THE SETTLEMENT VISITED

Semi-Annual Expedition of the Board of Health to Molokai.

President Ruggles of the California Board Filled with Admiration--The Other Visitors Pleased with Conditions Seen.

The Board of Health, accompanied by several guests, left on the Mazama Friday evening to visit the leper settlement on Molokai.

Though the boat reached the Settlement at daybreak, it was several hours before a landing was accomplished, owing to the breakers.

After a few moments' rest the Board headquarters, horses were provided and the party visited the settlement at Kalawao.

The home in general looked neat and many new improvements were noticeable. After lunching at the Board headquarters on returning to Kalaupapa, the party repaired to the office, where complaints of the patients were heard.

In the afternoon a visit was made to the Bishop Home for Girls under the management of Sisters of Charity.

Dr. Ruggles, who for many years has been President of the California State Board of Health, and who made the trip from San Francisco to visit the settlement, was completely astounded.

Mr. Kenny, British Commissioner, was greatly interested and expressed himself as more than pleased with the general outlook of the entire colony.

The guests of the board were highly gratified at the courteous treatment received from the Board of Health, from the President down to the Secretary.

A writ of execution on judgment for \$90.30, in an action by Henry Smith against William R. Johnson, has been returned unsatisfied, the plaintiff having stopped proceedings on learning that the property levied upon had been sold by the defendant.

An execution against plaintiff in the breach of promise case of Charlotte Boyd against John Gandall, for balance of costs, has been returned satisfied.

Smallpox Scare.

London, Nov. 3.--Rev. Dr. Thomas Nettleship Staley, Bishop of Honolulu from 1861 to 1870, is dead. He visited the United States in 1865.

IT WAS A TRUST DEAL

Hawaiian Sugar People Have Made a Good Contract.

Trust Determined to Control Raw Sugar and Kill Independent Refiners--Clause Spreckels in the Deal.

New York, November 4.--The Sugar trust has entered into a contract with the planters of the Hawaiian estates for the entire output of raw sugar of the islands. The contract is to take effect at once and was made at a much better price than was secured by the planters in the last contract, which expired something more than a year ago.

This is one of the hardest blows which the trust has been able to give the independent refiners who are now fighting it. It means that 250,000 tons of high-grade cane sugar will belong to the trust for a series of years. Of this amount, 75,000 tons will be refined by the trust at San Francisco and the balance brought to the East.

The announcement of the consummation of the deal was made today in the "Sugar Trade Journal," which says: "The value of this masterly arrangement to stockholders of the company is very great and is more important in the current sugar war, as usual, the American Sugar Company coming out on top."

The deal by which the entire Hawaiian crop was secured by the trust has been in progress some time. Several months ago the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company was very mysteriously gobbled up, taking it out of the hands of two sons of Claus Spreckels, who had operated it against the Sugar Trust. It now develops that Claus Spreckels himself engineered the deal in the interest of the trust, which he has been connected with since it bought out his Philadelphia and San Francisco refineries some years ago.

The Spreckels boys were negotiating a contract with the Arbutle Bros. at the time the control of the company was taken out of their hands.

The whole move shows the trust was determined to control, to as great an extent as possible, the raw sugar market. The cane crop, which is the better, is limited, while the beet sugar supply is almost unlimited. In the same line it is now reported that the Sugar Trust is dickering for the Louisiana crop of cane sugar, some of which is coming on the market later than usual because of the yellow fever. In addition a rumor has it that the trust now has representatives in Porto Rico who are trying to tie up the crop there. As this is now United States territory, the high tariff will no longer keep it out of this market.

Takes Hawaiian Registry.

Tacoma, November 3.--The British bark Euterpe, loading lumber here for Australia, changed today from English to Hawaiian register. The change of register is made to get the vessel under the American flag when the substitution of American for Hawaiian shipping laws is made. J. J. Moore & Co. of San Francisco own the vessel.

PUEBLA HAS ROUGH TRIP

Troops However are All in Good Condition.

Nevada, Tennessee and California Represented--Will Remain Two Days--Officers.

The United States Transport City of Puebla arrived yesterday after a rather stormy trip, 7 days and 2 hours from dock to dock. She has aboard one battalion of the Tennessee regiment Co. A of the Nevada cavalry and the California heavy artillery. SPANISH CRUISER LOST.

Charleston, (S. C.), Nov. 5.--The cruiser Maria Teresa, Admiral Cervera's flagship when he made his memorable dash out of Santiago harbor on the morning of July 3, raised at great expense by Lieutenant Hobson and added to the American navy, foundered off San Salvador, Bahamas, in a terrible storm Tuesday afternoon last.

The news of the disaster was brought here by the wrecking tug S. J. Merritt arrived at Quarantine at 7 o'clock last night, but was not allowed to come up to the city until 2 o'clock this afternoon. On board the tug were Captain Harris and 136 others, the officers and crew of the Maria Teresa.

THEIR HERITAGE DESPISED

Would Throw Away Good Kona Land for Life in Honolulu.

Errand of Mother of Family to Chief Justice Judd--His Good Advice Makes No Impression.

Chief Justice Judd was waited upon by a widow from Kona, Hawaii, who had her four children with her. The eldest was a son of eighteen years. Many of the natives still come to the Chief Justice for judicial business of a class that he surrendered to the Circuit Court Judges when the Supreme Court was made a purely appellate tribunal for all but certain exceptional functions.

This woman wanted to know if His Honor would consent to the disposal of her children's heritage of real estate in Kona, so that the family could come to Honolulu and enjoy the more lively existence of the capital. Her husband had left 300 acres of land to his family. The mother would like to get an advance of \$500 on the property to enable her to gratify the hankering after the gay society of the metropolis.

She admitted that it was excellent land, which would afford them a comfortable living for the tillage. Chief Justice Judd advised her earnestly to hold on to the land as the very life of her young family. What future was promised for the children in Honolulu? Were her growing daughters to be brought up to slatternly indolence with perhaps the worst that such a life involved? His words produced no apparent impression on the woman. It was so lonely in Kona; she plaintively persisted, and she would much better like to live in Honolulu. The Chief Justice told her that if he were Circuit Court Judge and had her petition before him in form, he should never grant her leave to throw away the rich patrimony of her children.

The instant is only one of hundreds similar--the natives disposing of their lands to get into Vanity Fair. It is a subject knowingly avoided by those who are never tired of harping upon the alleged robbery of lands from the natives.

New Sugar Factory.

Peoria, Ill., Nov. 4.--The Illinois Sugar Refining Company, which has just been incorporated at Springfield, is a new beet sugar company, the first organized in the Central States. Most of the capital is furnished by the wholesale grocers of this city who expect to handle the product of the factory. The capacity of the plant at the start will be 300 tons of beets daily, but the works will be re-built so that this capacity can be doubled.

Two More Deaths.

George H. Cowes of the Red Cross corps of Co. H, N. Y. V., died yesterday. Funeral services will be held at St. Andrew's Cathedral at 10 o'clock tomorrow. Chaplain Schwartz officiating. Cowes was an Odd Fellow and belonged to the Degree of Rebekah. The local order will be represented at his burial.

Robert Wands of Co. C, N. Y. V., also died yesterday. His widow was consumption. Wands will be buried from the Catholic cathedral at 11 o'clock.

WAITING FOR THE ELECTIONS

Spanish Think Voters will Influence the Peace Plans.

Anticipated that Republicans will be Less Exactng After the Ballots are Counted--Objections to Manila Surrender.

Paris, November 5.--Referring to the peace negotiations between Spain and the United States the "Gaulois" today says: "The memorandum of the Spanish commissioners extended to forty pages of closely written matter, and included an objection to the surrender of Manila, on the plea that it took place forty eight hours after the signing of the peace preliminaries. There was also a reservation that the continued sovereignty of Spain over the Philippines was evidenced by the fact that this sovereignty had been referred to by the French Ambassador at Washington on the eve of the signing of the peace protocol and was not objected to by the American diplomats."

Continuing, the "Gaulois" says: "On the whole, the attitude of the Americans has been encouraging to the Spaniards, and it is likely that an agreement will be arrived at after the election in the United States, when the Republicans will show themselves less exacting, being relieved of electoral exigencies."

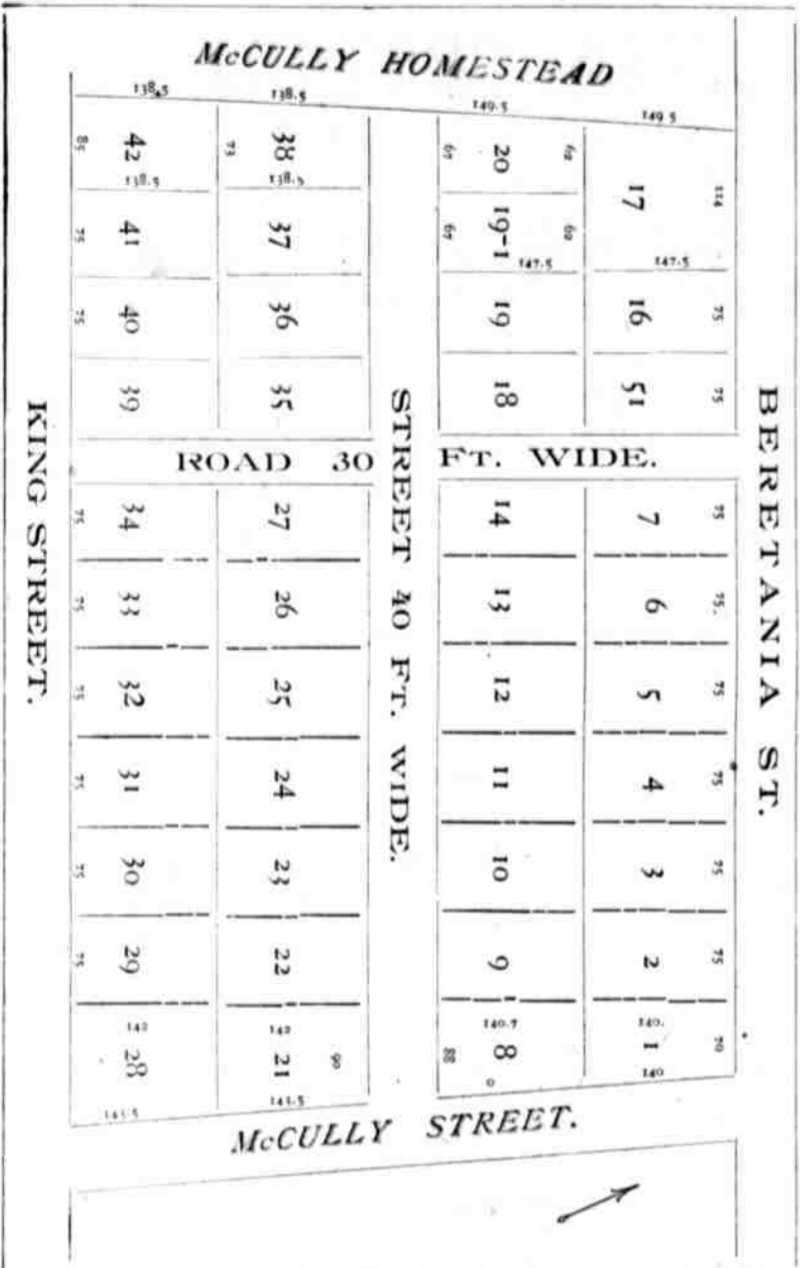

BRYCE AND THE ALLIANCE

Does Not Advocate Formal Agreement with United States.
Present Friendship is Strong Enough and will Hold Good—Two Nations with Common People and Purpose.

London, November 2.—In an address tonight the Hon. James Bryce said: When last in the United States I was much struck with the change in public sentiment. The spontaneous outburst of feeling in Great Britain when the European powers wished to intervene against the United States during the recent war with Spain made the Americans understand how close we felt the tie between ourselves and ourselves. They have shown that they appreciate and reciprocate our sentiment. I would never advocate a formal alliance. At all events the obstacles at present are serious, but all the conditions exist for a solid and durable friendship between America and Great Britain. They have no adverse interests anywhere in the world and they have common aims in sundry regions. Everywhere each can render a great service to the other. The Americans and the British understand each better than they can understand any foreign country. Nature and history meant them to be friends, and the closer and the deeper that friendship is the better it will be for the greatness and welfare of both.

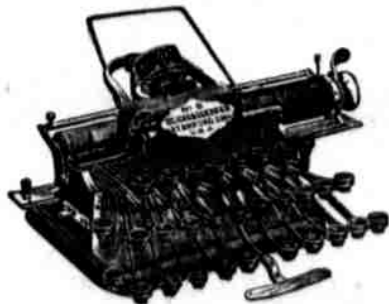

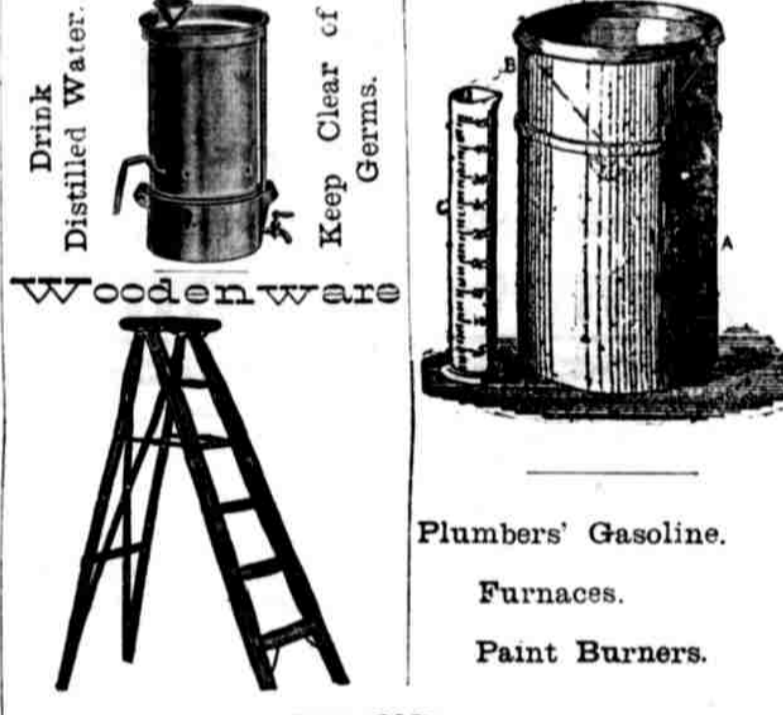
