### FACTS BLUNTLY PUT

#### MEDICAL MEN ISSUE UNDISGUISED ADVICE

Rosewater Recommended to Consumptives When Forced to Resort to Osculatory Pastime—Otherwise Doctrine.

The following circular was ordered printed in several languages and distributed throughout the Islands, at the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday:

To the Consumptive Direct—Your breath is not infectious, and people need not fear you on that account. Only what you cough up is dangerous, and that only when it gets dry. If this is spat up in your room on the floor and elsewhere, and allowed to become dry it will poison the air so that you may re-infect yourself and thus weaken or destroy the chance of your recovery.

When you cough do not swallow what comes up in your throat; spit it out, either into a bit of rag or paper, to be burned at once, or into water in a cup or vessel to be emptied frequently into the sewer through the waste pipes; the sewage germs will destroy the consumptive germs. By swallowing again there is danger of extending the disease to the bowels.

Do not let others kiss you indiscriminately, and never without first carefully wiping your lips with carbolic rosewater and thoroughly drying them.

Consumption is not hereditary and consequently, parents need not fear that they will transmit it to their children except, that the close and intimate relations between a consumptive mother and her child increase the danger of infection if the coughed-up matter is allowed to become dry before it is destroyed.

Most importantly: Remember that consumption is not necessarily a fatal disease. Many persons who have died of other diseases have been found with healed-up scars in the lungs, showing that they have been cured of consumption. More cases of consumption are cured by medical aid than is generally known—especially in this climate. Follow your doctor's instructions implicitly and don't impair his chance of curing you by re-infecting yourself. Insist on having all your expectorations promptly destroyed for your own sake as well as for the sake of others.

To the Family of a Consumptive—Study the principle underlying the foregoing. Make it a family duty incumbent on every member to see that no expectorated matter is allowed to get dry before being burned or emptied into the waste pipes.

Handkerchiefs should not be used by the consumptive; but if they are they should be immersed in water after each use and kept wet until they can be thoroughly boiled. Articles of clothing, bedding, etc., that may be accidentally soiled with the consumptive sputa, should be treated in the same way, or be thoroughly sponged off with carbolic water.

Spoons, cups, glasses and other articles used by a consumptive should be thoroughly washed and scalded as soon after use as possible.

When in doubt as to other details of this kind consult the doctor and rely upon him implicitly.

To the Public—The duty of the public as to consumption is obvious. Discourage the practice of public expectoration, both by precept and example. It is not only offensive to those who witness it, but dangerous to those who come along later when the expectoration is dried up, powdered and floating in the air.

Thrust a copy of this circular into the hands of the next person you see hawking and spitting on the streets or in a public place or vehicle.

### HEALTH BOARD MEETS

#### MANY CHANGES MADE AMONG SUBORDINATES

Queens Hospital Finances And Work Will Hereafter be Submitted to Board in Monthly Reports.

At the Board of Health meeting held yesterday the Board passed a vote of thanks to Dr. Herbert and Dr. Walters for their efficient and able services they have given in connection with the hospital for the insane during the past. The institution passes under the supervision today, of Dr. Marlston, medical superintendent and F. H. Kilbey, assistant, who filed their acceptances yesterday.

The matter of the sewerage system for the Baldwin home was disposed of by a resolution thanking Senator Baldwin for his liberal offer to equip the home with a sewer. However, owing to the scarcity of water available for flushing purposes, acceptance of the affair was necessarily deferred.

The questions of payment of steamship passage for deputy sheriffs and Board of Health patients, together with the matter of calling for new tenders for steamship service was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Smith, Auld and Reynolds.

Bids for furnishing canned beef to the leper settlement were opened from the firms of Blackfield & Co., and Theo. H. Davies & Co. The bids not complying with the terms of the call, the matter was referred to Superintendent Reynolds.

J. Kaiohelo was commissioned leper officer. The leper examining board as reconstituted will consist of Dr. Sloggett, Dr. Cooper, Dr. Moore, Dr. Meyers, Dr. Sinclair and Dr. McDonald.

Owing to confusion on the records of commissions issued to Board of Health employees, all such commissions will be cancelled August 15, and new ones made out to persons at present employed.

In the discussion in connection with hospital subsidies passed by the Legislature, the Board voted to require a monthly report from Queen's hospital showing receipts and expenditures. The appropriation made for this institution amounts to \$1666.66 per month, which will be paid monthly when the matter shall have been legally passed on by Attorney General Dole. A resolution to this effect was passed with reference to all hospitals receiving aid through the medium of the Board of Health.

Notice of acceptance of the position of government physician for Molokai outside of the settlement, was received from Dr. A. Moritz. Dr. Bond, government physician for North Kohala, declined to extend his duties over the territory of South Kohala.

Acceptance of the position of superintendent of the government dispensary was received from Dr. C. H. Douglass.

The committee to report on an improved scheme in the matter of drug allowances to government physicians, recommended that the business be left to the discretion of the executive officer and the secretary.

The board of examiners reported that Drs. Soga, Tschicht, and Kikawa had passed examinations and the secretary was instructed to recommend the Treasurer to issue to each, license to practice medicine.

Don S. Bowman was appointed sanitary inspector of Hilo, and Charles Moore, inspector of fish and pot.

A vote of thanks was tendered to J. H. Boyd for table accommodations for the Board's enquiry.

### TAX COMMISSION ORGANIZES.

The Tax Commission, authorized by the legislative concurrent resolution passed at the close of the regular session, met yesterday afternoon and organized. The members are as follows: Senators Kalaokalani and Kanaha; Representatives Emmeluth, Robertson and Makinai. John Emmeluth was elected chairman but no other officers were elected. The commission decided to go ahead with its work in the form of an independent investigation for the present. The compilation of the information gathered will be done later as the commission will not make any report until the sitting of the next Legislature. The commission has \$5,000 for its expenses.

### DETROIT BOAT WON.

Chicago, July 22.—The second trial for the Canada's cup was sailed this afternoon in a northwest wind averaging 20 miles an hour and was won by the Cadillac of Detroit, with the Detroit of Detroit second, the Illinois third, Mineola fourth and Prairie fifth. The last three boats are from Chicago. The Milwaukee, which won the first race, lost her rudder 20 minutes after starting and was compelled to drop out. The actual sailing time for the eighteen miles was: Cadillac, 2:29:32; Detroit, 2:41:50; Illinois, 2:42:15; Mineola, 2:55:05; Prairie, 3:55:29.

### Family Burned to Death.

Pittsburg, July 22.—A fire in a Penn avenue tenement building this morning caused the death of a mother and three children.

### SEEKING ITALIANS FOR LABOR IN CALIFORNIA

New Orleans, July 22.—W. E. Spofford and G. G. Camazzi of San Francisco are in New Orleans on a mission of great importance to this city, and one which it is believed will have a vast influence on the labor question for the Pacific Slope. It is the employment of white labor now chiefly employed on construction work in that section.

"We want all the white labor we can get," said Mr. Camazzi, "and are very favorable to the Italians on account of their thrift and attention to their business. They are good workmen and we would employ 500 or 1000 of them tomorrow if we could get them. It is an easy matter to get all the Japanese and Chinese laborers that we want at \$1 a day, but the Southern Pacific, which we represent, is desirous of replacing this labor with white men and is willing to pay from \$1.50 to \$1.60 a day for that class. We are awaiting detailed instructions—which will be given us Monday—before enrolling men."

President McKinley's decision in the case of the Legislature against Governor Dole confirms the contention of the Bulletin that Hawaii must work out its own salvation through the ballot box. Neither the governor, the judges nor the Legislature will be fired indiscriminately. Like naughty children they must learn to get along together and without constant appeals to papa.

No greater national calamity can be imagined than the resurrection of the Sampson-Schley powwow. A suffering public had hoped the corpse was a real one, and hardly become settled to that idea before either Sampson, Schley or some fool friend drops a word that brings the whole thing to life with renewed vigor. It is to be hoped that the fight between Secretary Long and the Board of Inquiry will be able to settle the affair once and for all.

At last Acting Governor Cooper has received an answer to his foolish proposition to use Republic of Hawaii bonds for the Territory of Hawaii. The answer is just what the people expected, and the experience can't do the Chief Executive any harm. After a few more rebuffs from Federal authorities our Executive may realize that it must stick to the Organic Act and not attempt to whip the devil of American law about the bush of personal schemes, hoping that McKinley will give his support. The Chief Executive must now realize that he presides over a Territory that is in financial straits. The only way out is through additional legislation. This means a special session to provide revenue and bonds and it is to be hoped the double-headed Executive will not shirk its plain duty but will endeavor to reach an understanding with members of the Legislature. A special session in September ought to find the members somewhat cooled off and the Executive less stiff-necked. It ought to be possible to secure a majority to do business that the Territory may not be held up for the full period of two years.

**BIG YACHTS STARTED ON ANOTHER RACE**

New London, Conn., July 25.—The yachtsmen of the New York Yacht Club came on deck this morning to find a complete change in the weather conditions and a cold northeast rainstorm sweeping over the fleet anchored at the mouth of the Thames. Soon after 8 o'clock, however, the rain ceased altogether. The wind did not subside, but was blowing at a good fifteen-knot rate with something more in the sound.  
Most of the yachts got away early but the big sloops did not start until just before 11:30. Columbia crossed the line sixteen seconds ahead of Constitution. At the starting gun Constitution occupied the better position but necessary for the Constitution to give Columbia took advantage of the situation and sped across ahead. The official time of the start:  
Columbia, 11:25:20.  
Constitution, 11:25:45.

**SHIP KINROSS' FAST TRIP FROM CARDIFF**

The British ship Kinross, Captain Locke, arrived from Cardiff, Wales, this morning after a remarkably fast voyage of 112 days.  
The Kinross left Cardiff on April 10th and crossed the equator twenty-two days later. On June 2nd she doubled Cape Horn, with all sails set. This is a thing that it is usually impossible to do. On July 1st the Kinross again crossed the equator. The vessel's best day's run was 300 knots. Her voyage, while very fast, is not as good as other vessels which have made the trip under 100 days.  
Captain Locke, the commander of the Kinross, is an American. The vessel was lately bought by Alexander & Baldwin and will be put in the coal trade between Oyster Harbor and Island ports. She is a remarkably fine looking vessel and will be quite an addition to the island fleet.  
Her cargo of coal is for the United States Navy.

**To Experiment With Isabella Grape**

W. A. Taylor, assistant pomologist at Washington, D. C., has written Jared Smith, asking for cuttings of the Isabella grape grown here. It has been reported to the pomologists that this grape has been cultivated in Hawaii so long that it has completely changed in type and is greatly different from the Isabella grown on the Mainland and in Europe. The cuttings will be put out in the department graperies and a study will be made to determine whether it deteriorates or improves from long cultivation in the tropics. A few cuttings left with Jared Smith at his office in the Capitol will be forwarded to Washington.

**Police Court Notes.**

In the Police Court this forenoon, Aug. Richardt, alias Richard Kunst, was fined \$150 and costs on the charge of selling spirituous liquor without a license at his parents' place on Queen street, July 27. Two of Detective Kappa's men testified to the purchase of a bottle of wine at the Queen street place and the paying over of twenty-five cents to Kunst. The defendant denied taking any money, saying that he was ordered by the old folks to give the natives wine but that he did not take a cent. He saw twenty-five cents on the table.  
During the testimony of Detective Kanpa, it was brought out that the following had been found stowed away on the Kunst place: 37 dozen bottles of beer, 33 quart bottles of wine, one 5 gallon keg of wine, 22½ small bottles of gin, and 5½ flasks of whiskey.

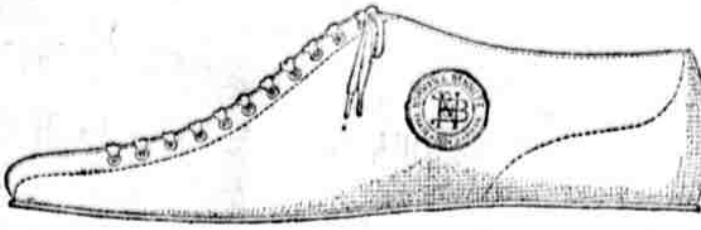

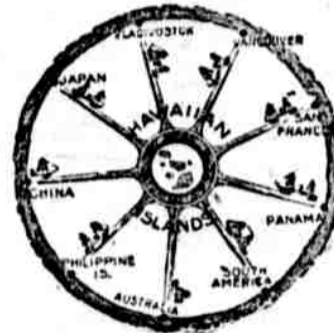
