THERE SHOULD HAVE BEEN AN INQUEST.

As reported in all the daily papers yesterday, a dead man was found in the harbor on Sunday morning. Competent medical testimony was to the effect that the man met his death by drowning in salt water. There is no doubt of that. But how did the drowning occur? This is the question that remains unsettled. It is a remarkable thing for a native Hawaiian, in health and his senses, to drown in a small sheet of water like the Honolulu harbor. Every Hawaiian can swim like a fish. How did this man get drowned? Did he fall into the water in a state of stupor? or did he strike against something solid and become insensible? or was he thrown in? Who can furnish answers to these questions? The whole affair is a mystery. About all that seems to be known is, that he was missing last Friday and was found drowned on Sunday. The body has been decently buried, and there is the end. This is certainly one of those cases of "sudden and suspicious deaths" which should have been investigated by a coroner's jury. A proper inquiry, which would have involved the calling and examination of witnesses, by an intelligent jury, might have cleared up the mystery; and if not, there would have been the satisfaction of knowing that no information to that end was procurable. Had the man no relatives or friends? Can anyone censure the general public for suspecting the practice of foul play? The coroner is decidedly guilty of palpable neglect of duty in not having summoned a jury, and made careful inquiry. It is a very easy matter for a man to be got quietly out of the world in this country, and the perpetrator escape undetected and unpunished. A rigid system of coroners' juries is the best safe guard yet devised against foul play.

OUR AMATEUR THEATRICALS.

The people of Honolulu owe thanks to the Amateur Minstrel Company for a series of amusing performances. In the death of amusement long prevailing, the young gentlemen composing this company did their best to furnish a little diversion, and they succeeded admirably. No better proof of their success in gratifying the public taste could be given or desired than the largeness of the audiences which have witnessed their performances. Three entertainments brought together three large gatherings, each succeeding one being an increase of the preceding, and the third and

last being the largest of the three. The legitimate drama, as some choose to call the antique productions of our forefathers, was not attempted. The amateurs sought to amuse, and amuse they did. The people went to the theatre to be amused, and amused they were. The success encountered was primarily due to a correct judgment of the public taste, which produced a class of entertainment that suited; and, secondarily, to the careful and thorough rehearsals of the troupe, which made every member master of his part, and resulted in performances well sustained and creditably played. For our own part, we have usually had unmeasured contempt for amateur theatricals of every description, considering them, as a rule, a miserable failure even as a burlesque of the pure breed. We are pleased to record a more favorable impression of Honolulu amateurs in general, and of the Minstrels in particular. They attempt nothing above their capacity, and they carry out satisfactorily what they undertake. Honor and thanks to them. We cordially congratulate them on the success they have achieved and the reputation they have established, and feel confident in asserting that the public will again be ready with an enthusiastic greeting, as soon as they (the amateurs) are ready with another entertainment or series of entertainments. Aloha!

A SURPRISE tin party was given to Mr. and Mrs. Julius Smith, at their residence, Beretania street, last night, by a number of their most intimate friends.

Mr. Brown (Australian Brown) of the Water Works Department, went to Molokai yesterday, to look after the water supply for the Leper Settlement.

THE receipts of the three entertainments by the Honolulu Amateur Musical Company amounted to about \$1,300, and the expenditures about \$500, leaving a net balance of \$800.

The Board of Immigration proposes to make arrangements for the further importation of Japanese immigrant laborers into this Kingdom, and requests that all parties desirous of procuring the services of such contract labor will forward their applications to the President of the Board of Immigration.

The special meeting of the Honolulu Rifles, last evening, was attended by about fifty members. A new constitution, for the battalion, drawn up by a special committee, was read and passed. The committee of arrangements on the drill and dance, last Friday evening, was requested to draw up a letter of thanks to those who kindly assisted the Rifles in their entertainment, and publish it in the Honolulu press. A committee of three—W. A. Kinney, W. E. Rowell and Sergeant E. F. Bishop—was appointed by the chair to engross a letter of thanks to the donors of the flag given to the Rifles. A vote of thanks was passed to Mr. F. Horn, for his efficient endeavors at the entertainment, Friday night, and for a delicious supply of ice cream and cakes sent to the army last evening. Next Thursday evening was set for the division of the Rifles into companies, and for the election of officers for the battalion. Five new members were elected, making the membership about one hundred. The meeting adjourned at 9:30 o'clock, with three deafening cheers for Captain V. V. Ashford.

He surrounded and took prisoner one of the Johnny "rebs" and in turn lost his drum by having it demolished by a bursting shell. Soon after he participated in one of those desperate charges that leaves but few to tell the tale, and came out of it with the tokens of its terrors in the shape of two wounds—one in the face, the other in the leg.

Is it any wonder that those highest in authority should commend the brave lad and that Horace Greeley should present him with the finest drum the country could produce?

SUPREME COURT.

BEFORE PRESTON, J.

MONDAY, March 28th.

Thos. H. Patterson vs. the bark Kalakaua, libel of intervention. Hearing upon claim of the captain, G. N. Armstrong, for certain personal property aboard the vessel, said claim having been filed March 15, 1887. The Court orders that the Marshal make an inventory of all goods and stores aboard the vessel, and that he make a separate inventory of goods belonging to the captain, G. N. Armstrong; also, that representatives of the owners, of the captain and libellant, may be present at the taking of said inventory. His Excellency A. Rosa for the captain, F. M. Hatch for the vessel and owners, W. A. Whiting for libellant, and W. A. Kinney for the nine seamen.

An application for a writ of habeas corpus was duly formulated by Mr. W. A. Kinney, of Smith, Thurston & Kinney, on behalf of Manuel Brito, a Portuguese. Brito was up before the Police Court on the 17th inst., and pleaded guilty to a charge of having opium unlawfully in possession, under section 4, Session Laws of 1886, whereupon he was fined \$1,000, and committed for two years hard labor. The petition was granted, a writ issued and the hearing took place this forenoon at 10 o'clock.

THE MATCH INDUSTRY.
A match is a small thing, but in the manufacture of matches one of the great corporations of this country has grown up. It originated in a combination of the leading match manufacturers. The capital stock is somewhere in the vicinity of \$20,000,000 to \$25,000,000. Last year a dividend of 8 percent was declared on this capitalization. The combination does not have entirely clear sailing. It is obliged at times to put prices down to the cost in order to drive competitors out of the business. Talking at the Hoffman House recently with John Robinson, the Chicago manager of the company, he said: "They have got matches down to a fine point in Michigan. They are selling three boxes—that is, 900 matches, for 2 cents. There was a little factory started at Grand Rapids. Matches were then selling at \$2.50 a case. They put down the price a little and we were obliged to meet them. They kept running down and we kept meeting them until it got down to \$1.25 a case. Then we took the initiative and dropped to \$1. The retailers had stocked up at from \$1.25 to \$1.75, which were thought bottom prices. Now they had to get rid of the matches at any sacrifice, and they began to cut. When they had slashed around to the dollar limit one man, who had been losing trade by the drive on matches, put his down to three boxes for 2 cents. That is 96 cents a case, or 4 cents less than he can duplicate them for. The other dealers offered to buy out his entire stock, but he wouldn't sell. He saw his trade coming back with the sale of matches at that price." It struck me in this episode there was a photograph of American business of startling vividness.—[Cincinnati Enquirer.]

AN EMPEROR'S SLAVES.
I have been told that there are about 5,000 male slaves in the Chinese Emperor's palace, a figure which is, of course, very difficult to control. The number, however, must be large, since that class of individuals is alone called upon to fill posts which everywhere else are usually given to men. Their business is to keep sharp watch over the Emperor's harem, an institution of no great service for the time being, since His Majesty is yet a minor, but in view of its becoming serviceable some day, and to pay meek homage to the rites of religion.

The Empress selects the young beauties admitted into this Chinese seraglio, and she has to renew the personnel every three years. These young girls are recruited among the families of the Manchou officers, who look upon the honor of having the prettiest of their daughters in the

imperial harem as a means of attaining high rank. These young ladies make their "debut" at the age of 14 and remain inside the harem until they are 25 years old. If in the interval they give birth to offspring they by right become "daughters of the imperial blood," and remain bound with the fate of the child, for he may become a "Son of Heaven" and sovereign heir to 10,000 kingdoms. If, on the other hand, the young lady reaches the age of 25 without yielding increase to the imperial household she is sent home to her illustrious parents and honestly weds a Mandarin of the place.

The legal ex-concubine of the Emperor is honored as a person of high rank, having held at Court the most exalted position. The Emperor is entitled to seven only of these legal concubines, but the number of illegal ones placed at his disposal is unlimited. That accounts for the large number of guardian eunuchs engaged to watch over and serve all these seraglio princesses, who are placed under the vigilant superintendence of the Empress.

Such manners appear very strange to us at first sight; but genuine Chinamen, who hold out staunchly for ancestral worship, find them practical and good, and ascribe to them the results that Chinese civilization has attained. They can not imagine how a nation can be endowed with better manners if it hopes to endure as long as the ages. The throne and family are thus never without heirs. This institution of eunuchs is not of Chinese origin. It was imported, say the learned, from Arabia and Persia, by a renowned Chinese conqueror. It was at once adopted at the Court of the Mogul sovereigns, and has ever since retained, in spite of varying success, a portion of that occult influence which Orientals are so provisionally ready to stand up for and defend.—[Journal des Debats.]

Rapid penmanship is advantageous at the English universities. It is said that one of the most famous of modern English mathematicians was beaten at his university examination by a rival who had practiced fast writing for some weeks beforehand.

Columbia College is to have a new gymnasium. The cost of the building as planned will be from \$125,000 to \$150,000. It will be three stories high, cover four lots of an area of about ten thousand square feet, and will be erected near the college.

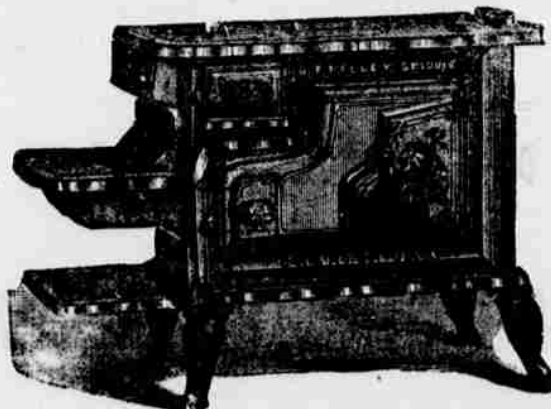

TWO BOYS WITH BUT ONE PAIR OF LEGS.

John and Jacob Tocci, the twins of Lecana, who have been shown in almost every city of Europe as the successors of the famous Siamese twins, are dying in the Prater. The boys resemble each other exactly, and are now in their tenth year. John and Jacob are separate as far as the sixth rib, and have one abdomen and one pair of legs between them. Jacob moves the right leg, John the left. The twins cannot walk, and they balance by lacing their arms round each other's necks. Jacob eats often and heartily and is the healthier of the two, and to all appearance it is he who keeps his brother alive. Two days ago the twins quarrelled over a toy, and John grew so excited that his heart-blood suddenly ceased to flow and he changed to a condition of complete lethargy, from which he had not woken on the following morning. The boy suffered from the same complaint a year ago in Berlin, and Professor Virchow then declared that a recurrence of the lethargy would certainly put an end to the twins' life. A number of Vienna physicians are observing the malady, but they entertain little hope of John's life, and if John dies, Jacob must follow him to the grave. The twins as they lie in their bed offer a strange contrast; Jacob, with feverish eyes and a red face, seems to harbor all the blood that has retreated from John's lifeless body. The conscious boy cries incessantly, because he has often heard Professor Virchow's remark repeated, and knows that his brother's death is but the harbinger of his own. The poor creatures are meeting with the same fate that some time ago put an end to the life of the Siamese twins, the second of whom died of poisoned blood vessels, after having spent six terrible hours, with the corpse of his brother. The advisability of an operation separating the living from the dead brother was discussed at the time, but before a resolution could be taken death had done its work. The twins of Lecana, who for the last eight years have traveled to all the world's shows, were to have left to-morrow for New York, where Barnum is said to have engaged them for a year at a salary of 30,000 francs. In the event of their death the parents have sold their body to a London anatomical museum for the price of £8,000.—[St. James Gazette.]

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

John C. Calhoun, then a Senator, stated in debate in 1841 that the "previous question" was introduced into the House in 1811. Its establishment was rendered necessary by the long-winded speeches of Barent Gardner, a Representative from New York, who would speak two or three days on some unimportant resolution when action was promptly demanded. Henry Clay differed from Mr. Calhoun in his recollection. He said that before the previous question was introduced they had a rule in observance in the House which acted as a great auxiliary in cutting off debate, and that was a question of consideration, viz: "Will the House now consider?" He recollected the application of that rule in a particular case of interest. Mr. Randolph, who understood that a message would be sent from the President declaring war against Great Britain, came to the House in the morning and commenced his famous anti-war speech, and after he had spoken some time he (Mr. Clay), being in the chair, asked him on what proposition he based his remarks. Mr. Randolph replied upon a resolution he was about to offer to this effect: "Resolved, That it is inexpedient to go to war with Great Britain." Mr. Clay asked him to be good enough to reduce it to writing, which he did and sent it to the Chair. The question was put: "Will the House now consider the resolution?" and decided in the negative, which cut off the speech, and Mr. Randolph denounced it as a "gag law."—[Ben: Perley Poore.]

People with a little ready money can pick up some very good pictures cheap in Paris nowadays. Fashion is beginning to turn from the modern school. A figure by Meissonier sold at auction recently for \$1,380, while one by Benjamin Constant brought \$125. A study by Alfred Stevens went for \$81, and Henner's "Eugenie," but eight years a sensation, brought only \$396.

It is said that Julian Hawthorne has retired from the Author's Club. He has not visited its rooms since the unfortunate Lowell-interview controversy.
