials said Wednesday

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) -Attacks by leftist rebels in five rural states have killed at least eight police officers and leveled barracks, authorities said Wednesday.

The fighting, which began Tuesday night and was still raging Wednesday afternoon in a remote state capital, was the first broad guerrilla action since a nationwide offensive in July left hundreds of soldiers and rebel fighters dead.

The national police operations chief, Gen. Alfredo Salgado, characterized the onslaught, two days after the rebels rejected a government end-of-year truce offer, as "the guerrillas' response to the Colombian people's clamor for peace."

In the heaviest confirmed casualties thus far, six police officers were killed and four were missing in Prado, a town in central Tolima state, Salgado said.

"That's the information we have from peasants in the region, because the police barracks was totally destroyed and we haven't been able to get there yet," Salgado said

In another town in the same state, Dolores, the church was reportedly destroyed.

Salgado said units of the leftist Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, the country's largest guerrilla force, carried out the attacks in four states: Tolima, Huila, Norte de Santander and Arauca. Combat continued Wednesday

afternoon in Inirida, the capital of Guainia State in eastern plains along the border with Venezuela.

Four marines were slightly wounded, and reinforcements were



Banned China sect members protest

BELJING (AP)—Gathering furtively before police could catch them, several members of the banned Falun Gong spiritual movement staged a brief protest today in Beijing's Tiananmen Square.

In the latest act of defiance against the government's fourmonth campaign to vanquish the group, four women, a man and a young child performed slow meditation exercises on the vast square's pavement.

Plainclothes and uniformed police quickly hustled them into a van and drove them away. "We appeal to international society and to kind people who uphold justice to support Falun Gong believers who have been persecuted ruthlessly," a member of the movement who watched but did not take part in the demonstration said in a written appeal handed to a foreign reporter.

Chinese media and a human rights group reported that 16 Falun Gong adherents in cities across the country had been formally arrested on various charges, including disclosing state secrets, incitement to create disorder, organizing illegal gatherings and sales of illegal publications.

Since banning the popular group in July as a threat to society and the regime, the communist govliefs or face arrest.

But followers have converged on the capital to appeal, arguing that Falun Gong is not a threat and

improves health and morality. The written appeal by the Falun Gong member, who did not give his name, said fellow adherents were leaving their homes and jobs, sometimes walking or bicycling from distant cities, in their quest to defend the movement.

It said members were living in an "environment of absolute terror." Five suspected Falun Gong members in the northeastern city of Changchun were arrested in the past two weeks, the state-run newspaper Science and Technology Daily reported today.

Those arrested included Xu Yanquan, who it said headed the movement in Changchun, the hometown of Falun Gong founder Li Hongzhi and a stronghold for the group.

Three others - Zhang Guoliang, Deng Jin and Lu Yuzhong - were accused of selling Falun Gong publications, the newspaper said. A Hong Kong-based human rights group reported that 11 other Falun Gong members were facing trial in cities across the country.

China faces new rules

BELJING (AP) - U.S. and Chinese trade negotiators ended months of hard bargaining with a breakthrough agreement to stop China's runaway piracy of movies and software.

Fifteen months later, the negotiators had to redraft the accord to close loopholes China exploited.

With its landmark deal this week to open markets to U.S. business and the promise of entry to the World Trade Organization to follow, Beijing faces new globally enforced rules. And the question for China's trading partners is: Will the future be any different? "This country has been ruled by consensus for thousands of years.

You cannot change it overnight," said Shawn Xu, an economist with the investment house China International Capital Corp.

"The international community is going to have to give China some time." If past is prologue, China's membership in the global trading club could be tarred by broken or hedged promises.

Take the international treaty banning trade in endangered animals, which is spottily enforced, or the 1995 intellectual property protections with the United States, which had to be renegotiated in 1996. But there are encouraging

China's communist leaders have expended much political capital to overcome domestic op-

position to joining the capitalis WTO.

They see WTO with its free markets and fair-play rules as a way to prod long-protected state industries to reform or face unforgiving foreign competition.

It would also help build a more western-style legal system better suited to running the dynamic economy than the current mix of central fiat and imperial bureau-

Since Monday's market-opening deal with the United States, Chinese leaders have devoted the entirely state-controlled media to selling WTO to a nationalistic public and skeptical business interests.

"Under the agreement, China will have to do things according to international rules," People's Daily today quoted China's chief WTO negotiator, Long Yongtu, as saying.

"This cannot be called a concession. Following the rules is the duty of every responsible nation." The same protections that WTO membership affords other countries will also protect Chinese exports, ventures and markets abroad, Long argued.

Although U.S. trade negotiators called the agreement "comprehensive," China still can slow inroads by foreign companies. Financial and telecommunica-

tions firms given greater leeway

under the accord will still need government-issued licenses.

Capital controls and the inconvertibility of the yuan will dampen foreign bankers' interests. "In the end of the day, they


have a million ways to write rules to frustrate an agreement," said Gordon Chang, a Beijing-based lawyer with Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton and Garrison.

"China will find itself in perpetual litigation in WTO dispute panels." Pressures to delay living up to WTO terms will grow if recalcitrant state factories go under in dizzying numbers and unemployment soars, Chang said. But China, as negotiator Long noted, is in need of foreign capital and has to play by the rules to

attract it. Investors' fervor for China cooled further after the trading arm of a wealthy provincial government collapsed. Foreign lenders to GITIC are still trying to recover \$3 billion in debt. "The

Chinese learned a hard lesson: If you don't comply with international practices and international laws, you will get punished." said China International Capital's Xu. "There'll be no more lending from foreign banks." Even if China ends up with a mixed record in WTO, the People's Republic would hardly be alone.

Japan joined the world trade system 45 years ago and still has disputes with the United States and other trading partners.

Japan rocket may have leaked fuel

TOKYO (AP) — This week's NASDA spokeswoman Makiko Norman Makiko Nishihara said. minutes after launch may have been caused by fuel leaking from a rocket booster, Japanese space officials said Wednesday. The failed launch of the MTSAT satellite on Monday was the second this year caused by problems with the H-2 rocket, the key to Japan's space program. The program is competing with Europe and the United States for a share of the commercial satellitelaunching market.

Officials at the National Space Development Agency ordered the rocket destroyed after launch Monday when engine trouble developed and they feared the rocket might veer out of control. Liquid hydrogen fuel flowing from cracked pipes probably caused the engine trouble,

A video of the launch showed abnormal jets of gas shooting from the rocket's main engine shortly after takeoff. This, along with flight data transmitted during the launch, provided clues

about why the rocket malfunctioned, Nishihara said. She said the agency was still investigating what might have caused the cracks in the pipes. The failed launch was a major setback for Japan's government-

run program. "This doesn't just reflect poorly on the National Space Development Agency, it leaves serious doubts for Japan about the future of space as a business," said an editorial in the Nihon Keizai newspaper, Japan's main business daily.

Thai province tries to shake off dog meat tag

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A Thai province notorious for canine cuisine is stepping up a campaign to shake off its reputation as the place in Thailand to eat man's best friend.

The local government in Sakhon Nakhon province in Thailand's poor northeast is trying to clamp down on the many vendors in its famous dog meat market and persuade people that eating dog noodle soup and other dishes is bad for your health.

Vutthichai Sithi-art, an official at the provincial administration office, said Wednesday that police, veterinarians, public health and factory standards staff were trade, though it is legal.

Health officials would explain to people that since the meat mostly comes from strays, it is riddled with parasitic worms, Vuttichai said.

Traders, who also sell the skins for leather, will face more stringent monitoring of how they transport dogs and slaughter them for sale in the sprawling market, which local people say originated with Vietnamese settlers.

The provincial governor, anxious to dispel Sakhon Nakhon's reputation as Thailand's dog meat capital, is urging the Interior Ministry to issue a regulation prohib-

Sakhon Nakhon for its dog meat market." said Vuttichai. "This is very bad for the province's reputation, and we are trying to change it."

Unlike in some other Asian cultures, such as Korea where dog is regarded as a delicacy, it is less prized in Thailand for its taste than its cheapness.

Dog meat sells for 50 baht (\$ 1.30) per kilogram (2.2 pounds), compared with 80 baht (\$ 2.05) for a kilogram of pork.

Devious butchers looking to save money travel 540 kilometers (335 miles) to the province from Bangkok to buy dog meat in bulk and mix it with other kinds of meat they sell in the Thai capital,

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — An outspoken economist allied with Malaysia's opposition sued the country's Election Commission today, seeking to halt elections later this month because nearly 700,000 new voters were not being allowed to participate.

The Election Commission has claimed it cannot complete a new voter registration roll until January - too late for the Nov. 29 poll called recently by Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad.

The civil lawsuit was filed on behalf of economist Jomo Sundaram, one of the potential voters who will not be able to participate in the election. No date was set for a hearing. The petition was filed by Karpal Singh, a lawyer and opposition member of Parliament with the Democratic Action Party.

In the petition, Jomo argues that barring him from voting was a violation of his constitutional rights. "If the judiciary is concerned about the democratic pro-

cess and upholds the constitution, I believe I will be successful," Jomo told reporters.

About 680,000 citizens, mostly young people who turned 21 recently, signed up during Malaysia's voter registration drive in April.

But the Election Commission has maintained that only the 9.7 million people already on the list for the 1995 polls could vote.

The opposition alleges that the delay was a ploy to keep out young voters, many of whom are believed to have turned against Mahathir over the ouster and arrest last year of his popular deputy, Anwar Ibrahim.

"The Election Commission, in having to comply with the wishes of the prime minister not to allow the 680,000 new voters to vote in the 10th general election, has brought shame and infamy to Malaysia," said the Democratic Action Party's leader, Lim Kit Siang. Mahathir's ruling coalition, the National Front, has held power since the Southeast Asian nation became independent in 1957.

Since the prime minister fired Anwar in September 1998, however, Malaysians have protested openly against the government and opposition parties have banded together to challenge Mahathir. Anwar is serving a sixyear sentence for corruption and is currently on trial for sodomy, a crime in this predominantly Muslim nation.

Anwar denies the charges, saying they are part of a plot to quash his political challenge to Mahathir.

Foreign firms seek China telecom deals

BELJING, (Reuters) - A WTO "grandfather" - or seal in place pact between China and the United States has given foreign firms a new weapon in their battle with China Unicom over \$1.4 billion in frozen investments in telecommunications networks, executives said on Wednesday. "WTO will give us more ammunition against claims that our contract is irregular," said a Western telecom executive whose company invested in a China Unicom mobile phone network. "I think it's going to make it

fairly difficult for Unicom to negotiate from now on," he said. China's number two telecom firm has been fighting for more than a year to nullify joint ventures with two dozen foreign companies following a declaration by industry regulators that the projects were "irregular". Since the mid-1990s, the foreign firms had used Chinese middlemen to skirt a ban on overseas participation in the sector and pour a total of \$1.4 billion into Unicom's networks. Cashstarved Unicom initially welomed the capital but is now trying to buy out foreign partners to pave the way for a multibillion dollar overseas stock listing in April.

Most foreign companies have rebuffed Unicom.

"GRANDFATHER" **CLAUSE SEENTHEKEY Now** the companies are turning to a key pact signed between the United States and China on Monday, which would require China to gradually open telecom firms to 50 percent foreign ownership as a term of entry into the World Trade Organisation.

Equally important, China has agreed under the accord to

all existing operations in service sectors. "China will grandfather all existing current market access and activities in all services sectors," the pact said.

"This will protect existing American distribution services, financial services, professional and other service providers in China, including those operating under contractual or shareholder agreements or a licence, from restrictions as Chinese commitments phase in," the document said.

Europe will probably seek a similar clause in any WTO pact it negotiates with China, executives said. Several foreign companies said they would seek to use the grandfather clause to maintain a stake in their joint ventures with Unicom. "I think the WTO signing will

upset the momentum of the current negotiations," the Western company executive said. "We're going to re-look our

strategy from the bottom up." BUT WILL UNICOM AC-CEPT THE ARGUMENT? It is far from clear whether China Unicom or industry regulators would entertain protection under WTO.

"If you were to ask Unicom, I think whey would give you an answer that it doesn't change anything," said one source familiar with the issue.

"It's to their advantage to get the foreigners out for a cheap price and then go do a public

offering," he said. China Unicom declined immediate response on the issue. Still, a second Western executive with a stake in the issue said Unicom might see advantage in maintaining its partnerships.

Pakistan enacts anti-graft law

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan(AP) - Pakistan's military government enacted a stiffer anti-corruption law today that disqualifies politicians found guilty of corruption or defaulting on loans from holding office for 21 years.

The law took effect shortly after a midnight deadline expired for those with outstanding bank loans to repay their debts or face criminal charges.

jail term of up to 14 years. Previously, those found guilty of corruption in Pakistan faced a maximum five-year jail term and were kept out of politics for seven years.

According to newspaper reports, the equivalent of \$100 million was recovered when the deadline expired.

The new law also imposes a equivalent of nearly \$6 million. One of the first major promises of Army Chief Gen. Pervaiz Musharraf, after throwing out Sharif's increasingly unpopular government in a bloodless coup on Oct. 12, was to clean up the country's deeply corrupt political system and revive the economy.

It's estimated that the equivalent of as much as \$4 billion is owed to banks by defaulters, most of whom are among Pakistan's wealthy elite, government officials said.

Banks, which were taken over by the government in the 1970s, were coerced into giving loans to the powerful, who rarely provided sufficient collateral.

The new law gives the government the power to confiscate property owned by loan defaulters.

It also bars anyone found guilty of corruption from taking out another loan for 10 years, according to the state-run news agency, The Associated Press of Pakistan, which published the new law.

Musharraf, who took power in the coup last month. already has established a National Accountability Bureau, headed by an army general, to investigate the corrupt.

Report: What is a few thousand deaths in India? asks Prince Philip

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prince Philip reportedly told India's prime minister that a few thousand deaths in a super cyclone last month should not matter in a country of nearly 1 billion people, a respected Indian newspaper said.

The Duke of Edinburgh's comment embarrassed Queen Elizabeth at her meeting with Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee during the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting in Durban, South Africa, The Hindu newspaper reported Tuesday.

The newspaper quoted unidentified officials of the Indian foreign ministry as saying they were debating whether to raise the issue with British Prime Minister Tony Blair.

Philip, the paper said, intervened during a conversation when the queen expressed sympathy to Vajpayee over the death and devastation in Orissa, where nearly 10,000 people have been killed, according to preliminary counts.

The Hindu, a respected newspaper, said the queen was stunned by her husband's remark and did not respond. Vajpayee just smiled, the paper said

In August, Philip, 78, said during a tour of an electronics factory run by Racal-MESL in Edinburgh, Scotland that an unsophisticated fuse box with cables reaching up to the ceiling looked "as if it was put in by an Indian." Racial equality groups in Britain expressed anger and, in an unusual move, Philip apologized.

In 1997, while on a visit to the northern Indian city of Amritsar, he surprised his hosts by disputing historical accounts of a massacre by British soldiers.

The reports of the 1919 massacre said 300 Indians were killed and more than 1,000 were injured when British Gen. Reginald Dyer ordered his soldiers to fire on unarmed civilians listening to Indian leaders campaigning for independence in a courtyard that had only one gate.

Philip told an official showing him around the memorial that Dyer's son had told him that the figure was much lower and he had no reason to disbelieve him.

New Tunisia prime minister named

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Tunisian President Zine el Abidine Ben Ali on Wednesday named his former international cooperation minister, Mohamed Ghannouchi, as the North African nation's new prime minister.

Ghannouchi, 58, whose previous post included the task of seeking foreign investment, replaces Hamed Karoui, who had served as premier for ten years.

Ben Ali, who came to power in 1987 in a bloodless coup, won Oct. 24 presidential elections with more than 99 percent of the vote. Ghannouchi announced his new

post after a meeting with the president. Among other government changes, the number of women in ministerial posts will double to four and, for the first time, there will be a minister in charge of human rights - Dali Jazi.

A new defense minister, Mohamed Jegham, and new foreign minister, Habib Ben Ahia, were also named.


Ben Ali's Democratic Constitutional Rally party has ruled Tunisia under different names since the small Muslim nation on the Mediterranean gained independence from France in 1956.

Ben Ali was a former interior minister in 1987 when he toppled President Habib Bourguiba, the nation's founder.

After being sworn in for his third term on Nov. 15, he responded to critics who attacked the government's human rights record, accusing them of "smear campaigns."

During the election campaign, several French newspapers and human rights groups criticized the Tunisian government for its tight control of the media, and for other abuses from harassment to torture of political prisoners.

Quake relief boosts Turkey

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) -Moments after an earthquake shook western Turkey, military helicopters rushed to the region, ferrying injured survivors to hospitals while rescue teams began assembling for deployment.

The prompt relief efforts after the deadly quake on Friday have strengthened the Turkish government just months after outraged citizens were questioning not only the future of Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit, but also the central role of a military that is revered in society

Turkey's government is recouping some of the prestige it lost after the previous quake on Aug. 17, when rescue efforts were so poorly organized that one relief team had to stop and ask a reporter if she knew where the team was needed.

"This time, no mistakes," the Milliyet newspaper boasted in a headline. Hurriyet newspaper commented: "The state made it this time.'

through northwestern Turkey, the military appeared to be in shock at the scope of a quake that demolished tens of thousands of buildings and sent parts of a key naval base sliding into the sea, killing scores of top officers.

The military's slow response stunned citizens who have always regarded the army as the most efficient organization in the coun-

The government also appeared disorganized, and international rescue teams that arrived complained that they had little idea where they were needed even days after the quake had struck.

"Tragic though it was, it gave them a second chance to show

"The magnitude was on a much smaller scale." Turkey also had rescue equipment on hand that was donated after the earlier

quake, and many of the rescue teams had the experience of having worked together in Turkey in August.

"It gives people confidence

that at least Turkey has become aware of the need to prepare for disasters and it knows better how to respond to them," Makovsky said.

Clinton, Barak meet in Istanbul

EPHESUS, Turkey (AP) --- On a sightseeing break from official duties, President Clinton strolled today through the marble ruins of this ancient city, one of antiquity's best-preserved settlements in the Eastern Mediterranean.

Traversing white stone pathways with his wife, Hillary, and daughter, Chelsea, the president paused to admire the grassy Upper Agora, once a marketplace and public square; and the Trajan Fountain, which dates to 102 and was dedicated to Emperor Trajan. A colossal statue of the emperor stands in the center of the structure.

With armed security officers in the rocky hills overlooking Ephesus, the first family walked and gawked with guide Cengiz Icten, an archaeologist who escorted Mrs. Clinton when she visited the classical city in 1996.

Clinton flew here this morning from Istanbul, where he is to attend a meeting of the leaders of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe starting Thursday. He returned to Istanbul in the afternoon and met for 35 minutes at his hotel with Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak. On Thursday Clinton expects to meet with Russian President Boris Yeltsin to discuss several issues including U.S. objections to the Russian military offensive in Chechnya.

After the Barak meeting, Clinton's national security adviser, Sandy Berger, told reporters that Clinton raised the current

standoff between Israel and the Palestinians over whether Israel has the sole right to determine from which West Bank areas it will withdraw it troops. Berger gave few details of the discussion but said Barak "expressed some hope that that would be resolved soon."

Clinton met with Barak earlier this month in Oslo, where they and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat discussed trying to establish by February the framework for reaching a Middle East peace settlement. Ephesus, known as the third

city of the Roman Empire, was originally settled by Ionian Greeks in the 10th century B.C. In 550 B.C., the Temple of Artemis, one of the Seven Wonders of the World, was erected here.

By the 6th century B.C. the city had developed into one of the Aegean Sea's major trading ports. At its peak, it had a population of 200,000 to 250,000. Today, the sea is about three miles away, and much of the ruins now visible are from the first and second centuries.

After admiring the two-story Library of Celsus, built in 117, the Clintons' guide pointed out "graffiti" carved into the stone pathway that was meant to signal directions to the House of Love, a former brothel. The graffiti was a carving of a left foot beside the likeness of a woman with a crown on her head, indicating that the brothel was located to the left.

Pope to visit the Holy Land

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II will visit the Holy Land in March, a Vatican official said today in the first confirmation of the long-awaited trip.

The trip will take place during the last 10 days of March, and probably include stops in Jerusalem and Nazareth, Archbishop Crescenzio Sepe said at a news conference on Vatican plans for the millennium celebrations.

John Paul was invited by both Israeli and Palestinian authorities, and will be expected to visit Jerusalem and Bethlehem.

But the proposed stop in Nazareth was put in doubt recently by Vatican complaints over plans there to build a mosque near a Christian shrine.

The Israeli Foreign Ministry

welcomed the Vatican's announcement. "We all hope that this visit is going to reinvigorate and support the spirit of peace and reconciliation between religions and the peoples of the Middle East," said Effie Ben-Matityahu, a ministry spokesman.

Pope Paul VI visited the Holv Land in 1964, before Israel took over the entire city of Jerusalem in the 1967 war with the Arabs.

The pope also was considering a stop in Iraq during his planned millennium tour of Biblical sites.

But the Vatican has not yet confirmed that visit. An advance Vatican team was to leave Saturday for Iraq to plan for a visit in late January, the Vatican missionary news agency Fides said today, quoting church officials in Baghdad.

UN's refugee chief meets with Russians

MOSCOW (AP) — With Russia's military offensive in Chechnya coming under increased international criticism, the top U.N. refugee advocate met today with Russian leaders to discuss the humanitarian crisis growing out of the war.

As the diplomats conferred in Moscow, Russian aircraft and artillery kept up their pounding of Chechen settlements.

Military spokesman Igor Kaverin said early today that planes had unleashed airstrikes on 17 rebel targets over the past 24 hours.

Sadako Ogata, the U.N. high commissioner for refugees, met Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov and said afterward she had come to Russia "to convey the secretary-general's concern and understanding, his appreciation of the difficulty in controlling and tackling terrorism, the importance of caring for the civilian population."

Ogata also met Emergency Situations Minister Sergei Shoigu, who tried to assure her that "there is no humanitarian catastrophe here."

"We are in a position to cope with the situation ourselves," he said. Chechen authorities claim more than 4,100 civilians have been killed in Russian air and artillery strikes on the separatist Russian winter. She said the Rusrepublic, and human rights groups sian government had provided have accused the Russian military of indiscriminate attacks that ers in the Caucasus region. have killed far more civilians than Chechen fighters.

More than 211,600 refugees have streamed out of Chechnya into neighboring Russian republics, the Interfax news agency reported today, citing the Federal Migration Service. While many have found shelter with local families, thousands are living in makeshift refugee camps and face shortages of water, heating fuel and food, refugees and human rights advocates have said.

Ogata is scheduled to travel Thursday to Ingushetia, the region that has taken in the most refugees, and to the northern part of Chechnya, which is under control of Russian forces. Ivanov said the visit should help correct what Russian officials contend are Western misconceptions of the situation in and around Chechnya, which present "terrorists, who are up to their elbows in blood, as victims."

"We aren't hiding anything. We're prepared to completely inform the U.N. secretary general and world community of how things really stand," Ivanov said.

Russian leaders from President Boris Yeltsin on down have angrily rejected international criticism of the Chechen campaign, and have warned that Chechnya should not be a major topic of discussion at the summit of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, which opens Thursday in Istanbul, Tur-

The Russian government, meanwhile, has ordered more work on organizing temporary housing, food, schools and medical care for Chechen refugees in Ingushetia, the ITAR-Tass news agency reported today.

Ogata said the United Nations was preparing a plan to aid refugees from Chechnya over the next three months, the depths of the security guarantees for U.N. work

The United Nations had previously pulled most of its international staff from the area because of the threat of kidnappings and violent attacks, and it withdrew all its workers from Chechnya on Nov. 13, after two local U.N. workers were killed when Russian airplanes bombed a convoy of refugees.

Russian troops continued pressing toward the Chechen capital. Grozny, though commanders have stressed that they will rely on air and artillery strikes rather than storming to conquer Chechnya's towns.

Jordan, France sign debt accord

PARIS (AP) — King Abdullah II of Jordan won both economic and symbolic support from France on Tuesday as the two countries signed deals to lighten Jordan's debt and honored the memory of the king's late father.

The four-day trip to France had personal meaning for Abdullah, on his first official visit here.

The 37-year-old ruler attended the renaming of a Paris street for . his father, who died of cancer last February.

The new "Avenue King Hussein I of Jordan" is near the Eiffel Tower. The visit also brought about concrete economic results on Tuesday, the second day of the trip, with both countries signing an accord to cancel \$11 million worth of Jordan's \$7 billion foreign debt. The money will be used instead for social and environmental projects.

A further \$20 million worth of debt will be converted into investment. This brings Jordan's total percentage of convertible debt to 30 percent from 20 percent, after a debt restructuring agreement in 1996 already converted \$43 million.

French Prime Minister Lionel Jospin, who met Abdullah earlier on Tuesday, said the debt accord "showed our very strong will to aid as best we can the ambitious reform and development projects" in which Jordan is engaged.

The king lunched with business leaders Tuesday, citing "the importance of private French investment in Jordan" and hoping to attract more business to Jordan, Abdullah also sat in on a session of the National Assembly, where lawmakers stood to applaud him.

The Middle East peace process was a key part of Abdullah's agenda during his visit, and he thanked France for its support in the search for a lasting solution to the region's conflicts. In the past month, France has hosted a series of leaders from the Middle East, including Israeli leader Ehud Barak, Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat and Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak. During Abdullah's visit, France also is expected to woo Jordan as a customer for Airbus planes.

Astronomers scan skies for meteors

(AP) — Around the world, astronomers and amateur stargazers headed for fields, beaches, deserts and mountaintops Wednesday to watch what could be the most spectacular meteor shower since 1966 and for decades to come.

The annual Leonid meteor shower was expected to reach its peak overnight Wednesday. However, predicting timing and intensity is an inexact science, and the quarter moon, the lights of civilization and cloud cover could obscure the view.

"It could be spectacular, or it could be a dud," said Williams College astronomer Jay Pasachoff, who picked a beach outside Valencia, Spain, for his viewing spot.

The best American viewing of the shooting-star show was expected on the East Coast in the wee hours Thursday morning.

The National Weather Service forecast thickening clouds across

much of the Northeast, but mostly clear skies southward. However, astronomical calculations put the best spectacle in the Middle East and Europe.

Up to 20,000 shooting stars per hour were predicted during the meteor shower, which occurs when dust and ice shed by the comet Tempel-Tuttle streak into the Earth's atmosphere at 40 miles a second and burn up.

Since the orbiting comet dumps extra debris every 33 years when it races past the sun, the chances for a meteor storm rise very 33 years.

The last great storm was 1966, with a peak of 144,000 shooting stars per hour. A typical year might yield just 20 per hour.

A NASA network of observing stations tallied the Leonid meteor count at 20 to 40 per hour early Wednesday, according to staffer Steve Roy, at the Marshall Space Flight Center



The number of shooting stars and fireballs was expected to swell during the night. On Tuesday night, fireballs streaked across the sky and stirred panicky calls to police across the Midwest. Some feared plane crashes or UFOs.

Blazing meteors also streaked across the sky above the Mediterranean Sea. Roy said the reports could well have been the vanguard of the Leonid shower.

NASA is studying the composition of the Leonids with special equipment aboard two airplanes, hoping for clues to how organic chemicals were first brought to Earth. But astronomy teacher David Howell at Deerfield Academy in Deerfield, Mass., said that even most professionals, like amateur stargazers, were mainly chasing "the thrill of it."

The shooting stars and fireballs can dart anywhere overhead, but all appear to come from the direction of the constellation Leo, which gives the shower its name.



Cosmic Patriot

THE FIFTH essay in the late great G. H. Chesterton's, 'Orthodoxy' is called "The Flag of the World." In this essay Chesterton takes on the bipolar concepts of Pessimism and Optimism. In the process of unpacking, unraveling, reforming and thoroughly transforming these concepts, Chesterton comes up with a wonderful point of view which is signified by the notion of Cosmic Patriotism.

Lets first take a look at Pessimism, one of Saturn's dark moods. From the Latin, 'pessimus', meaning 'the worst', Pessimism has had many distinguished adherents, from the ancient Greeks to the postmodern denizens of the Nietzsche Night.

Sophocles said it long ago: "Never to be born is far the best; yet if a man lives, the next best thing is for him to return as quickly as possible to the place from which he came." Probably the greatest Pessimist of the West is the inimical Arthur Schopenhauer. He looks at the sum total of existence and comes up with a negative result, confirming with masterful prose the gloomy mathematics of Sophocles.

Optimism, from the Latin 'optimum' is the opposite of Pessi-

mism. The Pessimist thinks that everything is wrong in the worst of all possible worlds, whereas the Optimist thinks that everything is right in the best of all possible worlds. Gottfried Leibniz is the philosopher of Optimism, and Voltaire's Candide his eternal critic.

Chesterton maintains that both notions, Pessimism and Optimism are "raving nonsense." He notes that the best definition of the terms was given by a child when she said, "An optimist is a man who looks after your eyes, and a pessimist is a man who looks after your feet.'

Both notions, according to Chesterton are based on an invalid presumption. Namely, they assume that we are free to look upon the world as if we were house hunting, choosing what we like or don't like. But, a person, "...belongs to his world before he begins to ask if it is nice to belong to it...The world is not a lodginghouse at Brighton, which we are to leave because it is miserable...the point is not that this world is too sad to love or too glad not to love; the point is that when you do love a thing, its gladness is a reason for loving it,

Our original orientation to the world is one of allegiance and "primary loyalty." We must love it "for better or worse," or like the parent who loves her (or his) child regardless of the circumstances. And if we feel that something is a mess, that is all wrong and not as it should be, then that is all the more reason to love it more, because it needs our love. For Chesterton, what is given to us is "not a world but the material for a world." If we love it, are loyal to our belongingness to world, then can change it, re-form it.

This point of view is called Cosmic Patriotism, which is the point of view of love and compassion. It is able to encompass the data of both Pessimism and Optimism, and to use that data as a basis for further development. The Pessimist is lost in Saturn's fog, and the Optimist blinded by the brightness of the sun. But both conditions are symptoms of dull denial and narrow mindedness. Both extremes are balanced and dissolved in the heartfelt compassion of the Cosmic Patriot.





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

that while the accountancy board bill can help generate revenue, it will however hurt local companies, which could eventually close down once the measure is enacted

"The bill is going to kill... local accounting offices in the process," said Reyes.

"But that did not happen in Guam, and it won't happen here," said Nielsen, referring to the same measure that was enacted by the in 1991.

"It will just mean that people who were doing things that they are not qualified to do... have to stop doing it. They can continue being accountants and bookeepers but they cannot do services that require CPAs," explained Nielsen, adding that the measure is being practiced everywhere but here.

Nielsen said that as a result of the Senate's alleged inaction, the CNMI is losing millions of dollars to Guam, which collects fees for accommodating aspiring CPAs and conducting tests.

He said people seeking to take CPA tests in Guam for certification are usually from several Asian countries whose application for entry into the US mainland are given more attention by the US Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) once they pass the Board examination.

By Nielsen's estimates, the CNMI government could earn \$3 million a year for accommodating CPA Board examinees, and another \$850,000 in immediate cash from test fees. Airline companies servicing the Northern Marianas could earn \$2.6 million bringing in and flying back examinees from points of origin, while business establishments and ser vice providers in the CNMI could bring in \$2 million.

"Why are we letting Guam have that business?" he raised.



Lewis wants Tyson next

NEW YORK (AP) --- Lennox Lewis is eager to defend his undisputed heavyweight title against Mike Tyson because "it is the most exciting fight out there."

"He has that drawing ability," Lewis said Wednesday.

A Lewis-Tyson fight is far from imminent, though, according to Lou DiBella, who heads boxing for HBO. "The end of next year at the earliest," he said.

Would Lewis be willing to wait 18 months to fight the former heavyweight champion, even if it meant Tyson's skills would be further diminished?


"Yes, and they will be," the British fighter said.

Lewis said he respected Tyson and was sympathetic toward the troubled fighter because of what Tyson has been through, including three years in prison on a rape conviction and jail time for assaulting two motorists after a minor accident.

"He is a man who used to be great trying to get his life in order," said Lewis. 'He's gone through some bad times, but he's married now, and he has gotten away from people like Don King."

Sociology aside, Lewis said a fight with Tyson would sell because it presented questions the champion believed fight fans would pay to see answered.

"Is he the man he used to be? How would he cope with

Lewis? How would Lewis cope with him?" Lewis said. "He had the right moves before his trials and tribulations

Tyson's camp seemed delighted when told of Lewis' comments.

"At the right time, the fight will happen," said Shelly Finkel, Tyson's manager.

Lewis is under contract to HBO and Tyson to Showtime, but that cable TV conflict would present no problem that couldn't be solved, according to Seth Abraham of HBO.

"Right," agreed Finkel.

Lewis' 12-round victory over Evander Holyfield on Nov. 13 will be shown on HBO Saturday night before the heavyweight fight between Michael Grant and Andrew Golota.

Lewis will do commentary for his unanimous decision over Holyfield, and then join the announcing team for the Grant-Golota fight.

Lewis may have more than just a passing interest in that fight. A victory by Grant (30-0) might put him in line for a title shot at Lewis.

"He's big, and he's up and coming" was Lewis' assessment of the unbeaten Grant. "But, he's going to have to knockout out (Golota) in less than 20 seconds to beat me."

Actually, Lewis knocked Golota down twice before stopping him at 1:35 in the first round of their fight in October, 1997.

David Tua of New Zealand was another likely opponent for Lewis according to DiBella.

During the news conference, Lewis finally officially became undisputed heavyweight champion when he was unceremoniously handed his ransomed IBF belt.

Delivery had been held up pending payment of a \$300,000 sanctioning fee.

"We didn't want the money going into a Bob Lee defense fund," said Kathy Duva, the promoter whose Main Events Productions had kept the money in escrow until it could determine which IBF corporation would get the money. "It finally went to the nonprofit IBF of Rhode Island."

Lee, who heads the IBF, has been indicted on federal racketeering charges. The IBF belt was hand-carried from New Jersey in a box and given to Lewis, who spread it out on a table along with belts from the WBC, WBA and lesser known IBO and admired his loot.

Orioles give reliever \$7.75M deal

process of revamping their dreadful bullpen Wednesday by signing right-hander Mike Trombley to a \$7.75 million, three-year contract.

Trombley, 32, took over as closer for the Twins after Minnesota traded Rick Aguilera to the Chicago Cubs on May 21. The first free agent to sign with another team this offseason. Trombley converted 24 of 30 save chances in 1999 but will likely serve as a setup man for Mike Timlin.

"I'm looking it as a setup situation, but whenever they need me to pitch, I'll pitch," Trombley said. "I'll do what they say."

Trombley should provide much-needed help for a Baltimore bullpen that last season blew 27 saves, allowed at least one run in 89 of 145 games and finished with a 4.93 ERA.

"He's a proven setup man. We felt as though he would be a perfect match for Mike Timlin," Orioles director of personnel Syd Thrift said. "Timlin is a power pitcher, and Trombley relies on good stuff. It's a nice contrast."

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Orioles' new manager earlier this Baltimore Orioles began the month, was not at the press conference and did not return a phone call to his home in Ohio.

Trombley, who made \$1.5 million last season, gets a \$1 million signing bonus, \$2.5 million in 2000 and \$2 million in each of the following two years. The Orioles have a \$3 million option for 2003 with a \$250,000 buyout.

Timlin lost his grip on the closer's role last year during a first half in which he blew eight of 17 save opportunities. He rallied in the second half by converting 18 of 19 chances but finished with a 3-9 record.

Although Trombley was 2-8 with a 4.33 ERA, he converted 13 of 14 save opportunities after June 30. He can serve as insurance policy in case Timlin once again struggles in the stopper's role.

While the Orioles now have two closers to choose from, the Twins have none.

"That certainly puts a hole in the back end of our bullpen, so we're going to have to start making alternative plans,"Twins general manager Terry Ryan said Wednesday,

He said the Twins will "try to mix and match" what they al-Mike Hargrove, hired as the ready have in the bullpen, as well

as look at possible trades and the free-agent market.

Baltimore relievers were plagued by an excess of walks last season, but Trombley owns an excellent strikeout-to-walk ratio. He struck out 82 and walked 28 in 75 games in 1999, and over his eight-year career has 525 strikeouts compared to just 243 walks.

"He doesn't walk anybody, and he hasn't made an error in the last four years. You have to throw strikes in this league. That's critical," Thrift noted. Trombley, who was drafted by Minnesota in 1989, entertained offers from the Twins and other teams before deciding upon the Orioles.

"It was a tough decision. I really enjoyed my time with the Twins," Trombley said. "But Baltimore was very good to me (financially). I guess I'll have to prove I deserve it."

Orioles utility infielder Jeff Reboulet, who played in Minnesota with Tromblev from 1992 to 1996, is certain Baltimore will get its money's worth. "Everybody knows what Mike throws and he still has success. That's the sign of a

good pitcher," Reboulet said.

Chipper Jones wins NL MVP award

NEW YORK (AP) — Four swings changed Chipper Jones' season into an MVP year - four home runs in a three-game September series against the New York Mets.

"I think those four home runs were huge. I'd like to think my name was already on the map before that, but that kind of jumpstarted everything," Jones said Wednesday after winning the National League Most Valuable. Player Award in a landslide.

Jones, who hit 45 homers and carried Atlanta to an eighth straight division title, received 29 of 32 first-place votes and finished with 432 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. He also got two second-place votes and one third.

"It's awfully hard to believe," Jones said. "To have this in your corner, to always be able to say you won an MVP, is a tremendous honor."

Houston first baseman Jeff Bagwell was second with one first and 276 points, followed by Arizona third baseman Matt Williams, who had two firsts and 269 points. They were the only players picked on every ballot.

Cincinnati's Greg Vaughn was fourth with 121 points and St. Louis' Mark McGwire was fifth with 115, followed by the New York Mets' Robin Ventura (113). Mike Piazza (109) and Edgardo Alfonzo (88). Chicago's Sammy Sosa was ninth at 87.

"Matt Williams is one of the guvs I try to be like. Just to be in the hunt with him is an honor in itself," Jones said. "I didn't have a real good first half. Baggy put together a full year."

Jones, a 27-year-old third baseman, earned a \$100,000 bc nus and became the fifth Brave to win the award, joining Bob Elliott (1947), Hank Aaron (1957), Dale Murphy (1982 and '83) and Terry Pendleton (1991).

Jones hit .319 with 110 RBIs 116 runs, 25 steals and 126 walks, He finished third in homers behind Mark McGwire (65) and Sammy Sosa (63) and third in walks; fourth in slugging percentage (.633), on-base percentage (.441) and total bases (359); seventh in runs; and 10th in batting

After June 15, he hit 30 homers and drove in 79 runs.


